



A Christmas Miracle (Part One)

Christmas is a season of miracles...don't you agree? Some are easy to recognize like a beautifully decorated Christmas Tree, or a choir of rosy cheeked carolers huddled on the street corner filling the wintry air with heavenly melodies.

Some miracles come gift wrapped like a new sled, or a warm comfy sweater. Miracles arrive when families gather together on Christmas Eve and express in magical ways the joy of the Lord.

Then there are those miracles that are carried across the heavens by Angels who place them on your door step in the middle of the night. That, folks, is where I come in!

My Christmas story actually begins on January 16, 1956...my eighth birthday. My parents, Vito and Lena, took me to a nearby animal shelter, better known in those days as "the dog pound" to make my birthday wish come true. I was to have the dog of my choice as long, that is, it met my mother's standards...a small male mixed breed that was already housebroken.

I took none of that into consideration as I went from cage to cage searching for a dog that "fit right" like a new pair of sneakers.

While Vito and Lena were busy picking out the "dog of my choice," I had already made eye contact with my K-9 SOUL MATE; a brown and white puppy with big clumsy paws and a brown, diamond shaped spot at the center of his head. I immediately called out to my mom and dad that their search was over.

walked over holding a frisky little poodle that was licking her face and wagging its tail in joyful anticipation all for naught.

Actually my puppy fit my mom's original description. It was a male, a mixed breed, small since it was only a puppy, okay so it wasn't house broken but that, as it turned out, was my mother's problem.

Spread out the newspapers Vito and Lena and watch where you step...this mutt is coming home with us!

As we pulled into the drive way of our Arnot Street home, we were greeted by my older brother Eugene, and my two cousins, Marie and her kid sister Cathy, who lived on the second floor.

What a fuss they made over this smelly but loveable addition to our household.

Now folks, maybe it was due to the excitement over his new surroundings or maybe it was just his time to go but go he did moments after I placed him down on the kitchen floor.

"He's trying to mark his territory" said my brother with a sheepish grin. "I'll mark his territory with the tip of my shoe!" replied Lena trying to hold back her laughter. She said that since it was my dog I should be the one cleaning up his mess. I knew it was an idle threat, one that would be repeated every time the dog had an "accident."

Luckily for both me and the dog, my mom had him housebroken in a very short time... much shorter in fact than it took her to housebreak me.

I could not, for the life of me, come up with a suitable name for my new dog. "Spot" was the best I could do and that was because of the spot between his ears. "Here Spot."

after our last dog who died the year before and whose remains were buried on the side of our garage along with our cat Cloudy. "Dusty" he smiled "we'll call him Dusty."

Just as my brother spoke the name the dog's ears perked up and he ran over to my brother and began tugging at the rolled up cuff of his Levi's. "He knows his name" laughed my brother, "Dusty!"

By the spring of 1956, Dusty had woven himself deep into the fabric of our family and began to take on human characteristics.

Really folks, that dog thought he was human. He even had his own chair. It was a wooden rocking chair which was located in the kitchen, under a newly invented wall telephone, next to a window that overlooked the side entrance, which was all we ever used.

Getting Dusty off that chair was not an easy task. He'd growl and show his teeth as if he were going to bite my head off if I continued to disturb him. I used to annoy the heck out of him and growl and snarl though he did he never laid so much as a tooth on me. It was all show, all bark and no bite sort of thing.

As close as the rest of us were to our dog my mother had us all beat.

As far as Dusty was concerned Lena was the boss and come to think of it we felt the same way...uh, including Lena.

The dog responded to my mother's every command in military like fashion. If he was under foot she'd order him to get on his chair and off he'd go.

If it was time to eat she'd tell him to get his bowl and sure enough Dusty would come running out of the hallway with his tail wagging and his bowl dangling from his mouth.

The same with his cup. Yes folks, Dusty had his very own coffee cup. Of course no one ever drank from it other than the dog except maybe on special occasions when cups were in short supply... Just kidding folks!

favorite program or when it was cold and rainy and your socks were still drying on the radiator. Then came the time when I'd be sprawled out on the couch like a beached walrus and Dusty sat there in front of me giving me an urgent look telling me that his time had come.

I used to cover my eyes with the throw pillow hoping that when I removed it he'd be gone...no such luck!

My dad, against our wishes, used to open the side door and let the dog out on his own, gave him a few private moments, then call him back.

