The Native American Indians of the northern and eastern United States kept track of the seasons by giving a name to each recurring full moon. European settlers followed the custom. ###

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

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
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Two Local Square Dance Clubs Merge

Once the movements are learned, dancers can participate in events throughout the country and the world, because all dances are called in English using standard terminology.



Moonachie School District 100 Years of Pride

(Editor's Note: In celebration of the Robert L. Criag School's 100th Anniversary, over the course of the next few issues, The Gazette Newspaper is providing a multi-part reflection. The following is a reflection by Allan Weissman who served the district from 1969 to 2008.

Moonachie Over the Years

Arriving here in 1969 with the late Mr. Floyd Henderson, we began teaching at the James A. McKinney School, a fourroom school house, located across the road from a yard with a chicken coop.

Our teaching companions were Mrs. Lolita Hanniver and Mr. Francis Raftery (later *Superintendent in the District).* Mentored by Mr. Edward G. Terragni, Sr., we began to learn the profession and the personality of the town, which was tough, traditional working class, but fair.

For the first few years, our gymnasium was the asphalt playground for softball and soccer. Mrs. Carol Walters would arrive a few times a week from the Craig School to teach music. Mr. Kersnowski would

arrive a few years later with his AV cart, dubbed the Art Cart.

Children went home for lunch, unless they were bus students. At graduation, the 8th Graders were awarded their diplomas outside Mrs. Martin's kindergarten room at the Craig School, with Miss Jane playing the piano, as long as it was not a spinnet.

Modernization arrived a few years afterward, as a gymnasium was added to the end of the Craig School and the entire school was now under one roof on West Park Street. Mr. Dante P. Zirpoli, the original principal of the district, had retired.

We of the McKinney School adjusted to our new situation among the larger Moonachie faculty, sometimes missing our autonomy in the old building.

Over the years the district grew from a rural town with factory lofts (and the accompanying low taxes) to a suburban town sandwiched between Teterboro Airport and the newly named Meadowlands.

Yet during those years, the opportunity to know the families personally made the school part of the fabric of the town.

It was, indeed, one big fam-

ily. Those children who were in those first classes of the late 1960s are the adults who today are the town elders. ###

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
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
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News from the Robert L. Craig School

Dr. Jill Mortimer, the Superintendent/Principal of the Robert L. Craig School, is planning some new initiatives for the 2011-2012 school year.

"I am very excited about my new position, and I look forward to working with all of the stakeholders. My entry plan centers on making sustainable, systemic changes that will support increased student achievement. I want to make changes that are transformative, not additive. School improvement does not necessarily arise out of innovations or new programs. I am in the process of examining the school's testing data to uncover patterns. I will then identify instructional priorities based upon this information," Mortimer said.

The district goals that are planned include the following:

- 1. Develop and implement a proactive, systemic system for assisting students who are struggling with academic achievement.
- 2. Continue the process toward the full implementation of the Reading and Writing Workshop Model in Grades K-8.
- 3. Ensure that our curricula meet the requirements of the new common core standards.
- 4. Engage in formative assessment training for staff and increase the frequency of
- 5. Develop a plan to maximize the efficiency of the master schedule and staffing assignments.
- 6. Improve student, staff and community access to technology.

The school goals planned include the following:

- 1. Implement a School Safety Team and meet all of the requirements set forth in the revised Harassment, Intimidation and Bullying Policy.
- 2. Establish a School Discipline Committee to review the consequences for misbehavior and make recommendations for improvement.
- 3. Implement the use of small group instruction based upon students' individual

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4. Infuse the 21st Century Life and Careers and Technology core curriculum content standards into the curricula.

Mortimer said, "As Superintendent and Principal, I plan to continually develop the capacity to create the district's desired future. Every school, and organization, for that matter, is set up to achieve exactly what it is achieving. They key is to examine those structures and modify them, if necessary."

Several new staff members have joined the school this year. A description of each person follows.

