

on the Carlstadt water tower and tank maintenance project located at the corner of Summit Avenue and Madison Street.

A conversion was made to an alternate water source to assure water service during the project.

There may be a slight decrease in water pressure when the tank is off line. It is not expected to interfere with firefighting capabilities, as the 50,000-gallon ground-level storage tank adjacent to the tower will remain full, providing pressure for the system.

This project will improve water quality and service reliability for residents in the immediate area.

There will be repairs to tank walkways and railings.

The water tower will be drained and then cleaned inside and out.

Work began with welding

tower with protective covering to contain residue from the sandblasting. This should keep surrounding homes and property safe from dust and debris.

This is the first major overhaul of the tower in at least 20 years.

Major repairs were made when the tank portion of the tower began to leak 10 years ago. The tank was drained for those emergency repairs, and there were no significant interruptions to water service.

This upgrade includes the replacement of the words "Borough of Carlstadt," which have been missing since the emergency repainting 10 years ago.

Emergency services, including Carlstadt Police and First Responders, Bergen County agencies, such as the County Police and Sheriff's Office, relocated their radio transmitters from the tower to the adjacent storage tank.

The area served by the water tower includes Carlstadt, most of East Rutherford, Moonachie, Wood-Ridge and portions of several other towns.



# NJ Hall of Fame Holds **42nd Induction Dinner**

The New Jersey Aviation Hall of Fame announced the 2014 Inductees into The Aviation Hall of Fame.

The new inductees will receive their bronze plaques at the 42nd Annual Induction Dinner on October 7, 2014, at The Fiesta Ballroom, in Wood-Ridge.

The 2014 inductees include:

- Joseph Crecca: From East Orange. Crecca was an F-4 Vietnam combat pilot, shot down after 75 missions. As a P.O.W. he was incarcerated in the same camp as John McCain. After release, Crecca became a test pilot on early military low visibility approach technology. Later he was a Captain with Fedex.
- Kenneth "Hock" Todd Ham: Born in Plainfield, was a U.S. astronaut and a Captain in the United States Navy. Ham was selected by NASA in August 1998, while serving as the F/A-18E/F Super Hornet lead carrier suitability test pilot. He was a two-time Shuttle astronaut, flying once as mission commander.
- Jay Zeamer Jr.: A past Orange resident. Zeamer com-

manded an unescorted B-17 flight over the Pacific which was intercepted by 17 Japanese fighters. Though badly wounded he got his crew home. Zeamer was the last living USAAF Medal of Honor winner. He later became an aeronautical engineer.

Folks, before you settle down to read this story, might I suggest that you do so before the evening hours when the wind whispers its secret to the creatures of the night as they prepare to pay you a visit.

What is the secret you ask? That this story is true and that there are such things as ghosts and they are closer than you think.

The entrance of her home was at the side of the building in an alleyway at the end of a small, cluttered yard.

Not far from the rear of this alleyway stood a weather beaten cement wall. I can't recall the exact height of this dilapidated structure, all I know is that I had to stand on a milk crate to see over it. On the other side was the forgotten end of a gloomy cemetery.

As the weather became warmer my girlfriend and I would unfold her neighbor's lawn chairs and spend the evening hours sitting in the alleyway holding hands and making "goo goo eyes" at one another. Hey that's what we did back in 1964!

Anyway...On this particular evening we heard what sounded like a cinder block being dragged across a sidewalk. The eerie sound was coming from the direction of the cemetery.

No kidding folks, we both heard it and I remember the both of us looking at each other wide eyed as if to say "what the heck was that?"

A few nights later I was back at my girlfriend's house helping her take out the garbage. The barrels, just my luck, were located next to that decrepit wall.

I remember looking nervously at my surroundings as

a sudden gust of wind burst through the trees making them appear as if they were coming to life.

The moonlight, as it flickered through the branches, danced across the landscape like miniature ballerinas.

