Halloween Tips About Treats

The FDA offers these tips for parents about treats:

• Children shouldn't snack while they're out trickor-treating. They should wait until they get home and parents have had a chance to inspect the goodies.

To help prevent children from munching, give them a snack or light meal before they go -- don't send them out on an empty stomach.

· Tell children not to accept -- and, especially, not to eat -- anything that isn't commercially wrapped.

• When children bring their treats home, discard any home-made candy or baked goods. Parents of young children should also remove any choking hazards such as gum, peanuts, hard candies or small toys.

• Inspect commercially wrapped treats for signs of tampering, such as an unusual appearance or discoloration, tiny pinholes, or tears in wrappers.

• When in doubt, throw it out. ###

Halloween Safety

Halloween is a cherished tradition, but the excitement of the night can cause children to forget to be careful.

There is no real "trick" to making Halloween a real "treat" for the entire family.

The major dangers are not from witches or spirits but rather from falls and pedestrian/car crashes.

Both children and adults need to think about safety on this annual day of makebelieve.

The Wood-Ridge Fire Department passes along these safety suggestions for a safe Halloween.

Parental Tips

• Make sure that an adult or an older responsible youth will be supervising the outing.

• Do not use open flame candles in jack-o-lanterns. Commercially available battery lights are much safer and do not pose a fire hazard.

• Parents should never let their children carve a pumpkin unsupervised.

• Do not hand out homemade or unwrapped candies to children.

• Parents should plan a route for their child to use while trick-or-treating and set an early return time for them.

• To welcome trick-ortreaters, switch on your porch lights or any exterior lights.

Trick or Treat Tips

• Do not go inside anyone's house. Remain on the stoop or porch at all times.

• Do not go into a stranger's automobile.

• Walk, do not run, from house to house. Do not cross yards and lawns where unseen objects or the uneven terrain can present tripping hazards.

• Do not take shortcuts through backyards, alleys, or parks.

• When crossing the street look both ways. Do not cross

need to call home.

Costume Tips

• Only purchase and use flame retardant costumes.

• Children should wear white, reflective clothing, or use reflective tape and carry either a flashlight or glow stick.

• Costumes should fit properly; avoid loose or baggy costumes.

• Costumes should not be so long that they are a tripping hazard. (Falls are the leading cause of injuries on Halloween.)

• If children are allowed out after dark, outfits should be made with light colored materials. Strips of retro-reflective tape should be used to make children visible.

• Avoid any type of open flame while wearing a costume.

• Encourage children to wear face paint as opposed to a mask. Face paint should be non-toxic and meet FDA standards.

• If a mask is worn, make sure that the eye, mouth and nose openings are large enough to ensure adequate breathing and full range of vision.

• Materials made of 100% polyester or modacrylics are best for making homemade costumes. They are less flammable. 100% polyester and modacrylics may be purchased at most local fabric stores.

• **REMEMBER** – A flame-retardant costume does not mean that it is fire proof. Always keep your costume away from any types of open flame or other heat sources.

Accessories

• Knives, swords and other accessories should be made from cardboard or flexible materials. Do not allow children to carry sharp objects.

• Bags or sacks carried by youngsters should be lightcolored or trimmed with retroreflective tape if children are

Wood-Ridge Students Start New Year in a New School

At 8:30 a.m. on September 3, 2013, Wood-Ridge Mayor Paul Sarlo, the Council and School Board Trustees held a dedication ceremony for the new Wood-Ridge Intermediate School at the front entrance of First Street.

Before classes began, parents took a walk-through of the building and met in the gym to view a pre and post construction video.

The Wood-Ridge Intermediate School will serve about 280 -- 4th, 5th and 6th Graders.

The approximately \$6 million facility had nearly a complete makeover during the summer.

The building was gutted and refurbished with new windows and blinds, new ceiling, new colorfully-tiled floors, new cabinets, HVAC system, redesigned front and rear entrances, an elevator, state-of-the-art technology, security systems and cameras throughout the building. The new school features 12 classrooms, two small group instruction rooms, a media center, art room, music room, central offices, a fully-renovated cafeteria and gym. The gym will be available to recreation, Assumption Church and the community.

