"Lucky Lindy" Brought to Life in W-R

On May 20-21, 1927, Charles Augustus Lindbergh, went from obscurity as a U.S. Mail pilot to instantaneous world fame. Yes, 91 years ago, at 25, he made the first solo nonstop transatlantic flight from New York to Paris, France.

The account of the events, which took place in planning the trip, navigating in the cockpit and arrival in Paris, were presented at a program on

On May 20-21, 1927, September 16, 2018, sponsored urles Augustus Lindbergh, by the Wood-Ridge Historical trom obscurity as a U.S. Society.

Neill Hartley, as Lindbergh, took us back to that historic trip. Mr. Hartley brought to life "Lucky Lindy's successes and failures in obtaining backers, and obtaining a plane to enter a contest in which the prize of \$25,000 would be given to the first pilot to fly nonstop from New York to Paris. In his presentation, Mr. Hartley took the role of many people including that of President Calvin Coolidge.

The presentation of the history-making trip and the problems faced in the air for 33 hours, was brought to life realistically and dramatically.

Mr. Hartley is a professional actor, director and educator.

He is an assistant professor of voice and speech at The University of Arts in Philadelphia, and has acted as a speech/dialect coach for several professional theater productions. He holds an MFA in Acting from Temple University.

Mr. Hartley has presented eight one-man shows for hundreds of groups. All of his presentations include the performance, an informal section to discuss the person being portrayed, and question and answer period.




























The Right Stuff

The marching band's first performance this season was August 30, 2018. ###
































Lodi Food Truck Festival







What Are Dental Veneers?

Dental veneers are ultrathin shells of ceramic (porcelain) or a composite resin material, which are bonded to the front of teeth. This procedure requires little or no anesthesia and can be the ideal choice for improving the appearance of the front teeth. Veneers are placed to mask discolorations, to brighten teeth and to improve a smile.

Veneers are an excellent alternative to crowns in many situations. They provide a much more conservative approach to changing a tooth's color, size or shape. Veneers can mask undesirable defects, such as teeth stained by tetracycline and damage due to

an injury or, as a result of a root-canal procedure. They are ideal for masking discolored fillings in front teeth. Patients with gaps between their front teeth or teeth that are chipped or worn may consider veneers. Generally, veneers will last for many years, and the technique has shown remarkable longevity when properly performed.

Gas-powered Plant Threatens Meadowlands, Would Only Benefit NYC

Hackensack Riverkeeper, in partnership with Food & Water Watch, Sierra Club NJ, and the Borough of Ridgefield, held its first community information meeting on Wednesday, June 27, to oppose, in the strongest possible terms, a proposal to build a gas fired powerplant in the Meadowlands.

A crowd of 143 people – with a strong showing from Hudson and Bergen residents alike – attended the meeting at the Ridgefield Community Center. While the proposed North Bergen Liberty Generating Project (NBLG) is proposed to be built in the Township of North Bergen, it would sit on the border with the Borough of Ridgefield, directly impacting Ridgefield residents.

At the meeting, we learned that the Ridgefield Municipal Council had proactively passed the first of hopefully many resolutions opposing the power plant; and we urge residents in Hudson and East Bergen Counties to reach out to their elected officials to encourage them to do the same.

Such resolutions will come at a crucial time, as the North Bergen Liberty Generating Project – announced in April 2018 - has already been approved for key New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) permits. The project stands in direct opposition to Governor Murphy's renewable energy goal of 100% renewable by 2050, and sentences the state to another thirty plus years of gas pipe-

line infrastructure, making it more difficult to divest from fossil fuel energy sources in the future. It would provide NO benefit to the residents of NJ, and yet it appears to be coasting through the DEP permitting process.

The NBLG project is proposed for a 17-acre parcel of land along Bellman's and Wolf Creeks in North Bergen, NJ. If built, the site would house a 1,200 megawatt electric generating plant with two 312-foot tall exhaust stacks, two combustion turbine generator sets, a 3.5 million gallon underground diesel tank, and a new connection to Williams-Transco's natural gas pipeline.

