

It's Hurricane Season -- Be Prepared

The 2017 Atlantic hurricane season is an ongoing event in the annual formation of tropical cyclones in the Atlantic basin. The season officially began on June 1, and will end on November 30, 2017. These dates historically describe the period of year when most tropical cyclones form in the Atlantic basin and are adopted by convention. However, as shown by Tropical Storm Arlene on April 19, 2017, the formation of tropical cyclones is possible at

Hurricanes can cause catastrophic damage. Hurricanes can produce winds exceeding 155 miles per hour as well as tornadoes and microbursts.

Additionally, hurricanes can create storm surges along the coast and cause extensive damage from heavy rainfall.

Floods and flying debris from the excessive winds are often the deadly and destructive results of these weather events. Flash flooding can occur due to intense rainfall.

Know the Difference

Hurricane Watch—Hurricane conditions are a threat within 48 hours.

Review your hurricane plans, keep informed and be ready to act if a warning is issued.

Hurricane Warning— Hurricane conditions are expected within 36 hours. Complete your storm preparations and leave the area if directed to do so by authorities.

Prepare Your Home/Property

• Bring in or secure anything that can be picked up by the wind (*bicycles, lawn furniture*).

• Trim loose/dead branches from trees.

• Secure windows with storm shutters/plywood (*pre-drill holes*).

• Remove satellite dishes/ antennae/roof turbines.

• Clean out gutters.

• Stack sandbags around exterior door frames.

• Close windows, doors and hurricane shutters. If you

do not have hurricane shutters, close and board up all windows and doors with plywood.

• Turn the refrigerator and freezer to the coldest setting and keep them closed as much as possible so that food will last longer if the power goes out.

• Turn off propane tanks and unplug small appliances.

• Talk with members of your household and create an evacuation plan. Planning and practicing your evacuation plan minimizes confusion and fear during the event.

• Securely moor or move your watercraft to a safe location.

Don't Forget

• Fill your vehicle with gas well in advance.

• Know how to turn off your home's gas, electricity and water.

• Prep generator to assure proper operation.

• Do NOT plan on using propane heaters indoors as these are a health hazard and a fire hazard when used indoors. Same story -- do not use candles.

Have On Hand

• Tools (hammer, screwdriver, chainsaw, etc.).

• Plastic tarp (*roof/window repair*).

• Clean up supplies (for yard and home).

• Camera to document before/after.

Basic Disaster Supplies Kit

A basic emergency supply kit could include the following recommended items: any time of the year.

NOAA has raised the number of named storms it expects to develop in their latest 2017 Atlantic hurricane season outlook, warning that "the season has the potential to be extremely active."

In their August outlook update, NOAA forecasters said there is a high chance -60 percent - of an above-average hurricane season, with 14 to 19 named storms expected throughout the season.

• Battery-powered or hand per crank radio and a NOAA thr Weather Radio with tone alert san and extra batteries for both.

• Flashlight and extra batteries.

• First aid kit.

• Moist towelettes, garbage bags and plastic ties for personal sanitation.

• Prescription Medications (7-day supply), medical information and medical items (hearing aids with extra batteries, glasses, contact lenses, syringes, cane).

• Baby supplies (bottles, formula, baby food, diapers).

• Pet supplies (*collar*, *leash*, *ID*, *food*, *carrier*, *bowl*), and vet records.

• Extra cash or traveler's checks and change.

• Important family documents such as copies of insurance policies, identification and bank account records in a waterproof, portable container.

• Sleeping bag or warm blanket for each person.

• Complete change of clothing including a long sleeved shirt, long pants and sturdy shoes. Rain gear.

• Extra set of car keys and house keys.

• Insect repellent and sunscreen.

• Fire extinguisher.

• Matches in a waterproof container.

• Books, games, puzzles or other activities for children.

Food/Water

Consider the following things when putting together your emergency food supplies: • Water, one gallon of water per person per day for at least three days, for drinking and sanitation.

• Store at least a three-day supply of non-perishable food.

• Choose foods your family will eat.

• Remember any special dietary needs.

• Avoid foods that will make you thirsty.

• Choose salt-free crackers, whole grain cereals and canned foods with high liquid content.

• Mess kits, paper cups, plates, paper towels and plastic utensils.

• Manual can opener for food.

Following a disaster, there may be power outages that could last for several days. Stock canned foods, dry mixes and other staples that do not require refrigeration, cooking, water or special preparation.

What do I do After a Hurricane?

• Drive only if necessary and avoid flooded roads and washed-out bridges.

• Keep away from loose or dangling power lines and report them immediately to the power company.

• Stay out of any building that has water around it.

• Inspect your home for damage. Take pictures of damage, both of the building and its contents, for insurance purposes.

