science; now, I, your magistrate, do proclaim that all ye Pilgrims, with your wives and little ones, do gather at ye meeting house, on ye hill, between the hours of 9 and 12 in the day time, on Thursday, November ye 29th of the year of our Lord one thousand six hundred and twentythree, and the third year since ye Pilgrims landed on ye Pilgrim Rock, there to listen to ye pastor, and render thanksgiving to ye Almighty God for all His blessings.

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

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


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42nd AHOF Induction Dinner

As each name was read, a Carlstadt Scout placed a flower at each memorial stone and Mayor Roseman tolled the bell.

The Mayor and Council then formally dedicated the monument.

A rifle salute was made by VFW Post 3149 members. "Taps" was played by a Marine bugler, and piper Sharon Dunn performed "Amazing Grace," while marching to the monument, concluding the program.

The monument was designed and constructed utilizing approximately \$60,000 in matching open space grant funding. ###





















Veterans Today By Thomas Marshall

Ever watch a football game and wonder how two teams can play and look terrible.

How can a coach call for that play? He should have done this play or that play? Doesn't he know his players? Do these guys practice? Do they do this for a living? Did anyone tell these teams there was a game today? Why does it look like no one prepared? How can they sell this to fans? Does this awful game constitute fraud? Is there a refund for a bad product on the field?

As a football fan we have all watched games and no doubt asked these questions. We are fans so we reserve the right to complain.

In life football is just a game. Win lose or draw Monday is back to work. So what does football teach us? What do we get out of it besides empty beer bottles, a headache and a broken TV?

It seems to me, mankind has a habit of looking at reality and not prepare for it.

We know what will happen and we are complacent. We do nothing. We ignore danger right in front of our eyes and ask later how did such a terrible thing happen? History has many examples of not being prepared.

In 1779, in New York State there was a village called Cherry Valley. It was located about 13 miles south of the Mohawk River.

Now this was the time of the American Revolution and so the people that farmed and lived in Cherry Valley needed protection from the Indian and British raids that had been destroying towns along the Mohawk River.

The people that lived there built a stockade around the Church and graveyard. Albany, the capitol of New York State sent the 7th Massachusetts Regiment for Cherry Valley's protection. Albany which was about fifty miles away felt that the Valley was now protected.

throughout the village and if any attack occurred they would not be able to get to the stockade.

The colonel received numerous warnings that a war party of Indians and Tories was headed his way but he chose to ignore them.

Three hundred Tory Rangers and four hundred Seneca Indians from the Iroquois Confederacy were moving down the Mohawk Valley.

In overall command was Captain Walter Butler. Butler had his Indian ally named Little Beard in charge of the Seneca Indians. Their goal was to wipe out Cherry Valley which was a known village of patriot support.

Also along on this raid was Chief Joseph Brant. He was a Mohawk Indian and he brought along about 60 Mohawks with him to help in the raid.

Colonel Alden sent out a small scouting party to check the woods surrounding the area for enemy activity. This scouting party was scouting for three days and they were cold, wet and tired.

Sergeant Adam Hunter relented to his scouts' request to make a fire to warm up and dry off. Making this big fire was a tremendous mistake. It attracted unwanted attention.

On the 10th of November 1779, Captain Butler and his war party surrounded the scouts and it wasn't hard to make them talk.

Hunter, with a knife at his throat, gave the layout of the troops quartered all over the town. Six of his scouts were dragged off into the woods by the Seneca and never seen again. Butler should have taken notice of what the Seneca did. Executing prisoners was not an accepted practice. There are many different Indian tribes and each one did things differently from the others. The Seneca were a vicious tribe that made no distinction among men, women or children. Joseph Brant and Little Beard no doubt knew the ways of the Seneca but for some reason, Butler remained oblivious. They planned to attack that night but the weather was rainy and cold with some flurries. So they decided to attack the next morning. On November 11, 1779 Colonel Alden was at the home of Robert Wells. Robert Wells was a Tory who was a friend to Chief Joseph Brant. Brant stopped there many times on his journeys in the past. Alden liked the nice house so he quartered himself there. Tory or not

the Seneca didn't care about Brant being friends with white people. They were closing in on the Wells house. Brant ran through a cornfield to save his friend and his family. Brant lost the footrace.

Eleven soldiers were quartered on the front porch. They fired a few shots at the oncoming Tory Raiders. The Tories fired a full volley and cut many of the soldiers down.

In an instant the Indians and Tories were on them and they were all killed and scalped.

Butler and Little Beard crashed through the front door. Inside they captured a Lt. Colonel and his aides, while Little Beard and his warriors went upstairs to the second floor and found Robert Wells and his wife along with their three sons and Robert's brother all kneeling in prayer. The Seneca hacked them down with tomahawks and scalped them all.

