The members operate a train museum and two large "Railroad Empires" covering almost 5,000 square feet.


















# **HH Town Day**

On September 17, 2022, a ribbon cutting ceremony to officially unveil the newly constructed Lincoln School, was held.

Giovanni A. Giancaspro, East Rutherford Superintendent of Schools, led the program, welcoming the many past and current stakeholders of this projected with a warm WILDCAT welcome.

The ceremony began with 6th, 7th, and 8th Grade students leading the Pledge of Allegiance. Hannah Aumack sang the National Anthem.

Faust School Band, led by Band Director, Mr. Jeff Schweikhardt, played several musical numbers. Students performed a few vocal pieces, under the direction of Ms. Diann Schweikhardt.

Following Superintendent Giovanni A. Giancaspro's, comments, Board President, Erin Shemeley, representing Mayor Lahullier and Town Council, Councilman George Cronk, Lincoln School Principal, Mr. Peter Villardi, made remarks. Members of the East Rutherford Board of Education, both present and past, the Mayor and Council, Members of DiCara and Rubino Architects, EPIC Construction Management, and Dobco Inc. were invited to the entrance of Lincoln School to cut the celebratory ribbon.

#### Superintendent Comments

That step was on May 7, 2021, with a ground-breaking ceremony, signifying the beginning of the Lincoln School construction.

Eight hundred and seventy days later, we celebrate this beautiful new school that is the center of our school community and a jewel for East Rutherford School District.

This event marks the grand opening of the most magnificent facilities upgrades and construction projects the East Rutherford School District has experienced.

The launch of our new building, supported by our district's rebirth and re-branding, reaping the sweet fruit that will allow our students to be comfortable and confident while learning the principles essential for a future-ready generation.

The District seeks to cultivate learners who demonstrate academic grit and social-emotional resilience by teaching students how to harness sustained commitment when faced with real-world challenges inside and outside the classroom.

Aristotle stated, "The roots of education are bitter, but the fruit is sweet." Education is one of the most precious gifts we can impart to the future generation.

Education does matter and it is true that learning continues outside the boundaries of the walls of our facilities. However, providing state of the art facilities is crucial in ensuring a safe and welcoming environment.

The passage of the \$35.5 million referendum (funded by debt service) in January 2020, enables the district to reduce

class sizes at all grade levels, and ensure we can provide a high-quality instructional environment for our students.

The funds were also used throughout the school system for state-of-the-art security and technology upgrades, (each student has a chrome book, smart boards, etc.), STEM Labs, special ed, McKenzie School gym, HVAC, health office, school kitchen, all purpose room, improve energy efficiency, accessibility for people with physical limitations, and the overall school environment.

Grove Street, between Lincoln and Faust Schools, was eliminated to create a school campus. A sky bridge connects Lincoln and Faust Schools.

Expanding and renovating the district's facilities now enables the schools to accommodate current and projected growth in student enrollment.

Finally, I leave with you this quote from the illustrious Ben Franklin. "An investment in knowledge pays the best interest."

#### **Background**

The East Rutherford School District is a community public school district that serves students in pre-Kindergarten through Eighth Grade.

McKenzie School serves children from Pre-kindergarten through 3rd Grade. Lincoln School serves 4th and 5th Grades. Alfred S. Faust School educates students from 6th through 8th Grades.

There are about 770 students and 200 staff under the direction of a seven person board. The annual budget is around \$20 million.

The East Rutherford School District will continue collaborating with our post-secondary partners on instructional best practices.

Becton Regional High School District serves students from 9 to 12th Grade and is independent from East Rutherford's school system. ###

# The Church of the Most Sacred Heart of Jesus Celebrates its 80th Anniversary

In preparation for the celebration of the 80th Anniversary the interior of the Church was painted. Our parish has gone from the Tuminelli Grocery Store/Tire Repair Shop to the downstairs Church to our beautiful present-day Church. The sanctuary as we prepare to celebrate our 80th.

On June 21, 2022, the parish family of the Church of the Most Sacred Heart of Jesus, Wallington, celebrated the 80th Anniversary of its spiritual home.

A tract of land in the "heart-shaped" Borough of Wallington was purchased by Archbishop Thomas J. Walsh, Archbishop of Newark. Rev. Alexander W. Fronczak was appointed to organize the new parish.

On June 21, 1942, Fr. Fronczak read the letter of appointment as pastor of "the new separate and distinct parish" dedicated under the title of Most Sacred Heart of Jesus.

