
Adult Coloring Night

Thanksgiving, that special time of the year, where family and friends gather together to forget their troubles and enjoy spending time with each other, some good food and of course some liquid cheer, wine.

While you catch up with friends and family that you may not have seen in a while or reminisce about old times with great stories, Thanksgiving is that special holiday that brings everyone together even for a little while to just enjoy life.

An Old Vine Zinfandel or a Syrah, with their bold peppery notes will do your turkey proud.

Desserts such as Pumpkin and Apple Pie, cheese-cakes, chocolate covered fruits, crème brulee, fruit tarts and cannolis all raised to a higher level with the introduction of a dessert wine. Taylor Fladgate Tawny Port or Dow's Red Ruby port or cream Sherry like Pedro Ximenez will bring tears of joy to your eyes.

Mr. So Ham will be more than happy to guide you in buying the wines you would like to try to pair for your Thanksgiving dinner. Give him a price range and be prepared to be amazed.

Remember you don't need to change the wine for every course, but if you can have a couple of varieties it will enhance and complement your dishes. It would be fun and will show to your guests you are not just another pretty face, but that you have major wine chops!

Most importantly is to enjoy the wine with the people that you like. Of course for those of you who are stuck at the house with people you don't like than we suggest drink whatever is open... TWICE.

As you are enjoying your holiday dinner, please remember to be grateful for your family and friends. May people who need help receive it and have hope and friends during the holiday season to help bear their burden.

A few weeks ago, as I was leaving my apartment, I saw none other than my cousin, Anthony, walking up Arnot Street at the Burns Avenue intersection.

He was at the tail end of a brisk workout to strengthen an ailing knee and was ready to make the turn south onto Westervelt Place.

I was pleasantly surprised and shocked out of my wits to see him, on foot no less, as he passed my way. I had to rub my eyes and take another look to make sure I wasn't hallucinating. I have been writing about the kids from Westervelt Place for a decade and now, before my straining eyes, here was one of them.

It was like he had stepped out of the pages of the past and materialized right where we stood some 55 years ago.

There we were together again pausing for a brief moment at our old hang out...The store at the corner of Arnot Street and Westervelt Place... then turned southward toward yesteryear. I didn't realize it at the time, but we were actually taking a walk through history...our own history.

Everything I have been writing about for the past few years was coming back to life if only for those few moments.

Along the way we passed the Albano Family's garage where we used to play box ball and single, double, triple. There we were, all of us as happy and as carefree as I remembered us to be.

My cousins, Johnny and Anthony, Johnny Rannou, Rocco Albano, Bruce Lo Castro, Kenny Grecco, Alan Luciola, Louis Albano, Jimmy and Tommy Scarpone, the Davis brothers, George, Bobby and little Raymond and the untold many who walked in and out of our young lives during the course of a summer day.

The Albano Family, Louis, Josephine and their marvelous children...all seven of them... are woven so deep into the fabric of my life that they have become a part of me that will never die, a part that I cannot live without.

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Those of you who have been reading this column for lo these many years have joined me on what has been a long walk down a short block and have, no doubt, worn out more than a few pairs of sneakers.

Just the other day I went out by my lonely self and retraced the steps of my early youth.

I walked on the sacred ground where once my house on the corner of Arnot and Westminister Place stood.

I saw in my mind's eye the home of our neighbors, Ida and Lee Levi and their two children, Joan and Julius, as well as their fear inducing dog who answered to the name Boy.

The kids from Westervelt Place swore that Boy was part wolf and let me tell you folks that he lived up to it. There were only two things that could stop a game of box ball and send everyone in doors in a hurry... A violent lightning and thunder storm and Boy the dog when he broke loose from his chain.

Next to the Levi home was the home\barber shop of Sal Decaro better known in the neighborhood as Sal the Barber.

Sal was a cranky sort of fellow in his mid 50's though in retrospect he looked a lot older. Hey when you're 10 years old like we were, everyone looked

with a slight tilt and hardly if ever stood up straight and tall which was probably the result of stooping over the barber chair for all those years. Like the corner store, Sal closed his shop from 12 to 1 to have his lunch which his soft spoken wife, Nancy, prepared for him each day without fail.

