

A Thrilling Voyage Chock Full of Sea Monsters and Side-splitting Action





Corn Moon

The September Full Corn Moon appears on Monday, September 24, 2018, at 10:52 p.m. It is usually known as the "Full Corn Moon" or the "Barley Moon." Corn, pumpkins, squash, beans and wild rice, the chief Indian staples, are now ready for gathering.

According to "The Farmer's Almanac," this full moon occurs closest to the autumn equinox. The "Full Corn Moon" usually comes in September, but in some years it occurs in October.

Often, the September Moon is called the "Harvest Moon" but this year it's in October. The Harvest Moon is the Moon that falls nearest the autumn equinox; this full moon provides the most light at the time when farmers can work late into the night by the light of this moon. It's needed most - to complete the harvest!

The Native American Indians of the northern and eastern United States kept track of the seasons by giving a name to recurring full moons. Europeans followed the custom. ###



Drunk carts and goggles were utilized to let the kids feel how it is to drive while intoxicated. They were asked to complete a course wearing drunk goggles ranging from .08- 3.0 B.A.C. Drug goggles were worn as they competed in squads attempting to make

free throws. They competed in relay races having to utilize equipment that officers need to carry on calls.

Wood-Ridge Fire Department Members were on hand to answer any questions about fire safety, general first aid and the recruits were treated to an ice cold wet down on a hot day.

On the last day, a graduation ceremony was held where the recruits were able to demonstrate to their families some of what they had learned. They impressed all with their drill and ceremony and a short demonstration of physical fitness. Each recruit was given a certificate that they each earned and photo donated by J. Derevyanik Photo.

Police Chief Goscinski addressed the recruits on a job well done and the importance of programs like this. He was given a standing ovation as he retired in the following days.







Trip to Largest Hindu Temple September 30

On Sunday, September 30, 2018, The First Presbyterian Church of Rutherford will sponsor a field trip to The BAPS Shri Swaminarayan Mandir, in Robbinsville, New Jersey. It is considered one of the largest Hindu temples in the world. The awe-inspiring marble Mandir resides within a larger visitor's center, which protects the intricate place of worship from the elements.

Measuring 42 feet tall, 133 feet long, and 87 feet wide, the temple is made entirely of Carrara marble imported from Italy to Rajasthan, India, where hundreds of artisans handcarved the 13,499 pieces. The finished Mandir, which opened in 2014, is an awe-inspiring work of craftsmanship that took a total of 4.7 million man hours, from craftsmen to volunteers to complete.

Among the thousands of elaborate carvings are 98 sthambhas (or carved pillars,) 66 peacock-style arches, 144 sacred figures, and 91 elephants with various musical instruments and flowers.

Historically Speaking

The Neutral Ground

Two hundred and forty years ago, in what is now Bergen County, was literally a battle ground. The British sat in New York City with outposts at Hoboken and Paulus Hook (Jersey City). The Continentals had posts just over the New Jersey/New York line, from the Hudson River to just north of Suffern and from time to time, manned posts in Paramus and New Bridge (River Edge). The area of Bergen County was called the Neutral Ground.

Some historians state that the population of the colony was divided into three factions. About one third advocated strongly for freedom from Great Britain. Another third

continued their allegiance to the Crown. This would create strong divisions in many families. Father versus son, brother versus brother, uncles and cousins.

The third group consisted of various factions ranging from those who were unsure of supporting either the Crown or the Rebels. Thomas Paine would call these "The summer soldier and sunshine patriot." Then there were those who were ambivalent as to who held power and a few pacifists.

Most of this area was rich farmland. At first, Continental Commissary Officers would purchase crops, livestock and horses with Continental script.

As the war went on, this paper money rapidly decreased in value. British Commissary Officers paid in gold and silver. Local farmers attempted to trade with the British via Paulus Hook. Attempts by the local militias were made, to interdict this smuggling.

Later, both sides conducted foraging raids. These were both large and small. At times the British put upwards of three or four thousand troops into these efforts. Smaller raids by Loyalist units, were often contested by local militias. Harvest time was when most of the raids

The British formed Loyalist regiments. They recruited from Bergen County. This was to become the 4th Battalion of the New Jersey Volunteers. They were known as the "Green Coats" from the uniforms they were issued.

To counter this, the State of New Jersey authorized the formations of local militia companies. These militias were part-time, made up of local farmers, who supplied their own firearms and wore no uniforms. They performed various duties such as guarding prisoners and generally acting as a police force. Two of these companies were the Polifly and Outwater Militias.

Nicholas Terhune, of Polifly (now Hasbrouck Heights), was commissioned by the State of New Jersey, as captain, on February 28, 1776, of the Polifly Company. This unit built and manned Fort Polifly. The Fort controlled movement on Polifly Road. This road ran from Hackensack to just south of what is now Rutherford.

