

About Veterans Day

Veterans Day is celebrated on November 11 in honor of those who have served in the Armed Forces of the United States and gives Americans the opportunity to celebrate the bravery and sacrifice of all U.S. Veterans.

Veterans Day, formerly known as Armistice Day, was originally designated in 1919 by President Woodrow Wilson. Wilson selected November 11 because the Armistice ending World War I officially took place on November 11, 1918. Wilson wanted to make sure that Americans did not forget the tragedies of the war. Legislation passed in 1938, November 11 was "dedicated to the cause of world peace and to be hereafter celebrated and known as "Armistice Day."

In 1954, after having been through both World War II and the Korean War, the 83rd U.S. Congress replaced the word "Armistice" with the word "Veterans." With the approval of this legislation on June 1, 1954, November 11 became a day to honor American Veterans of all wars.

Veterans Day continues to be observed on November 11, regardless of what day of peacetime. ### the week on which it falls. The

observance of Veterans Day not only preserves the historical significance of the date, but helps focus attention on the important purpose of Veterans Day: A celebration to honor America's Veterans for their patriotism, love of country, and willingness to serve and sacrifice for the common good.

On Veterans Day, special services take place at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier in Arlington National Cemetery. United States Senate Resolution 143, which was passed on August 4, 2001, designated the week of November 11 through November 17, 2001, as "National Veterans Awareness Week." The resolution calls for educational efforts directed at elementary and secondary school students concerning the contributions and sacrifices of Veterans.

Memorial Day honors service members who died in service to their country or as a result of injuries incurred during battle. Deceased Veterans are also remembered on Veterans Day, but the day is set aside to thank and honor living Veterans who served honorably in the military - in wartime or





Historically Speaking

The Grand Army of the Republic

Fraternity, Charity and Loyalty

Since the Revolutionary War. American Veterans would have informal get-togethers to recall their experiences and comradeships.

It was not until after the Civil War that Union Veterans formed an organization that would become the template for the Veterans organizations of today.

This was The Grand Army of the Republic (GAR). Any Veteran who served in the Union Army, Navy, Marine Corps or Revenue Marine Cutter Service and was honorably discharged, with a term of service between April 12, 1861 and April 9, 1865, was eligible to join.

The GAR was founded by Dr. Benjamin Stephenson on April 6, 1866. This was at first, a social/fraternal organization, with the motto "Fraternity, Charity and Loyalty." The GAR was the originator of Memorial Day (see The Gazette Newspaper, May 2019).

Because of unkept promises by federal and state officials about caring for Veterans, orphans and widows, the GAR became strong advocates for these issues.

Another area that the GAR was instrumental in was racial integration. White Veterans, recognizing the valor of African American soldiers, opened their membership to them. The GAR lobbied for African American voting rights. At least two women who had served, disguised as men, in the Union Army, were admitted as members.

By 1890, the GAR would have a department for every state in the nation. With a membership of about 410,000, the GAR was a force in American politics.

Office seekers for both national and local positions, eagerly sought the GAR's endorsement. Presidents Ulysses S. Grant, Rutherford B. Hayes, James A. Garfield, Benjamin Harrison and William McKinley, all claimed membership in the GAR.

A group of Civil War Veterans, living in and around Carlstadt, New Jersey, met to form a GAR Post for southern Bergen County. The Department of New Jersey, GAR, granted them a charter, dated July 29, 1878, for Post #17. The members chose to name their post after General George A. Custer.

Custer Post #17, would hold their meetings at Niederer's Hall. This would also be known as the GAR Hall. The building, at 400 Hackensack Street, still exists. It is now a multi-family dwelling. The Post was still in existence as late as 1919.

A roster of the Post lists at least 34 members. Christopher Niederer, owner of the meeting hall, is recorded as a member. Twelve members are listed as living in, or are buried in Carlstadt.

The last member and former post commander, Charles Zimmerman, passed away on February 17, 1930. He was given a military funeral with a large community turnout. He was laid to rest in the Berry Lawn Cemetery, Carlstadt, among his fellow Veterans. Mr. Zimmerman enlisted as a drummer boy in the 178th NY

Volunteer Infantry (Westchester Light Infantry), at the age of thirteen.

An alternative to mailing mail-in ballots at local post offices, the drop boxes were paid for by the State of New Jersey.

Ballots will be picked up regularly, and brought to the Board of Elections offices for immediate processing. last pick-up will be at 8 p.m. on Tuesday, November 3, 2020. Voters may also choose to mail their ballots at the post office or bring their own ballot to their polling place on election day.

Access to ballot drop boxes is 24-hours a day, seven days a week. Ballots must be in a drop box by 8 p.m. on election night, Tuesday, November 3, when the boxes will be locked. Ballots left after 8 p.m. on election night will be considered late and not counted.



The holiday isn't getting its due recognition, not like when we were kids. Today it seems that Thanksgiving has become sandwiched between Halloween, which now rivals the Yule time in the decoration department albeit a bit macabre, and Christmas itself.

We hurried over turkey day like Olympic Christmas shoppers racing to the finish line grabbing a drumstick along the way.

