

Failure to do so will result in a fine, mandatory court appearance and possible loss of license.

The first offense fine is not less than \$100, and/or imprisonment or community service not more than 15 days -- with higher penalties for subsequent offenses. The NJ Division of Motor Vehicle will also assess 5 M.V. points. ###





WRFD Urges Area Residents to "Prevent Home Fires"

A pot holder too close to a lit burner or a space heater left on overnight could be all it takes to start a home fire. In fact, cooking and heating are among the leading causes of home fires in the United States, according to the nonprofit National Fire Protection Association (NFPA).

That's why the Wood-Ridge Fire Department is teaming up with NFPA from October 5-11 to urge area residents to "Prevent Home Fires."

This year's campaign focuses on preventing all the leading causes of home fires – cooking, heating and electrical equipment, and smoking materials.

Additionally, fire safety educators will be teaching local residents how to plan and practice escape from a home in case a fire occurs.

According the latest research from NFPA, more than 2,500 people died in home fires in the United States in 2006, and 12,500 were injured. Fire departments responded to 396,000 home fires, which accounted for 80% of civilian deaths and 76% of injuries that year.

"While the number of home fires is daunting, the good news is that many are easily preventable when residents take simple steps to increase their safety from fire," said W-R Fire Chief Tony Gentile. "Whether it's smoking outside the home, keeping space heaters at least three feet away from anything that can burn, or staying in the kitchen when you are using the stovetop, there are easy things you can do to keep your home and family safe from fire." Do you know how to keep

your home safe from fire hazards? Reviewing the following information and taking action can help you "Prevent Home Fires" during Fire Prevention Week and year-round.

• Cooking: Stay in the kitchen when you are frying, grilling, or broiling food. If you leave the kitchen for even a short period time, turn off the stove.

• Heating: Keep all things that can burn, such as paper, bedding or furniture, at least 3 feet away from heating equipment.

• Electrical: Replace cracked and damaged electrical cords; use extension cords for temporary wiring only. Consider having additional circuits or receptacles added by a qualified electrician.

• Smoking: If you smoke, smoke outside; wherever you smoke, use deep, sturdy ashtrays.

Fire Prevention Week is actively supported by fire departments across the country. For 85 years fire departments have observed Fire Prevention Week, making it the longest running public health and safety observance on record.





Information About DWI

"New Jersey's drunk driving laws are among the toughest in the nation," said Pam Fischer, Director of the Division of Highway Traffic Safety.

Attorney Frank T. Luciano Esq. provided this information regarding DWI.

• The penalties for a DWI offense will be more than doubled if the offense occurred within 1000 feet of a school zone or a school crossing that is protected by an ordinance or where children are actually present.

• It is no defense to a schoolzone case to say that the offense occurred in the middle of July, on a Sunday at 3:00 p.m., when school was out. In essence, the legislature has created a 24 hour, seven-day-a-week safe haven for school children.


• If you are a second offender under the DWI statute, there will be a mandatory jail sentence of between 48 consecutive hours and 90 days.

• If you are a third offender under the DWI statute, there will be a mandatory jail sentence of 90 days.

• If a minor is in your car while you are intoxicated, in addition to a DWI, you will be charged with a Disorderly Persons Offense, which is a criminal offense. If your intoxication level is elevated, you can be charged with an indictable offense involving the endangerment of a minor.

• Never try to elude a police officer who is attempting to pull you over if you are intoxicated. That conduct is an indictable offense and can lead to a mandatory prison term.



Jr. Police Academy Starts With a Bang



At the end of June, thirtythree newly graduated eighth graders started their summer off with a bang – literally.

These adventurous children comprised the ninth recruit class of the Hasbrouck Heights Junior Police Academy.

For five days, the recruits took part in training that mirrors the regimen a real police recruit undergoes while in the academy.

The junior academy combines informational presentations with realistic hands-on activities.





The week began at Depken Field, where the class was given their orientation, which included physical training and instruction in drill and ceremony.

Later that day, the class took a trip to Teterboro Airport, where the Port Authority Police (PAPD) gave the recruits a tour of their facility.

Even though inclement weather cancelled a planned flyby of the PAPD's helicopter, the recruits were still able to climb inside one of the airport's high-tech fire trucks and see its capabilities firsthand.

The first day also introduced the recruits to the importance of teamwork in law enforcement, with the class taking part in various teambuilding exercises.

The rest of the academy had the recruits learning about various aspects of police work. Instructors from the Olympic Karate Institute presented an outstanding program that





coupled hands-on self-defense techniques with a lesson in respect and personal safety. Sergeant Joseph Rinke taught the class how to conduct a motor vehicle stop and then proceeded to let the recruits play the role of police officer in mock traffic stops, while he acted as the driver who had been pulled over.

