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

State-of-the-Art Structure to Help Mitigate Against Tidal Flooding in the Meadowlands

On July 23, 2014, The New Jersey Meadowlands Commission (NJMC) unveiled the new West Riser Tide Gate, a state-of-the-art structure that will help better protect residential, commercial and industrial properties in Moonachie, Carlstadt, Wood-Ridge and Teterboro, including Teterboro Airport, from daily tidal flooding. The tide gate is located along the West Riser Ditch on the border of Moonachie and Wood-Ridge.

The \$1,249,800 project was partially funded by a \$551,800 grant from the Port Authority of New York and New Jersey (PANYNJ). The NJMC funded the remaining \$697,000. Bergen County will maintain the new tide gate.

"The new West Riser Tide Gate will play a key role in helping to reduce the effects of tidal flooding in the Meadowlands region," said Marcia Karrow, Executive Director of the NJMC. "The Commission would like to thank Bergen County and the Port Authority for their critical assistance in making this important project a reality."

"I am very pleased to unveil the new West Riser Tide Gate with our partners at the NJMC and the Port Authority," said Bergen County Executive Kathleen Donovan. "As County Executive I have stressed the importance of governmental entities working together for the good of Bergen County. This collaboration is a prime example of the benefits that shared services can bring to our residents and businesses."

"Through this joint effort, the New Jersey Meadowlands Commission, the Port Authority and Bergen County have improved protection of Teterboro Airport and neighboring properties from tidal flooding," said Renee Spann, Manager of Teterboro Airport.

About the West Riser Tide Gate

The original West Riser Tide Gate was constructed in 1977 by Bergen County to prevent high tides from reaching upstream properties in Carlstadt, Moonachie, Teterboro and Wood-Ridge. The all metal structure was in need of replacement.

The new West Riser Tide Gate is comprised of corrosionresistant sheet piling with four (4) 6-feet wide by 7 feet long openings with composite flap valves attached on the downstream side.

The new openings are larger than the old structure's to allow for better flow release at low tide.

Additionally, the new structure was built to one-foot above the 25-year flood elevation to add additional storage capacity for storms.

A corrosion-resistant trash rack system was installed upstream to prevent debris from flowing through the openings.

Finally, a catwalk system was installed on top of the structure for maintenance access and includes four winch systems to open the gates for inspection.

The project was bid in July of 2013 and awarded in September 2013 to the joint venture of J. Fletcher Creamer & Joseph Sanzari Companies. Site work began in February of 2014 and concluded in June 2014. ###



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

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Real Estate Insight

Mega-Sites Unite! What's Up with That?

The big news in real estate this month is the announced merger between Trulia and Zillow (or, essentially, that Zillow is purchasing Trulia).

These internet sites have virtually created real estate web traffic where it didn't previously exist.

Ten years ago, it was nearly impossible to peruse local public records about home sales and home prices without visiting the County recorder's office in Hackensack. Now it's just a click away for here and practically every property in the US.

As an active realtor, it will be interesting to me to see how this merger might affect our local real estate business.

One of the biggest complaints that realtors have about both web sites is in the inaccuracy of their data.

In Bergen County, the origination of most home listings typically takes place in the New Jersey MLS, where an agent enters all of the data regarding a particular listing, including all of the photos, description, and other pertinent facts.

That data is then fed to different web sites (including the mega-sites we're talking about), and sometimes the data feed only happens sporadically - every several days or once a week.

In our office, listing agents frequently make small changes to the listing information in the MLS, which can include things like a price change, additional pictures, and updated descrip-

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Wood-Ridge, NJ 201.602.0824 Tom@TJMArchitect.com tions/facts about the property. Trulia/Zillow's data is often old and inaccurate due to the fact that these changes are made locally and too often get delayed en route to them.

It's not uncommon to find a home on either web site that's... a) already off the market or closed, b) under contract, c) inaccurately priced, etc., etc.

On reading the news that Zillow and Trulia were merging, one of my agents commented: "Now only half the sites will get the data wrong."

Nevertheless, we often tell potential buyers moving into this area that Zillow and Trulia are a good place to start their home search.

Admittedly, they offer pretty decent info on schools, mortgage rates, maps.