- Lauren Odoksta Supervisor of Curriculum and Instruction: Odoksta comes from the Upper Saddle River Schools, where she taught for six years. Last year, she was the Basic Skills/Enrichment teacher, and prior to that, she was both a first and second grade teacher. Odoksta was a Reading and Writing Workshop Model classroom teacher. Representatives from visiting districts came to her classroom to see how to implement the program effectively. That same program is in use in our school. She has a Master of Education in Educational Leadership, a Master of Arts in Teaching, and a Bachelor of Arts degree in Law and Society.
- Linda Mikulka middle school Language Arts: Last year, Mikulka was a middle school Language Arts maternity leave replacement in both Scotch Plains and Allendale. Prior to that, she taught 7th grade Language Arts in both River Edge and Ridgefield. Mikulka also has been formally trained in the Reading and Writing Workshop Model. She has a Master of Science in Literacy and a Bachelor of Arts in Psychology.
- Joanne Talamini middle school Math: Talamini just spent three years working as a research analyst for Dow Jones & Company. Prior to that, she was a middle school Math teacher in Hawthorne for two years. She is also a graduate of the Robert Craig School. Talamini has a Bachelor of Arts in Mathematics.
- Daniel Johnson Music: Johnson comes from the Burch Charter School in Irvington, where he taught Music for the past three years. Prior to that, he worked in the Little Ferry school district as a Music teacher for 16 years. He also teaches private drum lessons. Johnson has a Bachelor of Fine

Arts in Jazz Performance.

- Kim Samarelli One to One Aide: Samarelli has been a substitute teacher at our school for the past two years. She has experience as a first grade teacher as well. She has a Bachelor's degree in Psychology.

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Protect Your Family From Fire

Fire Prevention Week October 9 - 15



What's the best way to protect your family from fire? Be ahead of the game, of course.

Area Fire Departments are teaming up with NFPA during October 9-15, 2011, to let our community know: "It's Fire Prevention Week. Protect your Family from Fire!"

This year's campaign focuses on preventing the leading causes of home fires -- cooking, heating and electrical equipment, as well as candles and smoking materials. Additionally, it urges people to protect their homes and families with life-saving technology and planning.

"In 2009, 2,565 people died in home fires. Nearly all of these deaths could have been prevented by taking a few simple precautions like having working smoke alarms and a home fire escape plan, keeping things that can burn away from the stove and always turning off space heaters before going to bed," says Hasbrouck Heights Fire Chief Kevin Todd.

"Fire is a dangerous opponent, but by anticipating the hazards, you are much less likely to be one of the nearly 13,000 people injured in home fires each year," added Wood-Ridge Fire Chief Paul Clemente.

Moonachie Fire Chief Victor Migliorino offers the following tips for protecting your home and family from fire:

- Stay in the kitchen while you are frying, grilling, or broiling food. If you leave the kitchen for even a short period of time, turn off the stove.
- Keep anything that can burn at least three feet away from heating equipment, like the furnace, fireplace, wood stove, or portable space heater.
- Have a three-foot "kid-free zone" around open fires and space heaters.
- Replace or repair damaged or loose electrical cords.
- If you smoke, smoke outside.
- Use deep, wide ashtrays on a sturdy table.
- Blow out all candles when you leave the room or go to bed. Avoid the use of candles in the bedroom and other areas where people may fall asleep.

"While preventing home fires in our area is always our number one priority, it is not always possible," Lodi Fire Chief Anthony Maiolo continued.

Carlstadt Fire Chief Robert

Moore added, "Area residents need to provide the best protection to keep their homes and families safe in the event of a fire. This can be achieved by developing an escape plan which you practice regularly and equipping homes with life-saving technologies like smoke alarms and home fire sprinklers."

Little Ferry Fire Chief Rob Cordasco offers following tips will help keep your family safe if there is a fire in your home:

- Install smoke alarms inside each bedroom, outside each sleeping area, and on every level of the home (including the basement).
- Interconnect all smoke alarms in the home so when one sounds, they all sound.
- Test smoke alarms at least monthly and replace all smoke alarms when they are 10 years old or sooner if they do not respond when tested.
- Make sure everyone in your home knows how to respond if the smoke alarm sounds.
- Pull together everyone in your household and make a plan. Walk through your home and inspect all possible ways out. Households with children should consider drawing a floor plan of your home, marking two ways out of each room, including windows and doors.
- If you are building or remodeling your home, consider installing home fire sprinklers.

Your Fire Department will be hosting activities during Fire Prevention Week to promote "It's Fire Prevention Week. Protect your Family from Fire!"

