





Teterboro Pump Station Dedicated

On September 12, 2008, the John H. Strunck Memorial Pump Station, located at Vincent Place, Teterboro NJ, was dedicated.

In 1906, Mr. Walter C. Teter built drainage ditches. As the area developed, the need for a pump station to pump storm water from the lower riser ditch to the upper ditch on the west side became apparent. The pumping station handles the storm water for Teterboro and portions of the greater surrounding drainage area. This region is low-lying and flows to downstream tide gates along Berry's Creek West Riser Ditch, which serve to help isolate this area from tidal flooding. Due to the lowlying grades and tidal barrier, the only way for water to leave Teterboro is to pump it out.

Mr. Strunck, the Pump Master from 1917 to 1963, operated the original 1917 pump house, and the additional 1927 and 1952 pump houses that were built to handle the developing Borough.

This project was complex on many levels.

Because of the maintenance costs and taxed capabilities, the Borough wanted to upgrade the pump stations, but did not have the funds.

Additionally, the 2 1/2 acre site contained three pump

stations, Teterboro DPW yard, and three airport hangars, (originally owned by The Port Authority and deeded to Teterboro in the 1960s). In 1996, the property was deemed a blighted condition by the Meadowlands Commission, which allowed redevelopment.

In 1995, the Port Authority did a preliminary storm water study to assess the Airport needs, followed by a comprehensive study in 2001. This study determined that both the on-airport drainage system and the Borough's pump station were inadequate to handle a five-year storm which is the FAA's design standard for airports. The Port Authority planned to upgrade their onairport drainage system. As part of the upgrades, the Port Authority considered installing a new pump station on airport property. However, the Borough and the Port Authority eventually decided to combine their problems and resources. All storm water would continue to be pumped through the Borough pump stations.

But, as they were antiquated and could not adequately and reliably handle the storm water, it was agreed to build a new pump station. By reallocating funds the Port Authority was going to use for their pump station, they provided 6.3 million dollars to the Borough to

fund the new project.

After the necessary studies, design, regulatory approvals, permits and engineering, to include the NJ Meadowlands Commission, NJDEP, etc., construction began. Contaminated areas were capped to prevent contact with historic fill material.

The Port Authority ended their airport drainage upgrade with a 66-inch storm drain exiting the airport at Industrial Avenue. An existing 48-inch storm sewer collects drainage from areas along Industrial extending towards Rt. 46. Both connected at Industrial Avenue and Vincent Place to a new 96-inch storm drain that flows to the wet-well of the new pump station.

To support the facility, 88 steel "H" piles were driven into the underlying clay soil (some down to 200'), while weight-compensating fill was used to offset the weight of the large diameter reinforced concrete pipe storm sewer.

The new facility became operational in February 2007. It is a 175 cubic feet per second storm water pump station utilizing six 6-foot diameter Archimedes screw pumps, which pull from the lower riser ditch wet-well (open channel), lifting the water 10 feet to the upper ditch which flows by gravity towards Berry's Creek. ###
















Volunteers answered 100 phones, stuffed and mailed letters ... there was a job for everyone!





MFD Advises Area Residents to "Prevent Home Fires"

A pot holder too close to a lit burner or a space heater left on overnight could be all it takes to start a home fire. In fact, cooking and heating are among the leading causes of home fires in the United States, according to the nonprofit National Fire Protection Association (NFPA).

That's why the Moonachie Fire Department is teaming up with NFPA from October 5-11 to urge area residents to "Prevent Home Fires."

This year's campaign focuses on preventing all the leading causes of home fires - cooking, heating and electrical equipment, and smoking materials.

Additionally, fire safety educators will be teaching local residents how to plan and practice escape from a home in case a fire occurs.

