



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

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Pilots Walk Away From Fiery Crash

The Hasbrouck Heights Fire Department was called to a plane crash on Route 46 West in Teterboro at 3:17 a.m. on August 21, 2009.

Engine 1, Engine 2, Crash/ Foam Truck and both EMS rigs responded. W-R Rescue 903 also responded to set-up a unified command post, as Heights Rescue was out of service.

Upon arrival, the Department found both Port Authority ARFF response units had knocked down the fire and had expended their resources.

Hasbrouck Heights Fire Chief Michael Ratkowski took command and ordered Engine 2 to drop a foam line to take care of the hot spots.

Heights EMS handled transport of the co-pilot to the

awaiting NJ State Police Medevac helicopter for transport to Saint Barnabas Hospital in Livingston, and transport of the pilot to HUMC. The pilot was later transported to Saint Barnabas. Both are expected to recover.

The Moonachie Fire Department was on standby at First Aviation FBO to cover the airport. Covering Heights Fire HQ were Engines from Carlstadt and Wallington.

Heights fielded 23 members and was on the scene until 7:55 a.m. The Heights Fire Department is contracted by Teterboro for fire service.

The Little Ferry Police Department was responsible for all non-firematic issues, under the command of Chief Ralph

C. Verdi.

It was reported that the Beechcraft Super Baron BE58, was on a five-city run to collect specimens for Quest Diagnostics.

Just after 3 a.m., it approached heading north on Teterboro Airport Runway 1 and aborted landing, possibly at mid-field, to come around for another try.

It climbed slowly, flying low across Route 46, missing wires and the Industrial Avenue traffic signals. Upon crossing Route 46, it clipped a 35 foot tree, barely missing power lines. It spun down striking a 12 foot warehouse building sign. The Baron crashed upright on the lawn (of the old Ford plant, now Mohawk Carpet Co.) and burst into flames.

Two pilots exited the craft in seconds, suffering serious burns and broken bones, but walked away. Motorists found the dazed victims at a bus stop a few yards from the wreckage. That morning, NTSB and other agencies inspected the scene and held a brief press conference. Although the main portion of the aircraft was burned, the tail separated and was intact next to the sign. A section of the craft was in the struck tree and retrieved by HHFD Ladder. Lenox Corp. was contracted to remove the craft. Using their new 60 ton crane, they lifted the burned-out wreckage onto a flatbed; loading the tail and other larger parts onto a second flatbed. They transported the wreckage to a storage facility for investigation. ###

With the support and generosity of the community, he raised the \$6,600 needed to cover his expenses and go to Switzerland. This was Bryson's first international travel.

Competing among 18 international teams in Olympic Style competition, Bryson earned gold in the 200 meter and silver in the 400 meter competition.

On July 21, 2009, the Wood-Ridge Mayor and Council recognized his extraordinary and inspirational efforts.

Bryson McLeod, a senior at Wood-Ridge High School, was born with spina bifida. He is confined to a wheelchair. Despite this disability, Bryson is an accomplished athlete.

He has competed in Track & Field for 5 years, Sled Hockey for 4 years and Basketball for 4 years.

Using a special "Track Racer," he competes in sprinting the 100, 200, 400, 800 and 1,500 meters. In Field, he competes in javelin, disc and shotput. He is with the North Jersey Navigators in Jersey City.

In Sled Hockey, he was a member of the Devils in the South Mountain Arena, and used to practice at the Ice House in Hackensack. He has since put this on the back burner to pursue his other sports.

Basketball is his favorite sport, playing positions of point guard and shooting guard. He's with the Jr. Nets, operating out of Hackensack Middle School. He earned a trophy for First Team and just returned from a basketball camp in Texas.

• Make eye contact with drivers in stopped cars. Listen for traffic. See and be seen.


• Cross only at intersections, and within marked crosswalks if they are available.

There were plenty of water stations throughout the race area. Nourishment was available upon the race conclusion. Runners received a "goody bag" upon departing the race.

The Moonachie EMS/Rescue Squad provided emergency and first aid services. Ken Forester, CEO of Meridian Air Charter, piloted the Cessna 172 chase plane.

This event was organized by Bergen County United Way and PSE&G.

Heights American Legion Post is 90 Years Young

The American Legion was founded on March 21, 1919 by Veterans returning from Europe after World War I, and was later chartered by Congress in 1919 as a patriotic, war-time Veterans' organization, devoted to mutual helpfulness.

It is a not-for-profit community-service organization which now numbers nearly 3 million members, men and women, in nearly 15,000 American Legion posts worldwide.

In Hasbrouck Heights, a meeting was held at Library Hall on the evening of September 3, 1919 for the purpose of organizing an American Legion Post.