Every classroom has a

smartboard. Every student has a computer for in-school use.

Additional details, such as some bookcases and hallway display cases are yet to be installed.

The Borough purchased the Our Lady of Assumption School from Assumption Parish for \$2.8 million in 2012, with funding from Wesmont Station redeveloper Somerset Development. It was reported that taxes will not be immediately affected.

The new school will help with overcrowding in the elementary and middle school. ###

R.L. Craig School Grand Re-Opening

Superstorm Sandy swamped the R. L. Craig School with about 23-inches of water, making it unusable.

For most students, classes were then held in Wood-Ridge. After the Christmas break, the students then moved into the 40+ mobile classrooms installed in the field behind the RLC School, while restorations were being made.

It took about three months for the gym and cafeteria to be refurbished so they could be used for the balance of the school year. The rest of the school was sealed off from students, while repairs were made.

Due to FEMA and insurance restrictions, the Moonachie Board of Educations's goal was to restore to pre-storm conditions, not re-mediate/ upgrade, the facility.

With 23-inches of water, the drywalls were stripped an additional two feet.

All classroom furniture, including library book shelves (and books), were replaced. New floors were installed. New phone lines and internet connections were installed. The recently updated boilers, with electrical connections were replaced.

Rest rooms were thoroughly sanitized.

The computers were sent out for special cleaning. Some lost computer equipment was replaced by the South Bergen Rotary Club.

Costs for the clean-up, repairs, rentals, etc., was approximately \$8 million, and expected to be paid for by FEMA and insurance.

After about eight months, the R. L. Craig School was operational for students on September 5, 2013. At the end of the first day, Governor Chris Christie visited the students in the gym (see photo on page 21). On Thursday, September 12, 2013, the Moonachie Board of Education, in conjunction with the Mayor and Borough Council, officially re-opened the Robert L. Craig School with a ribbon cutting ceremony, and community tour of the building. The event was in concert with the school's "Back to School Night." Parents could meet the new Superintendent/Principal, teachers, and staff and get a clear understanding of the curriculum and what is expected of the students in their new grade levels. ###

Get Rid of Mold After a flood, mold will grow in your house. It can make you sick. You will need to clean your house.



Take things that were wet for 2 or more days outside.

Things that stayed wet for 2 days have mold growing on them even if you can't see it.

Take out stuff made of cloth, unless you can wash them in **hot** water. Also take out stuff that can't be cleaned easily (like leather, paper, wood, and carpet).

Use bleach to clean mold off hard things (like floors, stoves, sinks, certain toys, countertops, flatware, plates, and tools).

- Never mix bleach with ammonia or other cleaners.
- Wear rubber boots, rubber gloves, goggles, and N-95 mask.
- Open windows and doors to get fresh air when you use bleach.
- Mix no more than 1 cup of bleach in 1 gallon of water.
- Wash the item with the bleach and water mixture.
- If the surface of the item is rough, scrub the surface with a stiff brush.
- Rinse the item with clean water.
- Dry the item or leave it out to dry.

During WWII, Germany took 95,500 prisoners who suffered food shortages and unsanitary conditions. Japan took 27,465 prisoners and subjected them to murder, beatings, forced labor, medical experimentation, etc. An estimated 33% would die in captivity

In the Korean War, those captured were subjected to torture and executions, malnutrition and diseases. It was reported that 900 were never given back to the United States.

In Vietnam, POWs were subjected to torture, starvation, beatings and murder. Like Korea, there is speculation as to whether we received all of our The War in Afghanistan and Iraq brought new horror. Without reason or compassion, they executed prisoners (civilian and military) and put the execution on the internet. They have hung our countrymen from bridges and thrown their bodies into rivers.

In WWII, 400,000 lost their lives, but forgotten are the 73,000 who went missing in action. In Korea, 53,000 lost their lives, but forgotten are the 7,500 who went missing in action. In Vietnam, 58,000 lost their lives, but 1,600 went mission in action. During the Cold War, 126 are missing in action. To date, seven are missing in action from the Middle East. Master of Ceremonies "we must not forget the sacrifices of these comrades ... they must remain alive in our minds and hearts and we must continue to give our moral support to their families who continue to suffer.

