This was an exciting time for all of our 387 athletes and families who are connected to this soccer program.



Artful Thinking

Artful October 2022

This past summer, while jogging through the side streets of Lodi, I heard the urgent blast of sirens a block or two away. I looked and noticed plumes of billowing black smoke rising into the sky coating the atmosphere and blocking out the morning sun. Then there was fire, fierce demonic flames crashing through windows and threatening neighboring homes with its relentless, all-consuming inferno. Thankfully, there were no casualties.

Within minutes the entire area was surrounded by Lodi Police officers, Fire Departments from Lodi, Hasbrouck Heights, Hackensack, and Wallington.

Also on the scene was Lodi's Fire Marshall Paul Wanco. After twenty years of service the Lodi native has seen his share of fire and, along with his staff, has prevented countless tragedies along the way.

Fire Marshall Wanco, a 1973 graduate of Lodi High School, had aspirations of entering fire service even as a child at Washington Grammar School. "I became a certified fire inspector after receiving my official license through Civil Service," said Paul at a recent interview at his Lodi office. "There was an opening in town and I have been here ever since."

The primary function of Fire Inspectors is to look for violations in homes, apartments and businesses throughout the community. They operate under the New Jersey fire code which is second only to California when it comes to having the strictest laws. "We inspect non owner residents, one and two family homes. Also, multifamily homes three families and up regardless if the owner lives there or not," said Paul. "It's a yearly inspection."

As for local businesses, if they fail inspection they are given a form stating the violation. The owner is then given 15 to 30 days to comply. "We do approximately 30 inspections a year." Said Paul, "Both initial and re-inspections."

Absentee landlords of one and two family homes must be registered and inspected on a yearly basis.

Included in the inspection, both in and out, are meters, electrical cords, lights and outlets. Among those items on the inspector's check list are extension cords, power strips with circuit breakers, electrical panels, gas meters and smoke and carbon monoxide detectors.

"In my opinion," said Fire Marshall Wanco, "carbon monoxide detectors should be placed lower to the floor about the same height as an electrical socket. Carbon monoxide, unlike smoke, is heavier than air and stays lower to the ground. Batteries should be changed at least every six months."

Much needed seminars at schools and senior centers as well as educational briefings at fire houses were put temporarily on hold due to the Covid-19 pandemic. Hopefully, those extremely important functions will be starting up again in the near future.

The more we know the better are we prepared and the safer we become. The key word is safety. "We fire inspectors are in this for life safety," said Wanco. "People are sometimes unaware of what fire prevention is all about. It's our job to make sure they know."

Fire Marshall Paul Wanco is a certified arson and explosion investigator and certified vehicle fire inspector. His staff includes inspectors Michael Barkley, Thomas Rielly, Captain Charles Guarino Jr. and Fire Prevention Bureau Administrative Secretary Deborah Citro.

Historically Speaking

Big Plans -- Big Planes

Frederick Kuhnert had big plans. He purchased 20 acres in Hasbrouck Heights to build an "aerodrome." This was in 1910. He planned to build a 14-passenger airplane. At this time airplanes could barely get aloft with two people. In 1912, the plane did fly, but only in pieces. At that time the aerodrome was hit by a tornado and destroyed


the plane before it could fly.

Walter C. Teter also had big plans. In 1917, Mr. Teter purchased about 700 acres of marshland from Moonachie, Little Ferry and Lodi Township (now South Hackensack).

His plans were to develop the reclaimed marshland, to build a racetrack, 18-hole golf course and an airport. This be-

came the Borough of Teterboro on March 26, 1917. In 1918, additional land was annexed from Hasbrouck Heights.

A dirt air strip was built on the site. There was development during the First World War. A company set up operations in 1918. This was the Wittemann – Lewis Aircraft Company. The Wittemann – Lewis Training Tractor (T-T 1), a two seat, training biplane was produced in 1918.

