# 2005 Leaf Collection

The DPW will continue the service of curbside leaf collection.

Leaves may be raked into the street beginning October 15th and continue until December 1st.

Leaves may be raked to the curb -- but not within 10 feet of storm drains.

The DPW requests that the leaves be raked off the top of the curb and fully into the street.

It is advised that providing a drainage space between the leaf pile and the curb will allow a better flow of rain water to storm drains.

Leaves may also be bagged in paper sacks or in upright containers. Leaves in plastic bags are not acceptable.

Leaves are accepted at the DPW recycling depot at any time in paper sacks or upright containers. ###

From WWII to 1950 Looking for a new home

In September of 1941 Mr. Harold Pope was elected Commander.

On December 7th Japan attacked Pearl Harbor and the United States was drawn into World War II. Almost instantly Hasbrouck Heights and the entire country changed.

The Post continued to support the veterans of WWI in the Paramus Home, held the annual Memorial Day and Armistice Day ceremonies, and helped out with various War Bond and Scrap Drives.

William Brunckhorst Sr. became Commander in 1943 and during this period it was realized that, at the end of the war, Post 106 would probably experience a great growth in mem-

Thus the idea of having their own building again arose. Funds being needed, in 1944 the Post formed a corporation named, "The American Legion Scrap Corp." with the purpose of raising money by collecting newspapers, magazines, and scrap metal to sell.

By 1946 this was changed to "The American Legion Center of Hasbrouck Heights."

During this time, 1944 to 1947, J. Tangney, Turner Blaine, Ralph Knettle, and Shaler Hawkins served as Commanders.


The Post met in various locations including the home of one of the members during these years but talks were begun with the Borough Council to obtain a piece of land on which to build this Post Home.

In 1947/1948 the Borough agreed to lease the land to Post 106 at \$1.00 per year.

Now under Commander William Brunckhorst Jr., the land at the corner of Henry Street and the Boulevard was acquired for the erection of a building to be called "The American Legion Center."

However, it was stipulated that the building had to be open and operating in five years. As, by 1947, the membership had reached two hundred and was still growing, it was thought that financing it would not be a problem.

Actually, two different buildings were proposed. The first was a more formal twostory building, to be called the

"Hasbrouck Heights War Memorial Building." A drawing and a floor plan of this will be provided in the next edition.

Governor Whitman will give a brief talk about her experiences as Governor of New Jersey and Head of the Environmental Protection Agency.



## Referendums **Scheduled for** November

Voters will be asked to cast their ballots on two referendums scheduled for the November election.

One would consider the re-establishment of a Zoning Board, which was eliminated in February 2001 when the Zoning Board of Adjustment operations merged with the Planning Board.

The other would consider modifying the current zoning requirements to limit the ratio between the total habitable floor area to 55% of the total lot area.

## **Municipal Question:**

Shall the reconstitution of the Zoning Board of Adjustment in and for the Borough of Hasbrouck Heights be approved?

## **Explanatory Statement:**

On February 13, 2001, the Zoning Board of Adjustment of the Borough of Hasbrouck Heights was abolished and its powers and duties were consolidated with the powers of the Planning Board of the Borough of Hasbrouck Heights.

The stated purpose of that consolidation of authority was " \*\*\* to assure a greater degree of consistency in the interpretation, application and exercise of that authority and to achieve a more efficient and economical administration of that authority."

It has determined that not all of those goals have been met. In particular, the economy expected to be achieved has not resulted.

Further, despite the earnest efforts of the Planning Board members, certain applicants and, particularly homeowners seeking simple variance relief, have experienced some delays because of the often necessarily lengthy hearings required in complicated and highly technical site plan applications which now more frequently come before the Planning Board.

As a consequence, the Mayor and Council has concluded that the Board of Adjustment should be re-established for the convenience of all applicants.

## **Municipal Question:**

Should the Borough of Hasbrouck Heights consider adopting a limitation on the permissible ratio between the total habitable floor area of new or newly expanded one and two family residences to 55% of the total area of the lot on which that residence is located as a means to curb the current trend to build uncharacteristically large homes?