The territorial limits of the new canonical parish consisted of the entire Borough of Wallington and the Carlton Hill section of East Rutherford.

The house at 194 Maple Avenue served as a rectory and temporary Chapel of weekday Masses, Weddings and Baptisms. In June of 1942, the Borough granted permission to use the second floor of the Municipal Building that was then on Hathaway Street for Sunday and Holy Day Masses. Masses were celebrated there until December 1947.

In August 1942, Archbishop Walsh purchased the Tuminelli Grocery Store/Tire Repair Shop at Paterson Avenue and Bond Street.

This building now became the temporary chapel and the second floor, the Pastor's temporary living quarters. Archbishop Walsh blessed the building in November 1942.

The house next became the temporary school with Kindergarten, First and Second Grades.

The Chapel was used until April 1947 when it was demolished so that construction of the new Church and school could begin. Another piece of land, more centrally located was available, but it lacked buildings that the present track contained. During the War, only alterations of existing buildings were allowed; no new ones could be built.

The groundbreaking for the school occurred in September 1946 by Msgr. V. Masniski. This building was planned to be a temporary Church, school and convent because, until the beginning of February, the Felician Sisters were transported from and to Lodi by Fr. Fronczak.

Archbishop Walsh officiated at the laying of the cornerstone of the school in September 1946. The Basement Church had its first Mass on Christmas 1947 and the school opened in September 1948 with the Felician Sisters temporarily living on the second floor.

The upper Church was completed and Archbishop Thomas A. Boland blessed the cornerstone in September 1955.

In the mid-sixties, sanctuary changes were made with the altar being moved so that the celebrant was now facing the people. To comply with new Archdiocese regulations, the Church was totally renovated in June 1979.

With the increase of student enrollment a new convent was constructed on Jersey Street in East Rutherford. Archbishop Boland officiated at the laying of the cornerstone in December 1963.

The entire school building could now be used as class-rooms. In 1983, Rev. Stanley J. Adamczyk, Pastor, sold the convent to the Franciscan Friars. A new smaller home was built on Dankhoff Avenue to house the sisters. In June 2014, the parish school was closed by the Archdiocese.

After moving from the house on Maple Avenue to the second floor above the Cha-

pel on Paterson Avenue, to a renovated house on the corner of Paterson Avenue, the Archdiocese gave permission for a new rectory to be constructed in April 1968. The rectory was completed in 1969. On January 1, 1980, the rectory was damaged by a fire and renovated.

The Parish Restoration Campaign, "Our Parish...Our Future" began in September 2003. The success of the campaign made it possible for the building of an elevator and the renovation of the Church and auditorium.

In 2006, groundbreaking for the elevator, by Bishop John W. Flesey, was held. In October 2008, the blessing of the Portal of St. John Paul II and the blessing of the statute of St. John Paul II was conducted by Bishop Flesey.

For 80 years our parish has celebrated thousands of Masses, children being baptized, and marriages being performed. We have bid farewell to our loved ones and friends. Over the years our Church has changed in appearance but its heart remains the same. One thing we know is that God is good and He will continue to bless and protect Most Sacred Heart of Jesus Parish.

On November 13, 2022, Most Sacred Heart of Jesus Parish will be formally celebrating its 80th Anniversary with an 11:30 a.m. Mass of Thanksgiving and followed by a celebration dinner in the great hall. We invite all our parishioners and friends to join us as we celebrate the dedication, hard work and sacrifices that our founders, builders and benefactors made to establish our parish. #### **Artful November 2022**

Cars were a powerful source of self-expression for a teenager growing up in the 50s and 60s. A kid earned his wings driving his dad's car. If and when he survived that ordeal then he was ready for the big time; wheels of his own. "Wait until the girls get a load of me now," a young 17 year old might be heard saying as he burned rubber pulling out of his driveway on what was his first solo flight.

John Rannou, Lodi High School Class of '65, picked up his date in a monstrous 1953 Lincoln Continental. The car had no paint on it to speak of, just a gray primer of which gave it that WWII Army Tank appeal. The car was so long that Rannou needed two acres just to make a turn.

The first car to hit 40 mph on Westervelt Place, thus setting the pace for street rods to come, was Lou Albano's red 1964 Ford Galaxy 500.

The engine measured 427 cubic inches and boasted 425 horsepower, fueled by two 4 barrel carburetors. All of that muscle was powered by a 4 speed manual transmission.

