To save money -- conserve energy

Take a look around your home and check for drafts around doors, windows and even electrical outlets. By adding caulk, weather stripping or foam insulation you can block out winter cold -- which means greater comfort for you and your family and less work for your heating system. The New Jersey Department of Community Affairs (DCA) Acting Commissioner, Charles A. Richman, announced 2007 Extraordinary Aid awards. Extraordinary Aid is awarded to municipalities who, because of extreme circumstances, would not be able to provide essential services to their community without a substantial increase in their property tax rate.

Examples of the amounts awarded in this area include: Carlstadt - \$350,000, Hasbrouck Heights - \$150,000, Little Ferry - \$150,000, Moonachie - \$150,000, and Wood-Ridge - \$250,000. ###

FAIR Rebate Deadline Extended to Oct. 31st

Deadline for filing FAIR Rebate applications has been extended to October 31, 2007.

The FAIR Rebate Program provides rebates for New Jersey resident homeowners and tenants who occupied their principal residence in New Jersey on October 1, 2006, paid property taxes on that dwelling either directly or through rent, and whose gross income for the entire year does not exceed certain limits.

Homeowners and tenants file different applications according to their status on October 1, 2006.

If you were a homeowner on October 1, 2006, a 2006 FAIR Homeowner Rebate application was mailed to you by July 2007. Homeowners do not file Form TR-1040, doing so will delay the payment of your homeowner rebate. Eligibility includes having a gross income for 2006 of \$200,000 or less, subject to local property taxes. The 2006 property taxes must have been paid.

If you were a tenant on October 1, 2006, file a Form TR-1040, FAIR Tenant Rebate application, contained in the 2006 resident income tax return booklet. Eligibility includes: your principal residence is subject to local property taxes and property taxes were paid through rent, residence is a full living unit with separate kitchen and bathroom and your gross income for 2006 was \$100,000 or less.

If you were neither a homeowner nor a tenant on October 1, 2006, you are not eligible for a 2006 FAIR Rebate, even if you owned a home or rented a qualified dwelling for part of the year.





The event was dampened on August 4th, when a water crisis forced many food establishments to close. (See story on page 14)




Tribute to Deacon Art

One way to determine the impact a person has on the lives of others is to review what they have done with their lives and how they are revered after their death.

Deacon Arthur John Cauceglia was a family man; a man who fulfilled his responsibilities as a father, grandfather and great-grandfather. He was also a religious man; a man who wanted to be more involved in his Church; a man who wanted to give his time to the service of his God. The passage that best describes Deacon Art is from Psalm 112:1 "Happy is the person who honors the Lord; who takes pleasure in obeying his commands."

Deacon Arthur was ordained a Deacon of the Catholic Church in 1981. He served as Deacon for the past 26 years. He was first assigned to St. Francis Church in Hackensack

and, later in 1993, added another parish; the Assumption R.C. Church in Wood-Ridge. He ministered to both parishes until his death on July 20th. Every Friday, Deacon Art visited Hackensack University Medical Center where he ministered to the sick. Before he served as Deacon at Assumption Church, he was a parishioner there, played the bass fiddle at the Folk Masses.

Before one can become a Deacon, he must complete five years of training. After he is ordained, he can do everything a priest can do except celebrate Mass, hear confessions and anoint the sick.

Father Brian Cullinane, Pastor at Assumption, stated, "He was a very gifted man, a man with great insight, and, as we all know, a man who loved to talk. His anecdotes, his personal stories, and his family – he loved to share them with one and all."

Deacon Art was married to Rosalie (nee Pizzulo) for 59 years. He was a World War II Veteran and a member of numerous clubs and organizations. Before he retired in 1981, he was employed as a methods engineer for Kearfott Company of Little Falls.

Deacon Art served as the Chaplain of both the Wood-Ridge Fire Department and the Holy Name Society of Assumption Church and Affiliate of the Franciscan First Order.

