



Heights Vet Offers Autumn Pet Care Tips

The Hasbrouck Heights Oradell Veterinary Group, located at 343 Boulevard, suggests that you watch out for family pets as you prepare for the cold, festive days of fall.

• Many brands of antifreeze are highly toxic. Store new and used antifreeze in a sealed container.

• Chocolate is a special treat, but it is toxic to dogs, cats and birds.

• Holiday meals can be hazardous to pets. Chicken and turkey bones can get stuck and pierce the digestive tract. Rich foods can cause pancreatitis or bloating.

• Indoor pets not acclimated to winter temperatures should not be outside in cold weather for long periods. Outdoor pets can withstand fairly cold temperatures, but make sure they have proper shelter from wind and rain and provide them with good bedding. Frostbite is a winter hazard to pets. ###

FAIR Rebate Deadline Extended to Oct. 31st

Deadline for filing FAIR Rebate applications has been extended to October 31, 2007.

The FAIR Rebate Program provides rebates for New Jersey resident homeowners and tenants who occupied their principal residence in New Jersey on October 1, 2006, paid property taxes on that dwelling either directly or through rent, and whose gross income for the entire year does not exceed certain limits.

Homeowners and tenants file different applications according to their status on October 1, 2006.

If you were a homeowner on October 1, 2006, a 2006 FAIR Homeowner Rebate application was mailed to you by July 2007. Homeowners do not file Form TR-1040, doing so will delay the payment of your homeowner rebate. Eligibility includes having a gross income for 2006 of \$200,000 or less, subject to local property taxes. The 2006 property taxes must have been paid. If you were a tenant on October 1, 2006, file a Form TR-1040, FAIR Tenant Rebate application, contained in the 2006 resident income tax return booklet. Eligibility includes: your principal residence is subject to local property taxes and property taxes were paid through rent, residence is a full living unit with separate kitchen and bathroom and your gross income for 2006 was \$100,000 or less.

If you were neither a homeowner nor a tenant on October 1, 2006, you are not eligible for a 2006 FAIR Rebate, even if you owned a home or rented a qualified dwelling for part of the year.

Are there other ways to save money?

Yes. Take a look around your home and check for drafts around doors, windows and even electrical outlets. The Almost Disaster

It could have been a disas- traffic continued. ter. But wasn't.

On Friday afternoon, August 24th, about 2:18 p.m., a fully loaded gasoline tanker collapsed on Route 17 at the jug-handle across from White Castle.

The tractor became disabled and pulled onto the shoulder. The driver lowered the trailer's front landing gear supports and disengaged the tractor from the tanker trailer. A replacement tractor attempted to reconnect with the tanker when the trailer's landing gear supports gave way. Both tractors pulled forward of the traffic signal.

The scene immediately surrounding the disabled tanker was evacuated.

First responders took action of an unknown situation.

Route 17 North was closed with traffic diverted to Moonachie Avenue, along Hackensack Street/Terrace Avenue and down Franklin Avenue back to Route 17 North.

Incident Commander, Second Assistant Chief Kevin storm sewer drains near the Todd, positioned available resources north of the incident. Heights Rescue applied Speedy Dry around the storm sewer opening to create a dam in case of a leak. On Route 17 North, Heights Engine 2 dropped a 5" hose, connected to a hydrant, connected a feed line to the foam/ crash truck, then charged the line for a stand-by. Wood-Ridge Engine 905 connected to a hydrant on Route 17 South and stood by and prepared to drop a 5" hose. By 3:00 p.m., the remaining traffic caught between the detour at Moonachie Avenue and the incident was cleared and Route 17 North was fully shut down. Route 17 South

Assistant Chief Todd, several Bergen County HAZ-MAT, HHPD and NJ DOT members did a close visual inspection of the trailer and determined that no gas was leaking, assessed the damage and developed a plan of action to safely deal with the situation. South Bergen Zone 2 Fire Coordinator, Mark Tomko, assisted with mutual aid company coordination.

The task was to find a compatible tanker on a Friday afternoon, get it to the scene through grid-locked traffic and off-load the product safely in terms of personnel and the environment.

Lodi Foam Unit arrived at about 3:45 p.m. and positioned south of the incident.

BC HAZ-MAT, using HHFD and Lodi thermal imaging cameras and digital thermometers, continually assessed the tanker's load and temperature.

At about 4:14 p.m., BC HAZ-MAT covered the three incident with plastic sheathing and NJ DOT trucks covered them with sand. This precaution would protect the environment in case of spillage.

Ridgewood gas station to unload their product.