Every so often, Lou, whose dad owned the corner store, would take me for a hell raising excursion down Route 46.

The "G" force was so intense that it took 6 hours for the blood supply to return to my face. My Mother, Lena, thought I was anemic and fed me canned beets until the color returned to my face.

One thing I noticed as we turned onto the Lodi Main Street was that the girls were actually noticing me. With a cigarette hanging loosely from my lips (don't tell my Dad), giving me that James Dean look, I wondered to myself as I absorbed those admiring glances if it was me or the car getting all the attention.

A visit down Main Street later that day minus Lou's hot rod was a rude awakening. At the end of the day, you were only as cool as your car. First you had to own one.

Lou Albano's influence carried over to my cousin, Anthony "Tony" Maglionico.

At 17, my cousin was pulling hole shots out his driveway with his dad's 1957 Mercury. It wasn't long before his dad's garage housed a 1957 Chevy Sedan Delivery Wagon named "Incontention." The rod was built strictly for the racetrack.

Cousin Anthony insisted that he didn't buy the car just to attract girls, but it was an accessory he could live with as long as they didn't smudge the freshly polished fenders with their fingerprints unless, of cours, e those fingerprints belonged to his, then future wife, Beth Manzo.

Another major attraction was Al Norieka's red 1963 Corvette Stingray. It has been said that Al only piloted that car three times in 1964 before retiring it to a secret hiding place where it remains intact till this very day.

Joe Fasano, from Hasbrouck Heights, was the racing guru of the 60s and 70s. His Cordovan brown 1966 Chevy Biscayne tore up the track at Island Dragway in Hackettstown, NJ.

According to my cousin Anthony, the car that got all the attention was Anthony Antista's 1964 silver Pontiac Catalina. The car came equipped with a black convertible top, a 421 engine, three two barrel carbs and a four speed manual transmission.

Off the racetrack this automobile was the real Streetcar named Desire if you catch my drift.

Another "Big Kahuna" of the hot rod set was a kid by the name of Richie Luggiero. Richie drove a teal 1965 GTO with a black vinyl roof. The engine was of the 389 variety fed by three- two barrel carbs along with the usual 4 speed manual transmission. The car could be heard "leaving rubber" as far away as Nutchies gas station on South Main Street. owned by Carmine Pignatora and later by his son, Danny, became the mecca of the Lodi drag racing scene. Danny was known for his yellow with black racing stripes 1968 Camaro Z-28. Also in his garage was a 1963 Plymouth Savoy which was purchased from

Nutchies gas station,

Joe Paci. Under the hood lived a 426 wedge with 2-4 barrel carbs powered by 425 horses working overtime making it among the most feared cars on the circuit.

Where was the Artful Thinker during all of this? I was pushing my 1950 Nash Rambler to the side of the road waiting for my dad, Vito, to come and tow me home.

The Rastocky Brothers, Bob and Andy, sported a 1961 Chevy Impala convertible named Savage. The car had an Artesian red body with a white top. The engine measured 283 cubes, 315 horses, fuel injection with a 4 speed stick shift. When this chariot drove down Main Street it was a one car parade.

Yes, the guys with the fast cars also cruised the strip in Hackensack and scorched the pavement on the Hasbrouck Heights Boulevard. In the end they always made it back to Lodi before they ran out of gas. In the spiritual realm those youngsters are forever making it back to Lodi. May they never run out of gas.

# **Big Plans -- Big Planes**

Part Two

Anthony Fokker was born in Holland and built his first airplane there. Before the First World War, he moved to Germany. He designed and built aircraft for the German air service. His more notable designs were the DR 1, triplane of Baron Manfred von Richthofen, AKA "The Red Baron," and the D VII, biplane fighter. The D VII was so respected by the Allies, that it was specifically banned by the Treaty of Versailles.

Fokker returned to Holland after the war and started an aircraft company. He decided to expand his company to America. Fokker purchased the Wittemann factory in Teterboro. Fokker formed the Atlantic Airplane Company (not affiliated with today's Atlantic Aviation Company). He first produced the F VII single engine passenger plane.

This was improved to the F VIIa/3M, a three-engine model. Each engine was 220 hp and the plane held eight passengers. The F VIIa was used by Richard Byrd for both of his trips over the North Pole and the South Pole. Richard Byrd would be part of the crew to fly the first transatlantic airmail to France

The US Army Air Corps would fly a F VIIa to Hawaii to be the first to do this. The Air Corps set a record of 150 hours in the air. This was done by aerial refueling.