To the thousands of POWs that have survived captivity, we can never repay you for your suffering. We are forever grateful for your services. To our missing comrades, know that we continue our search to account for each one of you. We will never stop our search."

I would like to correct a mistake I made last month. The Battle of Fort McHenry was in 1814 not 1813. I made an error in research and hope it didn't cause any confusion.

Tecumseh

Tecumseh was a Shawnee Indian Chief that was born along a river in Ohio in 1768. Born in a world of warfare and violence, it became a part of his life at an early age.

His father was killed by white settlers. His mother left him in the care of an older sister to travel west to move away from the people moving into the lands taken by the settlers.

As a young warrior he was involved in raiding the flat boats coming up the Ohio River. A story about one of the raids is interesting in that it showed his character. He broke away from the other raiders, apparently, when one of the white prisoners was taken and burned at the stake, he ordered his band of raiders to never torture a prisoner in front of him again.

Tecumseh traveled south in 1779 with his older brother and raided near Nashville, Tennessee. His older brother was killed and he assumed command of the raiding party there. He went back to the Ohio area in 1790 and took part in the Battle of Fallen Timbers where another of his older brothers was killed. Tecumseh didn't want to make peace. He had cultivated a strong hatred of the settlers moving in on the ancestral Indian lands. The Indians signed the Treaty of Greeneville in 1794, but he walked out and never signed it. William Henry Harrison was the Governor of the Illinois territory. He made treaties with the Indians and bought land

from them. He bought land from the Miami Tribe with the treaty of Fort Wayne.

They sold 3 million acres to the United States. By this time Tecumseh was well known throughout the frontier as a great speaker.

He wanted to get all the tribes in the United States to oppose any more land deals and westward movements of settlers onto anymore Indian land. He spoke out against the "Peace Chiefs" of the Miami Tribe that just sold the land of the Shawnee to the whites.

Governor Harrison asked Tecumseh to meet with him to clear the air and discuss the matter.

In August 1810, Tecumseh showed up at the meeting with a large group of warriors. Harrison didn't miss the threat.

He spoke to Tecumseh and told him he bought the land from the chiefs and the deal was lawful. Tecumseh went into a long speech about how the deal was not lawful and should be nullified.

A story of the meeting comes down to us that a Shawnee Indian that was friendly to Harrison pulled the hammer back on his pistol.

Harrison didn't understand the language of the Shawnee. The click of the hammer was a signal that things were breaking down. Harrison drew his sword and prepared to fight. Calmer heads prevailed and the Indians left. Tecumseh told him that if the deal was not nullified he would get the Indians to join the English.

Tecumseh traveled south to gain support for his Confederacy. While he was gone, Governor Harrison took 1,000 soldiers as a show of force to the Tippecanoe River near Battle Ground Indiana, to get the Shawnee to comply with the land deal.

Tooumash's brother To

of Detroit. He marched his warriors around and circled to march again in view of the defenders of Detroit.

The defenders thinking they were outnumbered surrendered. Although things were looking up for Tecumseh they wouldn't stay that way. A battle took place in which he was not part of that would change the course of history.

On September, 13, 1813 the Battle of Lake Erie took place. It was a naval engagement and the British were defeated.

Control of the Lake now shifted back to the Americans. The British could not supply Detroit so they decided to abandon it.

Colonel Henry Procter of the British Army began his retreat across Ontario, Canada. Tecumseh was furious because the Tribes had now lost all protection the British and Indians provided.

Governor Henry Harrison pursued his enemy close behind. Tecumseh after several days on retreat had had enough.

He told Colonel Procter that he and his Indians would retreat no more. If the Colonel wanted to run then leave the guns and ammunition for the Indians to use.

On October 5, 1813 Procter did stop and they got ready for battle along the Thames River near today's Chatham Kent, Ontario.

He choose a swampy area to give his outnumbered men protection. Procter's error here is that he never took into account the American Calvary.

When Harrison arrivedwith his Army he sent his Calvary into battle first. They rode over the British line and get behind them. Then they dismounted and used rifles to shoot the British from behind. The British scattered and hundreds were taken prisoner.