According the latest research from NFPA, more than 2,500 people died in home fires in the United States in 2006, and 12,500 were injured. Fire departments responded to 396,000 home fires, which accounted for 80% of civilian deaths and 76% of injuries that

fires is daunting, the good news is that many are easily preventable when residents take simple steps to increase their safety from fire," said Moonachie Fire Chief William Hunt Jr. "Whether it's smoking outside the home, keeping space heaters at least three feet away

from anything that can burn, or staying in the kitchen when you are using the stovetop, there are easy things you can do to keep your home and family safe from fire."

Do you know how to keep your home safe from fire hazards? Reviewing the following information and taking action can help you "Prevent Home Fires" during Fire Prevention Week and year-round.

- · Cooking: Stay in the kitchen when you are frying, grilling, or broiling food. If you leave the kitchen for even a short period time, turn off the stove.
- Heating: Keep all things that can burn, such as paper, bedding or furniture, at least 3 feet away from heating equipment.
- · Electrical: Replace cracked and damaged electrical cords; use extension cords for temporary wiring only. Consider having additional circuits or receptacles added by a qualified electrician.
- · Smoking: If you smoke, smoke outside; wherever you smoke, use deep, sturdy ash-

"New Jersey's drunk driving laws are among the toughest in the nation," said Pam Fischer, Director of the Division of Highway Traffic Safety.

Attorney Frank T. Luciano Esq. provides this information regarding DWI.

- Carbonated mixers, including sparkling wines and draft beer, tend to accelerate the absorption rate of alcohol.
- You will be impaired if you are a 150 lb. male and consume four 12 oz. bottles of beer or four 4 oz. glasses of wine in two hours.
- You can be convicted of DWI if you are not "drunk." The law prohibits you from driving if it would be "improper" for you to drive.
- The fact that you are driving while intoxicated on private

property is no defense to a DWI offense.

- The fact that the vehicle that you are operating is not a motor vehicle is no defense. You can be convicted of DWI while driving a moped or a snow mobile.
- If you are in a vehicle that is completely inoperable and is being pushed and you are behind the steering wheel, you can be convicted of DWI.
- If you pull over to "sleep it off," you can be convicted of a DWI. Even if you "sleep it off" in the back seat with the keys in your pocket, you can be convicted of a DWI.

History Makes History

Wings and Wheels Expo Marks 60th Anniversary of Berlin Airlift

(ONBOARD THE SPIR-IT OF FREEDOM) --- We climbed the ladder into the year 1948. Inside was a museum dedicated to telling the story of the Allies' effort to save the citizens of Berlin, Germany.

On June 24, 1948, the Soviet blockade of Western Berlin began.

One of the greatest humanitarian efforts in aviation history began on June 26th, when the U.S. and her Allies took to the skies, flying in provisions for West Berlin's 2 million residents.

During the Berlin Airlift, a plane landed every three minutes supplying food, fuel, raw materials, etc. and took about 20 minutes to unload by hand. Deliveries grew from 500-700 tons a day to 12,940 tons by April 1949. At midnight on May 12, 1949, the test of wills ended and the Soviets reopened

the land and water routes into Berlin, ending the 322-day blockade.

The co-pilot for this historic flight was Lt. Gail S. Halvorsen (now retired Colonel).

Although delivery of staples was the backbone of the Airlift, it was pilot Lt. Halvorsen who captured the world's imagination. He encountered a group of children near the Berlin Airport and gave them some gum. He and other pilots continued dropping candy wrapped in handkerchief parachutes during the Airlift.

The crew did their final flight check, the engines roared, eight invited German and American journalists took their seats, and the Douglas C-54E/R5-D took off into history. The brief flight went down the Hudson, passed Ellis Island, The Statue of Liberty to Sandy Hook, before returning. ###

Prior to this commemorative flight, the German Consul hosted a ceremony on the ramp honoring the Veterans who participated in the Berlin Airlift.

Speakers included Dr. Horst Freitag Hera, German Consul General, Dr. Heinrich Neumann, German Press Consul and General Consul, Gail Halvorsen, the original "candyman" and Helga Johnson, Berlin child recalling the impact of the parachuted candy.

It was an emotional moment when the speakers walked over to the Berlin Airlift Veterans, and shook each hand.