The Atlantic Aircraft Corporation now built the F 10 version. This was a larger version of the F VII. It could hold 12 passengers. A number of airlines purchased this model. Sadly, in 1931, an F 10 crashed, killing famed football coach Knute Rockne and seven others.

Fokker and his factory in Teterboro, now produced the F

32. It was the first four engine passenger plane designed in America. At the time, it was the largest plane in the world. It carried thirty-two passengers. Only two were built. They were flown by Western Air Express. The four engines were mounted in two nacelles, back-to-back. This caused many problems. Fokker would sell his property in Teterboro and return to Holland.

In 1939, Teterboro Airport was only a dirt strip that was subjected to frequent flooding. However, Fred Wehran, a developer, had very big plans. He purchased the airport for \$10,000 and worked out a deal with ESSO (now Exxon-Mobil) to pave the runway. In exchange, Esso had exclusive rights to sales of aviation fuels at the airport.

From 1941 to 1945, the US Army took over control of the airport. Then Wehran resumed ownership of the airport. He purchased surplus C-46, C-47 and C-54 cargo planes. He started an air freight company. This was a great success.


By 1947, it was the busiest freight airport in the United States. At that time, Teterboro Airport had six flying schools, thirty-five freight lines and over three hundred private aircraft. Mr. Wehran would sell the airport to the Port Authority of New York and New Jersey for over three million dollars in 1949. Our red-hot housing market will likely "have to go through a correction" as "housing prices were going up at an unsustainably fast level," Jerome Powell chair of the Federal Reserve, said in a press conference this week.

With that, the U.S. Federal Reserve seems to want to completely upend the housing market, taking it from turbocharged to rapid deceleration.

It's been a long time predicted and, let's face it, the effects of the Fed's rate hikes in its war against inflation are being felt in just about every crevice of the economy - especially with fears of a recession mounting.

The stock market keeps falling, companies are scaling back on hiring or letting workers go, and mortgage rates are rising even more than anticipated, causing our home-buying clients to hibernate.

"The Fed is determined to cool inflation, and they're willing to throw housing under the bus to do so," said a researcher at John Burns Real Estate Consulting. Economists can debate whether the country is already in a recession or heading toward a downturn but it's clear that the housing market has shifted dramatically.

Not many months ago, homes in our neighborhood towns were selling in mere hours as throngs of buyers tried to outbid one another by tens of thousands of dollars over the asking price. But, when the Fed began raising its rates, mortgage interest rates also went up, making it significantly more expensive for buyers to afford housing

We're beginning to see the effects; home prices in our lo-

cal Bergen County market have begun coming down since the summer. Some sellers, realizing that they missed the peak, are holding off listing their homes. Others - those who need to sell - are cutting prices.

"The deceleration in housing prices that we're seeing should help bring prices more closely in line with rents and other housing market fundamentals — and that's a good thing," Powell said this week. "For the longer term what we need is supply and demand to get better aligned so that housing prices go up at a reasonable level, at a reasonable pace, and that people can afford houses again."

The 2022 Home Affordability Report showed that home buying costs made ownership difficult across the country, particularly in New Jersey where prices skyrocketed last year.

New Jerseyans, the report pointed out, are having a harder time buying a house than at any point in the last 15 years. Locally, the current median price for a house in Bergen County is \$575,000 – 17% less affordable than the second quarter of 2021 and 11% less affordable than the 1st quarter of this year.

So, for those who have long been frustrated by a hyperinflated real estate market, the current decline in prices is great news.

On the downside, however, mortgage rates are approaching 7%, inventory is still tight compared to pre-pandemic levels, and the long overdue decline in price is making itself felt very slowly.

But, increasing, more and more housing experts are expecting the market to tip back into the buyers' court by 2023. In fact, a significant number believe the shift will happen sooner – that is, this year.

All in all – good news, bad news, whatever – most of the experts appear to agree that the home-price deceleration will continue and speed through next year. Which leaves us with the question on everybody's mind today: how far, finally, will these home prices drop?

#### **Acid Reflux** and Oral Health

It's common to experience gastroesophageal reflux — otherwise known as acid indigestion, acid reflux or heartburn every so often. But heartburn also is a symptom of a chronic condition known as gastroesophageal reflux disease (GERD), which affects about 20 percent of the U.S. population, according to the National Digestive Diseases Information Clearinghouse.