I'm sure that Thanks giving can be found alive and well in many households. Keeping that tradition has become more important than ever.

We seem to be drifting apart. We're going in different directions with heads down looking at our phone - side stepping the one holiday that pulled all of us together -- Thanksgiving. Have a Healthy and Happy one! ###

Further investigation revealed a large duffle bag containing a .380 caliber carbine rifle with a loaded magazine, a large amount of U.S. currency and several pairs of high-end sneakers. Mr. Abudayya was arrested on the scene for the illegal possession of a weapon.

Detective Sergeant Matthew Mueller and Detective David Marchitelli were both called to the scene for evidence collection and further processing.

Once at headquarters, it was brought to Detective Sergeant Mueller's attention that Mr. Abudayya was the primary suspect in a home invasion involving the theft of high-end sneakers and large amounts of

U.S. currency in the City of New York. NYPD Robbery Squad Detectives were contacted and arrived shortly after to conduct an interview with Mr. Abudayaa.

He later confessed to his crimes in their jurisdiction and a subsequent arrest warrant was issued out of the City of New York.

Mr. Abudayya was fingerprinted, photographed and charged by the Wood-Ridge Police Department with Illegal Possession of a Weapon (2C:39-5C), Receiving Stolen Property (2C:20-7A) and Money Laundering (2C:21-25B(1)).

Mr. Abudayya was lodged in the Bergen County Correctional Facility awaiting his appearance in Central Judiciary Court later in the month.

Before you head down the path of reading this article, you need to know that I think it's great that people try and sell their own homes when they feel that they can.

I am not an anti-FSBO (For Sale By Owner) kind of real estate broker. I equate it with people who choose to do their own taxes versus hiring a CPA; some people want to do it on their own and some people want to hire it out.

Bashing FSBOs is in poor taste. So if you are looking for a "pro real estate agent, you can't live without me" type of article, please know this: you won't find it in these paragraphs.

In fact, with today's fast moving market here in Bergen County where - either because of or in spite of the pandemic, inventory is snapped up as soon as it becomes available, many sellers will consider taking on the sale of their home themselves rather than hiring a realtor.

And for those taking the plunge, here are a few useful tips on the just the first step: Finding a Buyer...

• Determining how much a FSBO's home is worth. Pricing a home is part intuition, part research and market timing.

Price within the parameters of comparable sales and you should receive immediate offers. Not pricing correctly can, however, put you at a big disadvantage because the first two to three weeks on the market are crucial; that's when buyers' interest levels are the highest.

• Preparing the FSBO's home for a sale. Examine your home from a stranger's viewpoint. Ask friends to give their objective evaluation of the property and to be frank about its deficiencies.

Consider spending money on improvements making repairs that will enhance profit. But don't spend too much! The single biggest downfall for sellers is in spending too much money on repairs that will never be recouped.

Consider home staging – it could mean the difference between selling now for more money or not selling at all. At the very least, get rid of the bulk of your furniture. Most sellers can do without 50% of their stuff. And if they can do without their pets, as well,

so much the better; they can present a whole other set of challenges.

• Marketing the FSBO's home for sale. With all the money you'll be saving over hiring an agent, spend a big chunk on advertising. That will entail figuring out your target audience and getting the message out to them by specific media.

Today, most home buyers are looking at the Internet for homes for sale but that doesn't mean you'll be selling your house online.

The idea is to get buyers inside; all marketing should be geared toward making your phone ring and increasing traffic to your home.

That means doing photographs, virtual tours and select usage of print advertising, direct mail, flyers, hosting tours, etc. Open houses and time flexibility required for showings are necessary components as well.

• For most FSBOs finding buyers is typically a pretty big challenge, but - truth be told -finding a buyer is only the first step in a rather long and tricky process.

There's a whole lot more to do before the FSBO can even imagine arriving at a successful closing. And, largely, it's on these later, more technical steps that FSBOs often trip up.

They sometimes don't have the skill and knowledge that goes with properly screening buyers; they frequently dispense with the demands of preapproval and pre-qualification and lack access to third party mortgage counseling assistance.

FSBOs are generally untrained in negotiating with potential buyers regarding offers and contracts which can be loaded with clauses, timelines and contingencies such as those for deposits, mortgages and inspections.

They have no relevant experience to know how to handle Home Inspection findings (the single greatest threat to real estate transactions) and, more often than not, react in ways that can kill any potential deal.

But this is not, I repeat, an effort to dissuade anyone from wanting to become a FSBO. It's just my own opinion, objective and 100% unbiased....

Cancelled Stamps Wanted

Sixteen years ago, in 2004, the Kiwanis Club of Hasbrouck Heights started a project collecting cancelled stamps. They came upon a letter from a Sister Ann Mary, a retired Carmelite Sister who was collecting cancelled stamps and selling them to dealers in foreign countries.


The money helped children at St. Benedict's Day Nursery and Infant Hospital of Georgetown, St. Vincent of the West Indies. She collected stamps until 2008. In 2008, the AARP Hackensack Chapter took this project as one of their own. Kiwanis Club has since disbanded.