From the sidewalk Sal could be seen at his little card table in the back of his shop enjoying whatever it was his wife prepared for him. I used to torment him by jumping on his metal street level cellar door, wait till he jumped out of his seat then run away.

I stood where my driveway used to be and saw myself talking to the left handed blonde girl from Pennsylvania who's pretty smile touched my heart, the memory of which beats there still. Her hair had the scent of Aqua Net hair spray which enhanced the already

I then found myself at the corner of Westervelt Place and Contant Avenue where once I held hands with a the girl with red hair, who's innocent brown eyes lifted me off the ground and sent me off on a lifelong dream...a dream that never

Amish Church membership begins with baptism, usually between the ages of 16 and 25. If they break their baptismal vows the Amish community shuns them. 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

Halitosis

Halitosis, or bad breath, affects more than 80 million people in the United States. In most cases, people with bad breath aren't even aware of the problem.

Halitosis has a significant impact, both personally and socially, on those who suffer from it. If you think that you suffer from bad breath, your dentist can help determine the source of the odor.

If your dentist believes that the problem is caused from a systemic (internal) source, such as an infection, he or she may refer you to your family physician or a specialist to help treat the cause of the problem.

What causes bad breath?

Typically, bad breath originates in your gums and tongue. It is caused by waste from bacteria in the mouth (typically called periodontal disease), decayed food particles, other debris in your mouth, and bad oral hygiene. The decay and debris produce a chemical compound that causes the unpleasant odor.

Bad breath may occur in people who have a medical infection, diabetes, kidney failure, or a liver malfunction. Even stress, dieting, snoring, age, and hormonal changes can have an effect on your breath. Xerostomia (*dry mouth*) and tobacco also contribute to the problem.

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What is morning breath?

Saliva is the key ingredient in your mouth that helps keep odor under control because it helps wash away odor-causing food particles and bacteria. When you sleep, however, salivary glands slow the production of saliva, allowing bacteria to grow inside the mouth, which causes the bad odor, or "morning breath."

To alleviate morning breath, brush your teeth and eat a morning meal.

Morning breath also is associated with hunger or fasting. If you skip breakfast, the odor may reoccur—even if you've brushed your teeth.

Do certain foods or drinks cause bad breath?

Very spicy foods, such as onions and garlic, and drinks like coffee may be detected on a person's breath for up to 72 hours after digestion. In addition, certain diets, especially ones that eliminate carbohydrates, increase the chances of halitosis.

How can I control bad breath?

Visit your dentist regularly because checkups will help detect any systemic causes. Checkups also help to get rid of the plaque and bacteria that build up on your teeth.

It is important to practice good oral hygiene, including brushing and flossing your teeth at least twice a day to remove bacteria, plaque, and food particles.

To alleviate odors, clean your tongue with your tooth-brush or a tongue scraper (a plastic tool that scrapes away bacteria that builds on the tongue).

In addition, be sure to drink plenty of water. Try chewing sugar-free gum that contains xylitol—it also may help control odor. If you have dentures or a removable appliance, such as a retainer or mouthguard, clean the appliance thoroughly before placing it back in your mouth.

Before you use mouthrinses or deodorizing sprays or tablets, talk with your dentist, because some of these products do little to eliminate bad breath. Instead, your dentist can recommend products that have proven successful.

Fifty-Nine Years and Counting

Rutherford Community Blood Bank will be well into its sixtieth year of operation and six decades of saving lives when it holds its annual fall donor day on Monday, November 7, 2016.

Representatives from religious, fraternal, civic and other organizations unanimously voted to set up a blood bank on Thursday, April 25, 1957. The first drive, which brought in 136 donations, was held in November of that year at the Elks Club on Ames Avenue in Rutherford.

Rutherford resident, Judith Calviello, is a former chairperson and one of the most loyal and long-serving members of the organization's board of directors, known for its enduring commitment and ability to retain members for many years. "Many people, like myself, have served for decades," said Mrs. Calviello. "We understand the severe ongoing shortage of blood, and that often those who need it are in dire straits. Also, I am one of the directors who has been grateful when blood was available for a seriously ill family member."

