

What is Laser Dentistry?

What is a laser and how does it work?

A laser is an instrument that produces a very narrow, intense beam of light energy. When laser light comes in contact with tissue, it causes a reaction. The light produced by the laser can remove or shape tissue.

• Are lasers used in dentistry?

Yes, lasers have been used in dentistry since 1990. Lasers can be used as a safe and effective treatment for a wide range of dental procedures and are often used in conjunction with other dental instruments.

• How are lasers used in dentistry?

Dental lasers can be used to:

- Reduce the discomfort of canker and cold sores.
- Expose partially erupted wisdom teeth.
- Remove muscle attachments that limit proper movement
- Manage gum tissue during impressions for crowns or other procedures.
- Remove overgrown tissues caused by certain medications.
- Perform biopsy procedures.
- Remove inflamed gum tissues and aid in the treatment of gum disease.
- Remove or reshape gum and bone tissues during crown lengthening procedures.
- Help treat infections in root canals.

• Speed up tooth whitening procedures.

• What are the benefits of using dental lasers?

There are several advantages. Dentists may not need to use a drill or administer anesthesia in some procedures, allowing the patient to enjoy a more relaxed dental experience. Laser procedures can be more precise. Also, lasers can reduce symptoms and healing times associated with traditional therapies; reduce the amount of bacteria in both diseased gum tissue and in tooth cavities; and control bleeding during surgery.

• Are dental lasers safe?

If the dental laser is used according to accepted practices by a trained practitioner, then it is at least as safe as other dental instruments. However, just as you wear sunglasses to protect your eyes from prolonged exposure to the sun, when your dentist performs a laser procedure, you will be asked to wear special eyeglasses to protect your eyes from the laser.

• How can I be sure my dentist is properly trained to use a laser?

Ask your dentist questions about the extent of his or her laser education and training. Make sure that your dentist has participated in educational courses and received training by the manufacturer. Many dental schools, dental associations, and the Academy of Laser Dentistry (ALD) offer dental laser education. The ALD is the profession's independent source for current dental laser education and credentialing.

• How will I know if treatment with a dental laser is an option for me?

Ask your dentist. Although the laser is a very useful dental instrument, it is not appropriate for every dental procedure.

Real Estate Insight

Airbnb: For You, Homeowner?

Home improvement projects can be a fun part of owning a home and there are certainly tons of projects that a homeowner can choose from. Just watch HGTV or "This Old House" - home improvement shows that beguile because they often make everything look so easy. But before you pick up the drill and sawzall please pause for this public service announcement via Tony, a contractor friend of mine: "Those shows don't show you 90% of what needs to happen to complete a project." In reality, he says that home improvement shows are more about people than projects; in their pursuit of drama and compelling narrative they bypass a whole lot of details about how repairs and renovations actually get done.

So for inspiration, TV or YouTube may be a fine start. But beyond that, a little knowledge can be a risky thing. Certain jobs are too dangerous, others too complicated, and some too pricey as the equipment could cost as much as hiring a contractor. Here are few DIY projects that Tony says you should forego to avoid a ton of headaches or worse...

Molding. How many inspiring episodes have you seen where a quick addition of crown moldings instantly classes up a room? Tony says 'Caution': "No walls in a house are perfectly straight, not even in new homes." And no amount of caulk will smooth over these imperfections, either. In fact, experts who do molding use various techniques such as scribing [i.e. painstakingly shaping your material with tools so it fits flush] to ensure that moldings are aligned and stay that way. Says Tony: this is not for the average DIYer.

Electrical work: A lot

of people are actually quite handy; they can install dimmer switches and stuff like that. But, according to Tony, many of them are lucky they don't end up blowing up the place or electrocuting themselves. He urges homeowners to steer clear of all electric except changing a light bulb.

"You shouldn't fool around with electric", he says. "If you want to DIY a dimmer switch, YouTube is a good source of electric tutorials. But a good rule of thumb is if your wires look different from what you're seeing on the video, abandon the project to avoid having to guess." A lot of people die every year from faulty electricity. It isn't worth the risk.