We heard it again...that sound...the long, agonizing movement of a cement block coming from behind the wall. Just then the night air thickened and a putrid odor entered our nostrils and soured our stomachs.

We quickly dropped the garbage into the barrels and ran into the house to find the blonde girl's mother sitting at the kitchen table sipping coffee and puffing on a cigarette.

We told her about the strange sound and of the foul odor that was emanating from behind the wall. "What did you expect to smell near a garbage can?" she laughed, "perfume?"

Life, for me and my pretty girlfriend, went on as usual over the next few weeks. Summer was by now in full swing and we were all enjoying the magic of teenage life in the 60s.

The incident in the backyard was all but forgotten. That was about to change.

It was a moonlit night in mid-July when it happened. We had just returned from a birthday party and as we approached the doorway we heard that dreadful sound again.

It was a grinding sound that echoed in the alleyway and caused the neighbor's dog to let out a blood curdling howl.

Then came a sudden gust of cold wind that rushed through the darkness like a chariot of demons escaping from the fires of hell.

I turned away and faced the street holding my girlfriend close as she strained her eyes into the darkness of the back yard. Suddenly her hands began to tremble, she tried to speak but fear had taken her breath away until all she could do was gasp and point in the direction of the yard.

Finally, as if life had flowed back into her, she screamed

"look...there in the yard!"

I took a deep, anxious breath, turned around and there to my utter astonishment was a ghostly apparition.

Folks I'm not kidding! It had an angelic presence that appeared to be floating just inches off the ground paying us no mind as it passed through the yard.

Though I couldn't make out any distinct features the indications were that of a woman with long flowing hair and a dainty countenance.

She was wearing a white gossamer gown that moved in the breeze like a cobweb.

Not believing my own 16 year old eyes, I set aside my fear and took a few paces forward to get a closer look.

This, whatever it was, turned her head in my direction and looked at me, rather through me. She then turned toward the cement wall and vanished into the melancholy darkness of the July night.

What was I experiencing? What the heck was I looking at? Folks, I have spent a lifetime trying to make sense of it all.

Was it really a ghost? It certainly looked like one to me and I can tell you that it wasn't some prankster lurking around in the depressing cemetery wearing a bed sheet.

It was the most unnerving, the most startling presence I have ever had the misfortune of seeing. The memory stays with me till this very day. My girlfriend moved away shortly afterward never to return and neither did I.

· Children shouldn't snack while they're out trickor-treating. They should wait until they get home and parents have had a chance to inspect the goodies.

To help prevent children from munching, give them a snack or light meal before they go -- don't send them out on an empty stomach.

· Tell children not to accept -- and, especially, not to eat -- anything that isn't commercially wrapped.

- · When children bring their treats home, discard any home-made candy or baked goods. Parents of young children should also remove any choking hazards such as gum, peanuts, hard candies or small toys.
- Inspect commercially wrapped treats for signs of tampering, such as an unusual appearance or discoloration, tiny pinholes, or tears in wrappers.
- When in doubt, throw it out. ###





# 35,000 Attend 100th An











The 100th Annual St. Joseph Festival opened Friday, August 29, 2014, with rides, games, entertainment, hourly 50-50, a Super 50-50 and the "Best Italian Food." The Feast continued Saturday, Sunday and Monday.

On August 30 and 31, from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m., the St. Joseph Society, accompanied by the Metropolitan Feast Band, marched with a banner of Saint Joseph throughout Lodi, Garfield and Hasbrouck Heights.

Each group went out with a "stenardo" (banner) of Saint Joseph and held Processions starting at various points in Lodi, covering a majority of the streets in Lodi and surrounding towns such as Garfield and Hasbrouck Heights.

Each door bell at every house was rung and the band would play favorite songs such as "Mamma," "Oh Marie," "Santa Lucia," etc. The festival then opened at 2 p.m.

On Labor Day, at 2 p.m., there was be a Solemn Mass celebrated by Bishop Bernard A. Hebda, followed by the Procession with the Statue of St. Joseph throughout Lodi.