At about 7:00 p.m., the empty tanker returned, positioned for off-loading, hooked up several grounding cables to both vehicles and prepared transfer hoses.

BCHAZ-MAT technicians reviewed the off-loading technique with the truck operators. The technicians stated that they had this type of tanker event training.

HHFD Foam/Crash Truck prepared the foam-handling hoses and positioned their firefighters on the north section of the jug-handle. Lodi Foam Unit prepared themselves at the south section of the jug-handle. Their primary objective was that in case of an incident, they would be able to protect the BC HAZ-MAT technicians who were on top of the disabled tanker off-loading the gas.

At about 7:15 p.m., final preparations were made to include shutting down all Route 17 traffic in both directions, cordoning off and evacuating an ample safety area for all emergency personnel on scene with the exception of the truck operators, HAZMAT and firefighters operating the foam unit positions. At about 7:25 p.m., BC HAZ-MAT technicians Thomas Bischoff Jr. and Scott Saunders stood on top of the disabled tanker, inserted a suction hose and began off-loading the gasoline product. At about 8:45 p.m., the final batch of gasoline was transferred to the replacement tanker, which then departed. Emergency services then began breaking down the scene.

Three news helicopters were circling the scene.

With Route 17 North closed, traffic was creating back-ups in New York City, and Trenton ordered relief. At about 5:30 p.m., NJ DOT set up cones to open one lane of traffic northbound.

At about 5:43 p.m., a gasoline tanker from Prospect Transport, Carlstadt, NJ, arrived on the scene. Unfortunately, the tanker was also full of gasoline. With a Bergen County Police escort, the tanker went up Route 17 to a

At about 8:52 p.m., the towing company began their task of lifting the empty tanker, placing a miniature "fifth wheel"

(trailer hitch), reconnecting the empty tanker for transport and departed at about 9:50 p.m.

Route 17 South was reopened about 9:15 p.m. and Route 17 North was reopened at about 10:30 p.m.

Fire Departments responding to the scene were Hasbrouck Heights Fire Department Foam/Crash Truck, Engine 1, Engine 2, Rescue and both ambulances, Lodi Foam Unit and Engine 1; Hackensack Emergency Response Units, three Moonachie Rescue/EMS units, Teaneck's Box 54, Wood-Ridge Engine 905 and Garfield Engine 1, East Rutherford Truck 1 and Carlstadt Rescue.

Police Departments responding included: Hasbrouck drain openings in case of spillage.

Heights, Wood-Ridge, Bergen County and NJ State Police, in addition to BC HAZ-MAT Team, BC Office of Emergency Management Sgt. Barry D. Leventhal, and the NJ DOT emergency response unit.

During the incident, Wood-Ridge Engine, Hackensack Engine, Little Ferry Ladder and Moonachie Engine were on standby at the Hasbrouck Heights Fire Headquarters to handle any emergencies.

It was noted that many businesses along Route 17 were adversely affected, i.e., The Fiesta had three receptions scheduled that night. ###

Search & Rescue

On the evening of August 22, 2007, the Hasbrouck Heights Fire Department conducted training at a Kipp Avenue house scheduled for demolition.

The exercise was led by First Assistant Chief Mike Ratowski, Rescue Lt. Chris Halloran and Ladder Company Capt. Brian Morrow.

The drill started with orientation and a review of safety procedures and on-scene protocol. Participants were divided into two groups; each having the opportunity to participate in each scenario.

Lt. Halloran supervised second floor search and rescue training in a simulated smoke filled environment, utilizing three volunteers as victims.

Victims were hidden inside rooms near makeshift furniture. Doors were closed and obstacles strewn about to simulate potential hazards.

The search for victims was done with firefighters in full turnout gear using their air tanks; and included practicing teamwork search procedures and use of thermal imaging cameras. Once the victim was located, rescuers had to remove them to the front door.

Capt. Morrow supervised several roof venting techniques. This included assessing the structure and incident, ladder training and safety, venting a sloped roof and venting a flat roof. Tools used included a circular saw, chain saw and axe. Firefighters wore full turnout gear.

Also participating in the drill were members of the Moonachie Fire Department and Carlstadt EMS. ###

the service of curb-side leaf collection.

Hasbrouck Heights: Leaves may be raked into the street curb beginning October 17th and continue until December 1st.

Leaves should be raked off the top of the curb and fully into the street -- but not within 10 feet of storm drains.

It is advised that providing a drainage space between the leaf pile and the curb will allow a better flow of rain water to storm drains.

Leaves may also be bagged in paper sacks or in upright containers. Leaves in plastic bags are not acceptable.