## **Explanatory Statement:**

The Governing Body of the Borough of Hasbrouck Heights seeks to ascertain the sentiment of the voters of the Borough on whether an ordinance should be adopted imposing a maximum habitable floor area ratio upon all proposed single-family or two-family residences or extensions to existing resi-

The Governing Body intends by this restriction to limit such new construction to a total habitable floor area of 55% of the total lot area on which the residence is located in order to curb the construction of uncharacteristically large homes commonly referred to as "McMansions."

Thereafter, such construction would be permitted only after review by the Planning Board or the Board of Adjustment at which time neighboring property owners would be given the opportunity to voice their opinions on that particular proposal.

This ordinance is intended to impose the least possible impact upon existing homes of more typical size.

All properties will be inspected in 2005, but the revaluation will not go into effect until 2006. The tax bill which you receive for 2005 does not apply to the revaluation.


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

# Halloween Safety

Halloween is a cherished tradition but the excitement of the night can cause children to forget to be careful.

There is no real "trick" to making Halloween a real treat for the entire family.

The major dangers are not from witches or spirits but rather from falls and pedestrian/car crashes.

Both children and adults need to think about safety on this annual day of make-believe.

#### **Motorists**

The Hasbrouck Heights Police Department Traffic Bureau urges motorists to be especially alert on Halloween.

- · Watch for children darting out from between parked
- Watch for children walking on roadways, medians and
- Enter and exit driveways and alleys carefully.
- · At twilight and later in the evening, watch for children in dark clothing.

## **Parents**

Before children start out on their "trick or treat" rounds, parents should:

- · Make sure that an adult or an older responsible youth will be supervising the outing for children under age 12.
- Plan and discuss the route trick-or-treaters intend to follow. Know the names of older children's companions.
- · Instruct your children to travel only in familiar areas and along an established route.
- Teach your children to stop only at houses or apartment buildings that are well-lit and

**never** enter a stranger's home.

- · Establish a return time.
- Tell your youngsters not to eat any treat until they return home.
- · Review all appropriate trick-or-treat safety precautions, including pedestrian/traffic safety rules.
- · Pin a slip of paper with the child's name, address and phone number inside a pocket in case the youngster gets separated from the group.

## **Costume Design**

Only fire-retardant materials should be used for costumes.

- · Costumes should not be so long that they are a tripping hazard. (Falls are the leading cause of unintentional injuries on Halloween.)
- · If children are allowed out after dark, outfits should be made with light colored materials. Strips of retro-reflective tape should be used to make children visible.

## Face Design

- · Masks can obstruct a child's vision. Use facial makeup instead.
- · When buying special Halloween makeup, check for packages containing ingredients that are labeled "Made with U.S. Approved Color Additives," "Laboratory Tested," "Meets Federal Standards for Cosmetics," or "Non-Toxic." Follow manufacturer's instruction for application.
- · If masks are worn, they should have nose and mouth openings and large eye holes.

## Fire Department Offers Safety Suggestions

The Hasbrouck Heights Fire Department passes along these safety suggestions for a safe Halloween.

#### **Parental Tips**

- · An adult should always accompany children under 12 years of age.
- candles in jack-o-lanterns. Commercially available battery lights are much safer and do not pose a fire hazard.
- · Parents should never let their children carve a pumpkin unsupervised.
- · Do not hand out homemade or unwrapped candies to children.
- · Parents should plan a route for their child to use while trick-or-treating and set an early return time for them.
- · To welcome trick-or-treaters, switch on your porch lights or any exterior lights.

### Trick or Treat Tips

- Do not go inside anyone's house. Remain on the stoop or porch at all times.
- automobile.
- · Do not take shortcuts through backyards, alleys, or flame while wearing a costume. parks.
- When crossing the street look both ways. Do not cross

in between cars.

- Always use the sidewalk.
- · Trick-or-treat on well-lit streets within your neighborhood.
- · Children should always travel in a group.
- · Use the buddy system, • Do not use open flame and make sure you have at least one buddy with you the entire evening.
  - · When you return home, have an adult examine and discard all candies that are not factory sealed or wrapped by the candy manufacturer. Never eat homemade or unwrapped
  - · Children should carry spare change in case of an emergency if they need to call home.

## **Costume Tips**

- Only purchase and use flame retardant costumes.
- · Children should wear white, reflective clothing, or use reflective tape and carry either a flashlight or glow stick.
- · Costumes should fit prop-· Do not go into a stranger's erly; avoid loose or baggy costumes.
  - · Avoid any type of open
  - · Encourage children to wear face paint as opposed to a mask. Face paint should be

non-toxic and meet FDA standards.