Aside from his wife, Deacon Art leaves behind his children Valeria Azuma, Julian, Lucian, Andrea Maloney, Damian and Daria Skorupa, eighteen grandchildren and four great-grandchildren. Story by Peter Gallo Jr. ###



Fire Prevention Week It's time for Fire Prevention Week. From October 7-13 the Wood-Ridge Fire Department

is joining forces with the nonprofit National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) to remind local residents to "Practice Your Escape Plan." During this year's fire safety campaign, firefighters and safety advocates will be spreading the word about the dangers of home fires and teaching local residents how to plan and practice escape from a home in case a fire occurs.

Being alerted to a fire and knowing what to do to escape from one are extremely important, yet only 23% of households have planned and practiced a home fire escape

Fire Chief Tony Gentile stated, "Sometimes there are only seconds to escape, but there's no question that having a plan in place that has been practiced saves precious time and makes survival more likely. We hope that Fire Prevention Week will prompt folks in our community to plan and practice their escape."

Although it's difficult to prepare for the unexpected, reviewing the information below and taking action based on it to plan for a fire is strongly recommended... and don't forget to practice your escape plan during Fire Prevention Week!

- Install working smoke alarms on every level and inside and outside of each sleeping area.
- Develop a fire escape plan that identifies two ways out of each room and have a family meeting place outside.
- Make sure your plan allows for any specific needs in

your household. If everyone knows what to do, everyone can get out quickly.

• Practice using the plan at least twice a year.

Some studies have shown that some children and adults may not awaken to the sound of a smoke alarm; they may need help waking up.

If the smoke alarm sounds: Go to your closest exit, and if you run into smoke, turn and use another way out. If you must exit through smoke, get low and go under the smoke to your exit. Don't take time to pick up belongings; just get out and help others get out. Move fast, but stay calm.

For 85 years, fire departments have observed Fire Prevention Week, making it the longest running public health and safety observance on record. ###

HHPD Reminds Drivers About School Traffic

As the new school year begins, Lt. Thomas Archer reminds drivers: "There are 14 school crossing locations in town. All have advance school crossing signs which are lime green in color."

School crossing guards are present during school days between 7:45 a.m. to 8:45 a.m.; 11:30 a.m. to 1:30 p.m. and 2:30 p.m. to 3:30 p.m.

School crossing guards wear lime green vests and hold portable stop signs.

Drivers should exercise caution at these locations, especially during inclement weather and periods of sun glare.

Dropping students off at schools:

• At schools, Lt. Archer reminds drivers not to park in the yellow zones or double park

-- especially during inclement weather, letting off or taking on passengers in moving traffic.

- Do not park in designated drop off zones at dismissal
- At Corpus Christi School, don't park in the Minit-Mart
- When dropping off or picking up students at the Jr./ Sr. High School main entrance at The Boulevard, do not park in the yellow zone, at the bus stop or double park on The Boulevard.
- At the LaSalle Avenue entrance, no parking, dropping off or picking up students in the yellow zone where no parking or no standing signs are posted. This violation creates a hazard for students and impedes Boulevard/LaSalle traffic flow.

- Use the specially designated drop off zone in the morning that is clearly marked by traffic cones from 7:30 a.m. to 8:30 a.m.
- Paterson Avenue entrance, no double parking. No "K" turns to avoid Paterson/ Boulevard intersection.

"School's Open--**Drive Carefully!"**

Lt. Archer also stated that, "The greatest threat children face today is motor vehicle crashes."

To help protect children, motorists should follow these safety tips:

- · Slow down near schools and in residential areas.
- · Drive with your headlights on - even during the day - so children and other drivers can see you.
- · Look for clues such as School Safety Patrollers, bicycles and playgrounds that indicate children could be in the area.

This was a full time summer day camp which means children stayed through lunch with their counselors until 3:30 p.m.



Water Emergency Puts Heights & Moonachie FD's on Standby

The Hasbrouck Heights Crash/Foam Truck (holds 1,500 gallongs) and Moonachie's Tanker (holds 1,500 gallons) were placed on standby by the Mutual Aid Zone 2 Coordinator to support area fire departments.

Problems at the Haworth Water Treatment Plant following lightning strikes during a storm on Friday, August 3, 2007 caused a water emergency. One bolt struck just outside the water treatment plant, followed by a direct hit shutting down its back-up generators.