In August of 2008, the chapter found another organization that was collecting stamps. After a phone call to them (Ulseth Lodge Sons of Norway NLC) in Calumet, MI, they decided to send the cancelled stamps to them.

The Lodge collects and sends the stamps to a facility where they are sorted and packaged to sell to collectors and dealers. The proceeds are donated to the Norwegian Health System to aid physically and mentally challenged children and youth.

In June 2015, the AARP Hackensack Chapter disbanded. The Leisure Club of Hasbrouck Heights then took over the project. In 2019 the AARP Garfield Chapter, also started to contribute to this project.

All collected stamps collected were sent to Marie Gallo who supervised the trimming of the stamps, sorting of the stamps and finally packaging and then sending out. Marie, a member of the Kiwanis Club, Hackensack AARP, Leisure Club and Garfield AARP, has been in charge of this project



since its inception. She has made all the contacts with the organizations collecting the

In February 2020, the Lodge we were working with suggested that we work with another Norwegian Lodge closer to us. The TUBFRIM, a Norwegian organization located in Brooklyn that collects stamps along the east coast - Maine to Florida. The organization is still the Sons of Norway with a branch in Brooklyn. They also use the money from the sale of stamps to aid physically and mentally challenged children and youth. On April 28, 2020, fifteen pounds of cancelled stamps were mailed to Brooklyn.

If you would like to help the Leisure Club of Hasbrouck Heights in collecting cancelled stamps, please trim the stamps to 1/4 inch around the stamps.

Old envelopes and postcards are also being collected. If envelopes, postcards etc., are more than 40 years old, please do not cut off the stamps, but save the whole envelope/ postcard.

Infection Control in the Dental Office

Infection control is a set of recommended safety precautions that dentists implement to protect their patients and staff in the office.

Strict infection control is required to prevent the spread of disease, since many dental procedures involve direct contact with blood and saliva.

Improved infection-control procedures with heightened awareness of the dangers of infection mean that the instruments and supplies your dentist uses in your mouth are either heat-sterilized or they are disposable items intended for one-time use.

• Do all dentists practice infection control?

In 1986, less than 30 percent of dentists wore gloves, masks or gowns. Today, these infection-control tools are required in all dental practices.

To fight the spread of diseases, such as human immunodeficiency virus (HIV), hepatitis B, syphilis and herpes viruses, and COVID-19, your dentist has strict procedures and may use a variety of measures to ensure that instruments used during dental procedures are sterile.

As an extra precaution, many dentists and their staff are vaccinated for hepatitis B, to prevent them from poten-

tially passing it on to patients.

Sterilizing dental instruments, a process that destroys all forms of microbial life, is also an important part of infection control in a dental office.

· How else does my dentist protect me?

When you first sit in the dental chair, chances are the first thing you'll see is your dentist washing his or her hands. Hands are washed at the start of the day, before putting on and taking off gloves and after touching any potentially contaminated surface.

Your dentist may use a variety of protective items that are used once and then thrown away, including gloves, mask, paper drapes, suction/water tube tips and needles.

Dentists and their assistants can use different kinds of protective gloves. Latex or vinyl gloves are used for patient examinations and procedures and are worn whenever skin could be in contact with body fluids.

Between patients, the gloves are thrown away, the hands washed and a new set of gloves is used to treat the next patient.

For cleaning and sterilizing instruments, heavy rubber utility gloves are used. If you are allergic to rubber or latex, your dentist can wear nitrile gloves, which do not contain any latex rubber proteins.

What are universal precautions?

Universal precautions, used for every patient, are safety procedures established by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) and the American Dental Association (ADA). These precautions require all dental staff involved in patient care to use appropriate protective wear, such as gloves, masks and eyewear. For more information on CDC Infection

• Do dentists sterilize the handpiece (drill) and other instruments after each patient?

Dentists sterilize handpieces and other instruments between patients to prevent the transmission of diseases.

Dental offices follow and monitor specific heat-sterilization procedures, which are outlined by the CDC and the ADA.

Most dental instruments are sterilized in special machines; it takes much more than just soap and water to make sure instruments are free of bacteria.

Recommended sterilization methods include placing these tools into an autoclave (steam under pressure), a dryheat oven or chemical vapor (commonly called a chemiclave). Typically, this equipment is kept in the office, away from a patient's view. Ask your dentist to show you how and where instruments are sterilized.

• How are other objects sterilized?

Before you enter the examination room, all surfaces, such as the dental chair, drawer handles and countertops are disinfected.

To sterilize equipment that can't be moved, such as X-ray units and countertops, disinfectant is applied after each patient to ensure a germ-free environment.

Some offices may drape this equipment with protective covers, which are replaced after each patient.

Disposable sharp items, such as needles, that cannot be sterilized are disposed of in puncture-resistant biohazard containers. Anything contaminated with blood or saliva is disposed of in special containers with safety lids.

Ask your dentist for additional information on how he or she is keeping you safe from germs and infectious diseases.


















WRFD Annual Inspection