The US Army awarded a contract to the company, in 1921, to build two XNBL-1 (Experimental Night Bomber, Long Range) Barling Heavy Bombers. They also received a contract to modify 25 De Havilland DH 4, day bombers, for the US Postal Service, for air mail service.

US Army Air Service, General William "Billy" Mitchell asked Walter Barling, who had worked for the Royal Aircraft Factory, during WW I, to design a large bomber, that could carry a 5,000 Lb. bomb load at 100 MPH and at a height of 10,000 feet.

Only one Barling bomber was built. The Army canceled the second aircraft because of cost overruns. By the time it was completed the cost had risen to \$525,000 for one bomber. The original contract was for \$375,000 for two bombers. When the bomber was completed, it was shipped to Wright Field in Ohio. The plane was assembled and flown on August 23, 1923. At the time it was the largest plane in the world.

It was in a Tri-Plane configuration and had six Liberty engines of 420 hp. each. These engines were housed in four nacelles. The inboard nacelles held two engines. This was a push pull arrangement. The plane had a crew of seven. It was 65 ft long with a wing span of 120 ft. Maximum speed was 100 MPH and had a service ceiling of 7,725 ft.

Anthony Fokker was born in Holland and built his first airplane there. Before the First World War, he moved to Germany. He designed and built aircraft for the German air service. His more notable designs were the DR 1, tri-plane of Baron Manfred von Richthofen, AKA "The Red Baron", and the D VII, biplane fighter. The D VII was so respected by the Allies, that it was specifically banned by the Treaty of Versailles.

Fokker returned to Holland after the war and started an aircraft company. He decided to expand his company to America. Fokker purchased the Wittemann factory in Teterboro. ###

Yom Kippur: Sunset Oct. 4 to Nightfall Oct. 5, 2022

Yom Kippur means "Day of Atonement." This is the holiest Jewish holiday of the year and ends the ten days of High Holidays or "Days of Awe," which begin with Rosh Hashanah. Jews refrain from work. Adults fast from sundown the evening before Yom Kippur until nightfall the next day.

This day is about asking God to forgive sins, reflecting on past mistakes accepting repentance, and praying.

Fasting is a way to cleanse and purify the body and soul.

Many will wear all-white clothing to also symbolize purity.

On the day itself, there are many traditional prayers. One of the most important prayers describes the atonement ritual performed by high priests during ancient times.

Yom Kippur ends with a single shofar blast.

Traditions include: The day

before Yom Kippur, a special meal is enjoyed, ending with candle lighting. Many remember those who passed. Some visit cemeteries on this day before Yom Kippur. Another tradition leading up to Yom Kippur is to perform charitable acts. After Yom Kippur, a festive "break-the-fast" meal is served with lots of satisfying breakfast foods such as bagels and spreads, kugel, blintzes, and egg dishes. Source Almanac.com ###

What is Sukkot?

2022 begins the evening of Sunday, October 9 and ends on the evening of Sunday, October 16, 2022.

Sukkot (Feast of Booths or *Tabernacles*) is one of the three biblically based pilgrimage holidays known as the shalosh regalim.

It is an agricultural festival that originally was considered

The first day of Sukkot a thanksgiving for the fruit harvest. Sukkot are hut-like structures that the Jews lived in during the 40 years of travel through the wilderness after the exodus from Egypt.

As a temporary dwelling, the sukkah also represents the fact that all existence is fragile, and therefore Sukkot is a time to appreciate the shelter of our homes and our bodies.

How is Sukkot celebrated?

Sukkot is celebrated by, first of all, building a sukkah. Jews are required to eat in the sukkah for eight days (seven days in Israel), and some even sleep in the sukkah for the duration of the holiday.

The sukkah is decorated and the first day is considered a holy day in which most forms of work are forbidden.