For more precise data, though, the best place to get updated information is from the local MLS (in our case, the *New Jersey MLS*). There you'll find a live database constantly updated as Realtors change/ add/modify information. And data at the source is – expert advice – almost always totally accurate (i.e., more better!).

For similar reasons, I don't think this merger will change anything in the day-to-day process of buying or selling a home. Let's face it: both web sites are media vehicles. They sell ads, not real estate. They've have been around since 2004/2005.

According the NAR statistics, homebuyers in 2001 were using realtors 69% of the time when purchasing homes; in 2013, that number went up to 88% of the time.

So, while homebuyers might continue to search more and more on non-real estate company sites, they are, ironically, using realtors more as

My take: finding a home online might seem easy – and, frankly, it is sometimes – but that constitutes only a small part of the entire home buying process.

The harder part begins once you want to make an offer to actually purchase the home. Consumers understand this to some degree. If they didn't, those aforementioned stats would not be increasing and a lot of the 'alternative models' that we've seen from time to time for connecting homebuyers and sellers, would have succeeded.

No, I think the idea (the fear!) that realtors will eventually be 'disintermediated', rendered meaningless/obsolete is completely unfounded.

There is still immense value in hiring a real estate guide, a person to whom you can direct your [sometimes] dumb questions, who's going to prompt you to ask the questions you don't even know to ask, who's going to listen and help assemble the right team for your purchase or sale.

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

Lt. Beese of Carlstadt Police Department reports that there are 20 crossing guards posted throughout the Borough on all school days from 7:45 a.m.- 9 a.m. and 2:45 p.m.- 4 p.m. Please obey the directions of the crossing guards in those

There are approximately 600 students that are dropped off and picked up at Carlstadt Public School every school day. Please follow the following rules.

- Do not park in the drop off zones. They are for dropping off and picking up of students only.
- Parents can use the auxiliary parking lot located at the north/west corner of the school, (next to the basketball courts) which can be entered from Garden Street.
- Please do not turn left from Washington Street on to Summit Avenue, when dropping off and picking up students. This disrupts the flow of traffic.
- Please do not park within 25 feet of a crosswalk or 50 feet of a stop sign. This makes it difficult for the crossing guards to see moving vehicles clearly and be able to safely cross the children.

railroad barges pulled end-toend that made up the core of the facility.

The Meadowlands Commission acquired the property for \$3.1 million in 2005.

The work was delayed by 16 months for the Army Corps of Engineers and the NJ DEP permits to dredge the river.

Built on the site of the former Barge Club, the New Jersey Meadowlands Commission's (NJMC) River Barge Park and Marina is a 5.5-acre, handicapped-accessible urban jewel located at 260 Outwater Lane, Carlstadt, on the Hackensack

A once neglected site has been transformed into a compelling destination for recreation, eco-tourism and environmental education.

The park is open from dawn to dusk 365 days a year. The park is patrolled by the Carlstadt Police Department.

Construction took threeyears and was completed in 2012. This \$9.5 million grantfunded project provides a muchneeded public access to the river in southern Bergen County.

Funding for River Barge Park was provided by the Port Authority of New York and New Jersey (\$6.4 million), the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration through its Coastal and Estuarine Land

Conservation Program (\$1.3) million), and NJMC funded the balance.

River Barge Park includes a 425-foot-long scenic riverfront promenade with picnic tables, paths lined by native plants, bird-watching, environmental education pavilion, a 130-foot long catch-and-release fishing dock, paddling and rowing launch points.

The park is located at the site of the iconic Meadowlands Barge Club that closed in 2005.

There is a new marina featuring a dock with 26 boat slips, 17 public slips for annual rental. There is no long-term storage of boats or trailers at the park.

The docks serve as the launch point for the NJMC's highly popular pontoon boat cruises on the Hackensack River.

The two-hour cruises run from late May through September and are led by experienced NJMC guides who explain the region's history and point out the area's flora and fauna. Group pontoon boat trips are available.

History

River Barge Park has a rich history, going back 350 years. The Lenape Indians hunted and fished the area and early Dutch settlers staged canoe races there.