He also conducted a firearms demonstration that clearly illustrated the capabilities of shotguns and pistols, while emphasizing the need to exercise caution and common sense around weapons.

The first "bang" to kick off the recruits' summer came courtesy of the Bergen County Bomb Squad.

Both the recruits and officers braved a steady rain to see the equipment – including a robot – regularly used by the bomb squad. The demonstration ended with the detonation of a jug filled with Jello.

The second (and loudest) "bang" of the academy came when the Lyndhurst Police Department's Special Response Unit (SRU) paid a visit. While the recruits were in Franklin School Gym discussing their experience conducting the motor vehicle stops, the SRU detonated a "flash-bang" grenade outside the gym and assaulted the room.

Looks of shock and sur-

prise were quickly replaced with smiles as the Lyndhurst officers introduced themselves and showed the recruits their gear.

The class also took a trip to the Bergen County Sheriff's Department Bureau of Criminal Identification, where they learned what it's like to be a real CSI.

In addition to touring the facility, the recruits were given demonstrations of various methods of lifting fingerprints and the ballistic water tank, which is used as part of certain tests performed on bullets.

Recruit Class 9 also heard presentations by the Drug Enforcement Administration and Federal Bureau of Investigation.

They participated in a simulated drunk driving scenario



using a golf cart and Fatal Vision Goggles, which replicate some of the physical effects of driving under the influence.

Quiet Flying at TEB Recognized

Teterboro Airport (TEB) will be presenting its "Good Neighbor Awards" at the NBAA Convention in Orlando, Florida in October 2008.

The program honors individuals and companies for "quiet flying" at TEB, and awards will be given to a record number of recipients this year.

To qualify for an award, operators must adhere to Teterboro Airport's voluntary restraints regarding late-night and Stage 2 jet operations and not have received any violations under the airport's mandatory noise rules. This year's ceremony will recognize recipients for 2006 and 2007.

"There's no better venue than the annual convention of the National Business Aviation Association to present our Good Neighbor Awards," said Rich Heslin, Airport Manager at Teterboro Airport, for the Port Authority of New York and New Jersey, the airport's owner. "There is harmony in the two events as the general aviation community gathers to share its common interests, including good community relations."

Heslin has assigned management staff from the airport's office for Noise and Environmental Compliance to attend the NBAA convention and present the awards during a press conference scheduled for October 6 at 2:00 p.m.

"We can't wait to make the presentations because the award criteria are not just challenging, but also because more operators complied with the criteria in 2007 than in previous years," added Dennis O'Connor, TEB's Noise Office Manager. "Pilots are hearing the message about 'flying quiet' and they deserve our thanks."

Teterboro Airport launched the "Good Neighbor Awards" in 2004 to give credit to operators who avoided violations of airport noise rules and night time operations.

The awards program has become part of the "TEB Industry Working Group," which was formed by Port Authority Chairman Anthony R. Coscia to improve safety, security and reduce noise at the airport.

The TEB Industry Working Group includes leading trade groups, such as the National Air Transportation Association (NATA), National Business Aviation Association (NBAA), General Aviation Manufacturers Association (GAMA), and Aircraft Owners and Pilots Association (AOPA), TEB FBOs, and other major operators such as NetJets.

The group is co-chaired by former Congressman James Coyne, President of NATA and Joseph Fazio, General Manager of Atlantic Aviation at TEB.

Created to address safety and security at TEB - one of America's busiest general aviation airports — the program also highlights noise abatement with voluntary restraints against operating Stage 2 jets into the airport and from operating any aircraft between 11 p.m. and 6 a.m.

According to Mr. O'Connor, "One of the measures of operator response has been the number of operations that occur after 11 p.m. The rate one night was as much as 83% fewer operations after 11 versus during the 10 p.m. hour." As O'Connor explains, "The enthusiastic response to TEB's voluntary restraints has enabled more operators to qualify for the awards and be recognized this year; and NBAA puts us in the right place at the right time to say thanks."

Teterboro Airport's "Good Neighbor Awards" for 2006 will be presented to Hawkaire, Massachusetts Mutual Life Insurance and Textron.

Teterboro Airport's "Good Neighbor Awards" for 2007 will be presented to the following companies and individuals: Ameriprise Financial, Hawkaire, IHBA, Inc., Massachusetts Mutual Life Insurance, Meredith Corporation, Twin Cities Aviation and VF Services, along with Mr. Thomas Heimgartner. An "honorable mention" is being cited for DHL Express in 2007 because award criteria cover aircraft used for passenger transport, not cargo, yet DHL's helicopter operations met TEB's noise rules and voluntary restraints.

If somebody asked me four years ago what I saw myself doing when I graduated, I probably would have responded with an answer alluding to graduate school or some other vague answer like most college freshmen would. I never thought that I would be preparing to move halfway around the world.