"Lightning affected power provided by PSE&G. One of the two electric lines that feed the plant was disabled by a broken utility pole, and the other by a fallen tree," said PSEG spokesman Claude Sikavi.

Power to the treatment plant was cut for nearly 12 hours, with power fully restored about 3:00 p.m. Saturday.

"With the Haworth Water Treatment Plant unable to process any water, all that remained was in the system's pipes and storage tanks," said United Water spokesman Rich Henning. He said it wasn't clear how much that was, but it would rapidly run out if residents continued to use water at the typical rate of 150 million to 160 million gallons per day.

The Hasbrouck Heights Police Department alerted resi-

The Hasbrouck Heights dents by phone using Reverse sh/Foam Truck (holds 1,500 911. The HHPD visited every food establishment in town ker (holds 1,500 gallons) early Saturday morning.

Moonachie Police Department used Reverse 911 for notifications and placed a variable message board at the intersection of Moonachie Road and Joseph Street. All restaurants were given a written notice on the restrictions (*The Graycliff had three weddings Saturday*).


"Absolutely no outdoor water use," said Jim Glozzy, vice president and general manager of United Water New Jersey. "We must save water for health and safety purposes including fire protection." Authorities told car washes and restaurants to close.

United Water customers may have had discolored water, low water pressure or no water. Officials issued a boil water advisory for its 200,000+ customers (est. 800,000 residents).

The outdoor water usage advisory was lifted Sunday and the boil water advisory was lifted late Monday, August 6, 2007.

Emergency officials stated that this crisis brought to light certain issues which are being addressed. ###

Variable Weather Will Continue

The highest temperature in Hasbrouck Heights during the month of August was a hot 95 degrees on August 2. The lowest temperature was a chilly 55 degrees on August 11 and again on August 21.

We had a pretty decent amount of rain but nothing extreme... I measured about 5" for the month. Some severe weather moved through. On one such morning, August 8th, a strong thunderstorm moved through our area of Hasbrouck Heights, Moonachie, Teterboro. and Wood-Ridge. We had some gusty winds and heavy rain from that "cell" but we lucked out, actually.

The same weather system that produced the scattered severe thunderstorms, produced a thunderstorm that spawned a tornado over Brooklyn that morning!

Anyway, we will continue our up and down type weather pattern as we head into September. Daytime highs will still reach around 90 degrees at times during the first week of September BUT also, some occasional invasions of cooler and drier air from Canada.

Watch for some severe thunderstorms during that time-frame. Overall, some increasingly cooler intrusions of air will form in Canada and come down into our area by mid to late month. This is typical for this time of year.

We will continue to watch the tropics as we head now into "peak hurricane season" which is September into October. So far, so good in that most systems have remained to our south. But, Mother Nature has a tendency to pull some surprises. Hasbrouck Heights resident Dan Ventola is a meteorologist and President of The National Weather Station with its main location at Teterboro Airport.

Lenox Recovers Jet

The Aviation Hall of Fame a four point lift. (AHOF) received a 36 foot long, 12,500 lb. forward fuselage of a Convair 880 (N803TW) on Tuesday, August 7, 2007. It was transported from Atlantic City Airport by Lenox Corporation. Bill Lenox started working on this project with the AHOF in November 2006.

The Convair 880 was sitting on a homemade trailer that was being moved around the Atlantic City Airport for over ten years. Now it was forced to be removed.

Before the move, Bill consulted with the AHOF, Teterboro, the agents who owned the 880 and Mike Bent at AvPorts, AC Airport.

On Monday, August 6, 2007, Lenox had to prepare the AHOF area so that the aircraft could be positioned. This required moving the Sikorsky HH-52A Sea Guardian helicopter and the single engine Lockheed Bush Master into the AHOF parking lot.

At 7:30 a.m., Tuesday, August 7, 2007, Recovery Supervisor, Bill Lenox and his Recovery Tech, met with the crane/operator, double drop decked stretch trailer with driver and a certified escort service at a staging area at the Atlantic City Airport.

Mike Bent of AvPorts AC, provided escort into the airport and to the location of the 880.