The site is a former land filled wetlands (filled during the days of unregulated dumping), prone to flooding and improved with a commercial enterprise and extensive paving.

In the 1940s, the site was part of Sky Harbor Seaplane Base, that trained hundreds of aviators. It was also licensed as a heliport.

Father and son, Leonard and Jay LaVerghetta, owned the property from the 1960s. The property later became the home of the Barge Club, an iconic area restaurant named for two early twentieth century wooden

Barge History

The Barge Club consisted of two covered barges that were pulled onto shore, one in back of the other.

The 30 by 100-foot barges were once owned by The Erie Lackawanna Railroad and The Baltimore and Ohio Railroad, built by the Brewer Dry Dock Company.

These 550 ton capacity covered barges were large enough for horse and wagon to enter, load up and go.

The barges, known as "lighters," were used by the railroads, to store cargo off-loaded from larger, ocean transport vessels. These barges made it easier for the large cargo ships to maneu-

The restaurant owner's eccentric collection of iconic commercial nautical artifacts, bollards (ship tie-downs), capstans, channel markers portholes, docking cleats, anchors, ballasts and regional artifacts were restored and displayed throughout the property.

Timber was salvaged from two railroad barges that made up the landmark Barge Club, and the third barge that sat abandoned on the river.

The timber was sent to North Carolina for milling, then incorporated into the park as beams, site furnishings (benches and tables), wheel stops and sign/ railing posts.

The Virginian Southern Longleaf Yellow Pine timbers (circa 1750) referred to as heart pine, is considered to be timbers from first generation trees and is no longer available.


The vintage timber was used exclusively for the 635-square

foot open air education pavilion (framing) that overlooks the reeds on the edge of the park that abuts and is a gateway to the Meadowlands Conservation Trust's 587-acre Richard P. Kane Natural Area.

Construction

The first phase in 2009 was to demolish the barges, installing a new bulkhead, boat ramps and 10-foot wide docks and the first dredging in the Hackensack River in more than 25 years.

The second stage included improvements of landscaping, construction of winter boat storage facility, open-air educational pavilion and promenade above the riverbank and parking area.

The park's beautifully illustrated signs further evoke a sense of place and identity.

The Robert Ceberio Environmental Education Pavilion's thatched roof constructed by Irish master thatcher, William Cahill (*roofthatch.com*), originally from Galway, Ireland.

The roof consists of 900 bundles installed in three lay-

most persistent weed plants (phragmites), a highly sustainable building material. The reeds naturally contain silicone which adds longevity; no sealant was used. They were cut in southern NJ and cured for one

The shape and size of the old barges inspired the design of the new boathouses' arched roofs, clapboard siding, colors, lettering and cupolas.

The 1970s iconic 30-foot-tall Barge sign was saved as a historic feature. The individual letters are 5'-6' wide by 8' tall.

The original energy-draining neon light was refurbished with low-energy-use LED lighting and stands above the site's bio-filtration basin. The property was re-graded to bio-swail and rain gardens.

A new bulkhead was installed and so was a 30 by 120-foot boat ramp with a washout area where the public can launch boats up to 30 feet long.

A rowing dock, canoe launch and fishing dock have been installed.

The marina was dredged and designed in accordance with the American Boating Association Accessibility Guidelines and features accessible boat slips, sustainable harvested Ipe wood decking, LED and solar lighting, public boat ramp, custom "arched" railing, kayak launch and rowing dock for crew teams.

Natural Habitat

Fresh water and brackish-tolerant indigenous plants were selected for their adaptability to the site and ability to provide wildlife food and cover. The planting arrangement, groupings and orientation mimic those commonly found in natural systems.

Hackensack River Estuary

Encompassing the southern part of the river and adjoining marshes and mudflats, it is part of the larger NY/NJ harbor estuary, located at the confluence of the Hudson River and many smaller rivers - including the East River and Raritan River.

Estuaries are bodies of water where rivers meet the ocean and salt water meets fresh water. The unique characteristics of estuaries make them diverse and productive eco-systems that are home to many plants and wildlife.

The Hackensack flows 50 miles from Lake Lucille in Rockland County south to Newark Bay. The waterway is essentially divided by the Oradell Dam into two rivers, with fresh water north of the dam and brackish (a mix of fresh and salt water) south of the dam.