I graduated from the Catholic University of America in Washington, DC in May with bachelor degrees in Theology/ Religious Studies and Social Work and a Certificate in Pastoral Ministry.

After many experiences at Catholic, I discerned the call to do long term service after graduation. This has led me to the Jesuit Volunteers International, with whom I will be serving the people of Dar Es Salaam, Tanzania, for two years.

My sophomore year brought along an opportunity to go on a mission trip to Kingston, Jamaica.

Little did I know how life changing spending one week in another country would be. I came back from that first trip with a different world view.

I was amazed and deeply moved by the sincere joy and faith that these people had despite their meager physical possessions. I was asked to be the team leader for the following year. These were truly life changing experiences which have positively affected the path I am choosing to take in life.

I started looking into organizations which have long term service programs and eventually I came across Jesuit



Volunteers International.

During my time in Africa, I will be living with three other volunteers; I will be a primary school teacher at a local Jesuit school. I am looking forward to living in a different culture, learning Swahili and experiencing the different lifestyle that comes along with living in Tanzania.

I am very grateful for all of the experiences I have had that have led me in this direction.

Most fundamentally, the way I was raised and the values my parents instilled in me were what ultimately pushed me in this direction and for that I am ever thankful.

I am very excited to embark on this next journey in my life; however, I cannot accomplish this on my own. Firstly and most importantly, I am asking for the prayers and support of everyone, for this is the foundation of all successful ministry. Lincoln School





Driver Caution: Obey School Traffic Patterns

Hasbrouck Heights

As the new school year begins, Lt. Thomas Archer reminds drivers: "There are 14 school crossing locations in town. All have advance school crossing signs which are lime green in color."

School crossing guards are present during school days between 7:45 a.m. to 8:45 a.m.; 11:30 a.m. to 1:30 p.m. and 2:30 p.m. to 3:30 p.m.

School crossing guards wear lime green vests and hold portable stop signs.

Drivers should exercise caution at these locations, especially during inclement weather and periods of sun glare.

Dropping students

off at Heights schools:

• At schools, Lt. Archer reminds drivers not to park in the yellow zones or double park -- especially during inclement weather, letting off or taking on passengers in moving traffic.

• Do not park in designated drop off zones at dismissal time.

• At Corpus Christi School, don't park in the Minit-Mart lot.

• When dropping off or picking up students at the Jr./ Sr. High School main entrance at The Boulevard, do not park in the yellow zone, at the bus stop or double park on The Boulevard.

• At the LaSalle Avenue entrance, no parking, dropping off or picking up students in the yellow zone where no parking or no standing signs are posted. This violation creates a hazard for students and impedes Boulevard/LaSalle traffic flow.

• Use the specially designated drop off zone in the morning that is clearly marked by traffic cones from 7:30 a.m. to 8:30 a.m.

• Paterson Avenue entrance, no double parking. No "K" turns to avoid Paterson/ Boulevard intersection.

to cross only at intersections where crossing guards are present and to only cross when instructed to by the crossing guard. • Crossing guards are present on all school days from 7:30 a.m. to 9:10 a.m., 11:30 a.m. to 1:00 p.m., and 2:30 p.m. to 3:30 p.m. • Parents are reminded that when dropping off children at the Robert L. Craig School the driveway is for drop off only, there is no parking in the circular driveway. • When picking up children after school there is still no parking allowed in the driveway and when parking you should park in a marked parking spot. Do not double park or

block another car that is parked in a spot.

• Please drive with extra care and follow the directions given by the school crossing guards.

• New Jersey State law requires that all passengers under 8 years old or under 80 lbs. be secured in a Child Passenger Restraint System or a booster in the rear seat. All passengers 8 years old or over 80 lbs., as well as the driver and the front seat passenger of an automobile, must wear a properly adjusted and fastened safety belt system.

• All drivers are reminded to drive with extra caution in all areas where children are.

• Buckle up and drive safely.

Pedestrian **Safety Tips** for Children

The Wood-Ridge Police Department Traffic Bureau offers these safety tips to review with your children.

• Always cross the street with an adult. Before crossing the street, look left, right and left again to make sure the road is clear. Then continue looking while you cross the street.

• Make eye contact with drivers in stopped cars. Listen for traffic. See and be seen.

• Cross only at intersections, and within marked crosswalks if they are available.

• Understand how pedestrian signals work: A solid WALK symbol means you may cross, but you still must pay attention, especially for turning cars.

• A flashing DON'T WALK symbol means you should not start crossing. If you are in the roadway when the flashing begins, continue crossing to the other side. Do not turn back.

• A solid DON'T WALK symbol means do not try to cross the street.

• The Traffic Bureau also cautions children to watch out for cars while getting on and off the school bus.

The Effect of Pharmacy Discount Programs

The recent increased trend in transferred prescriptions and the demand for discounted drugs may be compromising patient care.