Through these educational, family-oriented activities, residents can learn more about the power of prevention and available technologies to protect their own families from fire.

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Aviation History Comes



There was magic in the air, and a puff of smoke, when the B-17 Flying Fortress crankedup the distinctive sound of each of their four Wright-R Cyclone turbo supercharged radial engines (made at Curtiss-Wright, Wood-Ridge).

The Yankee Air Museum (www.yankeeairmuseum.org), based in Michigan, flew into Teterboro with the Yankee Lady, a World War II B-17 Flying Fortress bomber. For a fee of \$450, the B-17 offered unforgettable rides to 12 "crew members" at a time. When not flying, visitors had the opportunity to go on board and explore this heavy bomber during Wings & Wheels.

Aircraft featured included: • F/A-18 Hornet, in adversary colors and used in air-to-F/A-18 has been used by the Blue Angels since 1986.

- E-2C Hawkeye, known as the Airborne Early Warning System can track more than 600 targets and control more than 400 intercepts at one time.
- B-25 Mitchell twin engine bomber, famous for the Doolittle Raid over Tokyo.
- F4U Corsair was the fastest Navy fighter in the Pacific theater at over 400 mph and made popular on the TV program "Black Sheep Squadron.'
- L-12 Electra similar to the model flown by aviatrix Amelia Earhart. The model on display was used in the Movie "Amelia," and displayed with a Cord automobile.



Additional aircraft included: T-6B Texan II, Bell Jet Ranger Helicopter, Defiant aircraft, etc.

AHOF organized inforair training was displayed. The mative walking tours of the displayed aircraft, etc.

> The event featured several WWII Veterans who were available in the exhibit area.

- Don DeNezzo: WWII Army Air Corps flew 38 sorties for a total of 52 missions, all as a B-24 Ball Turret Gunner. Shot down once. Notable missions were Regensburg, Brenner Pass and Ploesti.
- A. R. "Van" Van De Weghe: A WWII P-51A pilot with the famed First Air Commandos in the China/Burma/ India Theater where he was wounded and is lucky to have
- Bernice Haydu: In the beginning of 1944, Bee was accepted into the 44-7 WASP (Women Air Force Service

Pilots). Bee was stationed at Pecos Army Airfield in Texas, a UC-78 (twin-engine aircraft) advanced training field as an engineering test pilot and utility pilot.

- Jack Widowsky: On August 6, 1945 Jack was the Navigator of "Big Stink," the B-29 backup plane for the "Enola Gay." On August 9, 1945, Jack was the Navigator of "Laggin Dragon," the B-29 Nagasaki advance weather plane.
- Russell Gackenbach: He was the Navigator of "Necessary Evil," the B-29 camera plane that photographed the Atomic Bomb explosion at Hiroshima on August 6, 1945.
- Gottfried P. Dulias: Luftwaffe fighter pilot. His Messerschmitt ME-109 "Gustav 14" was shot down by ground fire over Russia and spent more than four years in a Russian Gulag. He was one of only one percent to survive.

Julius Freeman: One of the documented original Tuskegee Airman.

Hangar One was filled with many exhibits to include:

- The Army Air Forces Historical Association provided an extensive educational display dedicated to preserving the history of the United States Army Air Forces during World
- Various organizations provided displays to include Civil Air Patrol, U.S. Naval Sea Cadet Corps, Paramus Flying Club, Great Dane Rescue, etc.

There were also a variety of aviation and military memorabilia vendors, etc.

A full program to include the WWII Veterans, "The Rusty Paul Band," Victory Bells, Elvis, etc. was presented.


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97th St. Joseph Festival







The 97th Annual St. Joseph Festival opened Friday, September 2, 2011, at 6 p.m. to 10:30 p.m., with rides, games, entertainment, hourly 50-50, a Super 50-50 and the "Best Italian Food." The Feast continued Saturday and Sunday from 4 p.m. to 10:30 p.m. and Monday from 2 p.m. to 10 p.m.

On September 3 and 4, starting at 10 a.m., and September 5, at 9 a.m., the St. Joseph Society, accompanied by the Metropolitan Feast Band, marched with a banner of Saint Joseph throughout Lodi, Garfield and Hasbrouck Heights. The Feast then opened at 2 p.m.