• Use flashlights in the dark. Do NOT use candles.

• Avoid drinking or preparing food with tap water until you are sure it's not con-

taminated.

• Check refrigerated food for spoilage. If in doubt, throw it out.

• Wear protective clothing and be cautious when cleaning up to avoid injury.

• Watch animals closely and keep them under your direct control.

• Use the telephone only for emergency calls.

Flash Flood Driving Tips

Flash flooding can occur after only a few minutes of heavy rainfall or after hours of precipitation. Safety officials offer these flood safety tips.

• During foul weather, be sure to turn on your lights. Remember, it's the law.

• Never drive around barricades at water crossings.

• Do not drive through standing water on roads or in parking lots. This could cause you to hydroplane and lose control of your vehicle. If you do experience aquaplaning, hold the steering wheel lightly and lift off the throttle until the tires regain grip. • Don't try driving through fast-moving water, such as at a flooded bridge approach - your car could easily be swept away. If no alternate route exists

and you have no other reasonable alternative but to drive through standing water --

• Remember that six inches of water will reach the bottom of most car doors. One foot of water will float most vehicles and two feet of water will carry most vehicles away.

• There is no way to tell if flooded roads have been washed out by swift-moving waters. Roads covered by water are prone to collapse. • Watch for debris in the roadway, such as downed trees or limbs.

• Avoid driving in water that downed electrical or power lines have fallen in — electric current passes through water easily.

Do your best to estimate the depth of the water (if other cars are driving through, take note of how deep the water is).
Drive slowly and steadily to avoid creating a bow wave.

• Driving fast through standing water can cause expensive damage - the air intake on many cars is low down at the front of the engine bay and it only takes a small quantity of water sucked into the engine to cause serious damage. All

engines are affected but turbocharged and diesel engines are most vulnerable.

• Drive in the highest section of the road if it is safe to do so.

• Just like in winter weather, try to keep a little more distance between your vehicle and the vehicle in front of you.

• Do not drive through flood water if a vehicle is travelling in the opposite direction.

• Watch and be prepared for spray from larger vehicles like trucks.

• Be especially careful at night as it can be difficult to see water and its depth across the roadway.

• If your vehicle stalls in the deep water, you may need

to restart the engine to make it to safety. Keep in mind that restarting may cause irreparable damage to the engine.

• If you can't restart your vehicle and you become trapped in rising water, immediately abandon it for higher ground.

• Try to open the door or roll down the window to get out of the vehicle.

• Have a device (*hammer*) to break a window from inside your vehicle.

• If you find yourself stranded in flood waters remain calm. Call 9-1-1 from the top of your vehicle or higher ground.

• Test your brakes thoroughly after leaving the flood water. ###

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

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Preventing Tooth Erosion

Tooth erosion, or tooth wear, is the loss of the surrounding tooth structure. This loss occurs when the hard part of your teeth—which is called the enamel—is worn away by acid.

Over time, this erosion can leave your teeth sensitive, cracked, and discolored.

What causes tooth erosion?

Acid is the main cause of tooth erosion. So, drinking carbonated beverages, energy and sports drinks, and pure fruit juice, which all contain high levels of acid, can cause tooth erosion, especially when consumed in large amounts.

Certain medical conditions, including acid reflux and bulimia, also can cause tooth erosion because they cause increased levels of stomach acids in the mouth.

What are the signs and symptoms of tooth erosion?

Tooth erosion can present in a variety of ways. Below are some common signs and symptoms:

• Sensitivity—Since protective enamel is wearing away, you may feel a twinge of pain when you consume hot, cold, or sweet foods and drinks.

As more enamel wears away, teeth can become increasingly sensitive.

• Discoloration—Teeth can become yellow as the dentin, the second layer of the tooth, is exposed.

• Rounded teeth—Your teeth may have a rounded or "sand-blasted" look.

• Transparency—Your front teeth may appear slightly transparent near the biting edges.

• Cracks—Small cracks and rough areas may appear at

erosion from occurring by taking these simple steps:

• Cut down on your consumption of carbonated beverages, sports and energy drinks, and pure fruit juice.

• Drink acidic drinks quickly and with a straw. This helps prevent acid from coming in contact with your teeth.

Also, don't swish these liquids around or hold them in your mouth for long periods of time.

• After consuming acidic drinks, rinse your mouth with water to neutralize the acids and wait at least one hour before brushing your teeth.

• Chew sugar-free gum, which helps your mouth produce more saliva to remineralize your teeth.

• Brush with a soft toothbrush and be sure your toothpaste contains a high amount of fluoride.

• Don't let your child consume highly acidic drinks or fruit juices in his or her sippy cup or bottle.