- · If mask a is worn, make sure that the eye, mouth and nose openings are large enough to ensure adequate breathing and full range of vision.
- Materials made of 100% polyester or modacrylics are best for making homemade costumes. They are less flammable. 100% polyester and modacrylics may be purchased at most local fabric stores.
- · REMEMBER A flame-retardant costume does not mean that it is fire proof. Always keep your costume away from any type of open flame or other heat sources.

## Tips About Treats

The FDA offers these tips for parents about treats:

· Children shouldn't snack while they're out trick-ortreating. They should wait until they get home and parents have had a chance to inspect the goodies.

To help prevent children from munching, give them a

snack or light meal before they go -- don't send them out on an empty stomach.

- · Tell children not to accept -- and, especially, not to eat -- anything that isn't commercially wrapped.
- · When children bring their treats home, discard any home-made candy or baked goods. Parents of young chil-

dren should also remove any choking hazards such as gum, peanuts, hard candies or small

· Inspect commercially wrapped treats for signs of tampering, such as an unusual appearance or discoloration, tiny pinholes, or tears in wrappers. Throw away anything that looks suspicious. ###

# Codey Signs Community Service Pilot Program at Heights High School

On September 9, 2004, Acting Governor Richard J. Codey signed bill S1598, launching a three-year pilot program that will require 15 hours of community service from high school juniors in select high schools throughout the state, with the potential to expand the program to all New Jersey high schools based on its success. New Jersey now becomes just the second state in the nation, along with Maryland, to require community service for high school students.

Codey said, "We have a moral obligation and a social commitment to help those less fortunate. By making community service part of the high school experience, we can teach students that life is much bigger than the individual and that each of us has the ability to impact others."

Codey signed the bill at the Hasbrouck Heights High School Burnett Eglow Media Center, where he was joined by bill sponsor Senator Joseph Coniglio (*D-Bergen*). Also joining them were Assemblywoman Joan Voss (*D-Bergen*), Hasbrouck Heights Mayor Ronald Jones, school district officials to include Superintendent Joseph C. Luongo, BOE school board members, HS Principal Peter O'Hare, Middle School Prinicipal Edward Bolcar, Jr. and Mrs. Laura Geftic with students from the Pilot's Log school newspaper.

Hasbrouck Heights was selected for the bill signing occasion because it is one of two systems in the state now offering a community service program.

Students had a chance to ask the Governor questions and the Governor asked the students about their community service experiences. As the bill was being signed, the Governor handed out souvenir pens to the students. After the event, various news media interviewed the students.

The pilot program is expected to go into effect this school year (2005-2006) in 30 high schools throughout the state that will be selected by the Commissioner of the Department of Education (DOE). The program calls for students to complete their hours of community service prior to graduation during the evenings, weekends or summer.

Students may complete their requirement with a non-profit agency, public institution, healthcare facility or any other community organization approved by the DOE. Students will not be allowed to receive compensation for their service and schools may exempt any student for which the requirement would be deemed a hardship or inconsistent with their Individual Education Plan.

The pilot program will take place over the next three school years and will be periodically reviewed by the DOE Commissioner to ensure that it is achieving the intended goals. The state will decide on whether or not to continue the program and expand it to all New Jersey high schools, based on a report that the DOE Commissioner will be required to present to the Governor and the Legislature by December 2008. ###




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

# Held At Fireman's Memorial







## The following address was given by Mr. Paul Carris during the service.

Thank you Rev Glasser for that introduction. To the Millers, I know nothing can truly heal your loss, but I am proud to be part of our community that is here to honor Robert and keep him and you in our thoughts and prayers. To Hasbrouck Heights, from the minute I got home four years ago with friends waiting at my house right up the kind words I still get today, I thank you all for the support and friendship you continue to show my family and me.

I am never sure what to expect on this day. Each anniversary emotions kind of sneak up on me and I've noticed the same thing with my fellow workers at the Port Authority. We start the day and then realize at some point there is this emptiness that comes. But that emptiness, whether it is from losing a friend or family member on 9-11, or from Hurricane Katrina as we have so recently seen, is something that comes anytime we lose someone close to us. Every loss is a tragedy, especially when the person is young or still living a vital life.