Each group went out with a "stenardo" (banner) of Saint Joseph and held Processions starting at various points in Lodi, covering a majority of the streets in Lodi and surrounding towns such as Garfield and Hasbrouck Heights.

Each door bell at every house was rung and the band would play favorite songs such



as "Mamma," "Oh Marie," "Santa Lucia," etc. The festival then opened at 2 p.m.

On Labor Day, at 3 p.m., members of The Society removed the St. Joseph statue from the Church and secured it on an ornate hand carved base constructed in 1915.

From 1915 to 1937, the statue was supported by long poles and carried on the shoulders by the Society.

Since 1937, the base and statue sit on a float surrounded with flowers, ribbons to hold donations, and children in First Communion dress.

The float is pulled by the Society. Float handling positions have been passed down generations.

This year, the Procession began with five thousand firecrackers and the release of dozens of balloons.

Patron Saint banners were from Lodi - Immaculate Conception Society, Garfield - Saint Anthony, Padre Pio, Sacred Heart Society, Hackensack - Padre Pio Society, Newark -Saint Gerard Society, Montclair

Saint Donato Society, NutleyPadre Pio Society, etc.

The procession also included the Festival Band, K of C St. Michael's Council 2861, Clergy, the St. Joseph statue float, followed by hundreds of faithful praying out loud in Italian, the Solemn Procession, moved throughout Lodi.

Some make this devotion barefoot. Traditionally, during the Procession, two homes at Arnot and at Hunter Street, set out refreshments.

New Procession Route

The streets covered were: East Place, Liberty Street, Prospect Street, James Street, Woodside Avenue, Hunter Street, Prospect Street, Kipp Avenue, Roosevelt Avenue, Central Avenue, Hillcrest Avenue, Grove Street and Spring Street.

The Processions concluded with a Benediction in the





Church.

Organizers stated that over 20,000 attended this family oriented festival and there were no incidents.

The Festival was originally founded by the Society and then passed onto the parish in the 1970s as a result of not enough Society members to run the event alone.

The Society today is still responsible for the Processions throughout the weekend, and the Solemn Procession with statue on Labor Day.

Proceeds collected from the Processions go toward helping the less fortunate, Scholarship Fund, Food Pantry, among many other charities.

The Festival has been a parish affair since the '70s. The food court, games and raffles are organized and operated by the parishioners, with all of the profits donated to the Church.

These booths have been family operated for genera-

tions. There are a few outside vendors and the amusements are contracted.

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Bible Baptist Church Sends Mission Team to Ghana









In this day and time few people have to be told about the financial status of the average American home. So, when God began to move over a year ago upon the heart of Pastor Bill Hegedus and Ray Cabrera, the church Youth Director, to return with a mission team to Ghana, it is understandable that Pastor Bill felt a little intimidated at the financial challenge the Church would face. Bible Baptist Church is an average Church with ordinary people and no huge financial resources. God was asking ordinary people to do an extraordinary thing and raise nearly fifty thousand dollars to finance a trip to Ghana.

Ghana is an impoverished country in West Africa. Many villages do not have running water or sanitary conditions that Americans take for granted. Electricity is available, but not very reliable. (One town the team visited hadn't had running water for two and half years!) The electricity can be off for days at a time.

The average annual income in Ghana is about \$1500 (\$125 a month). A Ghanaian child does not have several outfits to wear to school. A disabled Ghanaian child is often shunned and does not receive an education at all. Over six years ago God moved in the hearts of Andrea Linder Jehu-Appiah (an American physical therapist) and her Ghanaian husband, Pastor Joseph Jehu-Appiah. Together they began a ministry of providing a fundamental education to the physically and mentally challenged children in a boarding school called Mephibosheth Training Center (www.mephiboshethinghana.org). Before her marriage, Andrea attended Bible Baptist Church. Her love for the Ghanaian children has been imparted to Bible Baptist Church prompting two previous mission ten-day trips to Ghana.

In spite of Pastor Bill's misgivings, he shared with the Church what God had laid on his heart.

