So here is September. The new month brings cooler weather. It also brings the excitement of the new football season for those that care. Fans go to the closet and get their jerseys out. Every team starts off on an equal footing and the games begin. Last year's failures are forgotten, in the hope that they won't be repeated this year.

You may have heard the term "play 60." It's a reference to playing the whole game, not just part of it. How many times have you seen a team play well for 3 quarters and in the 4th die out on the field from exhaustion and lose the game? It happens all the time.

A couple games with losses from that are enough to keep a team out of the playoffs. Frustrating to fans but the lesson is one of the most important. If they don't play the whole game your team don't deserve to win and probably won't.

This lesson doesn't come from the field of sports though. It comes from the field of battle long before the NFL.

In 1781 General Nathaniel Greene wanted to remove all of the British forces from South Carolina. The Revolutionary War was in its 6th year. He had a little over 2,000 men under his command and he decided to remove the last British outpost in South Carolina which was Fort Ninety Six. along the Santee River. Sending detachments to harass the British operating in Charleston they waited for the next move.

From Charleston came the British Colonel Alexander Stewart and 2,000 men.

Their goal was to find General Greene's Army and defeat it. Stewart also camped along the Santee River at a place called Eutaw Springs, a couple of miles from the town of today's Eutawville, South Carolina.

Here the Eutaw Creek flows into the Santee and also Nelson's Ferry is nearby. Under trees in a nice shady place, it was a nice spot to rest his troops. In what appeared to be general safety.

Now General Greene decided to surprise Stewart and attack his camp. He was within 7 miles of the British camp and Stewart admitted that although he was looking for Greene's force he had failed to locate them, even though the Americans were so close.

On September 8, 1781 General Greene marched his command to the British camp. His order of battle was this. Three lines were formed.

In the first line were the North and South Carolina Militia under the Command of Brigadier General Francis Marion and General Andrew Pickens. Some Virginia dragoons under Colonel Henry Lee were also in the front.

The second line was composed of Maryland and Virginia Continentals under the command of Brigadier General Jethro Sumner.

The third line was a reserve line of cavalry led by Lt. Colonel William Washington and Delaware Continentals led by Captain Robert Kirkwood. General Greene and his small Army marched down the River Road to Eutaw Springs and the command of 150 men on horse and foot to retrieve his foraging party.

Coffin and his men ran into Lee's Dragoons and a skirmish quickly ensued. Coffin thought it's a small party of rebels so he presses an attack, but while Lee had to await the rest of the main body of troops to come up to support him, they fired into Coffin's men.

Coffin took losses and realized he needed to get back to camp and fell back. Greene's troops come up and more than one letter from the times explained that many of the troops had been emptying casks of rum.

Liquor and warfare should never be mixed but it ain't the first time some men drank up some courage. It just doesn't end well when that happens.

Greene deployed his first line and on they marched down the road. Stewart hurriedly formed his battle line. It was a single line of troops.

The third regiment was on his right flank with Grenadiers under Major John Majoribanks. Loyalist troops held his center.

These troops are the same as the troops that left Fort Ninety Six. His left was covered by the 63rd and the 64th Regiment. Behind them in reserve were Coffin and his mounted troops. Nine o'clock in the morning the two lines converged.

The British presented a field piece in the center and fired away. Lee paused to bring up his own cannons and they dueled back and forth till they were all put out of action dismounted and disabled.

Lee's infantry and Stewart's infantry fired volley after volley in a bloody beginning to the battle. The battle lines were close and the volley went from flank to flank as both sides fired at one another.

Stewart's left flank for some reason advanced without Stewart's orders. This advance pushed in Greene's' right flank and center. Greene said that these British troops stood with a "firmness that would have graced the Veterans of the great King of Prussia." that grows in this part of the country slowed the attack down because the horses could not penetrate through this brush.

Washington was bayonetted and taken prisoner. Lee has better success as his men poured a destructive fire into the British left, combined with the bayonet charge on the left side of the British line by the Marylanders trailing arms shattered the British left side.

The British fell back on this side and soon the whole line was in retreat. The British ran through their own campsite. Many entered a house that sat in rear of the camp. They used this house to fire from the windows and pick off troops chasing them through the camp.