Tecumseh and his warriors fought on for a couple of more hours but when word was passed along that Tecumseh was killed the Indians broke off the fight. William Henry Harrison won an incredible Victory. Tecumseh's death is still a mystery. No one really knows what happened to his body. Some said he was shot with a rifle and he walked into the woods to die. Some said he was killed and skinned for souvenirs. What we do know is that although he was no friend to America, he was a brave and outspoken enemy. Perhaps that is why his memory is still with us today. ###

A Sign of Desperate Times

There are blue signs marked "Washington's Army Retreat Route 1776" that are located around South Bergen County. There are signs, at least, at three locations in Hasbrouck Heights: Williams and Collins, Woodside between LaSalle and Madison, and on Passaic by the Bible Baptist Chuch.

On the evening of November 19, 1776, British General Lord Cornwallis and about 2,500 men crossed the Hudson River in an effort to attack and capture Fort Lee on the New Jersey side of the river.

It was his intention to surprise the forces under General George Washington here.

Because of some confusion on the location of the landing site, General Cornwallis did not land until dawn.

His men had to climb to the top of the Palisades and drag their artillery up along a four foot wide path. Because of this delay they were not ready to march south to Fort Lee until 2 p.m.

By this time the British had been detected and word reached General Washington who was then at the Peter Zabriskie House in Hackensack.

He sent word to Fort Lee to retreat and then went to oversee his men as they fell back.

There were about 936 men at Fort Lee at this time. Washington and most of his men crossed the Hackensack River at New Bridge. He ordered that the planks be taken up after they crossed.

They at first went west on what is now Essex Street, then south to Polifly Road to Terrace Avenue in Hasbrouck Heights.

They then turned west in the area of Williams Avenue. On what is now Woodside Avenue, they turned south to Passaic Street and Terhune Avenue in Wood-Ridge and Lodi.

At Main Street they went into Wallington, which is now Main Avenue.

At the Passaic River they crossed over the Acquackanonk Bridge. Washington ordered this bridge to be burned. Washington and his men traveled to Newark and Trenton where they crossed the Delaware River. The British followed at a leisurely pace.

During the next five years Bergen County was subjected to a number of raids from both sides for supplies and reprisals for personal agendas.

In March of 1781, a British force sailed up the Hackensack River and landed at Moonachie but were routed by the local militia.

More About Bruxism

Bruxism is the technical term for grinding and clenching of the teeth that may cause facial pain. People who grind and clench their teeth, called bruxers, unintentionally bite down too hard at inappropriate times, such as in their sleep. In addition to grinding teeth, bruxers also may bite their fingernails, pencils and chew the inside of their cheek.

People usually aren't diagnosed with bruxism until it is too late, as many people don't realize they have the habit.

Others mistakenly believe that their teeth must touch at all times. About one in three people suffer from bruxism, which can easily be treated by a dentist.

Causes

People who have otherwise healthy teeth and gums can clench so often and so hard that over time their teeth become sensitive. They experience jaw pain, tense muscles and headaches along with excessive wear on their teeth. Forceful biting when not eating may cause the jaw to move out of proper balance.

Bruxism is triggered by people with certain types of personalities. They may have nervous tension and a hard time handling stress. Anger, pain and frustration can cause people to start showing the beginning signs of bruxism without them even knowing it. People who are aggressive, competitive and hurried also may be at a greater risk for bruxism.

What Are the Signs?

When a person has bruxism, the tips of the teeth look flat. Teeth are worn down so much that the enamel is rubbed off, exposing the inside of the tooth, which is called dentin. When exposed, dentin may cause the tooth to become sensitive. Bruxers may experience pain in their temporomandibular joint (TMJ), which may manifest as popping and clicking of the jaw. Tongue indentations are another sign of clenching.

What Can be Done?

Your general dentist automatically checks for physical signs of bruxism and if it seems to be present the condition may be observed over several visits before recommending and starting therapy.

The objective of therapy is to get the bruxer to change behavior by learning how to rest the tongue, teeth and lips properly. When some people become aware of their problem, simply advising them to rest their tongue upward with teeth apart and lips shut may be enough to change their behavior and relieve discomfort.

However, the dentist can make a plastic mouth appliance, such as a night guard, that's worn to absorb the force of biting. This appliance can prevent future damage to the teeth and helps change the patient's destructive behavior.