The ceremony concluded with a color guard from the Teterboro Composite Squadron, NJ Wing, Civil Air Patrol, and Iwo Jima (LHS-7) Division of the U.S. Naval Sea Cadet Corps, marching to the podium and presenting a memorial wreath. ###

Cold War Warrior

Far from sight of land, skimming over rough seas whose depth and darkness hide a possibly hostile submarine, 10 men concentrate on instrument panels, scopes and detection devices as their P-3 Orion flies an ASW (anti-submarine warfare) search pattern.

Replacing the aging P-2 Neptune, the P-3C entered the inventory in July 1962. The P-3's reputation as the ultimate submarine finder was earned through more than 45 years of service, from the Cuban Missile Crisis to round-the-clock, low-profile patrols throughout the Cold War. The last Navy P-3 came off the production line at the Lockheed plant in April 1990.

The current force of 12 active and seven reserve squadrons supports the theater and fleet commanders' require-





ments for 40 P-3C's continuously forward-deployed.

The P-3C can either operate alone or support many different customers including the carrier battlegroup and amphibious readiness group. The aircraft can carry a variety of weapons internally and on wing pylons, such as the Harpoon anti-surface missile, the MK-50 torpedo and the MK-60 mine.

It is powered by four Allison T56-A-14 turboprop engines, swinging 13-1/2 foot paddle-blade propellers. For sea-level ASW work, two engines may be shut down to achieve increased time on station. Range is 3 hours on station at 1,500 feet; 1,346 nautical miles. Cruise speed is 377 mph.

The ramp also displayed many other aircraft.

The Army Air Forces Historical Association provided an extensive educational display which was dedicated to preserving the history of the United States Army Air Forces during World War II.

The Port Authority of NY & NJ displayed their Police helicopter, crash/foam truck and runway maintenance equipment.



Yankee Lady Living History

ONBOARD THE YAN-KEE LADY --- We climb a short ladder through a small hatch and into the belly of an American fighting machine built for a war long ago.

Three crew members and 10 passengers buckled into the B-17's jump seats. The quiet of the open airfield breaks with a cough, sputter and whine as engine #3 kicks up and nine cylinders of the Wright 1200 hp turbocharged radials hum. The sequence continues for engines 4, 2, and 1. With no soundproofing, it's loud!

There is a two minute pause as the engine oil warms up and the pilot does his check list, then we taxi the ramp to the edge of the runway. Just before entering, the pilot runs the engines up to 2,100 rpm to test the magnetos, then rolls onto the runway and begins.

At 100 mph and 2,500 feet, the Yankee Lady gently

Once airborne, we are allowed to explore the aircraft to include the nose/bombardier compartment, cockpit, top turret, bomb bay, radio room and the rear compartment.

Our smooth flight is over Giants Stadium; a couple of turns and we are traveling down the center of the Hudson River, 150 knots (175 mph) at 2,500 feet. Passing Ellis Island, the Statue of Liberty and Verrazano Narrows Bridge, we gently turn down the Jersey shore line to Sandy Hook. We returned the same route back to Teterboro Airport.

Rides aboard this flying museum were available to the public for \$425. Over 100 people took rides during the Wings & Wheels Expo 2008.

The Yankee Lady was built in 1945 and was put into storage. After the war, it was used by the U.S. Coast Guard for air-sea rescue and iceberg patrols. In 1959, Fairchild Aerial Survey Company used it for airborne survey work. In 1966, Aircraft Specialties, Inc. used it as a tanker to fight forest fires.

It was purchased for \$250,000 in June 1986 by the not-for-profit Yankee Air Museum in Michigan (which hosts a collection of historic aircraft). It took nine years to restore this B-17 Flying Fortress to its original condition. Its first post-restoration flight took place July 13, 1995.

The Yankee Lady nose art is representative of B-17s assigned to the 8th Air Force, 381st Bomb Squadron.

The Yankee Lady has been in several movies to include "Tora, Tora, Tora."