Deciding upon a high lift technique, the 880 was harnessed with two 30-foot and four 20-foot straps. This method disperses the weight and strain on the plane as not to cause damage during lifting.

Once the center of gravity was established, it was lifted, rotated, placed on the trailer and set at an angle for the lowest height possible for transportation. The aircraft was secured and departed AC Airport at about 11 a.m.

A NJ State Certified escort coordinated the routing with the state as to which roads and at what times the 14' 4" load could travel. The route included Rt. 30, Rt. 70, I-30, Rt. 1, I-287, I-80, exiting at Green Street, left onto North Street, right on Huyler, crossing Rt. 46 to Fred Wehran Drive.

The Convair 880 fuselage arrived at the AHOF at about 3:30 p.m. and was partially positioned. That night, 2-3/4 inches of rain fell creating a muddy situation for the final move the next day.

On Wednesday, August 8, 2007 at the AHOF, Lenox was set-up with a Recovery Supervisor and four Recovery Techs with 45 ton, 30 ton, 25 ton and 20 ton cranes to accommodate

A fence was removed, the trailer was moved into the outside display area and winched into a spot between the four cranes so they could do a four point basket lift.

They lifted the 880 about 20 feet high and removed the trailer. While in the air, the 880 was rotated mid-air into an upright position then lowered onto stands. The complete move was conducted with no damage to the aircraft.

Bill Lenox and his father, James Jr., have been working with the airport since the 50's. Earlier incidents included single engine aircraft flipping from wind storms, wind shear problems, etc.

Because of their proximity and timely response, Lenox currently handles incidents that may occur at Teterboro Airport employing air cushion recovery systems, specialized dollies and hydraulic cranes. These include aircraft stuck in the mud, gear failure, flat tires, etc.

Notably, Lenox handled a G4 that went off a runway 300 yards in December 2005. The Port Authority had to build a temporary road to get a 300-ton crane to the scene.

During recovery efforts, Bill's main issue is safety on the scene. He said that 90% of the time the aircraft is not damaged and his concern is not to create damage during recovery.

During aircraft recovery, he communicates with the Port Authority, AvPorts, FBO's, owners/agents, insurance companies, FAA, NTSB, HAZMAT, etc.

Lenox Corporation is a third generation towing and recovery firm located in Hasbrouck Heights and Moonachie, New Jersey.

Bill's grandfather, James Lenox, started the business in 1912. Lenox is the third oldest towing firm in the nation. Bill said, "Dad was first on the NJ Turnpike northern section in the late 50's."

Lenox does work for the State, Bergen County and nine municipalities, handling Rt. 80, Rt. 17, Rt. 46, Rt. 3 and Rt. 120.

They handle everything from disabled autos to overloaded trailers that have rolled over on the highways. (NJ State legal limit is 80,000 pounds.)

They have worked over 25,000 vehicle recoveries in the last 30 years. Lenox Corp. is a family operated business with Bill, Corry, Barbara, Darlene and Millie. They currently have 23 employees. Photos provided by Lenox Corp. ###







Handicap Accessible Park Comfort Station Dedicated

Community Access for All Committee dedicated the new comfort station in Woodland Park on August 5, 2007.

The new brick comfort station is fully handicap accessible with extra wide doors, mobility space for wheelchairs, oversized stalls and new safety lighting.

The facility also has baby changing stations. The rear of the building has storage facilities for senior and sports activities

The original wooden comfort station was put up by the Hasbrouck Heights Lions Club about 85 years ago. It was dismantled by the DPW at a savings of about \$6,000.

In addition to making Woodland Park more handicap accessible, a new drop off at the parking lot and ramp to the pavilion with new drainage, was also constructed.

The project to make Woodland Park more handicap accessible was started a couple of years ago by Patrick McCarthy and Eric Bischoff.

The cost for the comfort station and ramp package was \$188,000. It was funded by a \$116,800 NJ State Community Development Grant; the grants person was Rose Marie Heck. The Borough provided the balance.

Community Access for All is a grass-roots, non-political Hasbrouck Heights organization dedicated to improving handicap access. Its charter allows for 19 members and states that 25% have to be disabled or caretaker of a disabled person.