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Real Estate Insight

A Sometimes Strained Relationship

We real estate agents and the home sellers we represent have an oddly symbiotic relationship; we both benefit from the other: the home seller gets the property sold at an acceptable price and the real estate agent earns a little money for making it happen.

Oftentimes, as a result, this seller-agent relationship can become personal. This is because - unlike the majority of business dealings – this compact requires that both parties involved spend a lot of time working closely together towards achieving the mutual goal, the sale of the house.

The personal nature of the effort, though, can sometimes get rather complicated. Dealing with sellers in their homes (their natural habitat) seems to either find them in a state of vulnerability or in some other place where they may act without any pretensions.

This can lead to at least two possible scenarios for the agent. On the one hand, a special bond may be formed that will always be remembered fondly; in the other, a bad experience will evolve that will never be forgotten. Why?

Well, because, although often endearing, familiarity can on occasion most definitely lead to contempt.

Actually, it's precisely because of this familiarity that the line between a professional and a personal relationship gets

blurred. In an atmosphere of familiarity and camaraderie, sellers sometimes indulge in behaviors that can literally drive an agent crazy and work against the sale of the property. Let me mention a few of these scenarios...

The Pigsty. One famous realtor once wrote: "The way that you live and the way that you sell your home are two different things." How true! Selling your house expects a degree of good impression on the part of your potential buyers and the only way to get this is to keep your house immaculately clean.

Ready for viewing whenever the call is made. This is imperative because not even the best powers of persuasion your realtor can muster will obscure the buyer's opinion of your house especially if it is dirty and unkempt.

The Pig-Headed. Every home seller wants to get the best value for their home. Of course! We know that. But there's a big difference between sellers who want the best deal and sellers who would squeeze as much money as they can from their property.

The former would know how to compromise and negotiate on matters worth negotiating while the latter would always be inflexible with price, dismissing anybody outright who will not agree to it.

This sort of stubbornness can seriously disadvantage your agent who sincerely advocates working with the best buyer and not necessarily the best offer.

The Delusional. Undoubtedly, your home has a special spot in your heart after your having lived there for quite some time. But bear in mind: this is not necessarily the same impression your potential buyers may have.

Of course, you've built momentous memories there, but don't let this sort of emotional attachment override your agent's sound pricing advice. Remember: your agent sees your house for what it is and his/her pricing is based on practical calculations and concrete advantages and benefits.

Just the facts; no sentimentality. If you are unable to agree with your agent's realistic pricing then maybe you should reconsider selling at this time, as you may not be ready...

The Bad Intentioned. Failing to clean up properly before transferring the property is the height of rudeness, in my estimation. Sure, your thoughts are now more on where you're going than on what you're leaving behind but – please! - show some common courtesy.

And - whatever may have occurred during the course of the deal – don't consider it cause for you to act vindictively or with malice.

If nothing else, think of your poor realtor who recommended your home and who did so much over time to put it in the best possible light...

The Jerseymen at Gettysburg

Part 4 of 7

The 3rd Brigade, 2nd Division, III Corps, was known as the "SECOND NEW JERSEY BRIGADE." Although called the Second NJ Brigade, only four of the six regiments were from New Jersey. They were the 5th, 6th, 7th, and 8th NJ Vol. Inf. Regiments.

They were brigaded with the 2nd New Hampshire and 115th Pennsylvania Regiments. The Brigade was commanded by Col. George Burling. He had been Colonel of the 6th New Jersey before taking command of the Brigade.

When a regiment was formed, it had about 1,000 men and officers. By this time, many regiments were understrength due to losses from combat, sickness and desertion. More men died from illness than from combat during the Civil War.

At about 3 p.m. on July 2, the Brigade advanced with their division and was placed in reserve to the rear of the other brigades.

However, starting around 4 p.m. the Brigade's regiments were ordered to various positions to help stem the Confederate attack now hitting the III Corps. No two regiments of the Brigade would fight together that day. At the height of the battle, Col. Burling would have no regiments under his direct command.

The 5th NJ Vol. Inf., under the command of Col. William Sewell, was ordered to report for picket duty, west of the Emmitsburg Road. The regiment formed a skirmish line about 300-400 yards from the road.