Stormwater Management

Surface water flows into the large bio-filtration basin under the huge Barge sign, a rain garden and promenade planting beds. Parking area and walking paths are constructed of porous material to minimize runoff and maximize ground water recharge.

River Barge Park is a great place to watch birds, including herons and egrets. Endangered Peregrine Falcons and Bald Eagles fly along the river year-round, with springtime nests less than two miles away.

Nesting Ospreys (a threatened species) catch fish in the river late spring and summer.

In August and September, you might see thousands of migrating shore birds.

Sandpipers rest here in August at high tide.

In fall and winter, all sorts of ducks, including Ruddies and Green-Winged Teals, hang out on the river.

In the winter, Roughlegged Hawks (rare to this region) often come down from Canada.

River Barge Park serves as the gateway to the Richard P. Kane Natural Area, the largest contiguous tract of undeveloped land in the Meadowlands District. The Kane Tract is a 587-acre parcel of reclaimed and restored wetlands and wild-life habitat preserved by the Meadowlands Conservation Trust.

The existing mud flat shore edges were restored into a functioning salt marsh by creating planting areas armored with coconut fiber logs. Upland plants native to northern NJ were selected for tolerance to the windy brackish environment and minimal maintenance.

River Barge Park advances the NJMC's commitment to sustainable and green building through its incorporation of energy-efficient LED railing lights, solar and LED marina lights, and environmentally friendly storm water management, collection, and filtering systems.

In 2013, the NJMC received a Chapter Award from the New Jersey Chapter of the American Society of Landscape Architects (NJASLA) for River Barge Park's ecologically sustainable site design.

Teterboro Airport Acknowledges Good Neighbors

On Wednesday, July 23, 2014, the Teterboro Airport Noise Abatement Office and the Port Authority of New York and New Jersey announced the 2013 Good Neighbor Awards to 11 Teterboro Airport operators.

The award announcements were made during the second quarter 2014 TANAAC (*Teter*-

boro Aircraft Noise Abatement Advisory Committee) meeting held at 90 Moonachie Avenue, Teterboro, NJ. Plaque presentations were made at a later date.

Teterboro Airport Annual Good Neighbor Noise Abatement Awards recognizes those operators that are either based at the Teterboro Airport, or have operated more than 100 operations without incurring a noise violation or warning, adhered to not operating Stage 2 aircraft, and have ceased operations between the hours of 11 p.m. and 6 a.m. An individual award is also given to the jet operator with the lowest average sound level.

Teterboro Airport launched the Good Neighbor Awards in 2003. They recognize both based and non-based operators who have complied with mandatory and voluntary noise rules.

Awards are given to companies and individuals flying helicopter, propeller, turbo prop and jet aircraft.

The 2013 awardees were: Bank of America, Classic Services, Inc., CVS Caremark, Ocean Wings, Barnes & Noble, Inc., Massachusetts Mutual Life Insurance Company, William C. Morris, Newell Rubbermaid, Inc., Northern Jet Management, R & F Wings, and White Mountains Capital, Inc. ###



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TEB Installs 3rd Arrestor Bed

A 2005 law authored by the late Senator Frank Lautenberg requires all of the nation's major airports to have a 1,000 ft. runway-end buffer zone by 2015, to ensure passenger safety in the event of an overrun.

At airports that are unable to satisfy this requirement, because of either natural or man-made barriers, the FAA allows the use of a shorter runway safety area with a properly designed arrestor bed, which is an installation of materials designed to slow an aircraft down in a short distance.

These beds are designed to stop planes traveling between 57 mph and 80 mph.

- The first EMAS (Engineered Materials Arresting *System)*, known as an arrestor bed, was installed on the north end of Runway 6-24 (near Rt. 46) in October 2006.
- The second EMAS was installed at the south end of Runway 1-19 (Moonachie Road and Redneck Avenue) in December 2012.
- The third EMAS was installed at the south end of Runway 6-24, (near Moonachie Avenue) in December 2013.

Although there is over 1,000 feet available for a buffer zone, an EMAS system was used because of wetlands issues.