Oddly, most of the Americans stopped in the camp to take things they needed. Blankets, cups, food all the things many of them didn't have.

Here is where they needed to play 60. Greene had victory in hand but the men didn't follow up on the route of the British.

American officers ran through the camp and were being shot at from the house only to find that they are alone and their men stopped in the camp, many enjoying the fruits of a believed victory and partaking in some camp site rum. Greene tried to rally his men to complete the victory but it was no use.

Majoribanks and Coffin now seeing what had happened rallied their own fleeing troops and counter attacked. They drove the Americans out of the camp.

Greene ordered a strong picket to enter the area again and pick up the wounded men that were not too close to the house. The house had now become a strong position for the British. Once the wounded that could be taken were collected, Greene ordered a retreat.

The Battle of Eutaw Springs was over. Greene was no doubt disappointed in the outcome of the battle he knew he should have won, but the men decided that the battle was over before it actually was. All the effort in the battle was wasted on not completing the victory so close at hand. Dead on the field were 139 Americans with 375 wounded. The British suffered more. There were 85 dead and another 297 wounded. They also lost 430 soldiers as prisoners of war. Stewart on September 9, 1781 abandoned the field. He left his dead unburied and 70 of his wounded comrades in the field.

The gallant Majoribanks that helped Stewart steal a victory from certain defeat, took a wound and died in a Negro cabin on the Wantoot Plantation. He was buried next to the road.

All rivers shift and move in time and today most of the Battle site of Eutaw Springs is covered by the Santee River. It's covered by water and time, all but forgotten.

It is a lasting reminder for anyone that takes time to learn.....you got to play the full 60 because you can be sure your opponent will.

Somebody forward this to the Giants and Jets before the lesson is lost along with another season. ###

He laid siege to the outpost but when it was reported that Lord Rawdon and his troops were making their approach on Ninety Six, Greene lifted the siege.

Rawdon and his British troops chased Greene and his men for days but could not catch him. Rawdon abandoned the pursuit. He burned Ninety Six and fell back into Charleston.

Greene rested his men

British camp.

Now, Stewart was unaware of the approach of the Americans. He sent out a detachment of troops to forage for food.

There were 350 men in this detachment. They were digging for potatoes, certainly not a glorious task for soldiers when one signs up to be a soldier, but a necessary one to obtain food.

Going about their duty would be no big deal except they were currently unarmed. Two deserters from the American side alerted Colonel Stewart that the Americans were coming.

Realizing the bad spot his foragers were in he sent out John Coffin, a local Tory operating with the British Army, in Greene was forced to advance his second line in support. His North Carolina Continentals now entered the battle.

This added fire power drove back the British advance to its original position. Coffin had to use his reserves to bolster the British line as well. Greene decided to press the attack. He ordered his Maryland and Virginia Continentals in his second line to attack with the bayonet. He also ordered Lee to charge on Stewart's right flank with William Washington's cavalry.

When Halstead went on sick leave, Karge instituted regular drills and training, forced out incompetent officers and got uniforms and equipment for the entire regiment.

When Halstead returned, he was furious over the fact that so many of his family and friends had been forced to leave the Army.

As the officers of the regiment were openly arguing and the men had nothing to do, some began to desert. General Stoneman recommended that the regiment be broken up and the men sent to other regiments. Halstead resigned.

Sir Percy Wyndham, a British soldier of fortune, with experience in the British Army and Navy, French Navy, Austrian Lancers and as a cavalry officer with Garibaldi in Italy, where he was knighted by the King of Italy, was appointed Colonel.

Both Wyndham and Karge soon had the regiment in first rate condition. The payoff would come at the Battle of Brandy Station on June 9, 1863.

This battle was the largest cavalry battle of the Civil War. The 1st slashed its way through both the 12th and 35th Virginia Cavalry Regiments. They were then hit by the 6th Virginia and were forced back. Wyndham received a leg wound and would leave the Army.

As the Army of the Potomac advanced in pursuit of Lee, the 1st guarded the right of the Army. They arrived at Gettysburg on July 2, and were placed to guard the right flank, east of Culp's Hill.

That evening the Confederate Stonewall Brigade ran into

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the position held by the 1st, and were repelled with no losses.

The next day they were sent to relieve another regiment. However, they were slow to come up because Major Beaumont, temporary in command, had gone sick. He had the habit of going on sick call whenever there was a chance of a fight.