Recently, patients have been inundated with incentive or discount programs, such as gift cards or \$4 prescriptions, encouraging them to fill their prescriptions at participating pharmacies.

Gift card incentives that promote transferring prescriptions carry a risk that a mistake in transcription can occur.

I have seen errors when prescriptions for extended-release products are transferred, specifically for Metformin.

Metformin is a diabetes drug that, if not filled correctly, can compromise glucose control and increase diabetic associated complications.

In addition to the potential for transcription errors, the lack

of a complete patient profile should be of some concern.

Without a complete patient profile, the pharmacist is not able to adequately screen for potential drug-drug interactions or side effects. This can be very common with antiinflammatory drugs where duplication of therapy or drug interactions frequently occur.

With the introduction of \$4 generics for a 30-day supply or \$10 for a 90-day supply, there has been an increase in the amount of pharmacies patients use to fill their prescriptions, thus leading to the potential for an adverse event.

The primary goal of offering discounted prescriptions is to draw consumers into the store, thereby enticing them to buy other profitable items.

These programs are based on the view of the pharmacy as a retail center of the overall store and as a marketing tool that can break even or lose money in the name of increasing front end sales and customer traffic.

The regretful result is the patient begins to view the pharmacist as just another worker in the store and not someone who can help them with their healthcare needs.

Do not underestimate the long term effect of knowing your pharmacists and they, in turn, knowing you and your medical record.

Instead of using multiple pharmacies, just ask your pharmacist about any financial concerns.

The amount that can be saved financially by using multiple pharmacies in the short term may end up costing more in the long run.

"There is No Inter-action Anywhere Only Omni-action Everywhere"

When we realize that the action that takes place in interaction is first a thought, it is easier to be aware of this principle of Existential Metapsychiatry which has blessed my life in my moment to moment walk with God.

Whenever I find myself anxious I have learned to first listen to what I want or don't want. Also, I realize that this wanting state means that I am separated from the realization of my wholeness and Oneness with God Mind.

My attention is focused on the personal ego mind that looks for something in the outer to bring happiness, whether it is a person, place, or thing.

But the Bible says, "The Lord is my Shepherd I shall not want." What I need at that moment is to take my focus off the outer and turn my attention inward and upward toward the "Secret place of the Most High" within.

When I rest in this upper room of the mind or consciousness I release my mind from the limited objective consciousness and dwell in the spaciousness of God Mind, where Paul said, "I live and move and have my being in God." I relax and rest the personal human mind from thinking; that is, thinking about what should be and what shouldn't be.

As my teacher, Dr. Thomas Hora, would say, "Blessed are the shouldless." The Bible in Psalm 46 states, "It is in returning and rest that we are saved."

We are saved when we return or turn our attention to that secret place where our focus is one-pointed and single. Our focus is dwelling on the spiritual qualities of God Mind. I find this particularly helpful at home or the job when I am tempted to dwell in inter-action thinking. I stop whatever I'm doing, breathe in deeply, and turn my attention away from "Thinking about what others are thinking about what I'm thinking," called inter-active thinking. The breathing helps to quiet the mind from its internal, excessive chatter; it's calculating and judging by appearance.

surance, gratitude, and love," right where there was strife, anxiety and fear. Amazingly, when this rest, or state of Grace is realized within my mind, whatever is seemingly happening in the outer is harmonized and healed.

We have taken our focus off the inharmonious or unreal and turned our attention to harmony which is true perception or spiritual reality.

I have come to appreciate the "Prayer of Right Seeing." In a pamphlet entitled "Compassion," teachings from Existential Metapsychiatry, Dr. Hora states, "Everyone and everything is here for God, whether they know it or not." And he states, "That is reality."

He spoke of three modes of being of man: That we are here for ourselves which is the mode of unenlightened mind or we are here for others which he states is religious or humanistic mode of being.

In being here for ourselves

or being here for others is normal for man. Our attention is focused on inter-active thinking with oneself or other. We are dwelling on the horizontal plane of thinking. What is needed is to be interested in being here for God.

As we rest in Omni-active Mind, the human inter-active mind ceases from calculating, protecting or defending, and manipulation or operational thinking allowing us to go beyond the personal ego mind.

We let go of inter-active thinking. Thinking about what should be and shouldn't be or what we want and don't want and let God.

We give our concerns to God letting God Mind orchestrate a beautiful unfoldment of good. We return to God Mind, that quiet place where there is harmony, joy and peace we realize that "everything is already alright."

We learn to dwell in omniactive Love-Intelligence, the action which is non-action; meaning that we need "do nothing."

We learn to rest in and trust God Mind to unfold His Good that He desires to express through us as us as we seek to dwell in the upper room, or Secret place of the Most High.

Let Love or Omni-active Love-Intelligence express through you rather than dwelling in fantasies of interaction with yourself or another.

God bless you now and always. ###