Teterboro Airport will have only three arrestor beds. Because there is a 1,000-foot over-run area, Runway 1-19 will not need to have an EMAS at the north end (near Rt. 46). The area is undergoing turf improvements to further enhance safety.

Neither runway was lengthened, only rehabilitated.

Third Arrestor Bed

The size 162' x 348' arrestor bed is set on 4" of asphalt on top of 12" of base course, on top of 20" of sand.

The arrestor bed slopes from 5" up to 20" and contains about 3,440 blocks of material.

The actual work began in August 2013 and was completed by November 15, 2013.

Work was done during the day to be sensitive to noise abatement.

The project was supervised by Port Authority engineers. Blocks of arrestor bed material were supplied by (ESCO.)

The construction cost to install the third arrestor bed was partially funded by the FAA.

Rep. Bill Pascrell, Jr. announced that the Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) has recently awarded the Port Authority of New York and New Jersey a \$1,000,000 grant to improve runway safety at Teterboro Airport.

This federal grant helped fund the installation of this Engineered Materials Arresting System (EMAS).

Runway 6-24 is 6,015 feet long and 150 feet wide and is equipped with High-Intensity Runway Edge Lights (HIRL). This runway underwent a complete rehabilitation in 2010 (repaved and new lights installed).

The Runway 6 approach has an Instrument Landing System (ILS) and a Medium Approach Lighting System-R (MALS-R).

The Runway 24 approach is equipped with both PAPI (Precision Approach Path Indicator) and REIL (Runway End Identification Lighting) systems. ###





About EMAS Arrestor Bed Technology

EMAS (Engineered Materials Arresting System) arrestor beds are installed on the runway overrun/set-back to decelerate an aircraft in an emergency.

This technology, which was pioneered by the Port Authority and the Federal Aviation Administration, is comprised of beds of specially designed lightweight pre-cast concrete blocks that consist of crushable cellular cement material.

These blocks crumble under the weight of an aircraft, enabling a plane to stop safely and quickly in an emergency.

Each arrestor bed configuration is custom engineered in length, depth and strength to provide optimum performance for the aircraft mix used at the airport.

EMAS arrestor blocks are set on an asphalt bed (similar to a typical road) which is graded for drainage.

The arrestor bed technology, known as the Engineered Materials Arresting System (EMAS), was pioneered by the Port Authority and the Federal Aviation Administration, and has proven effective at John F. Kennedy International Airport, where the world's first EMAS was installed in 1996.

Then Port Authority Executive Director, Kenneth J. Ringler Jr., said, "The technology has proven effective in bringing aircraft to a safe and complete stop. It could be compared to driving a vehicle into gradually deepening snow."

The blocks are light enough to crush under a jet's landing gear, but heavy enough to slow or stop a jet. The beds can withstand the weight of rescue trucks responding to an accident.

A factory installed jet blast resistant block protection system is applied to raw blocks to enhance durability and to protect against the effects of aircraft jet blasts.

Maintenance

Weekly drive-by inspections, as well as a monthly walk of the bed, are recommended.

Normal maintenance consists of maintaining the protective surface coating -- painting and caulking as needed.

Proper maintenance protects the underlying arrestor bed blocks from the environment, keeping excessive moisture out and prolonging the life of the system. Repainting the entire bed may be required every three to five years.

Snow is not expected to have any substantial effect on performance. Excessive build up that may obscure approach lights or affect the ILS may be handled with a snow blower.

Vehicular traffic should be avoided. Site preparation includes paving around the perimeter to allow vehicles to drive around the bed for inspections and maintenance. Maintenance personnel can walk on the bed without damaging the surface. ###

- Joseph Crecca: From East Orange. Crecca was an F-4 Vietnam combat pilot, shot down after 75 missions. As a P.O.W. he was incarcerated in the same camp as John McCain. After release, Crecca became a test pilot on early military low visibility approach technology. Later he was a Captain with Fedex.
- Kenneth "Hock" Todd Ham: Born in Plainfield, was a U.S. astronaut and a Captain in the United States Navy. Ham was selected by NASA in August 1998, while serving as the F/A-18E/F Super Hornet lead carrier suitability test pilot. He was a two-time Shuttle astro-

Carlstadt Residents Save \$2 Million From Bond Refinancing

Carlstadt Borough residents will see new tax relief to the amount of approximately \$135,000 annually as a result of the refinancing of bonds issued in 2005, resulting in a tax savings being passed along to them, Board of Education officials announced.