Colonel Alden ran out the back door. He tried to get to the stockade when he saw Brant rushing him. He fired a pistol at the Chief but he missed. Brant crushed his head with a tomahawk. Three African servants were also killed at the Wells house. Wells had a daughter named Jane and she also ran out the back door. Little Beard ran after her and she too was put to the hatchet. Jane's Aunt Eleanor was found hiding in the brush. She was killed and dismembered. Fifteen soldiers who were down by the creek washing their clothes were surprised and killed.

The troops that made it to the stockade of Fort Alden closed the gate and could not fire because no preparations had been made to the fort to allow them to shoot outside the fort.

Butler and his Tory and Indian Raiders had the advantage now. The 7th Massachusetts troops could do nothing from inside the fort. Cherry Valley and its people had lost their defense and Butler lost all control of the Seneca.

The Seneca now moved about the village and shot babies while in their mothers' arms. They burned an entire family inside their cabin.

on County Militia came to Cherry Valley. They showed up a day too late.

They found a burned down village and mutilated corpses all over the road. Wolves were eating the dead. There was nothing left to do but take the survivors out of the woods and escort them to safety. The remnants of the 7th Massachusetts became a burial detail.

So Alden didn't prepare for the Tories and Indians. Neither did Butler prepare for the actions of the Seneca.

Both sides failed on this battle. Butler won the battle but never again wanted anything to do with the Seneca.

He would carry the memories of the Cherry Valley Massacre with him for the rest of his days. If you want a great book on the early history of New York and its frontier, I recommend the book "Bloody Mohawk" by Richard Berleth.



In command of the 7th Massachusetts was Colonel Ichabod Alden. Alden and his regiment went into the village and he named the stockade after himself. He apparently wasn't humble.

He also apparently wasn't much of an officer. He had no barracks built for his men. He quartered his men in the local houses and not inside the newly named Fort Alden.

He had two cannons with the regiment but never had his men set them up in a proper battery inside the fort.

He had 250 men scattered

Body parts of babies were chopped off and thrown into the newly fallen snow. Women and children were killed and scalped on a scale never before seen in the Revolutionary War. Butler had no understanding of his own allies. He too was shocked by the carnage but did nothing to stop it. Villagers ran into the woods to escape. Those that were lucky enough to escape would never forget the horror of this day as men, women and children were killed and mutilated beyond

recognition.

Toothaches

While decay often is cited as the primary cause of a toothache, it's important for you to have a complete oral examination to determine the cause.

Other dental causes of a toothache include: infection, gum disease, grinding teeth *(bruxism)*, tooth trauma and an abnormal bite. Tooth eruption may be the cause of tooth or jaw pain in babies and schoolage children.

TMJ, sinus or ear infections and tension in the facial muscles can cause discomfort that resembles a toothache, but often these health problems are accompanied by a headache.

Pain around the teeth and the jaws can be symptoms of heart disease such as angina. If your dentist suspects a medical illness could be the cause of your toothache, he or she may refer you to a physician.

Why does my tooth ache?

You may have a dental cavity or advanced gum disease. The first sign of decay may be the pain you feel when you eat something sweet, very cold or very hot. If the pulp (the inside of the tooth that has tissue and nerves) has become irritated, this can cause pain in your tooth.

What are the symptoms of a toothache?

Because the symptoms of a toothache may resemble other medical conditions or dental problems, it can be difficult to diagnose the cause without a complete evaluation by your dentist. If you notice pus near the source of the pain, your tooth may have become abscessed, causing the surrounding bone to become infected.

Or the pus could indicate gum disease, which usually is characterized by inflammation of the soft tissue and abnormal loss of bone surrounding the rarily alleviate pain and inflammation from a toothache:

• Rinse with warm salt water.

• Gently floss teeth to dislodge any food particles trapped between teeth.

• Take an over-the-counter pain reliever such as aspirin, ibuprofen or acetaminophen to relieve pain. If your child has a toothache, use acetaminophen.

• Never put aspirin or any other painkiller against the gums near the aching tooth, as it may burn the gum tissue.

• Apply an over-the-counter antiseptic containing benzocaine directly to the irritated tooth and gum to temporarily relieve pain.

• If there has been some trauma to the tooth, a cold compress may be applied on the outside cheek to relieve pain or swelling. If your tooth has been knocked out, forced out of position, loosened or fractured, visit the dentist's office or a hospital emergency room immediately.

How can my dentist help?

Your dentist will conduct a complete oral examination to determine the location and cause of the toothache, looking for signs of swelling, redness and obvious tooth damage.

He or she may also take X-rays looking for evidence of tooth decay between teeth, a cracked or impacted tooth or a disorder of the underlying bone. Your dentist also may prescribe pain medication or antibiotics to speed the healing of your toothache. If, by the time you see your dentist, your tooth has become infected, then treatment could require removal of the tooth or a root canal procedure, which involves removing the damaged nerve tissue from the middle of a tooth.