Every so often, for whatever reason, Vito would forget that he let the dog out. My mom was always the first to ask where the dog was. By that time Vito was already at the door calling for the dog to come in.

"Dusty" we'd hear him call. By the third "Dusty" the dog would dart up the steps make a right turn into the kitchen then a sharp left onto his rocking chair. My Mom was forever warning my dad not to let the dog out alone. "He likes to wander Vito" don't let him out alone. It was a warning that would come back to haunt the entire household.

The years that followed were, for me, filled with childhood crushes, red haired girls, close friendships, long summers and some nasty winters.

The winter of 1960/61 was especially fierce. It began snowing in late October and continued on and off until the following April. That year kids Halloween costumes were hidden under thick winter coats, gloves and woolen hats.

I recall trick or treating that year with the kids from Westervelt Place. A neighbor asked my pal Rocco, who he was supposed to be under the winter coat. "I'm not sure." replied Rocco "I think it's me under there."

By mid-November neighborhood kids were already hitting the slopes of Arnot Street with sleds, hockey skates, garbage can covers, their mother's ironing boards and whatever else was capable of sliding down the hill. As we raced past my house I noticed my father and my brother shoveling the side walk. My dog was out there sniffing around in the fast accumulating snow while my cousins, Marie and Cathy, were frolicking about throwing snowballs at the kids as they sped by. Daylight was fast giving way to evening's icy grip and it wasn't long before the Arnot Street hill was barren. All that could be heard was the angry wind whistling through the trees blowing the powdery snow into drifts so high that even the snow plows strained to get through.

I walked into the hallway, removed my winter gear, and joined the rest of my family in the warmth of our living room as they watched television.

My mom walked into the kitchen to check on the franks and beans she had baking in the oven. She noticed that the dog's rocking chair was empty and that food in his bowl was left untouched.

She re-entered the living room wiping her hands onto her apron and asked the dreaded question, "Where's the dog?"

My father and brother turned to each other with a foreboding look on their faces that told me in dead silence that something had gone horribly wrong.

My mother ran to the side door and in a despairing tone began calling the dog. "Dusty... here boy...here Dusty."

The urgency in Lena's voice echoed into the frigid night and soon became buried under the blinding snow. "Vito" shouted my mom "Don't tell me you forgot the dog out there. Didn't I tell you to keep him on the leash? You know he likes to roam. What did I tell you? Now go find that dog!"

The three of us got dressed and ventured out into the unfriendly night. Lena waited inside in case the dog found his way back.

The snow was coming down harder still and the howling of the wind muffled our voices and drove our words into the ground.

"Dusty" we yelled in long drawn out syllables "Here boy...here Dusty." Our voices cracked under the strain and our vision became increasingly impaired by the demonic gusts of wind that whipped us and stopped us in our tracks.

"Go home!" my father told me as he tried to shield me from the wintry onslaught. "We'll find that dog...go home." I remember giving Vito a hug and making my way home into the awaiting arms of that mighty fortress... Lena!

"Where's Daddy and your brother?" she asked as she helped me off with my boots. I told her that they were still looking for Dusty. My mom was noticeably worried and that worried me. It was already 7 p.m. Two hours had passed since my father and brother began the search. Two hours in the blinding snow and dangerously cold temperature looking for our lost dog. A half an hour later they returned empty handed. "We can't find him!" said my brother. "We looked high and low. Where the heck could he have gone? He just vanished into the night..Nowhere to be found."



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"Go get your cup," my mom would say in an energetic tone "You want ice cream?" If she ignored him he'd drop the cup in front of her and begin to communicate with her in dog language. It wasn't a growl rather a garbled bark. We'd be sitting at the table in stitches as Lena pretended not to notice him. Finally, Lena would give in, but not before Dusty exhausted his entire vocabulary.

The only thing my mom balked at regarding the dog was taking him "outside." If there was someone else available at the time then that person was given the task. It never came at a good time...the "walk" that is. It always came during your





Protection From Infection

Infection control refers to the recommended safety precautions that dentists follow to protect patients and staff. Many dental procedures involve direct contact with blood and saliva, but strict infection control helps to stop the spread of disease.

Infection control procedures call for most of the instruments and supplies that your dentist uses to be either heat-sterilized or disposable.

Do all dentists practice infection control?

The Occupational Safety and Health Administration Bloodborne Pathogens Standard requires that all employees who may come in contact with blood be trained about proper infection control procedures.

The dental board in your state also may have additional rules that your dentist must follow.

What are standard precautions?