Nine members of the previous team signed up for a return trip. An additional five members also joined the team. The team consisted of Pastor Bill Hegedus, Ray Cabrera, Delancey and Cortnee Callahan (husband and wife), Jaime Crist, Ken Dolph, Al Marinelli, Pauline Tutelo, and Joe Watkins. Teens also joined in for the trip. They were Elizabeth Arias, Tim Hegedus, Allison Rodriguez, Katie Watkins, and Melanie Watkins.

When Pastor Bill shared his vision with Joe and Andrea Jehu-Appiah they were thrilled to have the team return. Before long 25 local churches in Ghana were also anticipating their coming.

After much hard work, fund raising, and God's abundant help, the team found themselves flying out of Dulles International Airport in Washington, D.C.

Arriving Friday evening about 6 p.m. in Accra, Ghana on August 5, 2011, the team then traveled an additional three hours to get to the Mephibosheth Training Center.

Saturday, a meeting with the Ghanaian workers was held to prepare for the week long Vacation Bible Schools that would be held at two different outdoor locations.

There was one Vacation Bible School held in the morning and one held in the afternoon.

The Vacation Bible Schools started with a total attendance of 1,500 but rose to over 3,000 children by the end of the week.

All of these children were given the Gospel of Jesus



Christ, but also were daily given a treat and drink.

Many were given tee shirts, toys, and sports equipment, like soccer balls.

School items that were cherished were books for the Training Center and pencils. The small kid size pencil sharpeners that can be carried in a pocket or hand were especially popular because most children have to sharpen their pencils with a knife.

In the evenings there were youth rallies reaching over 300 teens held in the local Churches. The team also ministered to four different Churches on the two Sundays that they were there.

As the wearied team traveled in the airplane home the one thing they were most impressed by was the joy of the people.

The team had gone to Ghana to serve and bless them, but they came home with a new found appreciation for the abundance they have in the United States.

Many of the team members came home to be personally affected by the devastation of Hurricane Irene.

One teen team member lost her home, the family car and other personal belongings.

Yet, each of the team members felt as if God was preparing them for these losses. They had learned that joy is not found in things, but in service. If joy can be experienced in the midst of the constant poverty seen in Ghana, God can provide peace and comfort in the midst of temporary setbacks here. 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

HH Leisure Club Informed on Sump Pump Use

At the monthly meeting of the Leisure Club held on September 14, 2011, Hasbrouck Heights Councilman Russell Lipari explained the proper use of a sump pump.

He stated that the sump pump is used when basement flooding happens regularly where the water table is above the foundation of a home. He stressed that many homes had to use them during the recent

Councilman Lipari stressed the need to use these pumps to send water away from a house to any place where it is no longer problematic, such as a municipal storm drain or a dry well. This can be done by using a hose that sends the water to the street.

Water should not be pumped into sinks, toilets, showers or wash tubs. Water from these outlets is sent to the Borough's sanitary sewers. Sanitary sewers are operated separately and independently of storm drains, which carry the runoff of rain and other water which wash into city streets. When the sanitary sewers are

overwhelmed with excess water from other sources, sewerage will back up into homes. This happened during the last storm and has caused much damage to many homes.

Councilman Lipari emphasized that it is against the law in Hasbrouck Heights to pump water from sump pumps into the sanitary sewer. After his presentation, the club members were entertained by Anthony Sorbera and his son Michael, an excellent vocal duo. Story by Peter Gallo Jr. ###



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Bergen County Announces Disaster **Relief Employment Program**

The County of Bergen announced a temporary employment program centered on assisting disaster relief and clean-up.

These positions were created through a partnership between Bergen County's Workforce Investment Board (WIB), the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA), and the Bergen One-Stop Career Center, with funding provided by a United States Department of Labor National Emergency Grant.

The Disaster Relief Employment Program employs workers for six months or longer to assist with projects that provide food, clothing, shelter and other humanitarian assistance for disaster victims.

The work will be done through public and private agencies and organizations engaged in such projects.

The maximum wage to be paid to any one program participant is approximately \$12,000. Those eligible to employment under this grant would be:

- Workers who have been temporarily or permanently dislocated as a result of the disaster
- Eligible dislocated workers who are unemployed and not receiving unemployment

compensation or other types of income support

 Long-term unemployed individuals

After the initial six month employment period, the New Jersey Department of Labor & Workforce Development will reassess conditions to see if additional help is needed.