The Procession route included: East Place, Liberty Street, Prospect Street, James Street, Woodside Avenue, Hunter Street, Prospect Street, Kipp

Avenue, Roosevelt Avenue, Central Avenue, Hillcrest Avenue, Grove Street and Spring Street.

At 3 p.m., members of The Society removed the St. Joseph statue from the Church and secured it on an ornate hand carved base constructed in 1915.

From 1915 to 1937, the statue was supported by long poles and carried on the shoulders by the Society.

Since 1937, the base and statue sit on a float surrounded with flowers, ribbons to hold donations, and children in First Communion dress.

The float is pulled by the Society. Float handling positions have been passed down generations.

This year, the Procession began with firecrackers, confetti and the release of dozens of balloons.

With Patron Saint banners (some from area Churches), Clergy, the St. Joseph statue float, followed by hundreds of faithful praying out loud in Italian, the Solemn Procession-moved throughout Lodi.

Some make this devotion barefoot. Traditionally, during the Procession, two homes at Arnot and at Charles, set out refreshments.

The Processions concluded with a Benediction in the

Church.

Organizers stated that approximately 35,000 attended this family oriented festival and there were no incidents.

The Festival was originally founded by the Society and then passed onto the parish in the 1970s as a result of not enough Society members to run the event alone.

The Society today is still responsible for the Processions throughout the weekend, and the Solemn Procession with Statue on Labor Day.

Proceeds collected from the Processions go toward helping the less fortunate, Scholarship Fund, Food Pantry, among many other charities.

The Festival has been a parish affair since the 70s. The food court, games and raffles are organized and operated by the parishioners, with all of the profits donated to the Church.

These booths have been family operated for generations. There are a few outside vendors and the amusements are contracted.

Last year's Super 50-50 winner received over \$10,000.










# Veterans Today

On October 4, 2014, VFW Post 809 will host the Family of Eddie Couchon. Eddie Couchon was killed at the Battle of Okinawa in 1945. This is a Medal presentation ceremony. His family will receive the Medals Eddie Couchon earned while in our Service as a Marine. (This ceremony is by invitation only.) Couchon Drive in Little Ferry is named in honor of this World War II Marine.

On October 13, the Ladies Auxiliary will host a Soup and Sandwich Social at 12 p.m. This is a fun event and friends are welcome to enjoy the afternoon with the Auxiliary.

Also, on October 25, the Ladies Auxiliary of VFW Post 809 will hold their Annual Ragamuffin Parade. This is for the young monsters of the town to have a chance to parade down the street with their Halloween costumes and scare the beegeebus out of the locals. Is beegeebus a word? Parade starts at 1 p.m.

#### **Benedict Arnold**

On May 2, 1750, John Andre was born in London, England. He went to school in England and then his father sent him to Geneva for further education. He was an excellent student. He excelled in languages and had an artistic ability.

He wanted to become an officer in the British Army but lacked the money to buy the commission. He saved money for a time and in 1771 John Andre purchased a commission to become a lieutenant and went to school in Gottingen, in what is today Germany to study engineering.

On January 14, 1741, Benedict Arnold was born in Norwich, Connecticut. He went to school up to the age of 14, when his parents died and he had to leave school to run the family business.

His first taste of military life came when he joined the Connecticut Militia during the French and Indian War. He became successful in business and made enough money to buy a small fleet of ships to move goods across the Atlantic. When the Revolutionary War broke out he joined the American cause.

Andre, now a lieutenant, joined his 23rd regiment in North America. When the Revolutionary War broke out, his regiment was stationed in Canada and went south to occupy Fort Saint-Jean on the Richelieu River. It came under siege by American Forces

under Brigadier General Montgomery and the fort was surrendered to him in September of 1775.

John Andre, now a prisoner, was sent to Lancaster, Pennsylvania until he was exchanged. During his imprisonment he wrote a memoir of his experiences and gave them to General Howe when he returned to the army for service.