The proposed plant site is about one mile southeast of the existing PSEG Bergen Generating Station. However, unlike the Bergen Generating Station, NBLG will be polluting NJ's already compromised air in order to send electricity to power New York City alone.

Also, NBLG could generate nearly 2.4 million metric tons of carbon dioxide a year in an area that already fails to meet national Clean Air Act quality standards. The pollutants emitted would include heavy metals and chemicals like ammonia and nitrogen oxide. In addition, steam released through cooling towers adds lead, algaecides, fungicides, and volatile organic compounds to the atmosphere that eventually settle on the surrounding land and water.

The project would place our waterways at risk, especially the sensitive wetlands of the Meadowlands. The proposed project site ranges from three feet to just twenty feet above sea level and is adjacent to a wetland area at significant risk from sea level rise. The construction needed to build the plant adds unnecessary risks to the adjacent waterways from soil compaction, stormwater runoff, possible diesel tank failure, and increased impervious surface. It also requires two stormwater outfalls to the adjacent creeks and would require Bergen County Utilities Authority (BCUA) infrastructure, some of which has not yet been constructed. The project would add over eight million

gallons of wastewater a day to the already taxed sewer system.

Additionally, the site is adjacent to a CSX railway, placing the facility within yards of potential disaster should a freight accident occur, particularly if the incident involves a train carrying Bakken Crude oil. Oil train derailments can ignite (and have ignited) massive explosions and fires, pollute waterways, and threaten lives, health, property, land, and entire ecosystems. Storing over three million gallons of diesel fuel adjacent to this railway exponentially increases this risk.

Finally, is there even a need for this plant? The short answer is NO. NBLG claims that the pending closure of Indian Point nuclear power plant will result in a deficit of energy in NYC. However, a study conducted in 2016 showed that NYC will be within 500 megawatts of full replacement energy through existing measures once Indian Point goes offline in 2021.

Another claim by proponents of this project is that it will be economically beneficial to New Jersey. What many don't realize, under an NJ law exempting energy utility facilities, the Liberty Generating Station would only pay about 10% in property tax. This means, instead of \$500 million a year for the plant (\$1.5 billion proposal), North Bergen would only see \$5 million. And, New Jersey will be stuck with the entire environmental impact risk.

Help us fight this new threat to the Meadowlands and our communities. Veterans Today

The Veterans of Foreign Wars has always been strong with pressuring the government to pass legislation that is favorable to Veterans. Here is the latest Legislative news from the VFW. The Senate advanced three bills including the VFW supported S.899, the Veterans Providing Healthcare Transition Improvement Act, which would ensure Veterans who work for VA are able to attend medical appointments for service-connected health conditions within their first year of employment without having

to take unpaid leave. The Senate also passed H.R.2147, the Veterans Treatment Court Improvement Act of 2018 which would require VA to increase the number of Veterans Justice Outreach Specialists who assist justice-involved Veterans in receiving the treatment they need, instead of being incarcerated for crimes that were associated with untreated or undertreated service-connected health conditions. Both of these bills passed the House and the Senate and await the President's approval or veto. The Senate also advanced H.R. 6157, which would provide appropriations for the Department of Defense to carry out its mission, including an additional \$10 million dollars to enable the Defense POW/MIA Accounting Agency to identify the service members whose remains were recently returned by North Korea and reunite them with their loved ones

Now most of you are aware that remains have been sent back to the U.S. from North Korea. This is a result of the President and Kim Jong Un meeting to discuss issues that abound between our two nations. These remains are our service men that went missing in action during the Korean War and they will need to be identified so that they can be returned to their families. Iden-

tifying remains had been difficult in the days before DNA research. In order to have a confirmation on a set of remains you need a family member to compare the DNA sample of the remains, preferably from the mother's side of the family. Females pass down to their off spring chromosomes that cannot be passed down by males to their offspring, but a sister will have it and pass it down to her children. This DNA test is very useful in identifying the skeletal remains of our service people because it is stable and goes on for generations. I am not a scientist but this is how it was explained to me.