According to President Patrick McCarthy, its goal is to improve accessibility through awareness. He cites this Woodland Park example that began last year. Typical picnic tables are not wheelchair accessible. With awareness and at no additional cost, picnic tables that accommodate

wheelchairs at each end, are now purchased when they need to be replaced.

What is Medicare prescription drug coverage?

Medicare prescription drug coverage is insurance that covers both brand-name and generic prescription drugs at participating pharmacies in your area. Medicare prescription drug coverage provides protection for people who have very high drug costs or from unexpected prescription drug bills in the future.

•Who can get Medicare prescription drug coverage?

Everyone with Medicare is eligible for this coverage, regardless of income and resources, health status, or current prescription expenses.

• When can I get Medicare prescription drug coverage?

You may sign up when you first become eligible for Medicare (three months before the month you turn age 65 until three months after you turn age 65).

Your decision about Medicare prescription drug coverage depends on the kind of health care coverage you have now.

There are two ways to get Medicare prescription drug coverage. You can join a Medicare prescription drug plan or you can join a Medicare Advantage Plan or other Medicare Health Plan that offers drug coverage.

Whatever plan you choose, Medicare drug coverage will help you by covering brandname and generic drugs at pharmacies that are convenient for you.

Like other insurance, if you join, generally you will pay a monthly premium, which varies by plan, and a yearly deductible (between \$0-\$265 in 2007).

You will also pay a part of the cost of your prescriptions, including a co-payment. Costs will vary depending on which drug plan you choose. Some plans may offer more coverage and additional drugs for a higher monthly premium.

Medicare prescription drug coverage provides greater peace of mind by protecting you from unexpected drug expenses. Even if you don't use a lot of prescription drugs now, you should still consider joining.

As we age, most people need prescription drugs to stay healthy. For most people, joining now means protection from unexpected prescription drug bills in the future.

• What if I have limited income and resources?

There is extra help for people with limited income and resources. Almost 1 in 3 people with Medicare will qualify for extra help. If you qualify for extra help, Medicare will pay for almost all of your prescription drug costs.

Salt Water Warning

You can't see it, can't taste it and officials say there's nothing they can do about it.

United Water Company (NJ) has been sending notices out to its customers warning that the sodium level in the water supply is higher than it should be.

Customers with high blood pressure and other medical conditions requiring salt-restricted diets should consult their doctors.

For healthy individuals this is not a concern. The amount detected in the water is still low compared to the sodium amounts people consume in many foods.

State guidelines recommend no more than 50 milligrams per liter of sodium in water. When United Water tests found 70 milligrams, environmental officials required them to send the warning letters.

United Water blames the rock salt spread on roads in the winter. The salt washes into storm drains and reservoirs.

Sodium -- the main ingredient in the rock salt spread on streets as well as table salt -- is not a serious contaminant. ###

A video was shown on how the predecessors of the current membership worked, before they even had the right to vote, to preserve the beauty of the Palisades. The Center then presented each Club President and all the State Board members in attendance with a copy of the book "Past and Promise – Lives of New Jersey Women." It is described as a book that explores the lives and work of nearly 300 New Jersey women from the Colonial period to the present. Included are biographies of notable



individuals and less celebrated women whose vibrant personal stories illustrate the richness of women's experiences in New Jersey.

The Contemporary Club has contributed to the support of the Center that serves mostly low and moderate-income populations, including single parents, displaced homemakers and dislocated workers through grant-funded, free or low cost programs and services. Start with your heating system. Have a heating professional do a routine-check before cold weather arrives.

Clean or replace filters on your furnace once a month or as needed. Vacuum the vents and other heating components.

Clean warm-air registers, baseboard heaters and radiators. Make sure they are not blocked by furniture, carpeting, drapes, etc. Place heatresistant radiator reflectors between exterior walls and the radiators.