Over 12,000 B-17s werebuilt, 5,000 were destroyed in combat, and only 11 are flying

The B-17 is best remembered for its dangerous daylight-bombing missions over Germany. Defensive armament consisted of twelve .50 caliber machine guns. A normal mission bomb load was 5,000 pounds. A typical combat crew was 10.

Today's operating costs are approximately \$1,800 per hour with fuel consumption of 200 gallons per hour. For more info go to: www.yankeeairmuseum. org ###



Ugly Angels Were Beautiful

Legendary war hero USMC Capt. (Ret.) Ben Cascio stood alongside a real, operational Sikorsky H-34 and shared his stories.

It begins in 1967 when Mr. Cascio was one of the pilots of the "Ugly Angels" that rescued countless lives during the Vietnam War.

The H-34 was extremely durable; thus, even when it sustained considerable damage, it often was still able to rescue soldiers.

The combination of many successful missions, and ungainly appearance, quickly earned the aircraft the affectionate nickname the "Ugly Angels."

Originally designed in 1952 as an anti-submarine warfare platform for the U.S. Navy, almost two-thousand H-34s have served on every



continent with the armed forces of twenty-five countries.

YN-19 aircraft BU NO 150570 was built by Sikorsky Aircraft Division in Stratford, Connecticut and delivered to the Marine Corps, Oct. 28, 1963. It served in Vietnam from 1963 to June 1969. During her time in Vietnam she served with many squadrons as they rotated in and out of Vietnam.

From saving flood victims, recovering astronauts, fighting fires, and carrying presidents, military H-34s have met every challenge handed them.

With continuing post-military service, the number of countries which the H-34 has called home has swelled to nearly fifty.

Revitalized with turbine engines, it has yet to fade from sight. Whether lifting construction material or supporting police departments, the DC3 of the helicopters will still be flying on its fiftieth anniver-

YN-19 has been restored as a flying memorial to the pilots and crew who were lost in the Vietnam War.

The restoration took 20,000 man-hours over five years to complete, by the same Marines who flew together 40 years ago. It is owned and operated by Marine Helicopter Squadron 361 Veterans Association, Cutchogue, NY. www.34restoration.org ###

T-6A Texan II

Designed to train students in basic flying skills common to U.S. Air Force and Navy pilots, the T-6A Texan II is a single-engine, stepped-tandem two-seat primary trainer.

Pilots enter the T-6A cockpit through a side-opening, onepiece canopy that has demonstrated resistance to bird strikes at speeds up to 270 knots. The aircraft is fully aerobatic and features a pressurized cockpit with an anti-G system, ejection seat and an advanced avionics package with sunlight-readable liquid crystal displays. This T-6A is based at Columbus Air Force Base (www.columbus. af.mil). ###



Stearman

This Stearman was built in 1943. It is painted yellow with a red stripe, replicating a Navy Trainer. It is based in Belmar, NJ, and owned by Mike Flak-

The model began production in 1938. These sturdy biplanes covered the ramps of military bases and filled the skies over the central and western States during the war.

From 1940 to 1945, almost every Army and Navy student pilot earned his wings in a "Kaydet," or more commonly referred to as the "Stearman."

More than 8,600 primary trainers were produced through 1943. Post war, these maneuverable biplanes were sold surplus for a few hundred dollars and snapped up by agriculture pilots who placed crop dusting tanks in the front cockpit and spray bars on the wing. ###



Spartan Executive

Recognizing the connection between aviation and business, George Mennen was a corporate aviation pioneer who took business aviation to a new level using his aircraft to promote his products.

Of the 34 Spartan Executives made, only a dozen remain, and George Mennen owned and flew this one -- serial number 34, "Mrs. Mennen."

The Spartan Aircraft Company was formed in 1928. J. Paul Getty took ownership of the Spartan Aircraft Company in 1935, and yielded an aircraft that was far ahead of its time - in performance, in appearance, and in luxury. Its design was geared to the opulent tastes of the captains of industry. This Spartan Executive is owned and operated by his grandson, William Mennen. (www.spartanexecutive.com) ###

It was the good example of those who taught me and went before me that led me to be here. Parents have always been, and will always be, a foundation of this ministry.

