




Explore the cabin of the world's only surviving restored cockpit of the Martin 202 airliner.

On Avoiding Cover-Ups

It's hurricane season! As I write this, the latest - 'Lee' - is looming offshore, a category 4.

Do you recall Sandy and its impact to real estate in our area? I do. Here's a small cautionary tale for home sellers who might have the misfortune of dealing with the aftermath of Lee or other increasingly frequent storm threats.

Shortly after Sandy I spoke to a homeowner whose house was already under contract. Because of the hurricane, however, the inspections were delayed. She told me that they hadn't had any real damage except for some leaking that had caused a ring on a bedroom ceiling. She was willing to fix the ceiling but wasn't about to replace the roof which was less than 10 years old. Everything seemed to be dried out now. Should she disclose the leak, or simply repaint the ceiling and let it go at that...?

My advice to her was simple and emphatic: Disclose, disclose disclose!!!

Attitudes and laws regarding disclosure have shifted over the years. Where once buyers had to assume the responsibility of uncovering defects under the principle of "caveat emptor," or "buyer beware," now the reverse can be true.

In New Jersey, and most other states, sellers must inform buyers of any known material defects-and that includes balky toilets, broken furnaces, and yes, leaky roofs.

The goal is to provide consumers with a realistic idea of the condition of homes, especially regarding items that affect safety or health.

on the lookout for just such cover-ups; but even if he does miss it, he likely will find signs of recent moisture intrusion in your attic. Because a roof leak causes rot and insect infestations, it is far more important that you deal with this issue promptly than the water spot on the bedroom ceiling.

If there's damage to your roof or flashing, you will need to have the damage repaired or offer the buyer a credit at closing to have this done.

If you can't have the roof repaired before the inspector arrives, at least get a reputable roofer's estimate as to what it would cost to fix the leak, so you'll have a realistic price that you can use in negotiations with the buyers. You should share this information with the home inspector. (The good news: If the roof damage was caused by the wind or hail, it's probably covered by your *homeowner's insurance.)*

Another important reason to be upfront with your buyers is that it builds goodwill and trust. That's important because no house is perfect. In the first year or so after the new buyers will move in, they will inevitably find flaws that either you didn't think to mention or the home inspector missed. If you are above-board with them now, the new owners will be more inclined to give you the benefit of the doubt later and assume the cost of the fixes.

But if they think you've been sneaky, they might assume you covered up every problem that they find, and may have more of an incentive to speed-dial their lawyer to make you pay....

After the initial enthusiasm of greeting one another dissipated the Maglionico Family was ready to settle in for a soft and cozy weekend in the country.

After enjoying a hardy breakfast of pancakes and sausage, our cousin, Kenny, invited the five of us upstairs to his bedroom where we listened, like it or not...mostly not...to the clangorous blasts of his trumpet as it forced out the ill-fated tune Venus in Blue Jeans. The notes shot out of his horn like poison darts that ricocheted off the walls and sent a spasm through our ears in their passing.

Having survived that ordeal, Kenny escorted us to what was to be our bedroom for the next couple of days. The room as I recall, consisted of four WWII Army cots equipped with pillows and sheets and a bed with a large dark blue pillow with an embroidered Roy

Rogers and Dale Evans bed spread.

Cousin Kenny informed us that his parents once rented the room to a 50 year old field hand when the farm was still thriving. When his dad told him the bad news about the closing of the dairy farm the poor guy, with little money and nowhere else to live, became despondent and began drinking heavily.

One evening Kenny's Dad came up there to drive him to the train station. He knocked on the door which was slightly ajar. He called out to the man but there was no answer. He entered to find the poor guy lying face down on the bed with an empty bottle of whisky still in his hand.


Observing that the image on the bed did not belong to any of us we bolted out of the room in a chaotic, fear stricken frenzv.

Smile for Halloween

As children, we can all remember the advice from our parents, "don't take candy from strangers." Except, the reality is that on one day per year children are encouraged and permitted to seek and ask for as much candy from others regardless if they know them.

Parents can help ensure the safety of their little costumed trick or treaters by celebrating within their costumes at a party or other group function. A controlled environment may mitigate some of the risk when trick or treating to strangers.

Another risk from the Halloween treats is the effect on the teeth. Sugary treats can cause

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cavities in teeth and result in pain, infections, and tooth loss. Proper brushing and flossing can reduce the affects of sugar on teeth. Some treats are better and some are worse as listed below.

Better

1. Sugar-free lollipops and hard candies: These treats stimulate saliva, which prevents dry mouth. A dry mouth allows plaque to build up on teeth faster, leading to an increased risk of cavities.

2. Sugar-free gum: Chewing gum can actually prevent cavities, not only because it helps to dislodge food particles from the teeth, but also because it increases saliva. Saliva works to neutralize the acids of the mouth and prevent tooth decay. 3. Dark Chocolates: Chocolates are loaded with sugar, but studies have shown that antioxidants in dark chocolate can be good for the heart and may

even lower blood pressure. Just be sure to eat it in moderation. Worse

1. Sugary snacks: Candy corn, cookies, and cake all contain a high amount of sugar which can cause tooth decay.

2. Chewy/ sticky sweets: Gummy candies, taffy, and even dried fruit can be difficult for children and adults to resist, but they are a serious source of tooth decay, particularly when they get stuck in the crevices between teeth and make it nearly impossible for saliva to wash away.

3. Sour candies: High acid levels in these treats can break down tooth enamel quickly. Saliva slowly restores the natural balance of the acid in the mouth.

Be certain to brush and floss after consuming any of the sugary treats. Your dentist may offer other strategies to reduce the risk of tooth decay.

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Hunter's Moon

The October full moon appears on Saturday, October 28, 2023, at 4:24 p.m. It is called the "Hunter's Moon."

It will be below the horizon, so you will have to wait until sunset to watch it rise and take its place in the sky.

As the Moon drifts over the horizon around sunset, it may appear larger and more orange—how perfect for the fall season!

The orange color of a moon near the horizon is a true physical effect. It stems from the fact that, when you look toward the horizon, you're looking through a greater thickness of Earth's atmosphere than when you gaze up and overhead.

This particular full Moon is commonly referred to as the full Hunter's Moon. It is believed that this name originates from the fact that it was a signal for hunters to prepare for the upcoming cold winter by going hunting. This is because animals were beginning to fatten up in preparation for the winter season. Moreover, since fields had recently been cleared out under the Harvest Moon, hunters could easily spot deer and other animals that had come out to search for remaining scraps. Additionally, foxes and wolves would also come out to prey on these animals.

The earliest use of the term "Hunter's Moon," cited in the Oxford English Dictionary, is from 1710. Other names for this moon include "Full Travel Moon," "Full Dying Grass Moon," "Blood Moon" or "Sanguine Moon." ###