Turn your thermostats down to 68 degrees or below. Reduce the setting to 55 degrees before going to sleep or leaving for the day. Consider installing a setback thermostat. (For each one degree you turn down the thermostat in the winter, you'll save up to 5% on

- When lifting heavy bags of mulch, use a wheelbarrow when possible, and remember to lift with your legs, not with your back.
- Be careful when pruning. Pruning from a ladder is especially dangerous.
- To avoid blisters when doing yard work, wear gloves.
- If you are doing a lot of raking, try an ergonomic rake, which can be found at most hardware stores and garden centers. ###

Test your home for airtightness. On a windy day, hold a lit incense stick (or a ribbon) next to your doors, windows, electrical boxes/outlets, etc.

If the smoke stream travels horizontally, you have located an air leak that needs to be caulked, sealed or weatherstripped. Install rubber or foam gaskets behind outlets and switchplates on exterior walls.

Look for dirty spots in your insulation -- an indication where air leaks into and out of your home. Add insulation as needed.

Have your chimney inspected and cleaned. When the fireplace is not in use, keep the flue damper tightly closed. If not, heat escapes 24 hours a day -- it's like a 48" window wide



Back to Jamaica

Father Brad stopped to ask me a question. "Would you be one of the team leaders for next year's trip?"

As one of the leaders, it was part of our responsibilities to hold the information sessions about the trip and get people to apply. My co-team leader, Joe, and I interviewed over 70 students for only 18 positions.

Everything on the island was the same as it was the year before. We passed the large factories, the construction, the tin houses, the city dump, and saw all of the poverty.

Our first full day in Jamaica was spent in the mountains at a town called "Above Rocks." The Franciscans have a parish up there, St. Mary's, where we helped out last year. This year we spent the whole day with the youth group.

At the very beginning of the day, when we first arrived in the mountains, both our team and the youth group gathered in the recreation room. We played a few icebreaker games and it almost seemed like we were not to celebrate two of our teammates' birthdays by having real Jamaica jerk chicken and festivals, a type of sweet bread.

The following day we went to Mass at Stella Maris where Father Brad knows the pastor, Father Michael Lewis. He also went to Catholic University, but is originally from Jamaica.

After Mass we went to St. Monica's, which is a home for the abandoned elderly.

Sure enough, I saw Anne and Gladys sitting in their corner; Lloyd was there as well as both Martins. I saw the women from last year who couldn't speak. They were still sitting in the same positions as last year.

Anne remembered our group and was so happy when I said that I remembered her birthday. Gladys had just celebrated her birthday the week before. Martin also remembered our group and after a few minutes of recollecting about the songs we sang last year, he began to play his harmonica. We sang "Good Night Irene."

Cunningham was still there in his wheelchair writing and writing. When he was done, he would give one of my teammates something he had copied; usually a passage from the Bible or classic novel.

There was one woman there who I will never forget. Her name is Adina McDerpletely blind and her hearing

excited that someone came to visit her. I sat on the edge of her bed, held her hand and stroked her arm.

It is amazing what physical touch can do to a person. All of a sudden Adina came alive and was telling me about her husband, asking if I had a husband or children, telling me about her life in Jamaica and how she has never left Kingston.

All of her children have died, as well as her husband, but she kept on spelling her last name over and over again. The moment that really got me was when she asked if we could sing, and we sang "Amazing Grace" and then started praying afterwards.

This woman is deeply religious despite all of the ailments and trials in her life. I didn't want to leave, but our day was drawing to a close and I had to say goodbye. I will never forget Adina McDermott.

On Monday our group divided up among the three schools run by the St. Patrick's Foundation. There is a high school, a middle school, and a 3-6 year old school.

Six of us went to the little kid school in Riverton, literally the city dump. When we got there. we found out that three of us had to go to another school, "Callalloo." Annie, Andrew, and I walked out of the town, across the highway, and through another small town to the school.

I worked in the room with the 4-year olds and read stories to them, and helped with sounding out letters and counting. These children were so precious and so innocent.

Very little learning actually went on during school because it was a two room schoolhouse with 50+3-6 year olds.

There were older kids smoking pot right outside the school and this did not faze anyone at the school because it is so common.

One of my friends, Nick, went to the high school and tutored the boys. Nick was showing them pictures of the our team and they pointed me out, saying that they recognized me. These were two of the three boys I had tutored a year earlier. When Nick told me this I knew I had to go to the high school the next day.

