

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Winter Christmas Show Model Railroad Exhibits

The excitement and "Romance of Railroads," and the enjoyment of building and displaying model trains has kept the Society of Model Engineers going since 1926, making it the oldest model train group in the United States.

The members operate a train museum and two large "Railroad Empires" covering almost 5,000 square feet.

The larger "O" Scale layout is 40 by 70 feet and has almost 20 scale miles of train track, with detailed scenic diorama with realistic track work, roads, interesting structures, bridges and tunnels.

The "HO" Scale layout is approximately 30 by 45 feet. It also, is fully scenic with miles of scale track. Over 50,000 miniature trees have been installed by the members to depict Northern New Jersey.

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

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I remember someone telling me that in life it's the converts in any cause that are the most dangerous. Whether in religion or politics, once someone embraces a cause and converts, they take it to heart and go all out for their new found cause. Often they become fanatical and can be quite dangerous. Like the case of John Brown.

John Brown was born in Connecticut in 1800. He moved to Ohio where he met and got involved with the Abolitionists. These are people that were against the institution of slavery that existed at the time. A religious man who read the Bible, he believed that God was opposed to slavery.

Tired of the talk of the local Abolitionists that were mostly pacifists, Brown became militant and fanatical. He demanded more action. He took the opinion that only fighting will free the slaves. He was a failed businessman by age 42.

He had 20 lawsuits against him. So, he took his family to the new state of Kansas. Kansas at the time was struggling with whether to allow slavery in its borders or be a free state.

John Brown and his sons got involved in the Abolitionist struggle in their new home state.

In Kansas at that time, pro slavery men would raid Abolitionist towns. Abolitionists would raid pro slavery towns. Each side was trying to force the other out so that the state would take their side in the choice of free-state or slave state.

Two of Brown's sons were captured by pro slavery raiders. Brown and a small group of Abolitionists attacked their camp at what is known as the Battle of Black Jack. Not much of a battle. Brown and his men surrounded the camp and captured the leader and 22 of his men. Brown then ransomed them off in a prisoner exchange to get his two sons released. In August of 1856, John Brown's son, Frederick, was shot through the heart by a pro slavery man who was part of a raiding party in the town of Oswatomie, Kansas. John Brown quickly gathered up some men and raced to the scene. Brown and his men took up a position behind trees. He and the Abolitionists tried in vain to stop the raiders from destroying the town. Cannon fire with grape shot sent most of the Abolitionists running. So, Brown had to evacuate the area. Abolitionist

raiders killed pro slavery men. pro slavery men killed Abolitionists. It was how it went in Kansas at the time.

Brown, religious as he was, thought that it was God's will, the slaves were to be freed. He found that as a justification of the killings done by his men.

The conclusion was that the only way for slaves to be free is to arm them and they can fight to free themselves in one big slave revolt. Brown knew that the slaves would need weapons.

So, the Federal arsenal in Harper's Ferry, Virginia became his target for a raid. Harper's Ferry is located in West Virginia now because West Virginia was successful in seceding from Virginia during the Civil War. He would take the arsenal with his men and the slaves would rise up and have plenty of weapons with which to fight. He, as the story goes, looked for recruits to help him on the raid. He asked Harriet Tubman for help but she was ill at the time and could not join him. He asked Fredrick Douglas and Douglas turned him down. Douglas thought that a raid in Harper's Ferry would fail so he did not join.

The numbers vary from my resource books, but it seems that John Brown had settled on 13 white men and 5 black men for the raid, 18 men to start a giant war. He rented a farmhouse in Maryland that was about 4 miles from Harper's Ferry. Here his small force drilled and planned the raid to come.

He received rifles from Abolitionist groups up north and once he captured the arsenal at Harper's Ferry he would use the weapons there to arm all the slaves and white people that joined to help. Then he planned to move south freeing slaves as he went. Also he planned to supply his army from the land and farms they passed. Horses a mystery because at the next stop they reported the raid.

On the morning of the 17th, the Army workers at the arsenal and some of the locals saw the raiders. They sent word out and the local militia came out to stop Brown and his men.

They captured the bridge going over the Potomac River. Brown. His men could not escape now. Brown and his raiders killed 4 citizens from the town including the mayor. Taking more hostages, they then sealed themselves up in the firehouse. From the firehouse they traded fire with the militia. Brown sent out 2 of his men with a white flag. One was his son, Watson, the other was named Aaron Stevens. Watson and Aaron were both shot. Watson was dead and Stevens was wounded and captured.