John Outwater was appointed captain of a militia company in Moonachie. This company would be called to guard prisoners in Hackensack and stop smuggling, with the British, around the Hackensack River.

From time to time the British would send troops to occupy Hackensack, Paramus and New Bridge. At other times they would raid and loot. On one raid, the infamous Green Coats attacked Hackensack. They burned the court house, looted and burned homes of known and suspected patriots. They were confronted by the Outwater Militia. Captain Outwater was wounded in this engagement.

At another time, Fort Polifly was captured by Loyalist forces. In reply, a surprise attack, on September 22, 1778, by General William Winds, commanding New Jersey troops, captured the Fort and took prisoners. He then destroyed the place by blowing it up.

During the period of the duration of the war, there were some 96 engagements, both large and small, in Bergen and Hudson Counties. It was anything but a Neutral Ground. ###

I know that I have been focusing on life beneath the Harrison Avenue water tower "gee Artie we didn't notice" but wait, there was another part of the Lodi hill where, as a child, I spent a lot of growing up time as well. I'm talking about the northern most tip of Farnham Avenue on a street called Hillside place at the home of Grand

ma and Grandpa Pesenti, my mother Lena's parents.

Now, my mom worked at a large dry cleaning company which was owned and operated by two brothers. The factory was located directly across the street from my grandparents' home. At its peak it employed no less than 20 workers. Yes it was by all accounts a "sweat shop" if only because air conditioning wasn't invented yet at least as far as the brothers were concerned. Luckily for my hard working mother she took summers off to take care of her pride and joy. No, not our dog Dusty although he did carry a lot of weight in that department. Me!

Once school began and walk across this beautiful land. Lena went back to work, my grandmother would make her after school walk down to the Columbus school yard and escort me to her Hillside Place home. I'd spend the hours between 3 p.m. and 4:30 p.m. playing with the kids from that section of the Lodi hill.

> Back in the mid 50s that area of town was wide open. Farnham Avenue was a dirt road lined with rolling hills that extended from Arnot Street to Route 46. By the way Route 46 was nothing but a one lane cow pasture where I and my grandmother would go to pick dandelions. We'd visit a sick friend or two across the highway then

home to wash the greens we just picked and make a salad out of them. My grandmother used to joke around saying that we were like the cows in that we were eating grass. For all I know my grandfather might have put some in his pipe. Wrong grass!

There was another plant growing on what was called the Lodi Circle at the time. My grandmother called it "Malva." She would bring it home, dry it out, boil it and make a tea out of it. It was used to fight off everything from the vapors to bad skin rashes and everything in between. It was more of a preventative measure the taste of which was so bad that it made you forget you had the vapors. My mother used to try and camouflage it by mixing it in with my orange juice. What an unholy brew that was folks.

It took until my teen years before I'd drink orange juice again. It took me that long to trust my mother. I remember sitting at the breakfast table with my mom looking at me through the corner of her eye to see if I fell for it. We'd make eye contact and she'd begin laughing as she dumped the Malva laced orange juice down the drain. "I just squeezed these oranges" she said having taken a sip before emptying the glass. "You can't even taste the Malva."

The look on her beautiful face said different. ###

Filling You In

What is Orofacial Pain?

Orofacial pain includes a number of clinical problems involving the chewing (masticatory) muscles or temporomandibular joint. Problems can include temporomandibular joint discomfort: muscle spasms in the head, neck and jaw; migraines, cluster or frequent headaches; or pain with the teeth, face or jaw.

You swallow approximately 2,000 times per day, which causes the upper and lower teeth to come together and push against the skull. People who have an unstable bite, missing teeth or poorly aligned teeth can have trouble because the

muscles work harder to bring the teeth together, causing strain. Pain also can be caused by clenching or grinding teeth, trauma to the head and neck or poor ergonomics.

Some people may experience pain in the ears, eyes, sinuses, cheeks or side of the head, while others experience clicking when moving the jaw or even locking if the jaw is opened or closed.

If you are concerned about one or more of the above symptoms, your dentist may help by performing a thorough evaluation to determine the cause of the orofacial pain.

Thoughts on **Back to School**

Earlier this year, a nice young couple decided to sell their condo in Jersey City and move to one of the towns down here in our desirable south central Bergen County area. The main reason they moved? Their son, Robbie, age 5, starts school this week.

It's a typical realtor story but it highlights the quality of our local school districts which, I can tell from long experience, accounts immeasurably for the allure and value others put on residential real estate around

"We definitely moved here for the schools," Robbie's mom told us. "We wanted our kids to be with other children whose parents had as much involvement with education. The people here have similar backgrounds to ours. Those are the types of people you want to become friends with, whose kids you want your kids to become friends with."