The transaction, which occurred on July 28, 2014, refinanced \$17,075,000 for a savings of \$2,014,560 over the 18 year life of the bonds.

Prior to the sale, Standard & Poor's rated the district AAstating that the strong rating was a result of several factors, including the school district's stable financial position. S &P recognized the school business administrator's efforts to control costs and increase revenues which led to the rising reserve levels over the past two years.

They also noted that projections for fiscal 2014 indicate another healthy surplus which will further increase financial stability. Other factors in the rating process included a moderately concentrated tax base and a low overall debt burden coupled with limited future capital needs as well as strong wealth and income levels relative to the rest of the nation. ###



Hammer/Anvil

My father taught me many things about my grandfather. As a kid I was eager to learn from the past. My grandfather died two decades before I was born. He asked nothing from no one and took no charity.

Born in the late 1800s, he like everyone else, worked to survive in the worst of times. A piece of advice came down through the decades to me. He told my father. "For all your days prepare, meet them ever alike, when you are the anvil bear, when you are the hammer strike." I never forgot it. The American Army shows us exactly what this means.

In June of 1776 the brand new American Army was in New York. General Washington had about 19,000 men at the time. There they dug in and waited for the British to arrive.

Hoping to end the American Revolution, the British fleet arrived with 10 ships of the line, twenty frigates and 300 troop transports with 32,000 British and Hessian soldiers that disembarked on Staten Island.

The students out there will note that, to hold New York without a Navy is impossible. Washington knew this but did not want to leave without a fight.

On Long Island the high ground runs east to west and is known as the Guan Heights (colonial name for Gowanus). Washington realized that Brooklyn, sitting on high ground was the key to New York. So he decided to defend it.

On August 22, 1776, the British General William Howe crossed from Staten Island to Long Island at Gravesend Bay. He had about 15,000 troops with him. He also saw the importance of the high ground of Brooklyn and moved to take it.

In order to do this he had

to pass through the Guan high ground.

There are four passes that lead through the high ground and to Brooklyn, the Gowanus Road, the Flatbush Road, the Bedford Pass, and the Jamaica Pass. Washington posted his troops to block these passes.

Israel Putnam was placed in charge to guard the passes. Brave as he was and not afraid to fight, he was inexperienced in large troop movements.

General Howe feinted at the Flatbush and the Bedford passes. A feint is a demonstration of a fake main assault by the Army intended to fool the enemy in thinking the main assault was in that location, when it is actually in another.

It worked perfectly. Putnam immediately posted most of his troops at these two passes. On August 26, General Howe took 10,000 troops through the now unguarded Jamaica Pass.

A cannon shot was the signal to begin the main attack. When it fired the British and Hessians came on and crushed the entire left side of the surprised American position. Putnam was now engaged in his front while his left and rear positions were now under attack.

It was a disaster. The Americans could not reload fast enough before the enemy was upon them with bayonets. Many Americans were captured or killed in the engagement.

In Putnam's command was an Officer by the name of William Stirling. Realizing all was lost on Long Island he did what he could to save his command. He ordered his men to retreat but kept 200 Maryland men with him to make time for others to escape.

In an incredible display of bravery, he drew his sword and they charged into the oncoming masses of British and Hessian troops, fighting hand-to-hand to save their comrades. It worked; the enemy was stalled for a short time. Survivors ran through the marsh and swampy terrain to the last camp on Long Island, Brooklyn itself. Of the 200 Maryland men, only 9 made it to Brooklyn.

The only good news Washington saw was that the wind kept the British Navy out of the East River. He knew in time that was going to change.

So on the night of August 29 the American Army retreated across the river into Manhattan. Putnam and 4,000 men took up station at the battery on the tip of Manhattan, while the rest of the Army was

north of today's 125th Street on the heights of Harlem.