From the original minutes taken at that meeting we ascertained that the meeting was called to order by Mr. D. A. Watt, who after a brief address, introduced Mr. Mulliken the Field Secretary for Bergen County.

The question of a suitable name for the Post was discussed at length and it was finally decided that it should BUY DIRECT & SAVE BIG!

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

History of Moonachie

(Editor's Note: In celebration of its 100th Anniversary, over the course of the next year, The Gazette Newspaper is providing a multi-part series of Moonachie's history. The following is reprinted as written, from the 1960 Fiftieth Gold Anniversary Journal.)

Part Two

Neither adults nor children had much time for leisure because hands, not machines, had to tend the farm. Youngsters rarely got away from home except to school and Church on Sunday.

Moonachie had two Churches. Presbyterians had

which met at the Redneck Avenue School. The mission was founded by Rev. F. N. Kohler in 1904.

An annual Sunday school picnic held by the Presbyterians on Paterson Plank Road, at a place then called Levy's, was awaited anxiously by the youngsters as a change from the routine of school and farm. In those days, each family was asked to contribute a bucket of coal to the Church.

Catholics held their services in St. Anthony's Church on Concord Street. The Church was built by parishioners in the early 1900s.

When there was time for a Sunday school mission recreation, residents usually

found it at Penna's Hotel, which was located where the Win-Check Factory now stands. (Note: In 2000, the building is now the home of Teterboro School of Aviation.) The hotel was on an island and rowboats sailed around it. Every Saturday night, hundreds would join residents to fill the Dance Hall.

The resort boasted every sort of entertainment from trained bears to Indian Medicine Shows and silent films.

Horses accustomed to hard work and few comforts found themselves the center of attention once a year at Moonachie's biggest celebration -- "The Horse Troop Parade."

Every family gathered brush and branches from the fields and used them to cover the family wagon.

Youngsters made paper flowers and wove them in the horses' hair while mother stocked the wagon with food. Single men rode up ahead on their horses as the troop began its parade through Hackensack and Wood-Ridge.

At the end of the day, the troop would stop for lunch.

Later, the men competed in a shootout for prizes solicited from local merchants.

A dance climaxed the day of fun. Moonachie's amusements were simple, but they showed a sense of belonging, a community spirit and their warmth and color still have older residents longing for the "good old days."

Bit by bit, house by house, road by road, the Borough grew.

Between 1914-1916, Mr. Ernest Bruno built the first homes in Washington Park. Two of his excavations became small lakes, and one end of Park Street served as the local swimming hole and ice skating pond for years.

Most of Moonachie's roads were still dirt paths. During the rainy season, holes were filled with brick. Moonachie Road was the first to be paved. Transportation in early Moonachie was by boat or horse. Mr. Nick Rosa ran a horse and wagon taxi service for people arriving at the Wood-Ridge Station.

Later, Mr. Rosa owned the first telephone and the first auto in town, a Stanley Steamer, under which the driver had to light a fire every time he wanted to start. Most roads were still impassable in bad weather and a good rain often cancelled Council meetings.

In 1924, Moonachie's first official Police Department was formed. Hugh Ames became its first chief. Policemen often worked full time hours for only a token salary. They supplied their own transportation and ran a dance every time they needed anything -- badges, guns or uniforms. Police headquarters were in the Redneck Avenue School where the Council meetings were also held.

Elections in Moonachie were excited and violent affairs, at one time.

Rumors were constantly in circulation that voters were

Once the shouting was over and the votes were counted, the bitterness of the fight gave way to a general calm and politics were ignored for another year. The old ballots were turned over to the schools and the children practiced writing on the back of them.

During the '20s, Mayor Girardi and the Council first began to court industry -- they couldn't give the land away. Ads in New York papers offering land for free drew demands from businessmen that a factory be thrown in with it. After a court fight that rocked the county and the state, pigs were outlawed.

Later, a slaughterhouse was closed down by the Board of Health. A fireworks factory was considered too dangerous and also turned away.

In 1925, Moonachie almost acquired an amusement park. Work began on Moonachie Avenue for what was to be the biggest park with bigger thrills than ever before. But, depression came, and there was no money available for amusement parks. The other amusement parks went unchallenged by Moonachie.

At about the same time, bus service began down Moonachie Road and Moonachie Avenue to Berger Street. They ran every half-hour. Presbyterians were finally able, in 1923, to worship in their own hall. They built a community hall that served both as a place of worship and as a social meeting place on Redneck Avenue. The Church's annual strawberry festival became an important town event.

The '20s introduced Moonachie to a problem it would never forget "money." In 1922 a crisis threatened the school system. Funds to operate it were exhausted and no new monies were approved.

Somehow the schools struggled through, and in 1926, the PTA was organized with 25 members to help the Borough schools.