What is acid reflux and **GERD?** Acid reflux occurs when muscles of the lower esophagus relax and allow stomach acids to flow upward into the esophagus and even the mouth. These stomach acids can cause irritation and inflammation of the esophagus.

Acid reflux may progress further, developing into GERD. In patients who have GERD, the esophageal muscles are unable to keep stomach acids from flowing upward, causing corrosion of the esophageal lining and the uncomfortable burning sensation associated with heartburn.

#### What are the signs and symptoms of GERD?

- Heartburn
- Chronic coughing
- Difficulty swallowing
- Erosion of tooth enamel
- Regurgitation

How is GERD treated?

Although GERD is a chronic condition, its symptoms can be treated using medications and by making lifestyle modifications. In addition to taking over-the-counter antacids and prescription H2 receptor blockers, you can reduce GERD symptoms by:

- Avoiding beverages such as alcohol and coffee, as well as chocolate and spicy/greasy or tomato-based foods
- · Quitting smoking; smokers are more likely to develop **GERD**
- Avoiding eating several hours before bed, or lying down two to three hours after eating
- Losing weight if you are overweight or obese
- Not wearing tight-fitting clothing

How does GERD affect my oral health? In addition to damaging the esophagus and increasing your risk of esophageal cancer, over time, GERD can erode tooth enamel. Research indicates tooth enamel begins to erode at a pH, or acid level, of 5.5. With a pH of less than 2.0, your stomach acid can easily damage tooth enamel and cause increased tooth sensitivity, decay, discoloration and chipping.

How can I protect my teeth against acid reflux? Practicing good oral hygiene is the best way to prevent acid reflux or GERD from damaging your teeth and causing decay. In addition to brushing for two minutes twice a day, you can:

- Visit your dentist regularly for a tooth enamel evaluation.
- Use a toothpaste that's formulated for sensitive teeth.
- Do not brush your teeth for one hour after you consume acidic foods or drinks.
- Dissolve baking soda in water and swish the water in your mouth after you experience acid reflux.
- Ask your dentist about fluoride treatments to strengthen your teeth.
- Ask your dentist about wearing a mouthguard at night to prevent acid from damaging vour teeth.
- Avoid over-the-counter antacids that have a high sugar content. If you believe you may be at risk for acid reflux or GERD, speak with your dentist or physician.

# HH Mayor & Council Recognize Fire Department's Heroism

On October 10, 2022, at 7:19 a.m., the Hasbrouck Heights Fire Department (HHFD) was dispatched to 192 Boulevard for an Activated Fire Alarm. On arrival of Engine Company 616, along with a Wood-Ridge Fire Chief, confirmed a working fire in the building. Engine Company 616 forced entry and stretched an attack line.

As crews were ascending the second floor they were notified of a possible victim trapped. In under two minutes, the victim was located by both the Hasbrouck Heights Fire Department and the Wood-Ridge Fire Department; she was rescued from the second floor and then passed over to EMS which was waiting outside. The fire was under control in under 10 minutes. I would like to commend both the HHFD and the WRFD for the rescue made at 192 Boulevard, it is due to extensive training, pride and dedication that we are able to conduct operations safely and swiftly to save a life. This will be the second victim removal in ten months which is remarkable. The members that made the rescue are listed below. I would like to make a special thanks to the Wood-Ridge Fire Department for the immediate assistance and the Hasbrouck Heights Police Department for their efforts as well.

On June 10, 2022, the Hasbrouck Heights Fire Department responded to South Hackensack for a working house fire with multiple people trapped. Without hesitation the members listed below did a primary search with a house well involved in fire, the area they were working in, below them in the basement, and above them in the attic were all involved in fire and heavy smoke.

The members of the HHFD working together, were able to locate a victim on the bottom of the stairs of the second floor. The victim was removed from the rear of the house due to heavy fire cutting off other ways out. All members of the HHFD took turns performing CPR on the victim, one member actually stayed with the victim all the way up to the hospital where unfortunately he was pronounced dead.

In my 20 years in the fire service and having made rescues before, this was one of the most dangerous situations I have ever been in and the members of the HHFD did not hesitate. This, in my opinion, is of HEROIC ACTIONS AND GREAT PERSONAL RISK. The members listed below were all inside the Fire Building and worked together to try and save a life.