One of Brown's men panicked and ran to the Potomac to escape. He wanted to swim across and flee. He too was shot and killed. Oliver, another of his sons was exchanging gunfire with the militia and he too was shot and died. The raid was a disaster.

Adding to John Brown's troubles was the fact that no slaves came out to join his raid. The army he expected never materialized. He and his raiders were cut off from the outside world and no one was coming as he had thought they would.

One of the failures of his plan is that proper communications with the slaves in the area never happened. So when the raid took place the slaves had no idea what was going on and never rose up.

President James Buchanan that afternoon ordered a company of Marines to Harper's Ferry to stop the raiders. They were the only troops near Harper's Ferry at the time. He also ordered Lt. Colonel Robert E. Lee to take command of the Marines. He was on leave from the Army at the time of the raid and the only high ranking officer nearby.

On the morning of October 18, when the Marines under Lee arrived, Lee offered the task of storming the firehouse to the militia. They declined to do so. So, Lee ordered the Marines to solve the problem. First he wanted to offer the John Brown raiders a chance to surrender. He sent Lt. Jeb Stuart with a white flag to the front of the firehouse to ask for their surrender. Stuart was an Army Officer as many will note but he volunteered as an aide de camp to Colonel Lee. Stuart called out to Brown vfw.org legion.org kwva.org vva.org

and his followers to surrender. Brown and his followers turned him down. Stuart then turned to Lt. Israel Greene of the Marines and gave him thumbs down, meaning that Brown would not surrender.

Green and his Marines with sledgehammers and rifles crashed through the front door. Green was inside first. A gunshot dropped the second Marine with a shot through the abdomen. He would later die. Another Marine was shot in the face but he would survive. Green didn't know who John Brown was but one of the captives pointed him out. Green said later he tried to split his head open with his sword but Brown moved and the sword put a large gash on his neck. Then he tried to stab Brown with the sword but being a ceremonial sword it didn't pass through his body. It just bent. The rest of the raiders quickly surrendered. John Brown's raid was over.

People of the South didn't like the reality of Northerners coming to their states to make war on them and try and start an insurrection. Brown was put on trial in nearby Charlestown. He was found guilty of treason and hanged on December 2, 1859. Four more raiders also lost their trials and hanged on December 16. Two others would meet the same fate on March 16, 1860. Some of the raiders did escape only to die in the Civil War later.

Many would say Brown believed what he was doing was right. He had the guts to stick to his convictions. He didn't just talk, he went into action. Others on the other hand would say he was a nut. His plan was hopeless and worse when carried out. He and his cohorts got a lot of people killed. You can decide for yourself which side of that fence you think this raid belongs.

John Brown's raid would be dwarfed by the Civil War not too long after he was hanged.

The Civil War would cost tens of thousands of lives. Thousands more would be wounded as it tore the nation apart. It would take 4 years to complete but it did end with the slaves being freed. No doubt something that he would have been glad to hear. ###

and food would be needed of course.

On the night of October 16, 1859, John Brown and his men left the farmhouse and commenced on the plan to raid Harper's Ferry. They took hostages along the way and cut the telegraph wires to prevent communications from getting through to authorities. They stopped a train on the tracks that passed through Harper's Ferry and the raiders were confronted by a man who was a baggage handler for the train. They shot and killed him. His name was Hayward Shepherd, the first man killed in the raid. He was also an African American. Brown then let the train pass. Why he did this is

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Artful Thinking

In the summer of 1923 the booming little town of Lodi entered the zany, smoke filled, world of Vaudeville...or rather it entered Lodi, if just for one night. Actually it was a Friday night in late July and it took place at what was then the Mecca of local entertainment... the Lodi Theater, later known as the American Theater. The show was being sponsored by a group of hardy young men who called themselves the "Hamilton Sportsmen." Their ad which ran in the Passaic Daily read: "Vaudeville production of Hamilton Club will have pep and wit galore."

The show, which was run by a minstrel entertainer from Clifton, NJ known as William Billy Rink, was billed as "Nothing short of a Broadway performance. The show will be complete with comedy and other entertainment of high class," promised Billy. There was no reason not to believe Mr. Rink since his reputation as a minstrel show coach was quite amicable. Still, ticket sales were at best sluggish and that reality didn't sit too well with the Hamilton boys who put up the money for this production out of their own pockets.

The show was only four days away and the young Sportsmen wanted to see progress...or else.