The rabbis dictated that arbat ha'minim (four species) should be held together and waved during the holiday. These are based on four plants mentioned in the Bible, and the rabbinic version includes the following: etrog (fruit of the citron tree), lulav (palm frond), hadas (leaves from the myrtle tree), and aravah (leaves from the willow tree). This waving ceremony was performed at the Temple in the ancient world.

The seventh day of Sukkot is called Hoshanah Rabah. On that day in the synagogue Jews circle the room seven times while the arbat ha'minim are held and special prayers are recited. Source: https://toriavey. com/ ###



Public Safety Officials wish you a safe, fun Halloween!

Halloween Safety

Halloween is a cherished can present tripping hazards. tradition, but the excitement of the night can cause children to forget to be careful.

There is no real "trick" to making Halloween a real "treat" for the entire family.

The major dangers are not from witches or spirits but rather from falls and pedestrian/car crashes.

Both children and adults need to think about safety on this annual day of makebelieve.

The Wood-Ridge Fire Department passes along these safety suggestions for a safe Halloween.

Parental Tips

- · Make sure that an adult or an older responsible youth will be supervising the outing.
- Do not use open flame candles in jack-o-lanterns. Commercially available battery lights are much safer and do not pose a fire hazard.
- Parents should never let their children carve a pumpkin unsupervised.
- Do not hand out homemade or unwrapped candies to children.
- Parents should plan a route for their child to use while trick-or-treating and set an early return time for them.
- To welcome trick-ortreaters, switch on your porch lights or any exterior lights.

Trick or Treat Tips

- Do not go inside anyone's house. Remain on the stoop or porch at all times.
- Do not go into a stranger's automobile.
- Walk, do not run, from house to house. Do not cross yards and lawns where unseen objects or the uneven terrain

- Do not take shortcuts through backyards, alleys, or
- When crossing the street look both ways. Do not cross between cars.
 - Always use the sidewalk.
- Trick-or-treat on well-lit streets within your neighborhood.
- Children should always travel in a group.
- Use the buddy system, and make sure you have at least one buddy with you the entire evening.
- When you return home, have an adult examine and discard all candies that are not factory sealed or wrapped by the candy manufacturer. Never eat homemade or unwrapped
- Children should carry spare change or cell phone in case of an emergency or if they need to call home.

Costume Tips

- Only purchase and use flame retardant costumes.
- · Children should wear white, reflective clothing, or use reflective tape and carry either a flashlight or glow stick.
- Costumes should fit properly; avoid loose or baggy costumes.
- Costumes should not be so long that they are a tripping hazard. (Falls are the leading cause of injuries on Hallow-
- · If children are allowed out after dark, outfits should be made with light colored materials. Strips of retro-reflective tape should be used to make children visible.
- Avoid any type of open flame while wearing a costume.
- Encourage children to wear face paint as opposed

to a mask. Face paint should be non-toxic and meet FDA standards.

- If a mask is worn, make sure that the eye, mouth and nose openings are large enough to ensure adequate breathing and full range of vision.
- Materials made of 100% polyester or modacrylics are best for making homemade costumes. They are less flammable. 100% polyester and modacrylics may be purchased at most local fabric stores.
- REMEMBER A flame-retardant costume does not mean that it is fire proof. Always keep your costume away from any type of open flame or other heat sources.

Accessories

- · Knives, swords and other accessories should be made from cardboard or flexible materials. Do not allow children to carry sharp objects.
- Bags or sacks carried by youngsters should be lightcolored or trimmed with retroreflective tape if children are allowed out after dark.
- Carrying flashlights will help children see better and be seen more clearly.

Motorists

The Wood-Ridge Police Department Traffic Bureau urges motorists to be especially alert on Halloween.

- Watch for children darting out from between parked cars.
- Watch for children walking on roadways, medians and curbs.
- Enter and exit driveways and alleys carefully.
- At twilight and later in the evening, watch for children in dark clothing. ###

Hunter's Moon

The Hunter's Moon will reach peak illumination at 4:54 p.m. Eastern Time on Sunday, October 9, 2022. It will be below the horizon at this time, so we'll have to wait until sunset to watch it take its place in the sky.