Major Hugh Janeway quickly brought up two squadrons (a squadron had four cavalry troops) and Major Beaumont, miraculously cured, led the third squadron up in support.

The troopers dismounted and took a position behind a stone wall. They then opened fire, with their carbines, on Confederate pickets across the way. This went on for some time before they began to run low on carbine ammunition.

Another regiment was sent up to support them. They borrowed some ammunition, but it soon ran out. Rather than withdraw, they drew their revolvers and fired them.

They were then ordered to withdraw so that the artillery could have a clear field of fire on the oncoming Confederate cavalry.

Confederate General J. E. B. Stuart advanced his command in an attempt to get to the rear of Union forces at Gettysburg. This charge was met head on by a Union regiment led by General George A. Custer.

The 1st New Jersey remounted and charged into the left side of the Confederate column. One New Jersey trooper is credited with inflicting two saber wounds to Confederate General Wade Hampton. Stuart was stopped cold here. The regiment had 9 wounded from this fight.

The 1st New Jersey would end the war at Appomattox, Virginia in 1865. They had participated in 97 engagements. Twelve members received the Medal of Honor.

They overcame both internal and external adversity to become the sixth highest rated cavalry regiment in the Union Army. Provided by Civil War Enthusiast Jim Halloran. ###

Lt. Beese of Carlstadt Police Department reports that there are 20 crossing guards posted throughout the Borough on all school days from 7:45 a.m.– 9 a.m. and 2:45 p.m.– 4 p.m. Please obey the directions of the crossing guards in those areas.

There are approximately 600 students that are dropped off and picked up at Carlstadt Public School every school day. Please follow the following rules.

• Do not park in the drop off zones. They are for dropping off and picking up of students only.

• Parents can use the auxiliary parking lot located at the north/west corner of the school, (*next to the basketball courts*) which can be entered from Garden Street.

• Please do not turn left from Washington Street on to Summit Avenue, when dropping off and picking up students. This disrupts the flow of traffic.

• Please do not park within 25 feet of a crosswalk or 50 feet of a stop sign. This makes it difficult for the crossing guards to see moving vehicles clearly and be able to safely cross the children.

#### **East Rutherford**

The East Rutherford Police Department reports there are currently 26 school crossing guards posted throughout their Borough. All guards will be wearing a lime green vest and have a STOP paddle.

There are also multiple School Bus Drop off/Pickup Zones. Drivers are reminded to obey all directions given by the school crossing guards.

East Rutherford Police deploys two message boards to remind drivers of Traffic Laws, "Stop for Pedestrians in Crosswalks," "Click it or Ticket," "No Cellphone use

#### **Preventing Tooth Erosion**

Tooth erosion, or tooth wear, is the loss of the surrounding tooth structure. Thisloss occurs when the hard part of your teeth—which is called the enamel—is worn away by acid. Over time, this erosion can leave your teeth sensitive, cracked, and discolored.

What causes tooth erosion? Acid is the main cause of tooth erosion.

So, drinking carbonated beverages, energy and sports drinks, and pure fruit juice, which all contain high levels of acid, can cause tooth erosion, especially when consumed in large amounts.

Certain medical conditions, including acid reflux and bulimia, also can cause tooth erosion because they cause increased levels of stomach acids in the mouth.

What are the signs and symptoms of tooth erosion?

Tooth erosion can present in a variety of ways. Below are some common signs and symptoms:

• Sensitivity—Since protective enamel is wearing away, you may feel a twinge of pain when you consume hot, cold, or sweet foods and drinks. As more enamel wears away, teeth can become increasingly sensitive.

• Discoloration—Teeth can become yellow as the dentin, the second layer of the tooth, is exposed.

• Rounded teeth—Your teeth may have a rounded or "sand-blasted" look.

• Transparency—Your front teeth may appear slightly transparent near the biting edges.

• Cracks—Small cracks and rough areas may appear at the edges of your teeth.

• Cupping—Small dents may appear on the chewing surfaces of your teeth, and fillings might appear to be rising up out of the teeth.

What can I do to prevent tooth erosion? You can help prevent tooth erosion from occurring by taking these simple steps:

• Cut down on your consumption of carbonated beverages, sports and energy drinks, and pure fruit juice.