As the Confederates of General Longstreet's Corps advanced, the regiment fell back to the road. They supported artillery near the Klingle House. When Confederate pressure forced the artillery to withdraw, the 5th covered them.

They began to withdraw themselves. The regiment's color guard had taken shelter behind the house. Corporal John Sutton, fearing the loss of the regiment's colors, ran to them and took The Colors to safety. Col. Sewell was wounded. He turned over command to Capt. Virgil Healy but he was soon wounded. Capt. Henry Woolsey took command. He was wounded immediately after. The regiment left the field under the command of Capt. Thomas Godfrey, the fourth commander of the day.

They lost 94 men, killed, wounded, missing or captured out of the 206 men present that day.

The 6th NJ, commanded by Lt. Col. S. R. Gilkyson, was sent to support Union forces near the Devil's Den. They covered artillery and the 40th, NY. When Union forces retreated from this area, they fell back also. Their losses were 41 out of the 207 men present.

The 7th NJ, commanded by Col. Louis Francine, was ordered to support the artillery line facing south near the Peach Orchard. This included Battery B, NJ Artillery.

The regiment was in the rear of the artillery line. Because of the fire from the enemy directed at the artillery, Col. Francine ordered his men to lie down. When the artillery raced to withdraw, the men were almost run over. This split the regiment.

Six companies under Col. Francine advanced to fire a volley at the advancing enemy. Col. Francine received a mortal wound. The men fell back and rejoined the other four companies. Lt. Col. Francis Price rallied the regiment by grabbing the two color bearers and posting them where he wanted the line formed. He was then wounded. The regiment then fell back to Cemetery Ridge. Of the 275 men present, they lost 114.

The 8th NJ, commanded by Col. John Ramsey, was sent south of the Peach Orchard, near the Wheat Field. Here they had a short, sharp and bloody fight and had to fall back. All the while losing men. Col. Ramsey was wounded and command passed to Capt. John Langston, who led the men back to Cemetery Ridge. Out of 170 men, 47 were casualties. Of the 705 Jerseymen, in the Brigade, that were present, 296 were casualties. This was a loss of 23.8%.

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Veterans Today

Many times in life you realize the game is over. You are just waiting for the clock to expire when it hits zero, kind of like the football game that shows a score of 54 to 0 on the board and there are 2 minutes remaining.

You may be on the winning side or you may be on the losing side but the game is all but over. There is little that can be done at that point. These moments happen at work, school, home life -- basically anywhere.

History gives us many examples of this as wars wind down. The Civil War has a good example of it.

In November of 1864, Lt. General John Bell Hood was in command of the Army of Tennessee. He had about 39,000 men under his command.

Hood came up through the Confederate high command fighting in the east under General Robert E. Lee's Army of Northern Virginia. He was brave, sturdy and reliable for sure and I doubt anyone that studied the war would deny that but with only 39,000 troops facing General William Tecumseh Sherman's Army of around 120,000 there is not much he could do but be disruptive to the Union Army.

Sherman took Atlanta, Georgia, and was chasing Hood's army trying to stop their raids on the railroad lines that were supplying his army in Tennessee. He chased them through northern Alabama. Hood was a fighter but his numbers were not there to stop Sherman. His raids could not win the war in the west for the Confederates.

Also, on November 8, 1864, General George Mc-Clellan a Democrat, lost the Presidential Election of 1864 to Republican Abraham Lincoln.

This is important because McClellan ran on the platform of ending the war with the South. Lincoln wanted to finish the war with a northern victory. So, with Lincoln's victory the war would continue. It was another blow to Southern Independence.

Sherman grew tired of chasing Hood's army. He reasoned that he would lose 1,000 men a month just trying to protect thousands of miles of rail lines.

He took about 62,000 men and decided that he and these men would live off the land and march to the sea.

The idea was to bring the war to the Southern people and

show them first hand that the Confederacy could not protect them

He and his men caused a lot of damage along the way. His men burned down buildings, taking livestock and crops, sweeping all in his path as he marched to the Atlantic Ocean.

What should Hood do? Try and stop Sherman with his smaller force? Attack the rear of Sherman's Army to slow him down or turn him around?