General Howe promoted him to the rank of Captain and made him an aide to Major General Charles "no flint" Grey. There he served the British in the Battles of Brandywine Creek and Germantown.

While the British occupied Philadelphia, Andre met and made friends and connections with many of the Loyalist families living in Philadelphia. One of the many ladies he met was Peggy Shippen.

Benedict Arnold was in the Militia when the Revolutionary War broke out. He was involved in the capture Fort Ticonderoga in New York in 1775. He was with General Montgomery when the American Army tried to capture Quebec and Montreal. Montreal was captured, but Quebec was a harder target. Arnold and the Americans marched through the wilderness to reach Quebec. Many died in the cold winter of 1775. Many also starved from lack of food.

In the attack on Quebec he was wounded in the leg and carried from the field. The initial attack failed, but the now Brigadier General Arnold held a siege until May of 1776, when the siege was broken. He and what was left of his men went to Montreal. From there he went south to Lake Champlain.

He had a small fleet of gunboats built to try and keep Lake Champlain under U.S. control. He and his small fleet attacked the British ships as they moved south. The battle of Valcor Bay was a loss after many of the gunboats were damaged, but when Arnold retreated south many recognized his spirit and bravery for these amazing attempts on land and lake.

Benedict Arnold was promoted to Major General and in 1777 at the Battle of Saratoga he led the main assault over Breymann's Redoubt to break the Hessian and British line.

In doing so, he eventually helped cause the British Army to surrender. He also was shot in the same leg that was wounded in Quebec. He was sent to Philadelphia; the city was now in American hands after the British evacuated it. He was convalescing and was

put in charge of the city. He was a national hero for his service. While in Philadelphia he met a woman by the name of Peggy Shippen.

Now these two soldiers served on opposite sides of the same war, nothing odd or strange about that. Had things stayed that way history would have been different. We never would have even thought of connecting the two of them. Benedict Arnold would change all of that and become the most despised man in the history of America

While Arnold was healing from his wounded leg, Congress promoted officers that were junior to him to higher rank. This was infuriating to Arnold.

He complained to General Washington about this and the fact that Congress was investigating his financial matters. Even to the point of wanting to have him present himself before a general court-martial. He was irritated that the Congress felt that General Horatio Gates was the real hero of the Battle of Saratoga and presented him a medal for his actions. Arnold was left out.

By 1779 Benedict Arnold wanted to make contact with the British. He wanted to sell information to the British and also sought a commission as a British General. How does he make contact with the British? You may have already guessed, a woman by the name of Peggy Shippen.

Arnold sends out messages to the British Army in secret. Who was the man in charge of the intelligence for the British Army at that time? You may have guessed that too, Major John Andre.

Arnold is now officially a traitor. Now it wasn't uncommon for people to flip from one side or the other during the Revolution, but his treason was considered the worst. He fought so well for the Americans that he was a hero to many. For him to turn traitor was inconceivable. General Washington was one of Arnold's biggest supporters before Arnold betrayed his country.

Washington offered Arnold a field command when his leg was healed. Benedict Arnold asked to be put in charge of the American Post as West Point. Washington gave him the command.

What General Washington didn't know at the time was that Arnold had communicated to Andre that he would turn the post at West Point and all its soldiers for 20,000 pounds and an officer's commission of equal rank in the British Army.

On September 20, 1780, Major John Andre sailed up the Hudson River in the HMS Vulture to seal the deal with Benedict Arnold.

He met Arnold in the woods near Stony Point, NY, and then the two went to Thomas Smith's house to complete the deal.

On the morning of the 22nd, the Americans spotted the HMS Vulture and fired on the ship. It was forced down stream and Andre was stuck behind enemy lines. He was forced to travel to New York by land.

Benedict Arnold wrote out a pass for him to travel through the country. He also gave Andre civilian clothes and also papers that detailed the layout of the post at West Point to be used by the British forces when they arrived to take the post.