Like most of you, I have thought countless times about what happened 4 years ago today ... and all I can come up with is this ... there is no human explanation or human rationalization to help us understand why some of us survived and some did not. 9-11 was a TRAGEDY on a global and deeply personal scale and in this day and age when we mince words and twist meanings to suit our purposes, there can be no spin put on the meaning of tragedy.

We could spend the rest of our lives trying to figure why 9-11 took place, or being bitter, angry at the terrorists or the government, or being depressed over it ... but, to what end? ... Those are destructive emotions that can consume us and prevent those of us who are still here from living the fullness of life that God has blessed us with ... we could risk missing opportunities to have relationships with new people and improve relationships with those we already know... we could risk missing in the important things happening in the lives of our loved ones.

One of the things I have learned is that "We cannot always control what happens to us, but we can control how we choose to react to it."

That statement is appropriate for any time in our lives, but it is also a statement much easier said than done.

Picking up on what Rev. Glasser had to say, I know that **God allows good to come from tragedy** ... And there are good things that happened this day 4 years ago and since, which I want to point out:

• Most importantly, **up to 25,000 people survived** and it **wasn't just by accident**. Almost all of them including my friend Judith and I can chalk that up to the efforts of the fire, police, emergency workers, paramedics and our fellow workers.

Each year more stories are revealed about regular people who helped each other that day. Looking at the television images it is hard to believe how calm everyone was in the stairwells. We were stopped for 10-15 minutes at a time

and no one panicked. People shared water with each other, made room for the firemen coming up the stairs and the injured that needed to get down quickly.

- A story that has not been heard much is that after the 1993 bombing, a large structural girder was placed between the Lobby of the North Tower and the Marriott Hotel ... the hotel was located in between the two towers and was severely damaged in '93. The girder was to add structural stability to the reconstruction of the hotel. After the first jet hit the north tower, where the Port Authority offices were ... the department directors were told to assemble in the Marriott lobby. Most of the agency's directors were in that lobby as the south tower collapsed and crushed the Marriott. Those people happened to be standing under that girder and they all survived. The engineers who designed that girder used to be teased about its overdesign and what was considered at the time an extravagant cost. And it's a good thing they did ...
- Of the several funerals I attended after September 11, the remarkable thing about them was that anywhere from several hundred to over a thousand people were in attendance at each one. To realize that each of our lives touch so many others is important and it is so easily forgotten when we are focused on our own problems.
- A friend of mine at the Port is from Pakistan. He carried an elderly man with cancer who was weakened from chemo treatments down many flights of stairs that day. No one cared that my friend is a devout Muslim.
- Another friend of mine took the only photos from inside the WTC stairwells and he wrote a book titled "WALKING FORWARD LOOK-ING BACK." It is a good message because it is natural to look back and remember those we lost, but it is more important to cope with the hurt, the loss, the anger and keep moving forward to do something with our lives. For me, my faith has gone from doctrines that were mostly learned and studied to a faith that I experience every day.

These are some of the good things I think about to help me control how I react to September 11, or any bad event in my life...But, focusing on the good does not mean I will ever forget the evil which occurred that day ... I cannot .... and I am not sure I want to. What I can do, however, and what you can do, by focusing on the good ... is to positively remember and honor the memory of those who lost their lives that day.

So PLEASE, I ask that you ...

- Pray for this world we live in.
- Pray for our Country, our leaders and our military.
- Pray for our community.
- Pray for each other; pray with your actions, by helping each other the way everyone in the WTC stairwells helped each other four years ago. **Thank you and God Bless you all.**

On September 19, 2005, old Engine One made its final run down Hamilton Avenue.

The 1977 Seagrave was delivered 1,300 miles away to the Biloxi/Pascagoula Gulf Coast area in Mississippi which was devastated by Hurricane Katrina.

Prior to departure, the engine cab and all of the compartments were loaded with donated toys, books, school supplies, clothes, etc., that were collected from the community.

In addition, the Department also donated extra hoses and other equipment for the truck.

Engine One has served Hasbrouck Heights and Teterboro as well as mutual aid communities for 28 years.