• Drink acidic drinks quickly and with a straw. This

helps prevent acid from coming in contact with your teeth.

Also, don't swish these liquids around or hold them in your mouth for long periods of time.

• After consuming acidic drinks, rinse your mouth with water to neutralize the acids and wait at least one hour before brushing your teeth.

• Chew sugar-free gum, which helps your mouth produce more saliva to remineralize your teeth.

• Brush with a soft toothbrush and be sure your toothpaste contains a high amount of fluoride.

• Don't let your child consume highly acidic drinks or fruit juices in his or her sippy cup or bottle.

How can I deal with the sensitivity caused by tooth erosion? You can reduce sensitivity by using specially formulated toothpaste or overthe-counter enamel-building products.

However, always be sure to check with your general dentist before you try any new dental products. Tooth erosion impacts everyone in different ways. Make sure you speak with your dentist about your oral hygiene and find out what else you can do to protect yourself from tooth erosion.

Goodbye Summer 2016...I don't want to say good riddance but after all those 90 + dog days we had to deal with, especially the month of July, my true feelings are doomed to appear "good riddance"!

Oh, and by the way, as of the first of this month there are 116 days until Christmas... that should cool things down a little and personally I can't wait, how about you? I know that I'm rushing things by more than just a few months but I'm going to say it anyway "Merry Christmas."

Looking back over the summer of 2016, one question continues to plague my mind in bold print no less...Where the heck were all the kids?

The streets reminded me of that cable program called "Life Without People." Have any of you had occasion to catch that show? If yes, then you know what I mean.

The landscape was so baron that I expected to see tumble weed skipping across the sun baked road where once the kids from Columbus School played box ball or two hand touch.

There was a time, and you baby boomers can attest to this, when every street, vacant lot, dirt road, hillside and school yard in Lodi was overflowing with kids.

From dawn till dusk there was something going on that involved youngsters at play.

All someone had to do was bounce a ball and presto, like magic, there were 10 kids on the scene choosing sides and drawing bases on the macadam with rocks that were washed down from the hills of Farnham Avenue during a thunderstorm.

If someone happened to show up with a basketball then before you knew it another kid was balancing himself on the shoulders of his buddy nailing the rim of a large wooden vegone step ahead of you. All you had to do was walk no more than 100 feet from your house, sometimes less than that, and you were involved in a game.

That wasn't only in the summer months folks ...that was year round. It was never too hot, too cold or too anything for that matter. There was always something going on and everyone took part in it. Am I right folks?

If we needed a change of pace there was always our trusted bikes. Those beat up two wheelers were an important part of everyday life for a kid growing up in the 50s and 60s.

True we didn't use them on a regular basis, but when someone yelled "Let's go bike riding" that Huffy had to be in working condition and ready at a moment's notice lest you get left behind. You started off with maybe four or five kids and by the time you went around the block twice the number grew to 8 or more.

Again that's because there were so many of us. "Hey where you guys going?" No one knew or cared for that matter. The truth is we didn't know until we got there. I rode a Huffy Convertible and it was as much a part of me as my Keds high top black and white sneakers.

When my parents, Vito and Lena, gave it to me a couple of Christmases earlier it was equipped with red and white fenders, a matching chain guard, a horn, handle bar grips with red white and blue streamers attached to them, a seat cover, reflectors and yes, a rear view mirror.

The bike came with red metal covers that were connected to the bars that ran from the handle bars to the seat. It's what distinguished it from a girl's bike which was obviously a very important feature for ing soap box go carts.

Any way by the time the summer of 1957 was over the once shiny and new Huffy was beat up and stripped clean of all of those added features.

All that was left was the rear fender and the handle bar grips minus the streamers. Even the chain guard was gone which meant every so often the bike ride had to stop long enough for someone to help you remove your pant cuffs from the chain. It was a greasy affair that did not bode well for the kid whose mom had to wash them...torn cuffs and all.

My pal, Johnny Rannou, had a bike which was made up of parts from other bikes of various makes and models. Other kids at least knew what the heck they were pedaling.

It was a Road Master, a Huffy, or a Schwinn. When someone asked Rannou what kind of bike he was riding he'd have a choice as to what answer to give them and wouldn't be lying.