Tiling. Tony says this one is not an absolute don't, but a great-looking tile job does require a lot more planning than just slapping squares on the floor or wall. Even if you lay out the tile, measure and measure again, you will need to cut edges and around things such as faucets — and that requires special skill. Glass mosaic tiles are among the toughest to cut. So maybe you're thinking, 'I'll get big tiles so there are

fewer to install. Wrong. Large format tiles are even harder to cut than tiny glass mosaic ones and there's lots of waste. Which is why, Tony says, save yourself the trouble and hire a professional.

'Permit needed' work. Tony advises that if you don't really comprehend how to get the permit – or if or why you need one in the first place – you should avoid the project. You have to fully understand what's entailed in a DIY that requires getting the permit in the first place. Many DIYers skip permits altogether, but they risk being shut down if spotted by an inspector or ratted out by a vindictive neighbor.

Worse! As we Realtors will testify, you risk a lot more than inconvenience when you decide you want to sell your house. Why? Because you must disclose unpermitted work when selling. Buyers are likely to be unwilling to take on a home rife with potentially dangerous work. And they might have trouble financing due to the unlawful alterations to the home.

Best advice for dicey projects: hire a licensed professional to do the work. ###

A partial list of unacceptable materials includes: unlabeled wastes or containers with unknown contents, regulated medical wastes, radioactive materials and explosives, containers larger than five gallons, compressed cylinders (oxygen or acetylene), pressure treated lumber or railroad ties, computers, electronics and tires.

Historically Speaking

The Cost of Freedom

No member of the United States Armed Forces looks forward to earning this medal. The recipient is not nominated for it. Yet, once earned, it is worn as a badge of honor. It is the Purple Heart Medal (see The Gazette, May, 2013). The Purple Heart is only awarded to those that have sustained wounds or died as a direct result of enemy action.

Stephen Monti, now a resident of Rutherford, NJ, was seventeen years old, then living in Brooklyn, NY, and had just graduated from high school. He decided to enlist in the U. S. Army. Stephen wanted to drive a tank; however, his mother only agreed to his enlistment if he learned a trade while in the Army. He and his recruiter agreed upon radar technician.

In early 1965, Stephen reported to Fort Dix, NJ, for basic training. He was assigned to Company N, 3rd Training Regiment. Upon completion of basic, Private Monti was transferred across the state to Fort Monmouth. He began a 29-week course to become a radar repairman. After completion of this school, he was then assigned to White Sands Missile Test Center where he worked on the development of a laser rangefinder.

The war in Southeast Asia was now heating up. SP4 Monti was deployed to Viet Nam in July of 1966. He would report to the 162nd Helicopter Assault Company, stationed at Phouc Vinh. This was a helicopter unit that was composed of both gunships and troop transport craft.

Reporting to the First Sergeant of the unit, Monti was asked what his specialty was. He replied "Radar." He was

then asked if he knew anything about phones. Monti replied "no." The First Sergeant said, "You'll learn. Report to the Wire & Radio Communication Section." This would be his assignment for the rest of his time in Viet Nam.

At 0035 hours on July 27, 1967, the alarm sounded, announcing an impending attack. SP4 Monti rolled off his bunk. His gear was on the floor. He put on his boots and flack vest. He was about to grab his rifle and stand up to run to the bunker.

At that moment a 120 mm rocket hit the building. Stephen was hit with shrapnel and was concussed to the point that he was temporarily blinded and affected his hearing. Captain "Doc" Sanders, company medical officer, removed shrapnel from Monti's thigh and leg.

He would later see that the back of his flack vest was torn up. He was not evacuated and had his wounds treated at Phouc Vinh. At the end of his tour in Nam, Stephen was sent to Fort Bliss as a radar repairman.

After his discharge in 1968, Stephen went to work for the New York Telephone Company in New York City. Starting as a repairman, he would rise to operations manager by the time he retired. He then was employed by the New York Stock Exchange from 2003 to 2019 as a communication specialist.

Stephen, now fully retired, is a life member of the following Veterans organizations: the Order of the Purple Heart, the Veterans of Foreign Wars and the Viet Nam Veterans of America.

Stephen enjoys spending time with family, especially his grandchildren.

As a recipient of the Purple Heart Medal, Stephen Monti deserves the deepest gratitude and respect of every American. He has paid for our way of life with his blood. ###





Walk Out

The Bergen County Fire Prevention trailer was on-site so that children could experience a "smoke-filled" environment and receive fire safety tips. ###