The 1977 Seagrave pumper, with 31,000 miles on the odometer, holds 500 gallons and can pump 1,500 gallons a

It was remembered that this engine pumped water on the Champion Building Products Warehouse fire for about three days straight back in

Other calls made during its tenure included: the airplane crash on Central Avenue and Boro Hall/Firehouse fire in December 1999; Progressive Brick fire where its assistance saved a life, Napp Chemical fire in Lodi, many house fires to include Oak Grove & Hamilton, Ottawa Avenue in 2001, etc.

It was noted that when the pumper arrived, it was lime green. Ten years later when it was refurbished, it was painted

The 1977 Seagrave 1250 Pumper was replaced in 2002 by a Pierce Custom Pumper (fondly known as The Pumpkin).

When New Engine One arrived, Old Engine One was used as a backup and also in various towns to include Bogota, Oradell and River

The space in the firehouse vacated by Old Engine One will house a nine year old foam truck being donated by the Port Authority in January 2006. This new addition will support Teterboro Airport and handle fuel spills. ###

# A Visit With The Thomaseys

It's not unusual in a fire department to find a father/son or brother/brother combination in its membership.

It's the more dedicated family where the father, mother and son are all involved in the department.

I recently sat down with the Thomasey family to talk about their experiences in the Hasbrouck Heights Fire Department.

Robert Thomasey has been a member of the Hasbrouck Heights Fire Department for over twenty two years, most recently serving as our fire chief in 2003-2004.

Robert played a big role in recruitment for the department over the years and he, along with other active members, was helpful in the development and needs assessment of the new firehouse built on Hamilton Avenue.

He admits his interest started in the fire department with two of his cousins, one now retired and one an active lieutenant, who are members of the New York Fire Department. "I used to hang out at the houses when I was visiting my cousins," Robert said. "I really enjoyed the camaraderie at the house as well as how things in the department worked."

Patricia (*Pat*) Thomasey has been a member of our ambulance squad for over three years.

Pat was born in Hackensack and raised in Maywood. She met her husband when she was attending Bogota High School. "Friends of mine and I were trying to get into the library at Fairleigh Dickinson and Robert came along with mutual friends.

We dated for four years and after we married I made Hasbrouck Heights my home." The couple have two children, Michael and Tracey.

When asked how she got involved with the department, Pat explained, "When Robert first joined, there were no women members in the department.

Later on, I would watch my son and my husband go off on

a fire call and I would be left alone. I decided to join the ambulance squad and use my training there." Pat is an RN at Hackensack Hospital in Orthopedics.

Son, Michael, was born and raised in Hasbrouck Heights and has fire fighting in his blood.

His parents admit, "Michael went to all the wetdowns and family picnics when he was a child.

He also knew where all the other firehouses were in the other towns and always knew the quickest way to the house in Hasbrouck Heights." Michael adds, "I really love being a fireman. I guess it's in my blood. My dad loves fire fighting and I have wanted to be a fireman my entire life. The toys I most enjoyed playing with when I was little were fire trucks."

Michael has been a member of the Lodi Ambulance Squad since 1996 and currently serves as the Captain. He works full time as an EMT for the City of Hackensack and as a per diem firefighter in Monroe Township. His goal is to become a career firefighter in Hackensack.

Daughter, Tracey, lives in Collingswood, NJ. Born and raised in Hasbrouck Heights, Tracey went on to study at Rowan College and then on to Bryn Mawr. She currently works with an adoption agency in Philadelphia.

The Thomaseys agreed that getting people involved can be difficult and a challenge for the department.

"There is a lot of commitment," Pat explained, "There is a lot of schooling and training you have to accomplish on this

job. It's hard for a lot of people where both family members have to work."

"You have to know more than you did years ago," Robert said. "We have HAZMAT and anti-terrorist training now.

Also, years ago we used to have a core group of business owners, politicians and members of the DPW and the Board of Education that used to be involved

It's a lot different today where a lot of our members work out of town and sometimes have two jobs."

One of the things the family finds beneficial to the department is the growth of the Junior Fire Department, which is open to Hasbrouck Heights residents ages 16-18.

When I asked each family member what they liked best about the department, they all answered. "I feel good when I can help make someone feel better," Pat said. "There is a satisfaction when I help someone." Robert added, "There is a satisfaction that you feel when you are helping your neighbors and the town."

Michael summed it up best with, "I really enjoy the work and being part of the department."

"It's a nice way to get involved with the town," Pat said.
"We've made a lot of good friends since we all joined the department.