How can I deal with the sensitivity caused by tooth erosion?

You can reduce sensitivity by using specially formulated toothpaste or over the counter enamel-building products.

However, always be sure to check with your general dentist before you try any new dental products.

Tooth erosion impacts everyone in different ways. Make sure you speak with your dentist about your oral hygiene and find out what else you can do to protect yourself from tooth erosion.

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Veterans Today By Thomas Marshall

When I was young I remember the older folks telling me to save my pennies. Hold your nickels. Dimes add up. Ten cents is ten cents. I remember thinking that saving pennies would still take forever to get rich.

The lesson in saving your money is a useful lesson of course. Getting rich was not the lesson here. The true meaning of it is simple. Save your pennies and they will add up. Small amounts in time will add to the larger sum of money.

You may not get rich but if you make a good habit of it, you won't go totally broke and you will hit the goal you set in time. Small things adding up to make the whole, goes for other things as well.

Francis Marion was born in 1732 in South Carolina. He lived and worked on the family plantation like most young folks of the time did. His military career would begin in the French and Indian War when he joined William Moultrie's force to fight against the Cherokee Indians in 1757. In Moultrie's unit he became a Lieutenant. Fighting the Indians taught

him well about using cover of trees and the landscape to help surprise your enemy and wipe them out. He served the British at the time, but this would change.

After the French and Indian War he purchased his own plantation and went back to farming for a living. After the Revolutionary War started in 1775, he sided with the American cause and was told to recruit men for his own unit based on the fact that he had some military experience. So this he did. He was once again placed under the Command of William Moultrie who also took up the cause of American Independence.

The first assignment was to build Fort Moultrie. He and his men helped complete the task. History picks up Marion's military life once again in the spring of 1780 when the British lay siege and captured Charleston, South Carolina. Marion was in Charleston at the time but he was not captured. Lucky for him he broke his ankle and was sent out of the city before it fell.

He joined General Horatio

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Gates' Army which was being raised in the south to fight the British Southern Army. Marion knew the country and terrain in which Gates wanted to attack the British Army under the Command of General Cornwallis.

One would have thought Marion would be useful to Gates. General Gates however, had no confidence in Francis Marion and his luck would prove once again to be with him. Gates sent Marion and his small group of men out on scouting missions. More so it was said to get Marion out of Gates' way. So Marion and his men missed the Battle of Camden in which Gates' Army is routed and sent scattering to the country side.

Now at this point in time the British wanted to secure their hold on the Carolinas. Units were sent out from the British army that burnt towns stole and killed livestock, and arrested those that supported the Patriot cause. By doing these raids the British actually caused more of the local population in South Carolina to join the American cause.

The people of the area provided food and information to Francis Marion. He and his men, which numbered somewhere between 50 and 70 men at the time, took up camp in the Great White Marsh. Sick as many of his men were, Marion wanted to go into action.

Cornwallis had ordered his Loyalist troops not to go east of the Santee River because he was moving north to capture Charlotte, North Carolina with the rest of the Army and would not be around to give support.

So, the area was now under the control of Loyalist troops. John Ball and Joseph Wigfall were two Loyalist Captains that were ordered north of the Black River to maintain control in the Williamsburg District. Wigfall had 50 men in his command and Ball had 47 or so. Ball took his men to Shepherd's Ferry on the Black Mingo Creek and

camped at a tavern known locally as the Red House.

He did this to control the traffic on the post road and also could strike at Kingstree and Indiantown if need be. He and his men became the outpost for Georgetown. The defenses of Georgetown had been completed so the only thing that remained was to guard the area.

As stated before, Francis Marion and his men were looking to move out of the Great White Marsh and attack the British. His intelligence was excellent. The locals told him about the movements of the Loyalists and of their outposts in the area. Captain John Ball's small command at the Red House became Marion's target.

On September 14, 1780, Marion and his men crossed the Pee Dee River and went to Witherspoon's Ferry. He joined up forces with Captain James and considered waiting for reinforcements, but decided to proceed to attack anyway. On horseback they rode 12 miles to the Willtown Bridge.

Right before midnight and near the Red House now, Ball's men had heard the hooves of Marion's horses on the planks of the bridge as they crossed. The Loyalist sentry fired his musket. Alerted to the presence of Marion's troops the Loyalists scrambled to defend their position. Marion ordered his men to dismount and fight as Infantry. He did this because Infantry would be better to capture the Red House as opposed to mounted troops.

Marion ordered Captain Thomas Waites and some other officers to demonstrate before the Red House and attack it if possible. He then ordered Colonel Hugh Horry to attack from the right side of the house with his regiment of Patriots from Kingstree. Some of the troops still on horses were to attack the left side so as to attack from three sides. Marion and a small reserve were to wait and go into action where needed.