History shows that Hood did neither. Instead he looked at what Sherman left behind. Sherman left Major General George H. Thomas in charge of the Fourth and Twenty-third Corps. Thomas needed to bring them all together though and that may take weeks to gather them. Hood saw a chance to do some damage. He decided that it would be better to attack the troops before they gathered together with Thomas in Nashville, Tennessee.

On November 21, 1864 Hood and the Army of Tennessee crossed the Tennessee River and marched north. Thomas wanted to delay Hood's army so he placed Major General John M. Schofield and 28,000 men in Pulaski, Tennessee to slow him down.

Hood by-passed Schofield's force and headed to Columbia, Tennessee. This is the main crossing point of the Duck River on the way to Nashville. He did this not to run away but to cut off Schofield from the rest of Thomas' corps.

When Hood and his men arrived there on the 26th, they found to their surprise, Schofield had beat them to it. Hood and his men tried another move around Schofield, but Schofield backed his force up to the Duck River and waited for Hood's next move.

Hood left one of his three corps to occupy Schofield and he did a long flanking march around Schofield. He crossed the Duck River and marched to Spring Hill, Tennessee behind Schofield's position.

Hood ordered his generals to take Spring Hill from a small garrison. They attacked and skirmished till the sun went down. Hood and his army went to sleep believing that he had isolated Schofield from the rest of Thomas' troops.

Their camp was only a few hundred yards from the turnpike that lead north. Hood's men never secured the road. While the Confederates slept, unbelievably, Schofield and his men and wagon train marched right past and were not attacked.

The next morning General John Bell Hood could not believe what had happened. Furious, he called all his generals to him and he rebuked them on letting the Union troops escape. He ordered the army in pursuit of Schofield. Schofield meanwhile was now in Franklin, Tennessee, which is 30 miles south of Nashville. He had to have his troops repair bridges before he could continue north to Nashville.

On November 30, 1864, Hood took his entire command and raced to catch up to Schofield. He didn't wait for the Corps he left behind at the Duck River to catch up. He didn't wait for his artillery.

He brought his troops right up to the Union position and he ordered them to attack. Some of his generals offered flanking movements to gain a victory, but Hood said no. So, 20,000 men charged at the Union position.

Schofield's troops dug breast works around the town of Franklin. Each end of the breast work rested on the Harpeth River. Putting your back to the river is a dangerous position that no general wants, but Schofield needed a bridge or boats and at the time he had neither, so his soldiers took to the spade and dug a defensive position.

Against his generals' advice the Confederates charged this position. Schofield had a skirmish line set up in front of the breast works but the Confederates sent this line running back to the main position. This caused the main line to not be able to shoot because they would be hitting their own soldiers.

The Confederates mixed in with the Union men retreating and the center of the main line was penetrated by the Southern troops.

to sleep believing that he had General Patrick Cleburne, isolated Schofield from the rest with his division along with

two other divisions, drove back the 100th Ohio and the Union troops here were in retreat. Colonel Emerson Opdycke's brigade was in reserve and when the colonel saw the retreating troops he ordered his men to seal the breach.

General David Stanley, riding his horse to give the colonel those very orders, had his horse shot from under him and was also shot in the neck.

Opdycke's counter attack rallied the Union troops and they sealed the breach. Musket fire and cannon thundered away as well as hand-to-hand combat.

Rifle butts, entrenching tools, bayonets were all used in what many witnesses said was some of the most vicious and savage fighting of the whole war.

On the Union left side the attacking Confederates were confronted with the River forcing the divisions to narrow their marching path to be able to attack the position. Confederate divisions jumbled together in confusion. As they got closer to the Union line they came under artillery firing shell and canister. The casualties were horrific on the Confederate troops. The Confederates were driven back. They rallied and attacked again only to be pushed back. The attack on the center of the line and the left side on the Union line were ultimately repulsed.

The Confederates on attacking the Union right side moved forward, but a mistake by the cavalry left the Confederate left flank unprotected. It came under rifle fire immediately. A division was moved to cover the left side but it thinned the attacking rank to a single line. Taking fire from the front and their left and with the dark of night closing in, they abandoned the attempt. Hood had General Nathan Bedford Forrest and his cavalry try to outflank the Union left side.