Leaves are accepted at the Heights DPW recycling depot at any time in paper sacks or upright containers.

Moonachie: Grass collection stops the first Wednesday in November when leaf collection starts and lasts until December 1st. Leaves may be raked to the street curbs, but not in the street. Leaf bags are available to Moonachie residents at Borough Hall -- 3 for \$1 or 15 for \$5. Leaf bags are picked up more frequently. Wood-Ridge: Leaves should be swept to the street or put in paper biodegradable leaf bags only (not plastic bags or other containers) beginning October 1 through November 30, 2007. It is advised that providing a drainage space between the leaf pile and the curb will allow a better flow of rain water to storm drains. Please

Area DPW's will continue keep leaves 10 feet from storm drains.

> Filled leaf bags will be collected as the streets are swept.

From December 3rd through December 28th, all leaves must be bagged -- no plastic. There will be no leaf collection after December 28, 2007.

Do not mix twigs, branches or other waste with the leaves. Other material will not be picked up. ###

On the morning of June 11, 2007, doctors at St. Joseph's Regional Medical Center in Paterson, NJ, successfully completed surgery on two-year old Nelson Zambrano, from Honduras, suffering from congenital heart disease.

Nelson arrived at Newark International Airport with his devoted mother, Sonya, on May 27, 2007. They were pale and undernourished.

The entire trip and medical care, including transportation, food, housing, hospital and surgical coordination, was arranged by the Rotary District 7490 Gift of Life Foundation, a project of the 49 Rotary Clubs of Bergen, Passaic and Hudson Counties. The Interact Club of Bergen County Technical Schools raised the funds to sponsor Nelson.

The host family for Nelson and Sonya's stay in America was Mid-Bergen Rotary Club member, Ruth Nebiar.

Breakfast time the next morning was a heartbreaking moment for the Nebiar Family. Two-year old Nelson was not even able to feed himself.

Throughout that week Nelson was introduced to food gradually. It was important for Nelson to build up his strength so that he would be prepared for surgery.

Nelson went into surgery at 6:30 a.m. on the morning of Monday, June 11, 2007. The surgery was a success.

Later that afternoon, Sonya, Nelson's mother, began

having seizures. Sonya lay unconscious in the hospital with Rotarian Mia Villon and Mia's husband Cesar by her side. Sonia remained in the hospital for a week while Nelson returned home with the Nebiar Family.

That week, Ruth and Fred became parents again to a now much more lively two-year old.

It was determined that Sonya had parasites in her brain, a condition for which she was treated successfully at the same hospital, which had provided life-saving open heart surgery to her son only hours earlier.

She then returned back to the Nebiar household where she was reunited with her now healthy son.

Over the course of the next weeks, Sonya and Nelson began their recuperation. By following up with their medications, mother and son experienced rapid progression.

Nelson began to finally learn to walk and feed himself. He was now a normal two year old. The pair returned home on July 6, 2007.

It was a heartbreaking goodbye as the Mid-Bergen Rotary and the Nebiar Family waved good-bye to a now healthy mother and son. Not only one life was saved - but two. Story and photos provided by the Mid-Bergen Rotary. ###

Project Lifesaver

The Kiwanis Club of Hasbrouck Heights and Teterboro is sponsoring a special project for children who have been diagnosed with Autism or Down syndrome. This program is called "Project Lifesaver." A special device can help parents with their greatest fear-not being able to find their child if he/she wanders off.

The device is a one-ounce battery-operated radio wrist transmitter that emits a silent tracking signal every second, 24 hours a day. The child wears this bracelet 24 hours a day. The battery, as well as the band, is changed once a month. The wearer can do everything with it on, even shower.

The wrist transmitter has a specially designed radio receiver used to track down a lost child. A missing child can be found in twenty minutes. The Sheriff's team is specialized in approaching a lost child.

When a child is missing the caretaker calls the Police Department – then the Police call the Sheriff's Office. They use this device and, in extreme cases, they use helicopters as well as trained dogs.

Project Lifesaver is operated in over 30 states and every county in New Jersey by the local Sheriff's Office.

The Kiwanis Club is sponsoring this project and will pick up the initial expense of the wrist transmitter. They will pay for all wrist transmitters for children who live in Hasbrouck Heights.

There is a monthly maintenance fee of approximately \$13.00, which pays for a new battery and wristband. The parents must assume this fee. • Gina De Florio has been a resident of Hasbrouck Heights for over 35 years. In the past two and a half years, she has become a valuable asset to The Library. About three years ago, The Library wanted to start a knitting class. Because she was born in Italy where knitting was a very important and practical skill needed in everyday life, Gina offered her services. She has 7 classes with over 100 people. Because of Gina's efforts, The Library has established two craft organizations. Her groups now knit and crochet beautiful and useful items, which are donated to the patients at Hackensack University Medical Center.