During the Depression, further troubles appeared. Teachers had to be paid with script money, mere IOU's. The Depression crushed the town with indifferent cruelty. Farmers unable to pay taxes lost their homes in tax sales that could not be avoided. During the Depression, Moonachie lost some of its color and said goodbye to its Horse Troop parade. Travel Alert: Same Name, Different Drug

By William Zachok, R.Ph. International travel can present several challenges; foreign language, unfamiliar currency, and even brand name medications that contain different ingredients in another country.

A number of cases of drug mix-ups have been reported, some of which turned a relaxing vacation into a lengthy hospitalization.

In one case, a patient traveling in Serbia ran out of his Dilacor XR, a drug used to treat hypertension in the United States.

The Serbian pharmacist filled the prescription for Dilacor, which is actually the brand name for digoxin in Serbia.

Digoxin is used in patients with irregular heart rhythms, not to treat hypertension.

Not only did the vacationer not obtain the benefit of maintaining his normal blood pressure, but in fact he developed toxicity from the unnecessary digoxin and ultimately was hospitalized upon return to the U.S.

In another report, an Australian visitor to the U.S. was hospitalized for bleeding in his stomach, and told doctors he was only taking Cartia, a drug used to treat hypertension and angina in the United States, and unlikely to be the cause of the

stomach problem. Fortunately, a pharmacy student working with the patient found that Cartia is the brand name for aspirin in Australia and New Zealand.

The aspirin was determined to be the cause of the stomach bleed, and the patient recovered.

Keep your travel enjoyable by carrying an adequate supply of medications, as well as a list of both the brand and generic names of the medicines you take.

If you need a temporary supply of medicines while out of the country, always confirm that the correct drug has been dispensed.

Since 1977, the Chore Volunteer Handyman Service of the Volunteer Center of Bergen County, has been helping the elderly and/or disabled people, by performing minor household repairs that clients cannot perform themselves.

The Chore Service assists in improving the quality of life of older people who are living weather-stripping, changing screens and storms, replacing light bulbs, fixing broken lamps and switches, installing simple electrical fixtures or replacing existing electric outlets and switches.

Chore serves Bergen County residents who are at least age sixty (60) or who are permanently disabled of any age. **Project Lifesaver Available**

Hasbrouck Heights Police Chief Michael J. Colaneri would like to inform the residents of Project Lifesaver.

Project Lifesaver provides a timely response to save lives and reduce potential injury for adults and children with Alzheimer's Disease, Autism, Down Syndrome, dementia or other cognitive conditions or disorders.

The program deploys members of the Hasbrouck Heights Police Department and the Bergen County Sheriff's Department to locate individuals, who may wander from home and become lost due to confusion and/or memory loss.

Persons enrolled in Project Lifesaver wear a small, one ounce battery operated radio wrist transmitter that emits an individualized silent tracking signal 24-hours a day. In the event that a participant goes missing, the caregiver notifies the Hasbrouck Heights Police Department, who will initiate an immediate search while contacting the Sheriff's Department. Officers from the Sheriff's Department respond, with electronic tracking equipment. The average rescue is less than 20 minutes.

Participation Criteria

• The individual must be diagnosed with Alzheimer's Disease, Autism, or Down Syndrome and must reside in Bergen County in a private residence with a 24-hour live-in caregiver.

• The caregiver must send a letter of request to Chief of Police Michael J. Colaneri.

• The cost of initial equipment is approximately \$290 with a maintenance fee of approximately \$13 per month to cover the cost of the battery and bracelet.



Pending Home Sales Continue to Rise

The current uptrend in pending home sales is now in its fifth consecutive month, the first time in six years for such a streak, according to the National Association of Realtors.

The Pending Home Sales Index, a forward-looking indicator based on contracts signed in June, rose 3.6 percent to 94.6 from an upwardly revised reading of 91.3 in May, and is 6.7 percent above June 2008 when it was 88.7. The last time there were five consecutive monthly gains was in July 2003.

NAR chief economist,

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Lawrence Yun, said a combination of positive market factors is fueling the gains. "Historically low mortgage interest rates, affordable home prices and large selection are encouraging buyers who've been on the sidelines. Activity has been consistently much stronger for lower priced homes," he said.

"Because it may take as long as two months to close on a home after signing a contract, first-time buyers must act fairly soon to take advantage of the \$8,000 tax credit because they must close on the sale by November 30," Yun said.

Among the regional figures from the Pending Home Sales Index, our area - the Northeast - rose 0.4 percent to 81.2 in June and is 5.8 percent above a year ago.

Reflections

They Are Renewed Each Morning



The squad dances primarily to "hip-hop music" in formation similar to "line dancing" with many variations.



On Friday, August 7th a bus load of Hasbrouck Heights senior citizens traveled to Montclair to view this movie