Brigadier General Hatch and his division attacked Forrest's front and Brigadier General Croxton attacked his flank. The Union Army now armed with repeating rifles drove off Forrest and his men. The Confederate Cavalry took heavy losses and were soon repulsed. The Battle of Franklin was over. Schofield left the next day and headed for Nashville. His force took 2,326 casualties. Hood's Army took 6,252 casualties. It was 3,800 wounded and 1,750 dead, the rest were missing or taken prisoner. His Army would not recover.

He didn't stop Sherman and he didn't capture Schofield. He held the field but in the end won nothing. Here in the west as far as the Civil War goes, the game was over. All that was left was to wait for the clock to hit zero. ###

Due to threatening weather, Department personnel, in full dress uniform, formed up in the engine bays.


The program began with the Salute to the Flag, Roll Call by Department Secretary Gregory Gorab.

Local officials and Fire Chiefs from mutual aid towns inspected Department personnel. The Department was dismissed. Light refreshments were served. ###













During the Inspection, Ex-Chief Tom Sarracino made the following presentation:

At 23:29 hours on August 16, 2016, the Wood-Ridge Fire Department was dispatched for one engine to respond to 119 Washington Avenue in Little Ferry for a reported working house fire with people trapped. While responding, Chief Ron Phillips, Jr. requested the WRPD to dispatch an ambulance to respond to Little Ferry as well.

As Chief Phillips made his way to the command post, he noticed several occupants had jumped from the building. He asked the Incident Commander, what was needed. The IC advised Chief Phillips to have all manpower report to the front of the building ready to go to work, as people were still unaccounted for. Chief Phillips communicated to Engine 905 and Rescue 903 to report to the front of the building with manpower for a search.

While waiting for the Wood-Ridge fire apparatus

to arrive, Chief Phillips conducted a walk around the entire fire building and noticed the companies having difficulty making access to the second floor of the building via the rear of the building and that there was only one ladder placed on the B-D (Bravo Delta) corner of the structure.

When Chief Phillips met Engine 905's crew in front of the building, he advised them there was a five-year-old child on the upper floors and the only way in was through the front door.

Chief Phillips split 905's crew up sending Ex-Chief Tom Burniston and FF Dennis Kronyak, Jr. to conduct a search of the upper floors.

With firefighters now going to the upper floors searching, Chief Phillips immediately instructed the remainder of the engine crew, comprised of FF Nick Meglio, FF Matt Czwakiel and FF Mike Russo to raise additional ladders.

At that time, manpower from Rescue 903 had arrived

to the front of the building led by Lt. Bill Bergner. With Lt. Bergner was FF Dave Potchoiba, FF Mike Donato and Ex-Chief Scott Russo.

The rescue company was instructed to deploy a hand line and water supply to protect the stairwell and the teams in the structure with Engine 905, which was the closest engine with available hand lines. The rescue company stretched a 3" supply line to the hydrant and utilized a gate that was placed on the hydrant by the Little Ferry engine to establish the water source and they also deployed the hand line to the stairwell.

As the engine and rescue companies were working, EMS 906 arrived on the scene. The ambulance crew led by FF/Paramedic Eric Yaple, FF/EMT Teresa Ayala and Probationary FF Rich Ippolito immediately reported to Chief Phillips.

They were informed firefighters were searching for a missing five-year-old and to have a stretcher at the corner of the building for extraction with medical equipment ready for the treatment of a pediatric patient.

FF Dennis Kronyak Jr., and Ex-Chief Tom Burniston found the five-year-old on the third floor who was in respiratory arrest, and quickly brought her out of the building via the front door.

The child was immediately put in the care of EMS 906's crew. While on the way to the hospital, the ambulance crew worked with the paramedics from HUMC, together, they were able to revive her. Later that evening, the child passed from her injuries.

When Chief Phillips spoke with Ex-Chief Burniston and FF Kronyak they indicated they had to break procedures to get the job done, by passing up a fire room without the protection of a hose line, to be able to get to the five-year-old girl.

Without the coordinated efforts of the members of Engine 905, Rescue 903 and EMS 906, the situation could have

had a different outcome.

All three crews went above and beyond for not only a victim but to protect each other with the circumstances at hand.