I spent some time talking with the boys, but most of my time was spent tutoring some girls in the class. They were both 16 and one of them just had a baby.

We went back to Riverton and painted some houses. The kids who live there took us on a tour of their town and to the river where they swim.

The kids were still swimming in the same crocodileinfested river, still scrounging through the same garbage to find food or something to sell, and still wandering around.

Having the opportunity to go on this mission trip twice has been literally life changing. Now I am searching for the place I am meant to go to. I would love to return to Jamaica to do a year of service, but I am also thinking about going to Africa.

All of these dreams have formed because of this trip to Jamaica. Being able to go on this trip again was an incredible experience, one which only could have been possible with the grace of God, and one which I will never forget. ###

The Church has actively supported this ministry since its inception. The Church was invited by its directors, Pastor Joseph Jehu-Appiah and his wife, Andrea, to conduct ten days of ministry.

The team would paint the new children's dormitory and conduct an afternoon Vacation Bible School for the children in the area.

Understanding not only the hardships involved in rural Ghana, but also understanding the ministry potential, thirteen adults and two teens willingly gave up their vacation time to be a part of the team. Team members were Rey Arias, Nina Braciliano, Ken Dolph, Monica Gundran, Casey LaRosa, Chelsea LaRosa, Melanie Leslie, Jerry Matawa, Jane Sparling, and Maryanne Viscomi. Hasbrouck Heights residents included Glenn Evans, Bill Hegedus, P.J. Lapera, Matthew Marinelli, and Eileen Otano.

Upon arrival in Ghana, the team assessed the facilities they would be using for the anticipated three to five hundred children attending the Vacation Bible School.

It quickly was realized that there was not adequate space for the children. It was decided that the children should be divided into two groups. Each child would attend an outdoor assembly and also attend an indoor class time.

July 30th was the first day of the anticipated Vacation Bible School. Expecting the three to five hundred children the team was quite surprised to have nine hundred fifty children attend.

The team had to swiftly

redesign their plans to accommodate the needs of the unexpected number of children. Since most children did not speak English, translators also had to be assigned.

Each day the numbers increased. Although the team of fifteen people felt that they were unable to adequately minister to the spiritual needs of such large groups of children, the children were unaware that anything might be missing. The children were happy and excited to be there singing the songs and seeing the puppets.


By Friday, August 3rd, the number of children attending had grown to over two thousand one hundred, with many children unable to attend due to lack of transportation.

As if the number of children attending wasn't enough of a challenge, the team faced an attack of bees and a poisonous viper slithering through the outdoor assembly. The stings were attended to, the bees were dispersed and the viper was quickly incapacitated.

The team was also able to help paint the newly constructed dormitory to be used to house handicapped children as they come to get an education.

Due to time constraints and lack of electricity the team was not able to complete all the physical labor they wanted to, but they were able to leave the missionaries money to cover the expense of hiring the labor to complete the job.

When the team returned to Hasbrouck Heights, they came back with a completely new philosophy on life. They had seen poverty at its deepest level. They had endured heat and high humidity, bugs in abundance, electrical blackouts, times without water to bathe, diet changes, lizards, snakes and bees. They realized that each team member had seemingly been "hand picked" by God to address the overwhelming situations that occurred.







Some team members had administrative skills, some were teachers, one was a nurse, another a policeman, some had musical talent, and some just wanted to serve wherever needed.

Each team member came back with a renewed gratitude for things like a warm shower and air conditioning. They realized that they are very blessed. However, not one person doubted that their needs had been met. The one thing that they all felt that they learned with a completely new meaning was the Bible verse found in Philippian 4:13... Reflections

Refreshment and Challenge

Since I write this in the middle of August, I am alert to the fact that summer is a welcome time of refreshment.

Indeed I can report that I've experienced that refreshment first hand. This year I've been especially appreciative of the vacation time that I've had this summer.

I've even used the word "magical" to describe it and so it was, for any number of reasons. If I'm allowed to be slightly parochial on this page, I should say that one of these reasons was this: I was proud of Holy Trinity's international "stars," Omaldo and Sonia Pérez, who gave a benefit concert in a beautiful open air theater—Sonia singing and Omaldo, Holy Trinity's cantor, accompanying her on the piano-in Elounda, Crete, on behalf of an institute for children with disabilities.