Here is where the DNA test proved its worth. In August, 15 sets of remains have been identified. The USS Oklahoma was torpedoed multiple times while moored at Pearl Harbor on December 7, 1941. It capsized in the harbor and 429 men were killed. Remains found during recovery efforts that could not be identified were buried in the Punchbowl Cemetery in Honolulu as unknowns. Seaman 1st class Wesley Jordan was one of them. His remains and the remains of nine other Oklahoma Sailors have been positively identified and will be returned to their families for burial with

proper military honors.

Richard J. Murphy was a Staff Sgt. in the Marines when he and the 2nd Marine Division landed on Saipan in June of 1944. He disappeared during the combat that followed and he was listed as missing in action. He was buried as an unknown in the Manila American Cemetery in the Philippines. He too was disinterred and a positive identification has been made. He will be returned to his

family for burial with military honors.

Navy Commander James Mills was assigned to the USS Coral Sea during the Vietnam War. He served as a F-4B Radar Intercept Officer when he took off from the carrier on September 21, 1966 on an armed reconnaissance mission over Vietnam. His plane disappeared. Searches were conducted and his plane was not found. No antiaircraft guns or missiles were reported to have been fired in the search zone before the crash. He and the crew of the plane were listed as missing in action. In 2011 the United States Air Force underwater recovery team discovered his plane off of Quynh Phuong Province. Using DNA and other archeological evidence his remains were identified and will be returned to his family for burial with military honors. To date there are 1,594 Servicemen still listed as missing in action in Vietnam. ###

Artful Thinking

Well folks, here we are visiting the high plains of Lodi circa 1957. Oh, by the way, before we begin, I was wondering how many of you remember the lullabies that your mother sang to you when you were but a toddler? My mom, whose beautiful voice filled the room like a choir of angels, was known to have sung Toot, Toot, Tootsie Goodbye (the Eddie Cantor version) and an old country song written and performed by Jimmie Davis in 1940 called "You Are My Sunshine." "Please Don't Take My Sunshine Away." Of course I was never awake long enough to hear the ending but hey that was the plan and it never failed. What were your Lullabies? While you ponder that thought I'm going to return to the original topic: Growing up On Hillside Place part two. I'll give you a moment or two to catch up with the rest of us.

Picture this if you will. The year is 1957 Farnham avenue from Arnot street to Hillside Place was a dirt road over which stood a stretch of rolling hills. At the top of those hills were a scattering of dense woods that all but completely hid a dilapidated barn or two. The barns, in their forlorn fragments of the past, told a story of better days that had since come to a slow but inevitable halt.

The older folks like my parents and grandparents remembered well the cows and other farm animals that grazed up there and the owners of those farms whose dairy products found their way into just about every household in Lodi. The owner of one of those farms was the Cottone Family and it was their old barn that many of us kids in the area saw fit to ex-

plore. I remember entering and seeing petrified remnants of the cows (you know what I mean) that once rested there waiting to be milked. The stalls were still standing and there were bales of hay and straw stacked up against the side of the door.

They appeared to me as to be waiting there as if at any moment the cows were going to return bringing with them all that was lost in the darkness of time, a changing time at that. It all had a melancholy feeling to it and it sent a chill down my spine. As the wind blew through the openings in the roof it made the wood creek until it sounded like the barn was groaning like a friend who was saying goodbye. Little did we kids know at the time that it was us who were saying goodbye and it was a sad farewell at that!

As I walked away I turned to give the barn one last sentimental look. I made sure that my mind absorbed every detail so when the time came to reminisce I'd be able to tell someone about it as I am doing now.