It's nice to know that there is a support system when we need one. When there has been an incident in our lives, people have rallied around us.

There is a family feeling of helping. When you help someone, that makes you feel more special than just the ordinary guy on the street." ###

Codey signed the bill at the Hasbrouck Heights Firehouse at 248 Hamilton Avenue where he was joined by bill sponsors Senator Paul A. Sarlo and Assemblyman Frederick Scalera.

Also joining them were more than 200 volunteer firefighters, including members of the South Bergen Fire Chief's Association.



educational opportunities available for firefighters, while also helping them in their pursuit of a college degree. County colleges will now be required to award college credits to firefighters for completion of certain courses in county fire academies. The colleges will work together with fire academies to identify courses at the academy, which offer a curriculum similar to that of courses included in the college's fire program. The law will go into effect April 1, 2006.

"The men and women who pursue careers as some of New Jersey's Bravest learn many valuable lessons at their county firefighter academies that serve them well professionally later in life," said Sarlo. "If the goal of community college is to prepare students for professional life, there is no reason why the courses taught at firefighter academies should not translate to credits towards a degree for those seeking to become professional firefighters."

Bill A-2998 will help volunteers respond to emergencies by correcting a litany of legal ambiguities surrounding the use of blue flashing lights on civilian response vehicles. Under previous law, the vast majority of blue lights used by volunteer emergency responders were technically illegal because they were too bright. However, the lights that the law did allow were too weak to effectively warn drivers and pedestrians to free up the road, which ultimately posed a safety hazard.

The new bill will resolve these legal ambiguities and permit volunteer first responders to install larger contemporary light bars on response vehicles. The bill will go into effect immediately and the Motor Vehicle Commission will be responsible for issuing specifications for the equipment and creating permits for volunteers. ###



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# **EMS Likes ICE**

'ICE' Cell Phone Plan Would Help Rescuers

Cell phone users are being encouraged to list their emergency contact under the acronym ICE — "In Case of Emergency" — before the names of the people they want to designate as next of kin in their cell address book, creating entries such as ICE – Dad.

The Hasbrouck Heights Fire Department EMS says cell phones could do more than call for help if they're loaded with emergency contact information or specialized medical care information.

The Department encourages people to put an entry in their cell phones and other portable address devices under the name of "ICE" (In Case of Emergency).

Emergency personnel can quickly check the cell phone for the ICE entry and reach whoever's name and contact information is there. It also gives the cell phone owner the opportunity to choose who will be contacted during an emergency when that person may not want Mom. Dad, or a relative to be called.

Emergency workers say having that emergency contact information available could help them provide better care to someone who is unconscious, having a seizure or otherwise unable to communicate.

Paramedics, police and firefighters often waste valuable time trying to figure out which name in a cell phone to call when disaster strikes. Emergency services personnel say they must look through wallets for clues, or scroll through cell address books and guess. Many people identify their spouse by name in their cell, making them indistinguishable from other entries.

Bob Brotchie, a British paramedic based in Cambridge, England, came up with the idea in April 2005. Accompanying ICE would be the name and phone numbers of the person who should be called if something has happened to the owner of the phone.

He said he has responded to many accidents in which the injured person carried no information about next of kin or emergency contacts. This makes it difficult for paramedics because they don't know the patient's medical history or allergies. He said he got tired of trying to figure out who to contact when dealing with shocked or injured patients who could not give the information themselves.

Firefighters suggest that people not rely solely on cell phones. They recommend that everyone should have a piece of paper in their wallets with information regarding allergies, medication and contact information.

Officials stated that not only does it help emergency workers identify a responsible party when they come upon an unconscious person, it also helps identify the owners of lost cell phones.

The ICE initiative is available free to the 192 million cell users in the United States. ###

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# Fire Prevention Week is October 9-15

The Hasbrouck Heights Fire Prevention Bureau announced that Fire Prevention Week is October 9 through 15, 2005.

The Fire Prevention Bureau stated this year's theme is "Use Candles With Care -- When You Go Out, Blow Out!" Candles may be beautiful, but too often they are the cause of deadly house fires. In 2001 alone, candles started an estimated 18,000 house fires and caused 190 deaths. What's more, young school-age children are the most likely to be victims of fires started by candles.