St. Joseph Mothers' Club began with 13 strong women who had a purpose and dream: to assist in any way possible ,from hot lunches to minstrel shows.

Our Home School Association today, an arm of the



Mothers' Club, raises necessary funds for the budget and provides programs for the children.

Our connection to the community is evident in the presence of the leadership of East Rutherford and Carlstadt here today. We are integral to the life of the community and offer alternative educational choices to parents.

I am pleased to see priests and sisters who have served here, representation from the school's office of the Archdiocese and so many graduates to celebrate with us.





Pharmacist Corner

Shingles Vaccine

I wanted to focus this month's article on the new recommendations for the shingles vaccine. An estimated 43 million adults over the age of 60 are at risk for developing herpes zoster. The CDC Advisory Committee now recommends one dose of the vaccine for all adults greater than 60 who have no contraindications.

Herpes zoster, also known as shingles, is the reactivation of the varicella zoster virus, which causes chicken pox. After an initial infection with chicken pox, usually as a child, the infection becomes dormant. The risk factors for developing shingles include:

- History of chicken pox
- Increasing age
- Use of immunosuppresants (such as corticosteroids *like prednisone)*
 - Tumors
 - HIV infection
 - Radiation
 - Trauma
 - Surgery

The condition is usually characterized by a one sided, painful rash. Initial symptoms involve tingling, itching, burning, or numbness, which begin 4 to 5 days before the onset of the rash. The blisters normally heal over 2 to 4 weeks. A complication of shingles is called postherpetic neuralgia, which is diagnosed after the skin lesions have healed but the pain persists for longer than 30 days. The pain is described as a dull ache or a sharp burning or shooting pain with numbness.

Patients with herpes zoster are treated with oral antiviral agents such as Zovirax, Valtrex, or Famvir. In some cases, corticosteroids and analgesics may be used for additional pain control. The treatment of postherpetic neuralgia involves more intensive therapy, which can include stronger analgesics, antidepressants, anticonvulsants, capsaicin, and topical anesthetics.

To prevent shingles, the zoster vaccine (Zostavax) was developed for those 60 years of age or older. Please remember that the vaccine can not be used

to treat the virus once the infection begins. The vaccine helps by boosting a patient's immunity to the varicella zoster virus. An important note about the vaccine involves its storage and preparation. The vaccine must be kept frozen and should be administered within 30 minutes once removed from the freezer in order to minimize loss of potency.

The vaccine decreases the chance of infection by about 50% and the development of postherpetic neuralgia by about 65% -- these are very significant results. Before receiving the vaccine your provider should ask some potential screening questions:

- Are you sick today?
- Do you have any allergies to medications or any vaccine?
- Have you ever had a serious reaction after receiving a vaccine?
- Do you have cancer, leukemia, AIDS, or other immune problems?
- Do you take cortisone, prednisone, other steroids, or anticancer drugs?
- Have you had X-ray treat-



Lodi Feast

The 94th Annual St. Joseph Festival opened Friday, August 29, at 6 p.m., with rides, games, entertainment, hourly 50-50, a Super 50-50 and the "Best Italian Food." The feast continued Saturday, Sunday and Monday, from 2 p.m. to 10:30 p.m.

On August 30th, 31st and September 1st, starting at 9 a.m., the St. Joseph Society split into three groups accompanied by the Tony Neglia Band. Each group went out with a "stenardo" (banner) of Saint Joseph and held Processions starting at various points in Lodi, covering a majority of the streets in Lodi and surrounding towns such as Garfield and Hasbrouck Heights.

Each door bell at every house was rung and the band would play favorite songs such as "Mamma," "Oh Marie," "Santa Lucia," etc. The festival then opened at 2 p.m.