Unlike our little corner of Westervelt Place, which was a condensed version of life on the hill, the area up and around Hillside Place had a wider range of open space and was home to kids from the area around Columbus School and parts west. Even kids from "across the highway" were known to have visited these hills numerous times during the course of the spring and summer. For them it was like a mini vacation. A respite, if you will, from playing on the flat and dusty landscape that was Lodi High School Stadium. (Long before the new high school was built.) Now remember folks, all

of this took place before those strings of identical homes were built along Farnham Avenue. Children had plenty of room to stretch and to travel as far as their imagination could take them without stepping on someone else's dream. The hills and fields were alive with energy which sparked our imaginations and helped us to make our visions come to life. My mother told me many years ago that as children we spend the hours in dreams of becoming. Then the time comes when we realize that we have become the dream. That's what growing up on that hill has now become. A dream!

The One-Armed Devil

In the Gettysburg National Military Park is a 40-foot tall monument memorializing the First New Jersey Brigade, VI Corps, of the Army of the Potomac. There are two generals honored here; one being Brigadier General A.T.A. Torbert, who commanded the Brigade at Gettysburg.

The second general was

not even present at the Battle of Gettysburg. He had been killed in action on September 1, 1862, at the Battle of Chantilly (Oak Hill), Virginia. However, he was so revered by his troops that when the Veterans of the First Brigade planned their monument, they insisted that he be included.

arny was born to a well-to-do Irish family in New York City. His father, Phillip Sr., owned a brokerage firm and was a founder of the New York Stock Exchange. His maternal grandfather was one of the wealthiest people in New York.

Young Phillip was a keen horseman and aspired to follow his uncle, Colonel Stephen W. Kearny, into the Army. However, his father wanted him to join the family business. His grandfather wanted him to become a minister. Phillip attended what is now Columbia University. He earned a law degree with honors and, for a short time, clerked in a law office.

All this changed when, in 1836, his grandfather died, leaving him a very substantial inheritance. As his father had passed away earlier, Phillip was free to pursue his goal of a military career. He was commissioned as a second lieutenant of cavalry in his uncle's regiment.

His outstanding military attributes were soon recognized and, in 1839, he was chosen by the Secretary of War to study the French Cavalry tactics at their military school at Saumur, France.

He was assigned as an aide-de-camp and officer in the 1st Chasseurs d'Afrique. This unit became engaged in the Algerian War. Kearny took part in the fighting and became known as "Kearny le Magnifique," by the French. They wished to present him with the Legion of Honor. However, as an American officer, he could not accept a foreign decoration. He was also popular for the lavish parties his wealth allowed him to have.

Upon returning to America, he authored a manual on cavalry tactics. Kearny was appointed to the staff of General Winfield Scott, Commander in Chief, US Army. He also married. This would prove to be a poor marriage. His wife was not content with Army life. She urged him to resign from the Army.

He acceded to his wife's wishes and resigned in 1846. However, with the outbreak of the war with Mexico, Kearny requested a return to service. Rejoining his uncle's regiment, the 1st US Dragoons, he recruited a cavalry troop for service and purchased 120 horses out of his own funds.

General Scott chose Kearny's troop as his personal escort during the war. Kearny was promoted to captain. However, this unit would see combat. Kearny led his men at the battles of Contreras and Churubusco. At the latter battle, Kearny led his men in two cavalry charges. In the first charge they captured a Mexican gun battery.

His luck would change in the second. He was wounded in his left arm. This would lead to it being amputated. He quickly returned to service and was given the honor of being the first man to enter Mexico City at the war's end. General Scott said of him, "a perfect soldier" and "The bravest man I ever knew."

For his service in Mexico, Kearny was brevetted to major. He next saw action in 1851, fighting Indians in Oregon. By now, his wife had taken their five children and left him. Kearny decided to again resign from the Army and embarked on a trip around the world.

While in Paris, he met Agnes Maxwell from New York City. They fell in love but were unable to marry because his wife refused to give him a divorce. Agnes moved in with him. This was frowned upon by New York society. To es-

cape their disapproval, Kearny built Bellegrove Estate in what is now Kearny, New Jersey. Finally, in 1858, he gained his divorce and they were married in Paris.

France was at war with Austria. Kearny became a member of Napoleon III's Imperial Guard and saw combat in the battle of Solferino, Italy. He charged the enemy by holding the horse's reins in his teeth. This time he did accept the French Legion of Honor, becoming the first American to do so.