Any way folks the question remains..." Where have all the children gone?" Yea, I know those days are long gone and one can most likely find them staring into a computer which of course is a sign of the times.

Where are these kids going to play? Even the side streets are like highways. You can't even cross them, let alone play on them.

There are no more open fields or vacant lots to play on for they have long since given way to homes and businesses.

Even the school yards, once the very mecca of summer fun and recreation, are now lifeless.

Today it's mostly organized sports and I think it's a great idea because without them, especially in today's fast pace society, a kid would have no place else to simply have fun. And that's what being a kid is all about...That much hasn't changed...right folks? ###

#### Thoughts on **Back to School**

Earlier this year, a nice young couple decided to sell their condo in Jersey City and move to one of the towns down here in our desirable south central Bergen County area. The main reason they moved? Their son Robbie, age 5, starts school this week.

It's a typical realtor story, but it highlights the quality of our local school districts which, I can tell from long experience, accounts immeasurably for the allure and value others put on residential real estate around here.

"We definitely moved here for the schools," Robbie's mom told us. "We wanted our kids to be with other children whose parents had as much involvement with education. The people here have similar backgrounds to ours. Those are the types of people you want to become friends with, whose kids you want your kids to become friends with."

All over the country, parents are preparing this week to send their children back to school, spending hundreds of dollars on books, clothes and groceries for brown bag lunches. And, for many families, another key back-to-school purchase is... a new home!

Online giant Trulia, conducted a survey that compared

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the ratio of families with children aged 5 to 9 versus families with children aged 0 to 4. The results, unsurprisingly, showed that the most attractive communities for families with school-aged kids are traditional suburbs like those around here, where many of us grew up.

The communities that are the least attractive to parents with school-age children (the districts with the lowest ratios of 5-to-9 year olds and 0-to-4 year olds), tended to be densely-populated areas that are popular with young professionals and students, yet have high real estate prices. Notable among them is Hoboken, which has only 39 children of elementary school age for every 100 preschool-aged children.

We in the real estate business see up close the migration trends motivating many 30-39 year olds. A fair number of people in this age group may originate in the centers of cities but, we note, a substantial outflow of them as their kids approach school age.

It would appear that, setting their own interests aside, these more mature, responsible couples think more now along the lines of what's in the best interests of their kids.

(Our own son, Martin, father of two, made a similar decision last year when he and his wife gave up their hipster lifestyle in Williamsburg, Brooklyn and transitioned to the more staid environment of Beacon, NY.)

The fact is, though, that buying in a community with a good school district can benefit you even if you don't have kids.

Realtor.com did a survey recently which showed that school district boundaries impact the buying decision for more than 60 percent of home buyers.

Schools have always been closely tied to real estate sales but, more than ever, education is often seen as a factor that is even more important than price, commute time and nearby amenities. It means high resale value.

We're fortunate to have that (and more!), right here in our local area. Just last year, for example, the Hasbrouck Heights School District was acclaimed 80th best school district in New Jersey according to the 2015 Niche Rankings, a research and rating standard.

According to Niche: "A high ranking indicates that the district contains great schools with exceptional teachers, sufficient resources, and a diverse set of high-achieving students who rate their experiences very highly."

And Hasbrouck Heights' "80 out of the hundred best" is pretty damn awesome when you realize that that score was based on a total 8,738 school districts and dozens of key statistics, plus 4.6 million opinions from 280,000 students and parents...!

Now while that is a pretty bold statement made by Master Sommelier, a fancy title for a wine expert, Madeline Triffon, who called Pinot Noir sex in a glass, one can't overlook the fact that PN is one of the finest wines produced around the world.

Even though PN has at times been referred to as a "minx of a vine" by Jancis Robinson because of its difficulty in growing the grapes or being declared by Andre'Tchelistcheff, in a fit of obvious rage that "God made Cabernet Sauvignon whereas the devil made Pinot Noir," or Joel Fleischman of Vanity Fair who describes Pinot Noir as "the most romantic of wines, with so voluptuous a perfume, so sweet an edge, and so powerful a punch that, like falling in love, they make the blood run hot and the soul wax embarrassingly poetic"

Really? Seriously what the hell are these people talking about?