Frightened over the prospect of having his head mounted over the fireplace at the Hamilton boys' clubhouse, Billy called on his pals the Fonti Boni brothers to get him out of trouble. The two brothers were a popular comedy team who shared the spotlight with Billy on the minstrel circuit. One of those productions took place in Lodi and was well received by both theater goers and the local media as well. "Get them Billy!" said one of the bigger club members. So he did!

George Warwick. George was known for what was called Cherry Chalk Talks. If any of you Vaudeville historians happen to know what a Cherry Chalk Talk was please let me know.

Arriving from the Hippodrome, along with the Fonti Boni brothers an hour before curtain time, were a group of European street singers...hey, come to think of it they were the opening act! No wonder Mr. Rink was contemplating an abrupt end to his show biz career by jumping out of the third floor window. Luckily for Billy, he didn't have to make that decision since the curtain opened right on time. Besides, the only window in the theater was located in the basement which is where Billy was hiding.

Other performers included Lawrence Crane, the Irish Wizard, who had just arrived from the Palace Theater in Newark, NJ, where his act of prestidigitation astonished the audience. A screaming novelty and serenading Ada was presented by Harry Atkinson who had only the day before closed at the Schubert Theater. Billy had also booked a one man Vaudeville show which was presented by a performer by the name of Al Noda.

Then there was the comedian by the name of Al Miller who entertained with songs, dance and stories. Later in the show, Miss Mildred Durrie gave her rendition of "The-Dances of All Nations," which included Ballet and Acrobatic dances. Of course topping the bill was Billy Rink himself who performed his side splitting monologue "Oh What a Wedding."

According to the reviews that came out in the local newspapers the next morning the audience was "convulsed with joy and laughter throughout the evening." Luckily, for our Mr. Rink, the audience included the Hamilton boys. By the 1930s the town of Lodi began to experience the pangs of growth. The days of the trolley car and Vaudeville shows were fast coming to an end. Steps were being taken by town officials to remove the trolley tracks on Nicholson, Arnot, and Charles Streets. The superintendent of the street department was a man by the name of Daniel Cody whose efforts helped shape the future of Lodi. The removal of the trolley tracks "paved," thank you, the way for a modern means of public transportation such as

cars, buses and taxi cabs. As a child I remember my dad's car bouncing over those protruding trolley tracks on our way down Arnot Street.

Cody was also responsible for cleaning and repairing the drain pipe system on Main Street between the railroad tracks, now gone, and Union Street. He then spearheaded a plan to erect a bridge that would connect Home Place to South Main Street. The bridge was eventually built not on Home Place as planned, rather on the east end of Terrace Avenue, in the year '02. That same bridge was dedicated in memory of Lodi resident, Victor Scozzaro.

In 1934, new officers of the Lodi Fire Department were being elected and were ready to serve the community. David Dowson replaced Joseph Stark as Fire Chief while James Ferrara accepted the role as assistant. A young man by the name of Ben Brunooge took over as Captain. Other newly elected officers were President William Jones, Vice President John Paladino, and Treasurer Abe De Wilde. Delegates to the New Jersey and New York Fire Departments were Robert McGuire, Benjamin Dansen, Buddy Daleo, and Richard DeGrasse. Chief Dowson organized and raised funds for the Fireman's Association Convention which was held in Lodi in July of 1934. To further defray the cost of the affair the Fire Department sponsored a barn dance, at the Columbus auditorium on Nicholson Street. Mr. Morris Sorbello served as chairman of the entertainment committee. Performing at the affair was a musical group called "The Hillbilly Orchestra."

In February of 1934, Angelo Mancuso was appointed Lodi Library trustee. During that year Library Director Susan Henderson recorded that the book circulation in 1933 had risen to 29,631. Of that number 16,164 was taken out by juveniles and 13,467 by adults. Total Library membership was 2,563. In January of 1934, the year that LHS opened, The Library housed 3,817 books. Miss Hunderson's report showed a cash balance \$714.34 after expenditures of \$1,495.52 and fine collections totaled \$102.48. In that year Library President Jacob Kuipers sent a note of thanks to the Police Department for keeping order in The Library and for collecting fines for damaged books. The motto was most likely as follows... Don't mess around with The Lodi Library or the Police Department will "throw the book at you!" Oh yea folks, **HAPPY** HALLOWEEN. ###





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How to Instill a Love for Learning in Children

Little ones are notorious for being sponges of information. From birth, they're hardwired to gain an understanding of the world around them and use their explorative nature to learn and develop. Their innate curiosity is extraordinary but honing that natural ability into a lifelong skill is something that requires a little help from educators and parents.