Like September's Harvest Moon, the Hunter's Moon rises around the same time for several nights in a row, so start looking for it on Saturday, October 8.

As the Moon drifts over the horizon around sunset, it may appear larger and more orange—how perfect for the fall season! But don't be fooled by the "Moon Illusion," which makes the Moon appear bigger than it really is.

The orange color of a moon near the horizon is a true physical effect. It stems from the fact that, when you look toward the horizon, you're looking through a greater thickness of Earth's atmosphere than when you gaze up and overhead.

The atmosphere scatters blue light – that's why the sky looks blue. The greater thickness of atmosphere in the direction of a horizon scatters blue light most effectively, but it lets red light pass through to your eyes.

So a full moon near the horizon – any full moon near the horizon – takes on a yellow or orange or reddish hue.

For decades, the Almanac has referenced the monthly full Moons with names tied to early Native American, Colonial American, and European folklore. Traditionally, each full Moon name was applied to the entire lunar month in which it occurred and through all of the Moon's phases—not only the full Moon.

The Harvest Moon and the Hunter's Moon are unique in that they are not directly related to this folklore, nor necessarily restricted to a single month. Instead, they are tied to an astronomical event: the autumnal equinox!

The Harvest Moon is the full Moon which occurs nearest to the date of the autumnal equinox (September 22, 2022). This means that either September or October's full Moon may take on the name "Harvest Moon" instead of its traditional name. Similarly, the Hunter's Moon is the first full Moon to follow the Harvest Moon, meaning that it can occur in either October or November.

This year, the Harvest Moon occurred on September 10, so the Hunter's Moon will follow it one lunar cycle later, on October 9.

It is believed that this full Moon came to be called the full Hunter's Moon because it signaled the time to go hunting in preparation for the cold winter ahead. Animals are beginning to fatten up ahead of winter, and since the farmers had recently cleaned out their fields under the Harvest Moon, hunters could easily see the deer and other animals that had come out to root through the remaining scraps (as well as the foxes and wolves that had come out to prey on them).

The earliest use of the term "Hunter's Moon," cited in the Oxford English Dictionary, is from 1710. Some sources suggest that other names for the Hunter's Moon include "Full Travel Moon," "Full Dying Grass Moon," "Blood Moon" or "Sanguine Moon."either associated with the blood from hunting or the color of the changing autumn leaves. ###



Smile for Halloween

As children, we can all remember the advice from our parents, "don't take candy from strangers." Except, the reality is that on one day per year children are encouraged and permitted to seek and ask for as much candy from others regardless if they know them.

Parents can help ensure the safety of their little costumed trick or treaters by celebrating within their costumes at a party or other group function. A controlled environment may mitigate some of the risk when trick or treating to strangers.

Another risk from the Halloween treats is the affect on the teeth. Sugary treats can cause cavities in teeth and result in pain, infections, and tooth loss. Proper brushing and flossing can reduce the affects of sugar on teeth. Some treats are better

and some are worse as listed below.

Better

- 1. Sugar-free lollipops and hard candies: These treats stimulate saliva, which prevents dry mouth. A dry mouth allows plaque to build up on teeth faster, leading to an increased risk of cavities.
- 2. Sugar-free gum: Chewing gum can actually prevent cavities, not only because it helps to dislodge food particles from the teeth, but also because it increases saliva. Saliva works to neutralize the acids of the mouth and prevent tooth
- 3. Dark Chocolates: Chocolates are loaded with sugar, but studies have shown that antioxidants in dark chocolate can be good for the heart and may even lower blood pressure. Just be sure to eat it in moderation.