Andre used a fake name. He called himself John Anderson. Fortunately for the United States, he never made it to New York.

He was stopped by three Militiamen on the road in Tarrytown, New York. He offered the pass given to him by Benedict Arnold but the Militiamen, upon further questioning, figured out he was a British officer.

When they searched him, all the papers were now out in the open. He was arrested for being a spy. Had he worn his uniform visible for all to see, he would have been a Prisoner of War, but using civilian clothes and a fake name he was classified a spy.

The difference between the classifications was simple. As a POW he would have been held till he could be exchanged. As a spy he would be hanged. He was taken to Tappan, NY, and held there. Unfortunately, the guard took the papers found on Andre and sent them to Benedict Arnold. He apparently didn't realize his mistake until

it was too late. Arnold, realizing that his treason was out in the open, took a small boat and ran to the HMS Vulture.

General Washington was livid. He was furious at Benedict Arnold. He toured West Point and saw that there were no preparations done for defense.

He had Major John Andre put on trial by the senior officers under his command. Andre was found guilty of being a spy and sentenced to hang.

Sir Henry Clinton, the British Commander in New York, asked for leniency. He wanted Andre back. Washington said he was free to go, but you must give us Benedict Arnold.

Clinton didn't want Arnold and Washington didn't want Andre but the British policy stated that he could not exchange prisoners that faced the hangman.

So Clinton turned down Washington's offer. Clinton requested that Andre die by a firing squad like a soldier. Washington said he will hang like a spy.

On October 2, 1780, Major John Andre was taken to Tappan, NY, and hung from a tree.

Arnold received his commission and was put in charge of a group of Loyalists born and raised here in America.

What did he call them? They became known as the American Legion. They raided towns in Connecticut; New London, Connecticut was burned to the ground.

He attacked supply depots and burned Richmond, VA, to the ground when he and his men went south. Benedict Arnold and his American Legion left Yorktown, VA, before Cornwallis surrendered.

He is probably the only man to serve as a general for both sides of the same war.

He went to England after the war. Apparently, never really accepted in England,

The British don't like traitors either. He sold America's trust for his own wealth and is forever hated in America and never trusted in England.

He died in 1801. Major John Andre's body was exhumed in 1821 and sent back to England where he now is buried at Westminster Abbey. ###

#### **Telephone Scams**

The Moonachie Police Department has been receiving an extraordinary number of reports of telephone scams in our area. The targets of these scams are both residents and businesses. The caller in these scams requests payment by way of credit card information, bank account information, and prepaid credit/gift cards. Other personal and identifying information may also be requested.

The caller may provide the target with information such as names, addresses, birthdays or other information that may lead the target to believe it is a legitimate call, when in fact this information has been obtained fraudulently or from the internet.

ment being requested is not turned over within a specified period of time (usually an hour or less) that immediate action will be taken such as service disconnection, legal action and imprisonment.

Some of the most common recent scams include:

**IRS Phone Scam:** Caller claims to be agent of IRS or calling from IRS Collections department and claims that the target owes back taxes.

Telephone / Gas Company: Caller claims to be from a utility company and states that unpaid or overdue bill needs to be paid immediately or the electric, gas, phone, etc., will be immediately disconnected.

Hostage Scam: Caller claims to have a family member or friend being held hostage and that ransom needs to be paid for their safe release.

Residents and businesses are urged not to provide financial or other personal identifying information over the telephone. If you receive any of these types of calls, disconnect and call your police depart-

Despite the increase in phone scams, calls from these companies and government agencies may be legitimate. If someone believes the call may be legitimate they should end the call and contact that company by using contact information from trusted sources (i.e., your gas/electric/phone bill, or your tax records).

The Police Department investigates these calls to the extent possible, however, many of these calls originate out of the United States and use fake telephone numbers. Please call your Police Department if you have any questions. ###

# Sandy-affected Seniors get Assistance

Hurricane Sandy-affected seniors can still get assistance to fix their homes through the Social Services Block Grant (SSBG).