In introducing them, the host mentioned their association with Hasbrouck Heights several times! It may not have meant anything to the audience, but it sounded important—at least to us!

If summer is a time of refreshment, I am also alert to this: it is a time for contemplative reflection on how God is calling us to live and serve together.

The scripture readings of the Common Lectionary for our Christian assemblies during this season after Pentecost challenge us to think about and to act on the divine summons to mission and service.

The readings are filled with ch and varied expressions of lives deeply related to God and the consequences of that relationship for daily life.

Mary W. Anderson, in brief commentaries on some of the summer readings for the journal "Currents in Theology and Mission," uses an interesting word to describe what the Biblical witness calls for in our lives.

She uses the word "realignment"—that is, to realign our lives in the direction suggested by the prayer appointed in my tradition for Sunday, August 5: to love what is truly worth loving, to reject what is offensive to God, and to treasure what is ultimately important.



This program is open to all adults 18 years or older. Minors may be tested with parental consent.



So Happy to be Here!

I am Rev. Thomas Wisniewski, better known as Father Tom, the new addition to the priestly clergy serving the people at Corpus Christi Church, here in Hasbrouck Heights.

It is a homecoming of sorts, but it's a little complicated. My birthplace was Jersey City, July 7, 1954. For the first 21 years of my life that is where I lived and attended school, including my Bachelor's in accounting from Saint Peter's College in 1976.

In March of 1976, our family moved to Hasbrouck Heights which is where my parents, Frank and Irene, still reside.

My sister, Judy, lives with her two children, Kirsten and Jon, in nearby River Edge.

The reason I qualify it as a partial homecoming is I only lived in Hasbrouck Heights for six months before beginning seminary in Mahwah at Immaculate Conception, where I received an M Div Degree.

From 1980-1996 I served in a number of pastoral assignments, including three in Bergen County.

During this time I also received a Doctor of Ministry Degree from Drew University.

In my earliest days of ministry I spent almost all my time with teenagers and young adults.

There is so much energy and all that potential that lies ahead at that stage of life. I was determined to get out a message that Jesus Christ is not only real, He's the best thing you can do for your life. The 80's were exciting times in Bergen County youth ministry and I felt fortunate to be a part of it.

My conviction with both young and old is that most of us need a conversion experience, something that brings us into real relationship with Jesus.

Without that, I think it is hard to make religion a vital part of your every day life. I especially enjoy retreat work and it's during events like that, where conversion happens over and over again.

If I could encourage most people to do something good for themselves it would be to go on a retreat, adults have Cursillo and the youth have Antioch, SEARCH as well as parish retreats being offered in many places.

Finally, in 1996, I had the opportunity to become a pastor at Saint Joseph's in Maplewood, an experience that broadened my vision of ministry into many more areas. Also, I was able to use some of my accounting background in doing the necessary administrative work needed in a small parish with modest economic means.

It is there that I became convinced that the most important work we can do as clergy is to be welcoming. For the first three years in Maplewood my staff and I simply built community. It was truly rewarding to hear visitors comment on how friendly our Church was to strangers. Isn't that what Jesus emphasized?

In the past three years I fulfilled another lifelong dream -- to teach college full time. As a professor of Theology at the College of Saint Elizabeth in Morristown, I concentrated on Scripture and Christian ethics. Once again, I was surrounded by youthful enthusiasm willing to learn and to discover what their faith meant as young women. It was a great opportunity and something I will always cherish.

Yet, despite my joy, I also came to realize that my first calling is parish.

This is the front line of real life and there are so many things people contend with each and every day and I believe that faith is a critical ingredient to finding integrity and an inner peace most of us crave so much.

There are many ministries I hope to impact during my time at Corpus Christi and we are still figuring out what some of those directions might be.

Two things I will immediately plunge into will be to work with the new youth ministry team as we try to build a

youth community and to use my love of teaching to do some adult education.


This fall I hope to offer a series on the Old Testament beginning in October.