• Laurence 'Lonny' Donohue is a "Good Neighbor" to the residents who live on the 100 block of Hasbrouck Avenue. He looks out for many of his neighbors. He thinks nothing of shoveling their sidewalks in a snow storm, edging lawns, and when asked, taking in their mail while they're away. He also took care of a family pet while the family was away on vacation. Lonny takes pride in his landscape and helps others keep their property beautiful as well. He genuinely cares about his neighbors and is always there helping when asked.

She makes the time to help even if she has to rearrange her own schedule. Joan helps by shopping for you or taking you where you need to go. Joan is always cheerful. She brings you up when you're feeling down. She is one of those unique people who makes you feel important. • Frank Saggio helps his neighbors, and even his former neighbors, when they call upon him. He is always ready to drive them to keep a doctor's appointment and then pick them up when they are finished. He also can be relied upon for trips to the drug store, bank, beauty salon, etc. A neighbor who doesn't forget you and still wants to help even if you moved a few blocks away, is a great neighbor. 93rd Annual Devotion to St. Joseph -- Festival

Approximately 25,000 attended the Labor Day Weekend 93rd St. Joseph Festival, which opened August 31st at 6 p.m., with rides, games, entertainment, super 50-50 with a \$10,000 winner, and the "Best Italian Food." This annual program benefits the St. Joseph Church operating fund.

On September 1st, 2nd and 3rd, starting at 9 a.m., there were Processions by the St. Joseph Society with Italian Feast Band -- throughout Lodi and surrounding towns.

The Band was the Tony Neglia Band of Local 248 Musicians Union, Paterson, NJ. They have been playing this Festival for over 50 years.

The Band formed up at St. Joseph Church at 9 a.m. and played the "Star Spangled Banner" and the "Italian National Anthem."

Society members and The Band split into three groups and held Processions starting at various points in Lodi, covering a majority of the streets in Lodi and surrounding towns such as Garfield and Hasbrouck Heights.

Each group went out with a "stenardo" (banner) of Saint Joseph. Each door bell at every house was rung and the band would play favorite songs such as "Mamma," "Oh Marie," "Santa Lucia," etc.

The highlight of the Feast is a Solemn Procession of St. Joseph throughout Lodi on Labor Day at 3 p.m.

Society members took the Statue of St. Joseph from the Church and set it on the float. They decorated the St. Joseph statue with blue ribbons and flowers. Seven children, who made their First Communion this year, rode on the float. The float also held a Society member who would accept donations and pin them to the blue ribbon.

Originally, the stand which supports the statue was supported by long poles and carried on the shoulders by the altar boys and clergy; the St. Joseph Float was followed by over 100 laity, at times saying The Rosary. In the past, some women would make this devotion barefoot.

Traditionally, during the Procession, two homes at Arnot and at Charles, set out refreshments.

Upon the completion of the Procession, the statue was returned to St. Joseph Church, and there was a Benediction.

For the past 93 years, this Festival has been a parish affair. The food court, games and raffles are organized and operated by the parishioners, with all of the profits donated to the Church.

These booths have been family operated for generations. For example, the Palumbo/Esposito Families have about 30 members who work the sausage sandwich booth. Charles Palumbo started this family tradition when he was 14 years old, when the Festival began.

There are a few outside vendors and the amusements are contracted. ###

St. Joseph Society

The St. Joseph Society was founded on December 7th, 1915 by Italian immigrants from various towns in Sicily devoted to St. Joseph.

Their mission was to have a place of worship in honor of their patron saint to be located in Lodi, New Jersey.

The founding fathers worked together to help build the first St. Joseph Church in 1917.

Each member took out a personal loan to help contribute financially and did the actual work in building the first St. Joseph Church.

Labor Day is a national holiday here in the United States. The Society decided that what better holiday to celebrate the life of St. Joseph since he was a laborer. So, the idea was born to host a Feast in honor of St. Joseph during Labor Day Weekend. Benediction. Ninety two years later, this is still the case. It is still a large success and well known event in Northern New Jersey.

The St. Joseph Society was once a strong group having close to 100 members during the 1940's to the 1960's.

The decision was made to hand over the majority of the Feast responsibility to the Church. Hiring the rides, games, and food would be the Church's responsibility. The entertainment would be the Society's, in addition to the tradition of collections during the Feast weekend and Procession. ###