The wine experts, at times referred to as wine snobs, make such references not only to express how good the wine is, but to impress you with their immense wine knowledge. We get it, you have a wine degree in Oenology you are special!

Now far be it from us to disagree with them. In fact we respect their knowledge and could only strive to come close to a sommelier let only a Master Sommelier. That being said and we mean this from the bottom of our hearts, Will it work well

with hamburgers, Chinese food or pizza, with cheese, olives or other savory snacks? Will it work with desserts?

So for all of you fine people who enjoy wine but may feel a bit intimidated by all the aristocratic mumbo jumbo, let's break it down in plain old English without the hint of trying to sound pompous or like a stuffed shirt if you will. Bless their hearts.

Does PN pair with a big juicy steak or a simple hamburger, you bet it does. How about a slice of pizza, pasta dish or seafood, come on why wouldn't it. Chinese and other Asian dishes, are you kidding me, pass the dumplings please! What about fresh fruits, chocolates, cannoli, yup all of the above. Hell, even Entenmann's will go with Pinot Noir. What?

You never had any of their products at the end of the aisle in the supermarket. That's what I thought. Trust me I speak from experience; after all we all can't afford Crepes Suzette.

What you need to know is that when PN is young, only a year or two, it will have a nice full red fruit aroma with subtle taste hints of cherries, berries, plums or raspberries.

But, when you have a bottle that has a little more age to it, three years or older, you will be able to notice the complexity of the wine, the fullness of the taste that will give you great pleasure or dare I sound like one of the wine experts, tastes like liquid velvet washing over your tongue. think I need to try this PN but how do I know what to get or how much to spend. Well how much you want to spend depends on you.

But remember you don't need to spend a lot to get a good bottle of any type of wine today. The how and the where to buy them is easy too. Just go to your local wine store that offer tastings, some local examples are Stew Leonard's Wines which has several locations, or Total Wine in Paramus.

Locals can also go to **Meadowland Wine and Liquor** in Wood-Ridge. Ask for So-Ham the owner, a great guy that always has many interesting wines to offer.

Most will offer a tasting of wines on a regular basis; ask them when they will be offering Pinot Noir for a taste. Trust me you will be pleasantly surprised, and do not be afraid to let them know a price range that you want to spend; they will be able to get you a great bottle that will fit your budget.

The days of bad wine are far behind us my fellow wine lovers. Over 90% of the vineyards around the world and here in the USA are committed to putting only the best wines in the bottle showcasing their label. Do a little research and taste, taste and, when in doubt, taste again.

There is nothing wrong with a splash or two or even three. Don't forget to share your wine finds with family and friends, it will taste that much better. Besides you may just find that bottle of Pinot Noir that the wine experts refer to as "sex in a glass." Till next month, enjoy, drink, cheers and Salute! Philip Miuccio & A. # Youth Mentors Needed

Each year, in Bergen County, approximately 600 children are removed from their homes due to abuse, neglect or other factors that place them at risk of harm.

These children are placed in foster homes, residential facilities, hospitals, shelters or in the care of other family members.

The Bergen Volunteer Center's Mentoring Youth program is currently recruiting volunteer mentors to work one-onone with youth between the ages of 5-18 who are facing these difficult challenges.

For more than 30 years, Mentoring Youth has trained and supervised adult volunteers to serve as mentors to children who are confronting adverse social, emotional and/or behavioral challenges at home or in their daily lives.

Mentors serve as positive role models; provide guidance, friendship and support; and advocate on behalf of youth when called upon to do so.

The next 3-week Mentoring Youth training will begin on Wednesday, September 21, 2016. According to a study by Big Brothers/Big Sisters, youth who regularly meet with a mentor are 52% less likely than peers to skip school and 46% less likely to use drugs.

Additionally, they are 33% less likely to hit someone or to start drinking.

By sharing fun activities and exposing a youth to new experiences, mentors encourage positive choices, promote high self-esteem, support academic achievement and introduce young people to new ideas.

Mentoring Youth volunteer training is provided at no charge and covers such topics as the benefits of mentoring for volunteers and children; child and adolescent development; understanding child maltreatment; effective listening and communication skills; building rapport and developing strong mentoring relationships; the role of the mentor; and the matching and closure process.

Applicants are required to undergo a comprehensive background check and must obtain written letters of recommendation as part of the training course.