On Labor Day, at 3 p.m., members of The Society removed the St. Joseph statue from the Church and secured it on ornate hand carved base constructed in 1915.

From 1915 to 1937, the statue was supported by long poles and carried on the shoulders by the Society. Since 1937, the base and statue sit on a float surrounded with flowers, blue ribbons to hold donations, and children in First Communion dress. The float is pulled by the Society. Float handling positions have been passed down generations.

With Patron Saint banners (some from area Churches), the festival band, K of C St. Michael's Council 2861, Clergy, the St. Joseph statue float, followed by hundreds of faithful praying out loud in Italian, the Solemn Procession, moved throughout Lodi. Some make this devotion barefoot. Traditionally, during the Procession, two homes at Arnot and at Charles, set out refreshments. The processions concluded with a Benediction in the Church.

Organizers stated that approximately 50,000 attended this family oriented festival and there were no incidents.

This Festival has been a parish affair. The food court, games and raffles are organized and operated by the parishioners, with all of the profits donated to the Church. These booths have been family operated for generations. There are a few outside vendors and the amusements are contracted. This year, a new kiddie area was added.

Last year's Super 50-50 winner received over \$10,000. This annual program benefits the St. Joseph Church operating fund. For more info: www. saintjosephsociety.org ###



Reflections

Heaven: Just Geography

I remember when my daughter and I came to New Jersey from Puerto Rico to visit my brother during summer vacation. My daughter was three years old.

When we returned home, my mom asked my daughter how she had enjoyed visiting in New Jersey. She replied ecstatically, "Uncle Danny lives in Heaven with God!"

Of course! Heaven is just geography. As far as my daughter knew, we got on a plane and went straight to Heaven. She had no idea we landed someplace else. But she did know that she had a lot of fun in Heaven with her uncle.

The problem with placing God in Heaven is that we often think God is far, far, far away and very seldom accessible

It is very difficult to relate with God from such a distance, so we think, God has too many things on the plate; there is no way God can be thinking about me. This is why when we pray we don't get quick responses. There are too many clouds in the way and they interfere with our communication.

Such misconception! If we only knew how close God can be. If we only knew that we determine how close God can get. We determine what prevails—good or evil—this is called free will. This is so because closeness to God is a spiritual relation that we choose or deny, accept or reject.

I have a slogan that some consider controversial—"God is a relational Being—Get intimate with God!"

Intimate? Sounds everything but spiritual. But, then again, what is it to be intimate?

According to the dictionary, it is to associate in close personal relations; it is characterized by or involving warm friendship or a personally close or familiar association or feeling; it is very private; closely personal: one's intimate affairs; it arises from close personal connection or familiar experience; it is engaged in or characterized by sexual relations; inmost; deep within. Yes, that just about sums it up.

God was pretty much tired of chaos and decided to make things look good. As a matter of fact, it looked soooooo good that God decided to share

with someone the beauty of creation.

We all know the story of Adam and Eve and how disobedience got in the way (Genesis 1, 3). Disobedience certainly was the cause of the break up in our relationship with God.

Nevertheless, God clothed and took care of Adam and Eve even after the exile from the Garden of Eden; and still takes care of us today in the midst of the chaos caused every day by the consequences of our disobedience, self-pride, self-determination, and selfreliance and dependency.

And free will is also a product of Creation with which God has given us the opportunity to get close to the One, the great I AM.

This is why Jesus lived amongst us; to re-establish that relationship by example. Jesus' obedience, faithfulness to God, and constant intimacy with God prepared the setting for the ultimate victory over death: spiritual death and physical death (I Corinthians 15:50-55).

This is why we are so certain that dying is about living. Our spiritual death entails surrendering of one's self to God, the renouncing of one's ideas, views, and thoughts and the rendering of one's self to the Holy Spirit to proclaim the truth to a community in accordance to God's will and voice.

And, when we encounter physical death, we reap the benefits and blessings of having lived a rewarding relationship with God that helps us move on to a new geographical location—Heaven! ###