Medicare Part D 2012 Important Changes

Whether you are approaching the age of 65 or already enrolled in Medicare, the annual enrollment period for next year's prescription drug plans is right around the corner and it's starting a month earlier.

This is the first of three important changes that are taking place under the health reform law.

The dates for the annual enrollment period changed this year and run from October 15 to December 7 in 2011.

Your plan will still take effect January 1, 2012. An extra 7 days has been added, but it means for those that wait until the end of the year, you can not procrastinate.

For the over 400 of you that I assist with Medicare Part D, expect a call earlier so we can discuss if the plan that you had for this year is still the best for you in 2012.

There are so many changes

to the plans year over year as far as formulary, premiums, and copay structure, that it is best to check every year. Also, your drug regimen may have changed or your health status may have improved or worsened and this affects which plan is right for you.

The second change deals with the coverage gap or "donut" hole. In 2011, for most beneficiaries, when you entered this phase of the plan brands were covered at a 50% copay and generics were covered at a 93% copay.

For 2012, brands will still be covered at a 50% copay and generics will be covered at a 86% copay -- an improvement of 7% compared to 2011 – not huge but every little bit helps.

The third change deals with the 5 star rating system. In 2012, Part D beneficiaries will be allowed to switch, one time for each enrollment year, to a plan that has received a 5 star rating from CMS.

Not many plans receive

this rating, but in my opinion the most important factor is still what medications you take.

Case in point, if you are on a medication that is covered by a 4 star plan and you switch to a 5 star plan, but the medication is not on the formulary and therefore not covered, how does that help you that your plan is a 5 star plan.

I understand that CMS created this rating system to incentivize plans to become better, but I feel beneficiaries will enroll into 5 star plans not realizing that one or more of their medications may not be covered.

If you have any questions regarding these changes or have questions on other aspects of Medicare, please do not hesitate to call and schedule a free one on one consultation.

I have had many beneficiaries who switched to a different plan every year and their out of pocket expenses have been less year over year. You have nothing to lose for a little piece of mind. ###

Filling You In

People with Diabetes at Higher Risk for Developing Gum Disease

According to the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, diabetes affects nearly 24 million people in the United States. The Academy of General Dentistry encourages those with diabetes to pay extra attention to their oral health.

Studies have shown that those with diabetes are more susceptible to the development of oral infections and periodontal (gum) disease than those who do not have diabetes. In addition, oral infections tend to be more severe in people with diabetes than in those who do not have the condition.

"We urge individuals with diabetes to take care of their mouths and have dental infections treated immediately," says AGO spokesperson E. Mac Edington, DDS, MAGD, ABGD. "People who receive good dental care and have good insulin control typically have a better chance at avoiding gum disease."

Because diabetes reduces the body's resistance to infection, the gums are at risk for gingivitis, an inflammation usually caused by the presence of bacteria in plaque. Plaque is the sticky film that accumulates on teeth both above and below the gum line. "Without regular dental checkups, gum disease may result if gingivitis is left untreated. Gingivitis also can cause inflammation and destruction of tissues surrounding and supporting teeth," says Dr. Edington.

To prevent problems with bacterial infections in the mouth, a dentist may pre-

scribe antibiotics, medicated mouthrinses, and more frequent cleanings to a patient with diabetes.

The established connection between oral health and systemic health suggests that diet and exercise may be the most important changes that people with diabetes can make to improve their quality of life and oral health. People with diabetes should be sure that their medical and dental care providers are aware of their medical history and periodontal status. To keep teeth and gums strong, people with diabetes should be aware of their blood sugar levels and have their triglycerides and cholesterol levels checked on a regular basis, as these factors may have a direct correlation with their risk for gum disease.

"People with diabetes who do not have good control over their blood sugar levels tend to have more oral health problems," says Dr. Edington. "If your blood sugar is not under control, talk with both your dentist and physician about the possibility of receiving dental treatment beyond routine checkups and cleanings."

It is recommended that patients with diabetes schedule their dental appointments for the morning hours, because blood glucose levels tend to be under better control at that time of day. Patients should eat and take their medications as directed prior to a dental appointment. Ref: 2010 Academy of General Dentistry. ###

The ten women who are the Friendly Neighbors are from five Churches in our community. The two representatives from each Church are Ethel Ball, Pat Boer, Arlene Carreau, Dorothy Dressel, Marge Heeren, Ginny Isler, Louise Marrie, Jackie Mazza, Lois Nitus and Elsie Sternbach.