Hasbrouck Heights fire officials also urge residents to ensure that smoke alarms are installed on every level of their home and kept working with monthly testing and annual battery replacement. All smoke alarms should be replaced with a new unit after 10 years. Each member of the household needs to know the fire escape plan and all should practice it twice a year.



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# How Fire Prevention Week Began

Fire Prevention Week was established to commemorate the Great Chicago Fire, the tragic 1871 conflagration that killed more than 250 people, left 100,000 homeless, destroyed more than 17,400 structures and burned more than 2,000 acres.

The fire began on October 8, but continued into, and did most of its damage, on October 9, 1871.

According to popular legend, the fire broke out after a cow - belonging to Mrs. Catherine O'Leary - kicked over a lamp, setting first the barn, then the whole city on fire.

Chances are you've heard some version of this story yourself; people have been blaming the Great Chicago Fire on the cow and Mrs. O'Leary, for more than 130 years.

But recent research by Chicago historian Robert Cromie has helped to debunk this version of events.

The 'Moo' myth: Like any good story, the 'case of the cow' has some truth to it. The great fire almost certainly started near the barn where Mrs. O'Leary kept her five milking cows.

O'Leary was in the barn when the fire broke out - or that a jumpy cow sparked the blaze. Mrs. O'Leary herself swore that she'd been in bed early that night, and that the cows were also tucked in for the evening.

But if a cow wasn't to blame for the huge fire, what was?

Over the years, journalists and historians have offered plenty of theories. Some blamed the blaze on a couple of neighborhood boys who were near the barn sneaking cigarettes.

Others believed that a neighbor of the O'Leary's may have started the fire.

Some people have speculated that a fiery meteorite may have fallen to earth on October 8, starting several fires that day - in Michigan and Wisconsin, as well as in Chicago.

The biggest blaze that week: While the Great Chicago Fire was the best-known blaze to start during this fiery two-day stretch, it wasn't the

That distinction goes to the Peshtigo Fire, the most devastating forest fire in American history.

The fire, which also occurred on October 8th, 1871, and roared through Northeast Wisconsin, burning down 16 towns, killed 1,152 people, and scorched 1.2 million acres before it ended.

Historical accounts of the fire say that the blaze began when several railroad workers clearing land for tracks unintentionally started a brush fire. Before long, the fast-moving flames were whipping through

But there is no proof that the area 'like a tornado,' some survivors said.

> It was the small town of Peshtigo, Wisconsin that suffered the worst damage. Within an hour, the entire town had been destroyed.

Eight decades of fire prevention: Those who survived the Chicago and Peshtigo fires never forgot what they'd been through; both blazes produced countless tales of bravery and heroism.

But the fires also changed the way that firefighters and public officials thought about fire safety.

On the 40th anniversary of the Great Chicago Fire, the Fire Marshals Association of North America (today known as the International Fire Marshals Association), decided that the anniversary of the Great Chicago Fire should henceforth be observed not with festivities, but in a way that would keep the public informed about the importance of fire prevention.

In 1920, President Woodrow Wilson issued the first National Fire Prevention Day proclamation, and since 1922, Fire Prevention Week has been observed on the Sunday through Saturday period in which October 9 falls.

According to the National and Records Archives Administration's Library Information Center, Fire Prevention Week is the longest running public health and safety observance on record.

The President of the United States has signed a proclamation proclaiming a national observance during that week every year since 1925. ###

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
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# **Holy Trinity Celebrates Anniversary**

What I told my son when he asked the question was what my parents told me when I was younger.

violent but still beautiful thing – and it can take human lives and destroy property in ways that cannot be imagined (and we saw that with this storm).

But God did not punish these people. That is just not the God I know and believe in.

I think that God was present with those people through the storm and after.

God is there binding the wounds of those who were injured and the hearts of those who lost loved ones — just as God is present with us now and always. Remember that. ###



Eligible homeowners received application packets for their FAIR property tax rebates in July 2005.

NJ residents qualify if they owned and paid property taxes on a home that was their principal residence on October 1, 2004 and their gross 2004 family income was \$200,000 or less.

Renters also qualify for a smaller rebate and received their forms in the 2004 NJ Income Tax booklet.

The recently approved state budget for fiscal 2006 provided \$1.1 billion in direct property tax relief for FAIR rebates.

FAIR rebates should not be confused with Senior Freeze Rebates for seniors and disabled, although that program's deadline has also been extended to October 17th.

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