On September 15, the British Army followed up with another amphibious landing at Kips Bay. This was bad news for Putnam because he was in danger of being cut off from the rest of the American Army. He and his men went north to Harlem.

Hessians and British troops walked ashore and quickly swept away the few troops posted there to oppose the landing. The British moved up as far as East 34th Street and stopped. Then they were ordered to camp just south of present day grounds of Grand Central Station. Putnam and his men were lucky. They made it to Harlem Heights due to the British delay.

General Nathaniel Greene, returning to the American Army, after being sick, suggested to Washington to burn the city down to prevent the British from using it during the winter.

Washington declined. He had a meeting with his officers. Washington was sick of being the "anvil." His army was driven out of New York at every turn. In the morning he would be the "hammer."

In front of the heights of Harlem was a clearing and a small hallow.

General Washington sent Colonel Thomas Knowlton and the 100 Connecticut Rangers down into the hallow before dawn.

As the sun came up on September 16, 1776, the Rangers exchanged fire as they made contact with the enemy.

Through the din of the battle men could hear bagpipes off in the distance as the British 42nd Regiment entered the field of battle.

Known throughout the world as the Black Watch, these men of Scotland are known for having excellent conduct in battle. Knowlton and his men, pulled back.

The Black Watch and the British light infantry seeing this, assumed the Americans were retreating and ran into the hallow after them.

Everything was going to plan. Washington would now hammer the enemy.

Troops from Rhode Island, about 150, rushed into the fray. A brigade from Massachusetts was committed to the battle. George "Joe Gourd" Weedon stormed into the Hallow with

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Stunned at the American counter attack the British advance was halted. Against all odds and to everyone's surprise in the open field the Americans attacked and after some quick exchange of musketry the British went into full retreat.

Through the site of today's Barnard College ran the Redcoats, kilt and all with the Americans chasing them. The Americans took great delight seeing the British run the other way. The chase was soon called off and the men returned to their lines.

Overjoyed that the battle went well the men were elated. The Americans lost 30 men killed in the Battle of Harlem Heights. The British numbers range from 92-390 killed and many more wounded.

Not a big battle in terms of troops, but it raised the confidence of the Americans after months of defeats. This is Washington's first battlefield victory of the war.

On night of September 21, 1776, a fire started in a tavern on the lower west side of Manhattan. Everything was made of wood, so it quickly spread.

How it started is a mystery, but it is said to have burnt one quarter of the city of New York. The British blamed the Americans, the Americans blamed the British. Either way, many of the British troops would not be staying in warm houses come the winter. You can still see evidence today of the great fire of 1776.

Take a walk into the cemeteries of St. Paul's Cathedral or Trinity Church; some of the ancient tombstones are still black from the fire, a small reminder of a September long ago.

On October 16 Washington's Army followed the Bronx River north and out of New York City. I believe my grandfather was correct. When the world feels like it is hammering on you like an anvil, be patient, the time will come when you become the hammer. You will know what to do. ###

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

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200th Anniversary of the National Anthem

On September 13, 1814, a British fleet with attached army units, fresh from burning Washington, now set their sights on Baltimore, Maryland.

However, after a twentyfive hour bombardment of Fort McHenry with mortar bombs and Congreve rockets, the fort's Commander, Major George Armistead, ordered a large garrison flag to be hoisted to show both friend and foe that they had not surrendered.

Aboard one of the British ships was an American emissary seeking the release of civilian prisoners taken at Washington.

In this he was successful. But because he was aware of the British plans to attack Baltimore, he was held until the battle was over.

This man's name was Francis Scott Key. Mr. Key was despondent during the night that the fort would fall. He saw the mortar bombs and rockets exploding over and around the fort.

With the dawn, when he saw the large flag flying over Fort McHenry, he was moved to jot down a few lines of a poem on the back of an envelope. This poem "In Defense of Fort McHenry" was printed in the local newspaper and was later set to music.

This was to become our National Anthem. The Star Spangled Banner, but not until March 3, 1931 by an Act of Congress.

The story of the flag goes back to July 1813, when Major Armistead said, "It is my desire to have a flag so large that the British will have no difficulty seeing it at a distance."

