

## Filling You In

#### **Smile for Halloween**

As children, we can all remember the advice from our parents, "don't take candy from strangers." Except, the reality is that on one day per year children are encouraged and permitted to seek and ask for as much candy from others regardless if they know them.

Parents can help ensure the safety of their little costumed trick or treaters by celebrating within their costumes at a party or other group function. A controlled environment may mitigate some of the risk when trick or treating to strangers.

Another risk from the Halloween treats is the affect on the teeth. Sugary treats can cause cavities in teeth and result in pain, infections, and tooth loss. Proper brushing and flossing can reduce the affects of sugar on teeth. Some treats are better and some are worse as listed below.

#### **Better**

- 1. Sugar-free lollipops and hard candies: These treats stimulate saliva, which prevents dry mouth. A dry mouth allows plaque to build up on teeth faster, leading to an increased risk of cavities.
- 2. Sugar-free gum: Chewing gum can actually prevent cavities, not only because it helps to dislodge food particles from the teeth, but also because its increases saliva. Saliva works to neutralize the

acids of the mouth and prevent tooth decay.

3. Dark Chocolates: Chocolates are loaded with sugar, but studies have shown that antioxidants in dark chocolate can be good for the heart and may even lower blood pressure. Just be sure to eat it in moderation.

#### Worse

- 1. Sugary snacks: Candy corn, cookies, and cake all contain a high amount of sugar which can cause tooth decay.
- 2. Chewy/ sticky sweets: Gummy candies, taffy, and even dried fruit can be difficult for children and adults to resist, but they are a serious source of tooth decay, particularly when they get stuck in the crevices between teeth and make it nearly impossible for saliva to wash away.
- 3. Sour candies: High acid levels in these treats can break down tooth enamel quickly. Saliva slowly restores the natural balance of the acid in the mouth.

Be certain to brush and floss after consuming any of the sugary treats. Your dentist may offer other strategies to reduce the risk of tooth decay.

#### **Road Trip**

For those old enough to remember Dinah Shore, her radio and television shows in the 1950s were sponsored by the Chevrolet Division of General Motors

Dinah's theme song, "See the USA in your Chevrolet! "encouraged Americans to take a drive to the nation's sights.

For many of the Baby Boomer Generation, a road trip was our first introduction to travel. Travel by air was not yet commonplace and the railroads were losing prominence in long-distance travel.

The 1950s and 1960s saw a dramatic change in how many families vacationed. The Interstate Highway System, created by President Eisenhower and Congress in 1956, spurred development from coast to coast.

Travel times were dras-

tically shortened, allowing travel to more distant locales. This new set of roadways also precipitated the rise of the explosion of roadside motels. The Holiday Inn, Ramada Inn and Howard Johnson's Motor Lodge chains were all founded during the 1950s.

These chains joined already existing Best Western and Quality Courts (now Quality Inns) along America's highways. Previously, most lodging accommodations were in the center of cities and towns. Roadside motels did not always have the best reputations. The new chains featured brand standards and centralized reservation systems.

In the early 1970s my parents took our new Ford Country Squire Station Wagon on the ultimate American Road Trip.

Departing New Jersey in mid-August, they made their way across the northern part of the United States, visiting Mount Rushmore, the Black Hills, and Yellowstone enroute to San Francisco.

From there they continued down the California Coast to Hearst Castle, the Danish style village of Solvang, and Santa Barbara, along the way to Los Angeles. Next was Las Vegas, then on to the Grand Canyon, Zion, and several other national parks.

Staying with our aunt, my brother and I awaited each postcard and phone call to hear of their exploits. Even the dog was happy to hear my mother's voice.

As travel evolved, the increased availability of flights created the Fly/Drive Vacation.

Families could now cut travel time by flying to a distant city and rent a car to visit the sights of a particular region. This allows travelers to spend more time exploring, without the kids asking, "are we there yet!'

During the current pandemic, the road trip has been more popular than in recent years. Many travelers could not or did not want to travel internationally.

The National Parks Service has reported that many of the more popular parks have been extremely crowded. Some parks have even required reservations for timed entry. Many road trippers like to just wing it (myself included at times), which is often is not a good idea.

Near popular parks and attractions, it is often difficult to find lodging on short or no notice. Covid restrictions on admissions, sightseeing tours, boat rides, and other attractions can leave the spontaneous travelers feeling disappointed. Booking in advance has become more recommended.