All over the country, parents are preparing this week to send their children back to school, spending hundreds of dollars on books, clothes and groceries for brown bag lunches. And, for many families, another key back-to-school purchase is... a new home!

Online giant, Trulia, conducted a survey that compared the ratio of families with children aged 5 to 9 versus families with children aged 0 to 4. The results, unsurprisingly, showed that the most attractive communities for families with school-aged kids are traditional suburbs like those around here, where many of us grew up.

The communities that are the least attractive to parents with school-age children (the districts with the lowest ratios of 5-to-9 year olds and 0-to-4 year olds) tended to be denselypopulated areas that are popular with young professionals and students, yet have high real estate prices. them is Hoboken, which has only 39 children of elementary school age for every 100 preschool-aged children.

We in the real estate business see up close the migration trends motivating many 30-39 year olds. A fair number of people in this age group may originate in the centers of cities but, we note, a substantial outflow of them as their kids approach school age. It would appear that, setting their own interests aside, these more mature, responsible couples think more now along the lines of what's in the best interests of their kids.

of summer," marks the end of the summer season.

Labor Day, an annual celebration of workers and their achievements, originated during one of American labor history's most dismal chapters.

In the late 1800s, at the height of the Industrial Revolution in the United States, the average American worked 12-hour days and seven-day weeks in order to eke out a basic living.

People of all ages, particularly the very poor and recent immigrants, often faced extremely unsafe working conditions, with insufficient access to fresh air, sanitary facilities and breaks.

As manufacturing increasingly supplanted agriculture as the wellspring of American employment, labor unions, which had first appeared in the late 18th century, grew more prominent and vocal.

They began organizing strikes and rallies to protest poor conditions and compel employers to renegotiate hours and pay.

Many of these events turned violent during this period, including the infamous Haymarket Riot of 1886, in which several Chicago policemen and workers were killed.

Others gave rise to longstanding traditions: On September 5, 1882, 10,000 workers took unpaid time off to march from City Hall to Union Square in New York City, holding the first Labor Day parade in U.S. history.

The idea of a "working-

Labor Day, "unofficial end men's holiday," celebrated on the first Monday in September, caught on in other industrial centers across the country, and many states passed legislation recognizing it.

> Congress would not legalize the holiday until 12 years later, when a watershed moment in American labor history brought workers' rights squarely into the public's view.

On May 11, 1894, employees of the Pullman Palace Car Company in Chicago went on strike to protest wage cuts and the firing of union representatives.

On June 26, the American Railroad Union, led by Eugene V. Debs, called for a boycott of all Pullman railway cars, crippling railroad traffic na-

To break the strike, the federal government dispatched troops to Chicago, unleashing a wave of riots that resulted in the deaths of more than a dozen workers.

In an attempt to repair ties with American workers, Congress passed an act making Labor Day a legal holiday in the District of Columbia and the territories. More than a century later, the true founder of Labor Day has yet to be identified.

Labor Day is celebrated in cities and towns across the United States with parades, picnics, barbecues, fireworks displays and other public gath-



VFW Post 809 Namesake Petersilge's Death Remembered 100 Years Later

In 1914, Germany and Austria-Hungary declared war on Serbia. Soon other countries, Britain and France honoring their treaties, entered the war to defend Serbia. Not long after, the Ottoman Empire was pulled into the war along with Russia.

What started as a small fight escalated into a world war. In the beginning, swift attacks and large troop movements were the order of the day, but with machine guns and artillery massacring troops by the thousands, soon changed the field of battle. Everyone dug in for the long haul and trench warfare soon became the norm.

This war, unlike the wars of the past brought forth new weapons of destruction on the troops and sailors that would serve. Submarines would now be the new terror of the sea. Not a new idea to be sure, but perfected for use in this war. Thousands of tons of shipping went to the bottom by torpedo attacks. Airplanes would rule the skies bringing a new horror for the infantry from above as they dropped hand grenades and bombs. Machine gunning troops from the air meant that there were no safe places on the field. Tanks would make their first appearance adding new mobile fire power not seen before.

All these new technologies brought to bear on the troops of World War I meant that thousands would die because there was no experience in defense from these weapons.

Still the worst was the chemicals. Poison gas fired into the lines brought death at the expense of taking a breath. Clouds of poisonous green gas drifting across the battlefield killing rats, horses and men too slow putting on their gas masks. Never before or since have troops had to face this

horror on such a large scale.

In 1917, America was content to stay neutral in this conflict but with Germany declaring unrestricted U-boat operations, meant that our ships would be torpedoed. America could no longer stay neutral. America had to protect its shipping and citizens at sea. America declared war on the central powers.