He hired Mary Pickersgill to make a large American flag for the fort. Mary, her daughter, three nieces and a black servant girl labored ten hours a day for three weeks.

When Mary's house became too small to work on the flag, she moved across the street to a brewery to finish it.

The flag, consisting of fifteen stars and fifteen stripes, for the fifteen states then making up the United States, was 42 by 30 feet. She was paid \$405.90 for her efforts.

The flag remained in the Armistead Family until it was loaned to the Smithsonian in 1907 and, in 1912, was made a permanent gift.

Today, after a number of restorations, it is on display in the Smithsonian Museum of American History in our Nation's capital, Washington, DC, for all to see this Star Spangled Banner. Story by James J. Halloran Jr. ###

He was also very active in the Scout movement and served as Scoutmaster. He was killed while in service during World War I.

Throughout its history it has met at the Municipal Building; the Old Reformed Church on Burton Avenue (presently the New World Montessori School); the Pioneer Club; at the homes of various members; "The American Legion Center" at the corner of Henry Street and The Boulevard (presently the TD Bank parking lot) a lot leased by the Borough to the Post at \$1 a year; and also at a building located at the corner of Passaic and Terrace Avenues.

Presently the Post meets on the first Monday of each month at 7:30 p.m. in the Senior Center at the Municipal Building.

Filling You In

What you need to know about wisdom teeth

If they grow in properly, wisdom teeth are no different than any other teeth in your mouth. However, if they become impacted, or erupt in a strange angle or location, they may need to be removed.

Learn more about your wisdom teeth and wisdom tooth extractions.

What are wisdom teeth?

Wisdom teeth are another name for the third molars. Most people have three permanent molars in each quadrant of their mouth. First molars typically erupt around age 6, while second molars emerge around age 12. The third molars are the last to erupt.

They are referred to as wisdom teeth because they tend to develop later in life than other teeth, between the ages of 17 and 21.

Why do wisdom teeth sometimes need to be removed?

Some wisdom teeth may become impacted (prevented from erupting properly). Many dentists recommend the extraction of impacted wisdom teeth because of the problems they may cause, including infection, decay of adjacent teeth, gum disease, cysts, and tumors.

Wisdom teeth that have already erupted also may need to be removed if they are nonfunctional, badly decayed, interfering with your bite, involved with or at risk of gum disease, or causing problems with adjacent teeth or restorations. Some dentists also may recommend removing wisdom teeth before they're fully erupted in order to prevent such problems from developing.

How do I know if I need my wisdom teeth removed?

Individuals whose wisdom teeth need to be removed may experience a variety of symptoms, including pain, infection, and swelling of the face or gumline. Your dentist can determine whether you need your wisdom teeth removed by taking X-rays and examining your mouth. Wisdom teeth that are not removed should be monitored, as they may cause problems later in life. Extraction is usually an outpatient procedure, performed by a dentist or oral surgeon using a local

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sedation or general anesthetic.

Are there any complications associated with wisdom tooth extractions?

The most common complication associated with wisdom tooth extractions is dry socket, a painful condition that occurs when the blood clot at the extraction site does not form correctly or is lost prematurely.

Because this blood clot serves as the foundation for new tissue and bone to develop, dry socket delays the normal healing process.

To prevent dry socket, do not smoke, consume carbonated beverages, or drink through a straw after a wisdom tooth extraction. Rinsing with salt water can help keep your mouth clean after the procedure. However, you should avoid excessive rinsing or spitting while your mouth heals.

Additionally, studies have shown that the high levels of estrogen found during the first 22 days of the menstrual cycle and in certain oral contraceptives may increase a woman's chances of developing dry socket. To decrease this risk, if possible, women should schedule extractions during the last week of their menstrual cycle.

Before tooth extraction, be sure to tell your dentist about any medications or supplements that you are taking, as they could interfere with the healing process. To avoid complications after the procedure, follow your dentist's instructions regarding eating and drinking, pain management, and keeping the extraction site clean.

Everyone's mouth is different, and only a dentist can determine whether your wisdom teeth need to be removed.

If you have concerns about your wisdom teeth or wisdom tooth extraction, talk to your general dentist.














W-R/Moonachie Takes Title