Standard precautions are safety procedures established by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) and the American Dental Association (ADA) to make sure every patient is safe. These precautions require all dental staff involved in patient care to wear appropriate protective items, such as gloves, masks, and eyewear.

Dentists and their assistants can use different kinds of protective gloves. Latex, vinyl, or nitrile gloves are used for patient examinations and procedures, and are worn whenever skin could make contact with body fluids. The dentist or team member throws his or her gloves away after seeing each patient, washes his or her hands, and puts on a new set of gloves. The dental team also changes masks after each patient. tially contaminated surface.

Your dentist also makes sure that the instruments he or she uses during dental procedures are clean by sterilizing them, a process that destroys all forms of microbial life. Some protective items—such as gloves, masks, paper drapes, suction/water tube tips, and needles—do not need to be sterilized because they are used only once and then discarded.

Do dentists sterilize instruments after each patient?

Dentists sterilize the drill and other instruments between patients to prevent the transmission of diseases. Dental offices follow and monitor specific heat sterilization procedures, which are outlined by the CDC and the ADA.

Most dental instruments are sterilized in special machines because it takes much more than just soap and water to make sure instruments are free of bacteria.

Recommended sterilization methods include placing these instruments into an autoclave (*steam under pressure*) or a dry heat oven, or to use a chemical vapor (*commonly called a chemiclave*).

Typically, this equipment is kept in the office, away from patients' view.

How are other objects sterilized?

Before you enter the examination room, all surfaces are disinfected.

To sterilize equipment that can't be moved, such as X-ray units and countertops, a disinfectant is applied. Some offices may drape this equipment with protective covers, which are replaced after each patient. Disposable sharp items that cannot be sterilized—such as needles—are thrown away in puncture-resistant biohazard containers. Any disposable item that is contaminated with blood is discarded in a special container.

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Fatal Transaction-Realtors at Risk

Working in real estate can sometimes make you want to scream bloody murder. And then there are those occasions when those words are not simply just a colorful turn of phrase.

I'm thinking when authorities in Arkansas recently found the body of real estate agent Beverly Carter days after she vanished while showing a house to a "customer."

The man accused of kidnapping and killing her, Aaron Lewis, admitted that she was targeted because she was "a woman that worked alone."

The motive for the attack is still under investigation though the local sheriff's office said the alleged killer "was a stranger to her" and that he saw Beverly as "a target of opportunity."

The sheriff stated that the realtor met with Lewis at a vacant house because she believed him to be a prospective

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
What other industry requires unaccompanied female (and male) agents to meet perfect strangers in empty houses? None. One would think this a recipe for disaster. Well, it sure is! But that's how we make our living...

This, of course, is not the first time an agent has been murdered, raped or assaulted while on the job. According to the latest Bureau of Labor study, the real estate industry experiences about a 40% higher rate of on-the-job crime than the average profession. Many of us have had anxious moments from encounters that made us nervous in situations which were, to varying degrees, unsettling.

Take my husband, Martin, for example. Twenty-five years ago, in Little Ferry, he was asked by an attorney to evaluate and put on the market a two family home, court-ordered to be sold.

Not knowing that this property was owned by the two bitter halves of a vicious divorce entanglement, Martin thought it was just another listing opportunity...that was until the gun came out and he was threatened with immediate death.

It turned out that one of the owners – who had tried unsuccessfully over the course of years to buy out his ex's

interest - saw Martin as the embodiment of all his misery and persecution.

"This is going to end today!" he said. "I can't take this anymore!" Seven hours later, with the aid of a hostage negotiator, local and county police, fire trucks and SWAT teams all over the neighborhood (snipers in the trees!), my husband was freed.

It made news in the papers the next day with photos of him and I (me, looking young and *concerned*) on the front page of the Record.

We laugh about it now but, believe you me, it wasn't funny that day.

The fact is, taking precautions is something that's always in the back of an agent's mind, but - sadly - not always implemented in practice.

And what changes - besides the safety guidelines our office (and offices all over, I'm sure) just recently re-reviewed and re-emphasized - are necessary in today's crazy world?

Should open houses be outlawed? Should open houses be allowed only if there are two agents present? Should Realtors have a special exemption under the law to carry mace, a Taser or even a handgun?

I mean, there's no doubt about the issue of vulnerability. Real estate agents have always worked hardest those hours and days – nights, week-ends - when most other people are not at work.