If teeth grinding is due to stress, a bruxer may be able to prevent the problem with counseling or strategies that promote relaxation, such as exercise and meditation. Biofeedback is used to treat daytime clenchers by using an electronic device to measure muscle activity and to teach patients how to reduce muscle activity when the biting force becomes too great.

Alzheimer's Disease Program Motivates Seniors

In the absence of the Leisure Club President, Vice President Kathy Murray welcomed back the members of Hasbrouck Heights Leisure Club, after the summer break. After meeting agenda for September 11, 2013, was completed, Kathy introduced the speaker for the day.

Ms. Elaine M. Winter, Associate Director of the Greater New Jersey Chapter of the Alzheimer's Association presented a very informative program about Alzheimer's disease.

She touched briefly on each aspect of the disease and noted that many facts can disrupt memory and mental functions. Some facts include depression, thyroid, poor diet, vitamin deficiencies, other medications and alcohol use. Ms. Winter stated that some people recognize changes in themselves before others notice. Other times, friends and family are the first to observe these changes.

After noticing changes, early detection matters. Dementia is the general term for the loss of memory and other intellectual abilities serious enough to interfere with daily life. Alzheimer's is the most common form of dementia and accounts for 60 to 80 percent of dementia cases. Ms. Winter then explained and presented a slide show to illustrate how the disease affects the brain and nerve cells.

Individuals who notice such changes should follow up on the symptoms and find a doctor they feel comfortable with. In many cases, the doctor may refer the patient to a specialist such as a Neurologist, Psychiatrist or Psychologist to evaluate the patient as there is no single test to prove Alzheimer's.

The last part of her presentation was to explain the many stages of the disease from Stage 1 to Stage 7.

In closing, Ms. Winter noted that currently there is no cure for the disease and no way to stop the underlying death of brain cells. She further noted that on the bright side, drugs and non drug treatments may help with both cognitive and behavioral symptoms.

Prevent Kitchen Fires *Fire Prevention Week October* 6 - 12

According to Wood-Ridge Fire Chief Scott Russo; It's time for Fire Prevention Week, October 6-12. Area fire departments are joining forces with the nonprofit National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) to remind local residents to 'Prevent Kitchen Fires.'

During this year's fire safety campaign, firefighters and safety advocates will be spreading the word about the dangers of kitchen fires--most of which result from unattended cooking—and teaching local residents how to prevent kitchen fires from starting in the first place.

Hasbrouck Heights Fire Chief Richard Giarratana said, "The kitchen is the leading area of origin for home fires and most kitchen fires are caused by cooking. On average, there are roughly 3,000 reported kitchen fires per day in the United States."

Moonachie Fire Chief Victor Migliorino reminds us that according to the latest NFPA research, cooking is the leading cause of home fires. Two of every five home fires begin in the kitchen—more than any other place in the home. Cooking fires are also the leading cause of home fire-related injuries.

"Often when we're called to a fire that started in the kitchen, the residents tell us that they only left the kitchen for a few minutes," said Lodi Fire Chief Matt Lombardi.

Carlstadt Fire Chief Jarrett Milligan recommends the following the safety tips that firefighters and safety advocates will be emphasizing:

• Keep an eye on what you fry! Stay in the kitchen while you are frying, grilling, or broiling food. If you leave the kitchen for even a short period of time, turn off the stove.

• When you are simmering, baking, or roasting food, check it regularly, stay in the home, and use a timer to remind you.

• If you have young children, use the stove's back burners whenever possible. Keep children and pets at least three feet away from the stove.

• When you cook, wear clothing with tight-fitting sleeves.

• Keep potholders, oven mitts, wooden utensils, paper and plastic bags, towels, and anything else that can burn, away from your stovetop.

• Clean up food and grease from burners and stovetops.

• Be alert! If you are sleepy or have consumed alcohol don't use the stove or stovetop.

Rutherford Fire Chief Fred Liller reminds you to "Check your smoke detectors frequently."

• Do not burn cardboard boxes or trash, as they can spark a chimney fire.

• Install stovepipe thermometers, which help monitor flue temperatures where wood stoves are in use, then adjust burning practices as needed. ###