Phillip Kearny returned to America with the beginning of the Civil War. He offered his services to the State of New York. Because of the so-called scandal over his divorce, New York declined his request. New Jersey was less interested in his social status and gave him command of the 1st NJ Brigade with the rank of Brigadier General.

He would turn these troops into one of the finest units in the Union Army. He would pay for equipment out of his own pocket. The Brigade showed how good they were at the Battle of Glendale.

He was given command of the 3rd Division, III Corps, Army of the James and promoted to Major General. He devised a red diamond patch to be worn by members of the division. This is the forerunner of today's unit shoulder patch worn by military units. The III Corps was transferred to the Army of the Potomac in time to take part in the second Battle of Bull Run.

Following the defeat of the Union Army, Kearny's Division halted Confederate pursuit at the Battle of Chantilly (Oak Hill), Virginia. Sadly, General Phillip Kearny was killed when he investigated a gap in the Union line. His Confederate foe had called him "The One-Armed Devil." At the time of Kearny's death, President Lincoln was considering him for command of the Army. General Kearny was buried at Trinity Churchyard in New York. In 1912, he was re-interred at Arlington National Military Cemetery.

As a young man, Phillip Kearny adopted the motto "Dulce et decorum est pro patria mori." Translated it reads; "It is sweet and fitting to die for one's country." He was the bravest of the brave. ###





Fire Prevention Week October 7-13

"Look. Listen. Learn."

Hasbrouck Heights Fire Chief Angelo Roccamo said: "Today's home fires burn faster than ever. In a typical home fire, you may have as little as one to two minutes to escape safely from the time the smoke alarm sounds. Knowing how to use that time wisely takes planning and practice."

Wood-Ridge Fire Chief Kenneth Schulz stated: "Fire Departments are teaming up with the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) -- the official sponsor of Fire Prevention Week for more than 90 years -- to promote this year's Fire Prevention Week campaign, "Look. Listen. Learn. Be aware. Fire can happen anywhere," which works to educate the public about basic but essential ways to quickly and safely escape a home fire."

Moonachie Fire Chief Justin Derevyanik noted, "NFPA statistics show that the number of U.S. home fires has been steadily declining over the past few decades. However, the death rate per 1,000 home fires that are reported to fire departments was 10 percent higher in 2016 than in 1980."

Little Ferry Fire Chief William Riedel added, "These numbers show that while we've made significant progress in teaching people how to prevent fires from happening, there's still much more work to do in terms of educating the public about how to protect themselves in the event of one."

Lodi Fire Chief Archie Dowson affirmed, "This is particularly critical given the increased speed at which today's home fires grow and spread."

South Hackensack Fire Chief Jerry D'Amico, noted that "Although people feel safest in their home, it is also the place people are at greatest risk to fire, with four out of five U.S. fire deaths occurring at home. That over-confidence contributes to a complacency toward home escape planning and practice."

"Working in the fire service for many years, we know that people often make choices in fire situations that jeopardize their safety or even cost them their lives," said Wallington Fire Department Chief Ken

Francis Joseph Jr. added these additional comments, "We need to do a better job of teaching people about the potentially life-saving difference escape planning and practice can make and motivating them to action."

Rutherford Fire Chief Jason Frahm said this year's "Look. Listen. Learn." campaign highlights three steps people can take to help quickly and safely escape a fire:

- Look for places fire could
- Listen for the sound of the smoke alarm.
- Learn 2 ways out of every room.

Carlstadt Fire Chief Brian Cervasio added that "Although we are focusing on home fires, these fire safety messages apply to virtually anywhere."

"Situational awareness East Rutherford Fire Chief is a skill people need to use wherever they go," said Bergen County Fire Marshal Bryan Hennig.

> South Bergen Chief Mutual Aid Coordinator Ronald Phillips reiterated, "No matter where you are, look for available exits. If the alarm system sounds, take it seriously and exit the building immediately."