In 2010 they became aware of "Canine Assistants," an organization which pairs children who suffer from illnesses such as epilepsy and muscular dystrophy with specially trained dogs who serve as their companions. The dogs are trained to recognize the early signs of seizure and know how to immediately alert the parents. It costs \$25,000 to sponsor one of these dogs. 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

Selling Real Estate in the 21st Century

Before an open house, agents these days run through a mental checklist: make sure the clutter is gone, put out the glossy brochures, turn on the lights and, oh yes, compose an enticing Tweet.

Only a few years ago, no one used Twitter to sell real estate. But it's fast becoming a must-have element in the increasingly Internet-enabled toolbox of savvy real estate brokers.

Internet marketing today is really where it's at; buyers want information and they want it almost instantaneously.

The fact is, the speed with which we realtors can get information into a prospective buyer's hands is almost that

Most print ads, business cards, for sale signs and brochures will now include OR ("quick response") codes (see the back page of this paper for examples). When scanned by smart phones, these codes will upload a combination of photos, video and text about the property or the agent representing it. Additionally, lawn signs now appear that say 'Google this address' which, when done, give the searcher

a YouTube tour of the house among their top results.

Why all this online effort? Because, in this new age, nearly 90% of home buyers conduct their real estate research online. To give customers the kinds of information they now demand, we brokers have had to bulk up on our online presence – by blogging, Tweeting, creating FaceBook pages for ourselves and our offices and, in some instances, creating individual websites for our listings where buyers can link to information about the town, its schools, services, etc.

And increasingly, the critical element of online information sharing is good quality digital photos.

Lots of them – since photos left off a website say as much about a home as those that are on it. More often than not, if buyers don't see the kitchen and bath pictures online, they automatically presume something's wrong. Which means that, even in dire need of a makeover, these areas should be shown.

Prospective buyers like/ need to know, upfront, what they're getting into. That way, when they walk in the door, they're already pretty much fully aware of what the house looks like. It gives them, I feel, the freedom to use the visit to gauge their reaction, confirm or disprove their virtual impressions and make rational decisions.

The purpose of advertising used to be simple: Entice buyers into the open house. That was when there was a lot

more impulse buying; when buyers would just fall in love with a house and then sign the contracts.

But since so many buyers now do their due diligence before a showing, we're now putting as much information as possible online – to minimize the chance that a prospective buyer will encounter a deal breaker of a nasty surprise.

That can include uploads of such things as plot plans, warranties, lists of improvements to a home, etc.

Of course, online marketing can only accomplish so much (price and condition - in that order - still take precedence) but it is already essential to the new practice of real estate. ###

Moonachie residents can put their leaves out in paper bags or garbage cans. No leaves will be picked up in plastic bags. Leaves are not to be blown or raked into the street. Delbros will pick up on Wednesdays until November 30, 2011.

Twigs and branches must be bundled into 4 foot lengths and kept separate from leaves. The DPW will pick up the bundles on Wednesdays. ###

The school system allowed the use of the gyms at Columbus and Roosevelt schools until October 31, 2011 to continue certain programs. Wal-Mart has donated supplies. Bingo revenues were lost.

The Club will reopen in stages: new gym floor by October 1, front offices, game rooms and security by October 15, and after checking the integrity of the pool and installing new pumps, by November 1.

Director Michael Nardino placed initial damage at over \$1,000,000. Insurance may cover about half the cost. To sanitize the facility could cost over \$100,000. Half of the staff was laid off.

Lodi OEM Ready for Hurricane Irene



























LODI OEM HQ -- At 22:30 Saturday, August 27, 2011, there was a briefing of key officials and departments, led by Lodi Office of Emergency Management Coordinator Bob Cassiello, who has held this position for 21 years.