And in many cases, their showings and open houses take place at isolated properties where they can find themselves alone with strangers.

But now - with social media increasingly becoming a tool used by criminals to track their prey - stalkers can check us out, target us at open houses and showing appointments or even go and rob our homes while we're working, thanks to the Web info trail we often leave on Facebook, Twitter, etc.

Scary world out there. Need the headlines, sometimes, to keep us mindful of it...

Baby Face

On December 6, 1908, Lester Joseph Gillis was born. His Mother must have smiled while she looked into the face of her baby son.

No doubt his parents were happy about the new arrival into the world and like all parents, were probably hopeful he would turn out to be a hard working good man.

Unfortunately, like many parents, their hopes would soon be dashed. At the age of 12, Lester found a pistol and accidently shot another kid in the jaw. He was sent to a reformatory school for a year.

At 13, he became a petty thief and was arrested again and sent to a penal school for another 18 months. Lester didn't learn his lesson.

By 1928, he was working at an oil station in Illinois that operated as a headquarters for a group of small time thieves that stole tires. Lester fit right in. It was here that he met many of the local criminals that moved through the Chicago underworld and he also took on a pseudonym.

When you're a criminal it isn't wise to use your own name, so he took the name George Nelson. He also took a wife. He married Helen Wawzynak. He also got involved with the local "Touhy Gang" and was soon driving bootleg alcohol throughout Chicago it and the name Lester Joseph Gillis would die in obscurity. Replaced by the name of what history now calls him, George "Baby Face" Nelson.

The gang was rounded up and locked up. Nelson too, but he made an escape in 1931. Nelson ran west. His underworld connections kept him hidden as he did work for a crime boss in Nevada and California.

He met up with two more thieves, John Paul Chase and Fatso Negri.

On August 18, 1933, he and his new gang robbed the bank in Grand Haven, Michigan. Banks being a favorite target, Nelson and the boys robbed the bank in Brainerd, Minnesota on October 23, 1933.

He sprayed the bystanders with machine gun fire as they fled. George "Baby Face" Nelson and the gang ran to San Antonio, Texas. A woman reported seeing them and one of his gang Tommy Carroll was stopped and questioned.

He started shooting and he killed Detective H.C. Perrin and wounded another officer. The gang fled again and Nelson went to San Francisco with his wife and child.

John Dillinger, another famous criminal of the time, made his escape from the Crown Point, Indiana jail. His escape may have been aided by Nelson and his gang, but it is not completely clear.

What is known however is that when Nelson and John Paul Chase went to meet Dillinger, his car was cut off by a paint salesman. Enraged, Nelson blocked his car in and killed him.

The gang was now John Dillinger, Homer Van Meter, Tommy Carroll, Eddie Green, John "Red" Hamilton and George "Baby Face" Nelson. With Dillinger now on board the gang robbed the Security National Bank in Sioux Falls, South Dakota. During the robbery, a motorcycle policeman rode up and Nelson sprayed him with machine gun fire wounding him severely. They made their escape. Dillinger and Hamilton were wounded by gun fire as the gang robbed the Bank in Mason City, Iowa on March 13, 1934.

testify against him. On March 22, Nelson and Chase solved the boss's problem. They kidnapped the witness, Roy Fritsch and made him disappear. Fritsch's remains were never found although legend has it that he was chopped up and thrown into a mineshaft.

On April 20, 1934 Nelson and his wife along with the rest of the gang wanted to spend a relaxing weekend in a lodge in Manitowish Waters, Wisconsin.

Everything was quiet during a card game the gang was having and the lodge owner's wife noticed that Dillinger was carrying a pistol. Then she said she looked at the other card players and noticed that they were all armed. She soon notified the FBI that the Dillinger gang was in her lodge. Agent Melvin Purvis and a team of FBI agents moved in to capture the gang.

On April 22, the agents surrounded the lodge. People were leaving a party at the time so it was difficult to know who was in the gang and who was in the party. When the agents tried to stop a Chevy Coupe from leaving, the driver didn't hear them order "Halt." The agents opened fire on the car. All three passengers were hit and one of them died. None of them were in the gang.

The gang realizing what was happening made their escape. Dillinger and the Boys ran out the back and made it through the woods and escaped.

Nelson charged head on at the agents. Shooting at Purvis and then the others, he was soon driven back into his room under a storm of bullets.