Worse

- 1. Sugary snacks: Candy corn, cookies, and cake all contain a high amount of sugar which can cause tooth decay.
- 2. Chewy/ sticky sweets: Gummy candies, taffy, and even dried fruit can be difficult for children and adults to resist, but they are a serious source of tooth decay, particularly when they get stuck in the crevices between teeth and make it nearly impossible for saliva to wash away.
- 3. Sour candies: High acid levels in these treats can break down tooth enamel quickly. Saliva slowly restores the natural balance of the acid in the mouth.

Be certain to brush and floss after consuming any of the sugary treats. Your dentist may offer other strategies to reduce the risk of tooth decay.

Head Back to School Safer and Healthier this Year!

Heading back to school is an exciting time of year for students and families. As students go back to school, it is important that they eat healthy and stay active, are up to date on their immunizations, and know the signs of bullying for a healthier and safer school year.

- Eat healthy and stay active. Our children spend the vast majority of their day at school, so it's a place that can have a big impact in all aspects of their lives. Schools can help students learn about the importance of eating healthier and being more physically active, which can lower the risk of becoming obese and developing related diseases.
- **Prevention works.** The health of students—what they eat and how much physical activity they get—is linked to their academic success. Early research is also starting to show that healthy school lunches may help to lower obesity

rates. Health and academics are linked – so time spent for health is also time spent for learning.

The Dietary Guidelines for Americans recommend that children and adolescents limit their intake of solid fats, cholesterol, sodium, added sugars, and refined grains. Eating a healthy breakfast is associated with improved cognitive function.

Young people aged 6-17 should participate in at least 60 minutes of physical activity every day. Research shows that physical activity can help cognitive skills, attitudes, concentration, attention and improve classroom behavior – so students are ready to learn.

- Get vaccinated. Getting your children and teens ready to go back to school is the perfect time to make sure they are up-to-date with their immunizations. Vaccination protects students from diseases and keeps them healthy.
- Heads Up: Concussions. Each year, U.S. emergency departments treat an estimated 173,285 sports- and recreationrelated traumatic brain injuries, or TBIs, including concussions, among children and teens, from birth to 19 years. A concussion is a type of TBI, caused by a bump, blow, or jolt to the head that can change the way your brain normally works. Concussions can also occur from a fall or a blow to the body that causes the head and brain to move quickly back and forth. Children and teens are more likely to get a concussion and take longer to recover than

adults. Concussion symptoms may appear mild, but the injury can lead to problems affecting how a person thinks, learns, acts, and/or feels. Concussions can occur outside of sports or during any sport or recreation activity, so all parents need to learn the signs and know what to do if a concussion occurs with the ABC's of concussions: Assess the situation, Be alert for signs and symptoms, and Contact a healthcare profes-

• Bullying is a form of youth violence and can result in physical injury and social and emotional distress.

In 2011, 20% of high school students reported being bullied on school property and 16% reported being bullied electronically (cyberbullying).

Victimized youth are at increased risk for mental health problems, including depression and anxiety, psychosomatic complaints such as headaches, and poor school adjustment.

Youth who bully others are at increased risk for substance use, academic problems, and violence later in adolescence and adulthood. The ultimate goal is to stop bullying before it starts. Some school-based prevention methods include a whole school anti-bullying policy, promoting cooperation, improving supervision of students, and using school rules and behavior management techniques in the classroom and throughout the school to detect and address bullying and providing consequences for bullying. Wood-Ridge Fire Chief Kenneth Schulz said, "Today's homes burn faster than ever. You may have as little as two minutes (or even less time) to safely escape a home fire from the time the smoke alarm sounds."

East Rutherford Fire Chief Kevin Felten said, "Your ability to get out of a home during a fire depends on early warning from smoke alarms and advance planning."

Moonachie Fire Chief Jus-

tin Derevyanik encourages all residents to embrace the 2022 Fire Prevention Week theme.

"It's important for everyone to plan and practice a home fire escape. Everyone needs to be prepared in advance, so that they know what to do when the smoke alarm sounds.