Many travel agencies report they are arranging more domestic vacations than ever. Because of the intricacies of these types of trips, the travel advisor may assess a planning or consultation fee.

Over the years, traveling Historic Route 66 has become a Bucket List destination for many vacationers. Nicknamed

the Mother Road and the Main Street of America, it is no longer an official highway.

Many parts of the road still exist in its celebrated state, while other parts have been upgraded as part of the Interstate System.

The notable thoroughfare from Chicago to Santa Monica, California was famous for roadside attractions like Wigwam Motel in Arizona, and scores of roadside eateries. Song writer Bobby Troup and singer Nat King Cole immortalized the road in their 1946 hit song urging America to Get Your Kicks, on Route 66. Travelers from around the world venture along the highway every year.






















## Moonachie Fire Department Honors Chief William Hunt

- A continuous set of three loud beeps—beep, beep, beep—means smoke or fire. Get out, call 9-1-1, and stay out.
- A single chirp every 30 or 60 seconds means the battery is low and must be changed.
- All smoke alarms must be replaced after 10 years.

South Hackensack Fire Chief Carmine Maceri noted, "Chirping that continues after the battery has been replaced means the alarm is at the end of its life and the unit must be replaced."

East Rutherford Fire Chief

Robert Swiston said, "Make sure your smoke and CO alarms meet the needs of all your family members, including those with sensory or physical disabilities."

## An Army of Immigrants

the American Civil War would have us believe that all who fought were of Anglo-Saxon descent, with a few Irish added for comic relief. By 1863, a large part of the Union Army. about 23%, was foreign born.

Entire regiments were recruited with immigrants of one or more nationalities. The 39th New York Volunteer Infantry Regiment was formed with companies of various nationalities. They were Italian, German, Hungarian, Swiss, French, Spanish and Portuguese. The Regiment called themselves the "Garibaldi Guard" after the Italian revolutionary, Giuseppe Garibaldi. The Regiment was in Federal service from May 27, 1861 until June 7, 1865.

The largest group of immigrants were German. The 52nd New York, 9th Ohio, 74th Pennsylvania, 32nd Indiana, and the 9th Wisconsin, were all made up of German immigrants. Battery A, 1st New Jersey Artillery, "The German Battery," was recruited in Hoboken.

It is estimated that about 10,000 Hispanics fought for the Union. The New Mexico Regiment and the 1st California Cavalry members were all Hispanic. 1st Lieutenant Augusto Rodriguez, a native of Puerto Rico, served in the

The Hollywood view of 15th Connecticut Infantry. The brothers, Federico and Adolfo Cavada, were from Cuba. Lieutenant Colonel Federico Cavada commanded the 114th Pennsylvania Infantry at the Battle of Gettysburg. Captain Adolfo Cavada served on the staff of General Humphreys.

It is recorded that over 4,100 Norwegian, Swedish and Danish men served in regiments from Illinois, Iowa, Minnesota and Wisconsin. The 15th Wisconsin was composed in its entirety of all Scandinavian volunteers.

Many of the Irish immigrants joined the Irish Brigade. This brigade was composed of five infantry regiments. They were the 63rd New York, 69th New York, 88th New York, 28th Massachusetts and the 116th Pennsylvania. The brigade was the idea of Captain (later General) Thomas Francis Meagher.

It is estimated that 187,000 African Americans enlisted in 163 regiments to fight for emancipation and the end of slavery.

The most famous Native American was Lieutenant Colonel Ely S. Parker, of the Seneca Nation. He was Adjutant to General Ulysses S. Grant. Lt. Col. Parker wrote out the terms of surrender that were signed by Robert E. Lee.

There is documentation stating that at least 50 Asians fought for the Union.

#### Hunter's Moon

The October full moon appears on Wednesday, October 20, 2021, at 10:57 a.m. It is called the "Hunter's Moon."

As the Moon drifts over the horizon around sunset, it may appear larger and more orange—how perfect for the fall season!

The orange color of a moon near the horizon is a true physical effect. It stems from the fact that, when you look toward the horizon, you're looking through a greater thickness of Earth's atmosphere than when you gaze up and overhead.

The atmosphere scatters blue light - that's why the sky looks blue. The greater thickness of atmosphere in the direction of a horizon scatters blue light most effectively, but it lets red light pass through to your eyes.

So a full moon near the horizon – any full moon near the horizon – takes on a vellow or orange or reddish hue.

Other names for this moon include "Full Travel Moon," "Full Dying Grass Moon," "Blood Moon" or "Sanguine Moon." ###