He too ran out the back and into the woods. He kidnapped a couple and ordered them to drive him far away. The car was slow so he told them to pull up to a house that still had its lights on. The owner was a switchboard operator and phoned the authorities of the strange car in front of his house. "Baby Face" Nelson took them all prisoner.

He was about to take the switchboard operator's car when the Agents pulled up to the house. W. Carter Baum and Jay Newman and the local policeman Carl Christensen were taken by surprise. Nelson ordered them out of their car. While they were exiting the car Nelson fired on the lawmen, wounding two and killing Baum with three shots to his neck. He stole their car and made his escape. His wife was captured at the Lodge. Nelson would eventually meet up with the gang in Aurora, Illinois. "Red" Hamilton was killed by police when he and Dillinger ran a road block. Tommy Carroll was killed running from the Police in Waterloo, Iowa. Nelson, for his murder of Agent Baum became Public Enemy Number 1.

Soon after this, the gang planned another robbery, the National Bank in South Bend, Indiana. Dillinger and another man ran into the bank to rob it and Van Meter was outside on guard duty for them.

A Policeman, Howard Wagner, was doing traffic duty when Van Meter shot and killed him.

A jeweler across the street opened fire and Nelson was hit. He wore a bullet proof vest and survived. He returned fire and the jeweler ran back into his store. The gang made their escape again.

On July 22, 1934, Dillinger was killed outside a theatre in Lincoln Park, Chicago. Van Meter was killed by police in St. Paul, Minnesota.

On November 27, 1934, Nelson and his wife along with John Paul Chase went to Barrington, Illinois. The FBI knew Nelson might come back to this town and staked it out.

While going down a road in this town Nelson spotted G-Men going the opposite way. The two cars circled one another and Nelson wound up behind the Agents' cars.

Chase and Nelson shot at the car and the Agents returned

fire. The Agents' car slid off the road and stopped.

Nelson kept going until his damaged car overheated and he skidded to a stop in a park. Agents Hollis and Cowley came up the same road as Nelson and realized what had happened. They pulled up not far from Nelson's car.

Nelson ordered his wife to go to a ditch for cover. He and Chase came out shooting. Agent Cowley shot Nelson 6 times before Cowley was shot and killed.


Hollis tried to move to a better spot to shoot but Nelson killed him with a shot to the head. Nelson stole their car but would die at a hideout that night.

His crime spree was finally brought to an end. Nelson's wild life is easy to track in books, on line, and in movies.

The public likes to idolize criminals and remember their names and forget the brave lawmen sent to capture these killers.

Why that happens, I will never understand. We should keep the brave lawmen in our minds and be grateful that we have citizens willing to go after and stop these murdering thieves.

Lester Gillis now going by the name George Nelson graduated up to home invasion and armed robbery when on January 6, 1930, he and the gang robbed a magazine executive at gunpoint. Taking jewelry, they made their escape.

Nelson and the gang robbed their first bank on April 21, 1930, netting about \$4,000 which in those days was big money. They robbed the Itasca State Bank and made off with \$4,600. Nelson robbed the wife of Chicago Mayor Bill Thomson. He took her jewelry and when interviewed by Police she said he had a "baby face, not much more than a boy."

The newspapers ran with

The FBI was now tracking them and they caught up with Eddie Green. Green was shot and killed on April 3, 1934.

Nelson and Chase hid in Reno, Nevada. Here their old crime boss pal had a problem. He was fighting a mail fraud case and a witness was going to

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

men back when the War ended. The War in Afghanistan and Iraq brought new horror. Without reason or compassion, they executed prisoners (civilian and military) and put the execution on the internet. They have hung our countrymen from bridges and thrown their bodies into rivers. In WWII, 400,000 lost their lives, but forgotten are the 73,000 who went missing in action. In Korea, 53,000 lost their lives, but forgotten are the 7,500 who went missing in action. In Vietnam, 58,000 lost their lives, but 1,600 went mission in action. During the Cold War, 126 are missing in action. To date, seven are missing in action from the Middle East. An Altar was prepared where Post Officers placed their symbolic tributes. ###

During WWII, Germany took 95,500 prisoners who suffered food shortages and unsanitary conditions. Japan took 27,465 prisoners and subjected them to murder, beatings, forced labor, medical experimentation, etc. An estimated 33% would die in captivity.

In the Korean War, those captured were subjected to torture and executions, malnutrition and diseases. It was reported that 900 were never given back to the United States.

In Vietnam, POWs were subjected to torture, starvation, beatings and murder. Like Korea, there is speculation as to whether we received all of our