- Goal is to be self sufficient for 72 hours.
- The weather overview was winds 5-10 mph, gusting to 75 mph with 5 to 10" of rain. The Saddle River crests at 13', but could go higher. River expected to crest at 2 a.m. Floyd was 13' 9".
- •Mayor made announcements on cable channel.
- Bella Vista was sand bagged and they stayed although notified.
- All preparations were made, with 400 evacuated. OEM concerned about the trailer parks.
- Departments reviewed: protect your equipment, safety first. Be sure to keep documentation for the government.
- DPW moved equipment to higher ground, garage doors opened to avoid buckling.
 - Specific issues discussed.
- Disaster has been declared and OEM is central control.

00:20: Lodi Fire Department abandons Main Street HQ as a precaution.

00:30: First Street, Meta Lane closed for flooding. Slow lane of Rt. 46 at Savoy flooded -- DOT notified.

01:20 a.m.: Official flood -- river went over 6'. Floods gauged at minor, moderate, major.

Relatively quiet evening with road closures.

01:45: Main Street from Union to Garaibaldi was closed. 01:50: Boys Club water up

- to first step.
 All vehicles fueled before
- DPW goes under water.
 Manholes overflowing on Passaic Street.

02:30: First call for water

rescue of vehicle on Rt. 46 E by BP Station.

02:35: Reports of swimming in Boys Club parking lot. DPW shuts down gas pumps.

02:50: Bridges almost covered

02:55: Greg Street flooded at Rt. 17.

03:05: Massey Street starts to flood.

03:07: Rt. 46 W starting to flood.

03:20 Boys Club water up to the gate.

04:30: Rt. 46 car stuck with occupants across from Amoco station.

07:45: Route 46 closed in both directions. Resources are scarce with County, Sheriff, etc. DOT cannot assist. Reports that Walgreen's has mandatory opening -- employees having difficulty to go to work.

OEM coordination DPW, FD and PD resources.

08:10: Lodi starts to split up into three sections due to road closures.

• Artificial field at Memorial Park starts to bubble and downgrade is watched from OEM; drainage pipes at capacity. (Note that field was lost costing over \$1,000,000).

08:15: Heights responds to closing Baldwin at Rt. 46.

08:25: Arnot and Passaic bridges are closed.

- Discussion about calling in National Guard.
- Rochelle Park sewer system shuts down -- Lodi may have to sanitize.
- Saddle River status ismonitored regularly on internet. Estimates crest at 13'.
- General feeling that they dodged the bullet with flooding only, no loss of power and not a lot of rain on the back end of the storm.

08:50: Discussion about expanding evacuation.

09:00: Explored National Guard option. Doesn't look good.

09:10: Meeting with of-

ficials and departments to review situation. River expected to crest a 14:00 at 12' 9" (same level as 2007, Floyd was 13"). Expect by evening water will recede to banks. 6 to 12" precipitation. Wind at 40-60 mph gusting to 80 mph to afternoon when conditions will improve rapidly. Should break by 18:00.

- National Guard could possibly provide 1 high water vehicle assigned to LFD; will not get NJ manpower. NG working Bound Brook.
- LFD provides Wallington with boat (*Lodi has 3*).
- Expanded evacuation considered.
- Rochelle Park pumps down. Sewerage goes into river. Discuss tetanus shots. Advise all to scrub up.
- Downed trees are cut and set to side.
- Big need for cones, barricades and try DOT.
- Notified that Rochelle Park pumps expected to be offline for 12 hours. Lodi concerned about their pumps holding.

10:05: National Guard vehicles (small Humvee and 2 high-water vehicles are used by Lodi, Rochelle Park and Maywood).

10:10: Weather improving.
12:00: Boaters on Main
Street with 4 occupants. Boat
overturned. Two rescued. Marine craft search for the other

14:35: Reported that river crested at 13:15. Rain stopped, spotty showers. Expect river to go back to banks about 19:00.

- Discovered that some people were hiding from evacuation.
- OEM goes into recovery mode, although State of Emergency will be in effect until all departments are okay.
- Garbage contractor to make extra pick-ups. Lodi has an outside service that cleans up raw sewerage and is covered by the Borough's insurance.
- Lodi FD will do pump outs and will begin after rescue operations. Residents must call for appointment for scheduling.
- DPW will sweep streets with disinfectant, clear trees, etc., on Monday. ###













Could Have Been 120" of Snow

Hurricane Irene dropped about 7" and Tropical Storm Lee gave us 5" -- that totals 12" of rain. At a 10:1 ratio, that would produce 120" of snow.

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