Captain Ball and his men scrambled to the west side of the house and took the field near the swamp and waited in the darkness for the attack he and they all knew was coming. Colonel Horry's men emerged from the woods and

at 30 yards the Loyalists fired into his troops. The line staggered, but it held. The Patriots now moved forward keeping themselves concealed as much as possible as they fired on the Loyalists. On the Loyalist right side Waites and his men came onto the field and they fired on the British.

Attacked on two sides proved to be enough, Ball's men fired a few more scattering shots and broke. They ran into the Blank Mingo Swamp. The battle of Black Mingo Swamp was a victory for the Americans. Small as it was. Marion's troops took all their arms and ammunition as well as supplies.

They also took their horses. Francis Marion took Captain Ball's horse. It was a good spirited horse that Marion rode in future engagements.

The two sides at the time had about 50 men apiece. The British had 6 men killed and 8 were wounded. The Americans had 2 killed and 5 wounded.

The lasting effects of this small win were worth the risk. More recruits joined Marion's force. Cornwallis was concerned about Marion and made it a priority to capture him or kill him. He sends Banastre Tarleton and his Dragoons out to catch him.

Marion moved through the swamps and back country frustrating Tarleton to the point that after 26 days he was said to curse Marion and that only the devil himself could catch the old fox.

Given the rank of General after he had rescued 500 American POW's, Marion continued his harassment of the British Army. His small engagements added up.

Little by little the British lost supplies and men to his attacks. Hit, run, hit again added up to help America achieve our independence. General Francis Marion, known affectionately by his countrymen as the Swamp Fox, is a name that every American should remember.

By the way, Marion gave his new horse a name. you guess what it was? Cool weather is coming. September is here. Don't worry I won't leave you in suspense. He named it Ball. ###

Renters Beware!

OMG! Another one! Just about everywhere you look lately someone has figured a way to scam other people out of their time and money.

A couple of months ago we wrote about clever hackerthieves who penetrate email accounts and instruct unsuspecting homebuyers to wire their closing funds to crooked bank accounts in Moldavia, Kyrgyzstan or wherever.

Big league, sinister stuff! But what about the risks involved in more mundane real estate activities like renting an apartment? Take a look at an edited email that we saw received regarding a house our office listed for sale in Lodi....

"Thanks for showing interest. The property is still for rent. It's located at... [address]. Move-in date ASAP. You may see a 'for sale' on the lawn but I've decided not to sell. The realtor's a jerk. Most agents aren't truthful. I've decided to rent it myself."

Dominick, the intended victim, showed us the ad on Craigslist which led to this email. The scam artist, 'Sal', was offering the property – a 4 bedroom, 2 bath cape, in a beautiful area - for \$1,500 a month (it would easily go for \$2,500). Fake owner 'Sal', was unable to show the vacant house to Dominick; he was recently "transferred out of state."

So, instead, Sal invited Dominick to peek in the windows or view the realtor photos online via Zillow. He would, he

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wrote, send Dominick an application ("please provide references") and a copy of lease.


If everything went well, Dominick would be FedEx'd the keys and could move in immediately. But only after, of course, slick Sal got the rent & security monies wired to his bank account. Dominick immediately smelled a rat and came to see us.

These days, renters have a lot to worry about, what with raising rents in our NYC area and landlords requesting highly personal information on rental applications (info that could be used for identity theft if improperly handled).

Craigslist is one of the most popular resources prospective tenants use to find available places but due to its nature of allowing anyone to sign up and post, it's riddled with phony postings like the one for our Lodi property.

We were already starting to get a lot of calls about the house being for rent before Dominick came to the office with his story and evidence. We flagged all the scam ads we could find online (on various websites) and even reached out to Sal the SOB scammer to tell him to knock it off. But, thankfully, the house sold quickly and this became a non-issue overnight.

If this scenario sounds like something only a sucker would fall for, consider a more sophis-



turing a low asking rent. The scammer, dressed respectably, shows prospective renters around the property and signs as many leases as he can within a three-week period, with a move-in date scheduled for the first of the next month.

He collects the first month's rent and security deposit from each prospective tenant. Then he disappears, and on the first day of the next month a dozen people all show up to move in...

These are real scenarios, and it happens more often than you think!

So, what are you to do to ensure that you're not dealing with a scammer? First, you can check public records on the Internet (where available) to be sure that the person claiming to own the property actually does.

Second, you can use a specialty site like Airbnb or VRBO, which add transparency through renter reviews and verifications.

Third, you can be alert enough to never send money to anyone without evidence of who they are.

Or - best solution! - you can skip all that and simply engage the services of a Realtor. He or she will help you avoid being scammed. It's part of our job.