While most of the Hurricane Sandy recovery programs have stopped accepting new applicants, the SSBG funds, commonly referred to as the Senior and Disabled Grant, continues to accept applications for assistance.

According to Tess Tomasi, Manager of the Hurricane Sandy Long Term Recovery Project of the Bergen County VOAD/LTRC (Voluntary Organizations Active in Disaster Long Term Recovery Committee), SSBG provides repairs of Sandy-damaged primary residences for eligible seniors and people with disabilities who are not covered through other programs.

Home repairs must be essential to safely sustain the individual in their own home.

The program has a cap of \$5,000 per household; however, additional funding may be available for repairs over \$5,000.

As of August 1, 2014, the Senior and Disabled Grant has completed work on twentyseven (27) homes of seniors with thirteen (13) more in the pipeline.

Funding from other sources, both public and private, has provided assistance to well over 1,200 Bergen County households.

Sandy-affected Bergen County seniors and disabled heads of household are encouraged to call the Hurricane Sandy Recovery Information Center at 201-470-3143 to schedule an intake appointment. ###



# 2014 Senior Flu Shots

Adult influenza vaccine injections are provided to residents over 65 years of age. Adults 65 years and older are required to bring their Medicare card (Part B). Residents who are covered by Managed Care Plans (HMO) are requested to see their private physicians for the vaccine. No pre-registration is required.

# Filling You In

#### **Smile for Halloween**

As children, we can all remember the advice from our parents, "don't take candy from strangers."

Except, the reality is that on one day per year children are encouraged and permitted to seek and ask for as much candy from others regardless if they know them.

Parents can help ensure the safety of their little costumed trick or treaters by celebrating within their costumes at a party or other group function. A controlled environment may mitigate some of the risk when trick or treating to strangers.

Another risk from the Halloween treats is the affect on the teeth. Sugary treats can cause cavities in teeth and result in pain, infections, and tooth loss.

Proper brushing and flossing can reduce the affects of sugar on teeth. Some treats are better and some are worse as listed below.

#### **Better**

- 1. Sugar-free lollipops and hard candies: These treats stimulate saliva, which prevents dry mouth. A dry mouth allows plaque to build up on teeth faster, leading to an increased risk of cavities.
- 2. Sugar-free gum: Chewing gum can actually prevent cavities, not only because it helps to dislodge food particles from the teeth, but also because its increases saliva. Saliva works to neutralize the acids

of the mouth and prevent tooth decay.

3. Dark Chocolates: Chocolates are loaded with sugar, but studies have shown that antioxidants in dark chocolate can be good for the heart and may even lower blood pressure. Just be sure to eat it in moderation.

#### Worse

- 1. Sugary snacks: Candy corn, cookies, and cake all contain a high amount of sugar which can cause tooth decay.
- 2. Chewy/ sticky sweets: Gummy candies, taffy, and even dried fruit can be difficult for children and adults to resist, but they are a serious source of tooth decay, particularly when they get stuck in the crevices between teeth and make it nearly impossible for saliva to wash away.
- 3. Sour candies: High acid levels in these treats can break down tooth enamel quickly. Saliva slowly restores the natural balance of the acid in the mouth.

Be certain to brush and floss after consuming any of the sugary treats. Your dentist may offer other strategies to reduce the risk of tooth decay.












#### Chimney Safety Tips

Chimney maintenance is vital to your family's safety. The Hasbrouck Heights Fire Department offers these tips:

- Have your chimney inspected and cleaned on a regular basis.
- When possible, burn seasoned woods (dryness of the wood is more important than hard wood versus soft wood).
- Smaller, hotter fires will burn more completely and produce less smoke.
- Do not burn cardboard boxes or trash, as they can spark a chimney fire.
- Install stovepipe thermometers, which help monitor flue temperatures where wood stoves are in use, then adjust burning practices as needed.