The development of children's brain architecture establishes the foundation for all future learning, behavior, and health. Brains are built over time, from the bottom, up. The basic architecture of the brain is constructed through an ongoing process that begins before birth and continues into adulthood. Children learn through developmental milestones, such as walking, learning to talk, tying their shoes, etc. Fostering this initial passion for knowledge has gone through different schools of thought over the decades. So what's the best way to instill a love for learning in children?

As they begin to expand their education in early learning facilities, there's a transition to understand more complex subjects like science, math, and languages. Sometimes, there can be a few hang-ups when information struggles to stick. Incorporating fun and engaging ways for understanding complex topics makes the world of a difference. Children love to play and it's an impactful asset to creating an environment that they'll look forward to and excel in during their formative years.

Center-based learning combines lesson plans and playful activities, which is proven to engage imagination, intelligence, language, social skills, and perceptual motor abilities in infants and young of cognitive, socio-emotional, and physical behaviors. If a child enjoys the cerebral sensations of a lesson, they're not only more likely to remember it, but want to learn more. By using approaches like songs-based learning, the class becomes more enjoyable and relatable for the child. Additionally, involving them in active decision-making and games also helps to retain information.

Environment is key to instilling a love of learning in children. Safe, stable, and nurturing relationships are imperative for healthy brain development. The educational programs we enroll our kids in should always have their best interest in mind. Scolding teachers and harsh disciplines can sometimes stunt a child's desire to learn as they create negative associations. Understanding and empathy yields a flourishing brain that will continue to absorb information.

In the quest to instill a love for learning, remember that you'll make more headway when being an active listener. Although educators and parents sometimes have to play an authoritative role, it is vital to remember that a learning experience which feels authentic and conversational is the most effective. Teachers who are trained and experienced in interest-based learning environments will be able to truly inspire a love for knowledge.

It establishes a powerful educational "hook" that will keep children engaged and wanting to learn more throughout their schooling.

Meteor Shower Guide

• October 7 or 8, 2017, nightfall and evening, the Draconids Dragon in the northern sky. In rare instances, fiery Draco has been known to spew forth many hundred of meteors in a single hour.

• October 21, 2017 before dawn, the Orionids, typically at their best in the wee hours before dawn. These fast-moving meteors occasionally leave persistent trains. They sometimes produce bright fireballs.

• Late night November 4 until dawn November 5, 2017, the South Taurids, well known for having a high percentage of fireballs, or exceptionally bright meteors.

• Late night, November 11 until dawn November 12, 2017, the North Taurids. Typically, you see the maximum numbers at around midnight. Peak number is forecast at about 7 meteors per hour.

Political candidates for local and state elections were there to meet the public and answer questions.



Public Safety Officials wish you a safe, fun Halloween! Halloween Safety

Halloween is a cherished tradition, but the excitement of the night can cause children to forget to be careful.

There is no real "trick" to making Halloween a real "treat" for the entire family.

The major dangers are not from witches or spirits but rather from falls and pedestrian/car crashes.

Both children and adults need to think about safety on this annual day of makebelieve.

The Wood-Ridge Fire Department passes along these safety suggestions for a safe Halloween.

Parental Tips

• Make sure that an adult or an older responsible youth will be supervising the outing.

• Do not use open flame candles in jack-o-lanterns. Commercially available battery lights are much safer and do not pose a fire hazard.

• Parents should never let their children carve a pumpkin unsupervised.

• Do not hand out homemade or unwrapped candies to children.

• Parents should plan a route for their child to use while trick-or-treating and set an early return time for them.

• To welcome trick-ortreaters, switch on your porch lights or any exterior lights.

Trick or Treat Tips

• Do not go inside anyone's house. Remain on the stoop or porch at all times.

• Do not go into a stranger's automobile.

• Walk, do not run, from house to house. Do not cross yards and lawns where unseen objects or the uneven terrain can present tripping hazards.

• Do not take shortcuts through backyards, alleys, or parks.

• When crossing the street vember look both ways. Do not cross at the vember between cars. located

Halloween is a cherished case of an emergency or if they need to call home.

Costume Tips

• Only purchase and use flame retardant costumes.

• Children should wear white, reflective clothing, or use reflective tape and carry either a flashlight or glow stick.