Is there a way to prevent a toothache?

The key to preventing toothaches is establishing a regular oral hygiene routine and sticking to it.

For example, failure to brush and floss regularly after meals can significantly increase your risk of developing cavities. After you eat, bacteria in your mouth feed on sugar and starch and produce acid that can "eat" a hole (or cavity) in your tooth's enamel. If the cavity is not filled, it can cause considerable pain and potentially destroy the dentin, pulp and the tooth's nerve.

Here are a few tips to help reduce your risk for developing a toothache:

• Brush at least twice a day, preferably after every meal and snack.

• Floss once a day to prevent gum disease.

• Visit your dentist twice a year for oral examinations and a professional cleaning.

Wood-Ridge Priest Celebrates 50 Years of Priesthood

Father Allen Weber celebrated the 50th Anniversary of his priesthood with a Mass at the Assumption Church in Wood-Ridge on Sunday, September 20, 2015.

The actual date of his ordination was May 29, 1965. That means he was ordained at a time when enormous change was taking place in the Catholic Church during the Second Vatican Council.

The council, through the Holy See formally opened under the pontificate of Pope John XXIII on October 11,1962 and closed under Pope Paul VI on December 8,1965.

The ordination took place at the Sacred Heart Cathedral in Newark by Archbishop Thomas A. Boland. Father Weber was ordained a diocesan priest. In 1980 he applied and was accepted to the Holy Name Province of the Order of Friars Minor and became a Franciscan Friar. Father Weber's education included an A.B. from Seton Hall; S.T.B. from Catholic University; M.S. from Fordham University; M.A. from Seton Hall University and Ph.D. from Catholic University. Through the past fifty years he has taught religion at Union Catholic Girls High School, taught religion and was guidance director at Union Catholic Boys High School. After receiving his Ph. D. in Counseling he was assigned to the Faculty of Saint Bonaventure University where he remained for 27 years until he was assigned to Assumption Church on February 14, 2014.

At the anniversary Mass, the celebrant was Fr. Weber's close friend Bishop F. Richard Spencer, the Episcopal Vicar for Europe and Asia in the Archdiocese of Military Services.

During his homily, Bishop Spencer emphasized the fact that a priest's life is one of service to the people of the Church and obedience to the Pope and the dogma of the Catholic Church. It requires dedication, patience, and holiness. He also stressed the point that time is a prize. Each morning we awaken to receive 86,400 seconds as a gift of life. When we go to sleep at night any remaining time is not credited to us, therefore, what we haven't used up that day is forever lost. So treasure every moment you have and remember to enjoy your seconds of your life, because time races by so much quicker than you think. 

The home is located in a highly sought-after part of our highly saleable south central Bergen County area. The market's great; new offerings are flying out the window. This listing is money in the bank! You're thinking: "why can't they all be this easy!?"


Comes time for the appointment – your scripts are memorized and rehearsed, your game face is on – you walk to the front door and ring the bell.

An older woman greets you with a warm welcome and a slightly reluctant smile. Before inviting you in inside, she mentions that she hasn't been feeling well lately and so the house is not as tidy as she would have liked. You assure her that this

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But, on entering the house, you quickly realize that this woman's idea of tidy is way out of whack with the norm in any ordinary sense of the term.

Not only is this home untidy, but it is filled floor-toceiling and wall-to-wall with "stuff." You look around and see stacks of newspapers, magazines, old boxes everywhere and the counters covered with an agglomeration of things.

Before you even realize it, you're following the homeowner down a narrow trail of worn carpet, making your way through cluttered rooms.

There are piles of clothes and miscellaneous items covering virtually every piece of furniture and the lady directs you to a chair in the dining room that she has cleared especially for your visit.

You swallow hard and sit down. Once again the woman apologizes for the condition of the home and thanks you for coming...

Realtors who have been on similarly described listing appointments can relate to some of the strong emotions such an experience evokes in you. And, if they haven't yet encountered such a scenario, well, they only have to wait – their time will come...

Statistically, as our aging population continues to increase, so will the number of listings that agents will likely encounter; listings of Hoarder Homes.

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The American Psychiatric association recently classified "hoarding" as a mental disorder and it's estimated that 2 percent to 5 percent of the population is afflicted with it. Studies show that while the hoarding behaviors often begin in adolescence, they worsen with age.

The highest prevalence of extreme hoarding exists primarily in the over 55 age group. The National Association of Realtors reported last year that one in four home sellers was over the age of 65 and that 14% were over 75.

As a result, we agents are finding ourselves in new territory, shepherding the sale of a hoarder's home.