Thousands of young men joined the military to defend our liberty. One of them was Little Ferry's own William E. Petersilge.

Joining the United States Marine Corps he obtained the rank of Corporal. The upper chain of command of the Marine Corps, wishing to honor one of their mottos "First to Fight," requested that the Marines be on the first ships to sail to Europe.

President Woodrow Wilson approved the request and the Marines would be assigned to the Rainbow Division. Under the Command of the Army, the Marines were active in the war in many battles. Belleau Wood Chateau-Thiery, St. Mihiel, the Meuse-Argonne offensive to name a few. They served on naval vessels and for the first time served the Air Corps. Serving on sea, on land and in the air the Marines fought to turn the tide in the War.

The Marines, along with the American Soldiers, forced the enemy to surrender in November of 1918. In all 116,708 Americans died in the War, 2,457 of them were Marines. One of them was our own Corporal William E. Petersilge, who was killed in action on July 29, 1918. It is through men like him that the war was won. Citizens like him that liberty is maintained and passed down to us.

A century later to the day,

guests, friends, the members of Petersilge-Velock Post 809, Veterans of Foreign Wars of the United States and its Auxiliary assembled at Maple Grove Cemetery in Little Ferry at the gravesite of Corporal William E. Petersilge, to remember comrades who served our country during World War I.

Post Commander Joseph Wisneski began. "We must not forget the sacrifices these comrades have made and endured for our way of life. They must remain alive in our minds and hearts for they were on the front lines stopping tyranny and defending liberty for the future of our nation." He then led the service with the salute to our nation's Flag.

The Chaplain gave the opening prayer. The Commander led the Pledge of Allegiance. A symbolic ritual followed, providing an interpretation of its significance.

Flag Ritual at Gravesite Altar

"Before you is the Flag of the United States, the Flag of our country for which our Comrades and Countrymen served and perished defending in World War I. Look closely upon this beautiful symbol and listen to the words of our officers as they present their symbolic tributes."

Junior Vice Commander: "The Flag of the United States reflects our Comrades that served in World War I. The red stripes reflect their courage and willingness to sacrifice, even their lives if necessary. The red of our country's flag has been made redder by their heroism. Therefore, we place these red flowers at our Comrade's grave to symbolize their courage and gallantry."

Senior Vice Commander: "The white stripes symbolize

the purity of purpose that our Comrades had in serving under this beautiful flag. The white becomes more stainlessly pure by the motives which impelled them. We place these white flowers at our Comrade's grave as a reminder of their unselfish devotion to duty."

Officer Of The Day: "The blue of our flag symbolizes truth and fidelity and represents the desire of our Comrades for peace and happiness throughout the world. Therefore, we place these blue flowers at our Comrade's grave, to symbolize the great love that our comrades, that have served in World War I, had for our flag and our country."

Chaplain: "As the Flag symbolizes undying love for our country, this evergreen tribute whose color is a symbol of life everlasting, signifies our undying love for our countrymen and Comrades that perished in World War I."

Madam President: "As the Flag of the United States symbolizes victory over oppression for the living, so this laurel wreath symbolizes victory over death for those who have made the supreme sacrifice. Therefore, we place this last token of affection at our Comrade's grave in honor of our World War I Veterans who have gone to their final reward."

Comrade Nemec: "On behalf of the Marine Corps for whose honor Corporal Petersilge fought and died, I place this symbol of the Corps at his grave. The Corps was his to serve. The flag of our country was theirs to defend. Its glorious colors shall wave over them in death as in life for everyone to behold."

Little Ferry Mayor Mauro D. Raguseo made comments.

Commander: For Little Ferry's own Corporal William E. Petersilge and for our Comrades that served our glorious nation, in silent land beyond, wherever your mortal remains may rest, these solemn services we hold in tribute to you.

The Rifle Squad fired a salute. "Taps" was played.

The Chaplain gave the closing Prayer: "Almighty God, we praise Thee, We glorify Thee and we thank Thee for sparing us from the grasp of our enemies. Grant us full understanding of the suffering endured by our comrades who served in World War I. We ask Thy blessings upon them, that whatever comforts were denied, whatever evil they must have endured, may rebound to their everlasting happiness. Especially do we seek Thy support for their loved ones. May Thy grace be with them always giving them the strength to do their daily tasks and the courage to meet the problems of life. We pray for those Veterans who have been called to Thy bosom that whatever justice they have been denied in this life has been granted them a hundredfold. Amen."

The gravesite service concluded with the "National Anthem."

The Auxiliary held a very brief ceremony, placing flowers at the Petersilge street sign.