• Costumes should fit properly; avoid loose or baggy costumes.

• Costumes should not be so long that they are a tripping hazard. (*Falls are the leading cause of injuries on Halloween.*)

• If children are allowed out after dark, outfits should be made with light colored materials. Strips of retro-reflective tape should be used to make children visible.

• Avoid any type of open flame while wearing a costume.

• Encourage children to wear face paint as opposed to a mask. Face paint should be non-toxic and meet FDA standards.

• If a mask is worn, make sure that the eye, mouth and nose openings are large enough to ensure adequate breathing and full range of vision.

• Materials made of 100% polyester or modacrylics are best for making homemade costumes. They are less flammable. 100% polyester and modacrylics may be purchased at most local fabric stores.

• **REMEMBER** – A flame-retardant costume does not mean that it is fire proof. Always keep your costume away from any type of open flame or other heat sources.

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Teenagers Oral Health

Teenagers typically are busy with school, extracurricular activities and social commitments. But while maintaining an active lifestyle, it's important that they remember to make wise, nutritious choices to keep their mouth and teeth healthy.

Which foods and beverages should I avoid?

Avoid sugary foods and beverages such as candy, desserts, fruit and vegetable juices. Sugar fuels the bacteria that produce acid and cause tooth decay, the most common chronic disease among children. Carbohydrates such as chips, bread, pasta or crackers also promote acid-causing bacteria, so they can be just as harmful to your teeth as sugar. Healthy snack options include nuts, raw vegetables, fruit, cheese or plain yogurt.

Should I limit the amount of soda that I drink?

Yes. Consider that a typical, 12-ounce can of regular soda contains approximately 10 teaspoons of sugar. Not only is sugar harmful to teeth, but acidic flavor additives can also erode and damage tooth enamel. Sugar-free diet soda also is bad for your teeth; all types of soda contain acid that can cause tooth erosion. There are simple ways you can limit the harmful effects of sodas. Try sipping soda through a straw; doing this will cut down the contact the beverage has with your teeth. Also, rinse your mouth with water after drinking soda. It can also reduce the risk of cavities.

Should I avoid sports drinks?

Sports drinks have become popular in recent years among adolescents who want to increase their energy levels and who may believe that these drinks are "better for them" than soda. However, keep in mind that the acidity levels in such sports drinks can cause acid erosion, too. After you drink one, wait at least an hour to brush your teeth to avoid

increasing the erosive action. Why should I avoid tobacco?

Tobacco use is the leading preventable cause of death in the United States, and it's important that teenagers avoid starting a tobacco-use habit that can continue into adulthood. Tobacco users are putting themselves at risk of developing nicotine dependence; health conditions such as asthma, cancer, and heart and respiratory disease; and oral conditions such as gum disease, halitosis (bad breath), the staining and loosening of teeth and tooth loss. Most importantly, tobacco can cause oral cancer.

Why should I avoid oral piercings?

People can chip teeth on oral piercings, such as tongue piercings, while they're eating, sleeping, talking and chewing on the jewelry. Tongue piercings commonly cause fractured teeth. The fracture can be confined to tooth enamel and require a filling, or it may go deeper — in which case, there may be a need for a root canal or tooth extraction. Infections are also common with oral piercings.

What's the best way to maintain my oral health?

In addition to visiting your dentist for regular checkups and cleanings at least twice a year, it's important to brush your teeth for two minutes twice a day, with either a manual or an electric toothbrush. Consider carrying a travel-size toothbrush with you in your backpack to ensure you're maintaining your oral hygiene even when you're on-the-go.



Not to Discourage You, But...

In the lifecycle of renting, there usually comes a certain moment when you say to yourself: I just can't do this anymore. Maybe it's the people upstairs who stomp around their apartment into the wee hours of the morning. Maybe it's the stale feeling you get looking at the same walls year after year. Or maybe it's the sting of realizing that your hard-earned money is circling down the drain – en route to paying somebody else's mortgage.

No matter the reason, most of us eventually hit a breaking point with renting and vow to become homeowners once and for all.

However, just because you want to buy a home doesn't mean you should buy a home. Even if you've already evaluated your finances and told yourself, "I can swing a down payment," there are some additional key questions to ask to determine whether or you're ready. I've tried to come up with the oft-overlooked, soulsearching inquiries that you really should ask yourself before you make the biggest financial commitment of your life. Here are a few...

Am I emotionally ready? If you've recently gone through a breakup, lost your job, or suffered any other kind of negative life event, you might feel like the answer is to start over. A reset can perhaps do you a world of good, but taking on a

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mortgage might not be the fresh new beginning you're looking for. Buying property can be very stressful and, if you're in a bad place emotionally, that stress might cause you to make ill-considered housing decisions. It's better to wait until you're past a situation and can know you're making the best

choice for you. Am I ready to write a lot of checks beyond the down payment? Mortgage requirements have been loosening since the credit crunch, and you may very well be able to buy with less than 20% down. That's the good news. The bad news is that that won't be the end of your upfront costs. Altogether, your closing expenses could add up to 7% of the total cost of the home. And then there's Murphy's Law: if something can go wrong, it probably will...

Am I OK with being in debt to the bank for a such a long time? One of the biggest benefits of homeownership of course, is the equity. Instead of handing all your hard earned money to a landlord, you're putting it back into your home - which you (hopefully) will sell for a profit down the line. But that equity doesn't happen immediately. In fact, for many buyers, whether they buy here in Bergen County or out in Big Sky, MT, it takes time. Meanwhile - unless you buy your house all cash – you'll be on the hook for not only your monthly mortgage payment but the interest on the loan as well. Stretching out your payments over more years - as with a 30 year fixed rate loan - can help reduce and stabilize your interest charges. But it can be hard to pay down your principal when you're constantly trying to cover other costs.

Is buying truly cheaper in the long run? For this, you'll have to do your own personal math. Understand that when you're buying, you'll be taking on a big down payment and all those additional costs. On the other hand, you'll want to take a close look at the local rental market. If your rents are increasing steadily year after year (generally 8 - 9% per year here in our local towns), you might be shelling out more on temporary housing than you would on your home each month. And you might eventually find yourself with your savings too depleted to buy...

As I said, buying a home is arguably the biggest financial and perhaps emotional commitment you'll ever make. You'll need to be sure it's right for you.





fast asleep when the smoke alarm sounds: Do you know what to do?

Hasbrouck Heights Fire Chief Angelo Roccamo said: Consider this scenario: "It's 2 o'clock in the morning. You and your family are fast asleep when you awaken to the smoke alarm sounding and the smell of smoke. What do you do? If you and your family don't have a plan in place, it could jeopardize your safety, or even prove deadly."

Wood-Ridge Fire Chief Kenneth Schulz stated: "In a typical home fire, you may have as little as one to two minutes to escape safely from the time the smoke alarm sounds. That's why home escape planning is so critical in a fire situation. It ensures that everyone in the household knows how to use that small window of time wisely.

"Developing and practicing a home escape plan is like building muscle memory," said Moonachie Fire Chief Justin Derevyanik noted. "That preplanning is what everyone will draw upon to snap into action and escape as quickly as possible in the event of a fire."

Little Ferry Fire Chief John C. Schwedhelm said, "This year's Fire Prevention Week theme, Every Second Counts: Plan 2 Ways Out!" works to better educate the public about the critical importance of developing a home escape plan and practicing it.

Lodi Fire Chief Archie Dowson is working in coordination with the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA), the official sponsor of Fire Prevention Week for more than 90 years, to reinforce those potentially life-saving messages. Fire Prevention Week is October 8-14, 2017.

You and your family are mental elements of home fire safety, and can truly make the difference between life and death in a fire situation."

> In support of Fire Prevention Week, Carlstadt Fire Chief Steve Capuano encourages all area households to develop a plan together and practice it. A home escape plan includes working smoke alarms on every level of the home, in every bedroom, and near all sleeping areas. It also includes two ways out of every room, usually a door and a window, with a clear path to an outside meeting place (like a tree, light pole, or *mailbox*) that's a safe distance from the home.

NFPA and Wallington Fire Department Chief Jake Hrywniak offer these additional tips and recommendations for developing and practicing a home escape plan:

Draw a map of your home with all members of your household, marking two exits from each room and a path to the outside from each exit.

East Rutherford Fire Chief Michael Falco added, "Practice your home fire drill twice a year. Conduct one at night and one during the day with everyone in your home, and practice using different ways out.

Teach children how to escape on their own in case you can't help them.

Make sure the number of your home is clearly marked and easy for the fire department to find.

Rutherford Fire Chief Christopher Seidler concluded with, "Close doors behind you as you leave — this may slow the spread of smoke, heat, and fire.

Once you get outside, stay outside. Never go back inside a burning building."
